MOVED, That the Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco does hereby appoint the hereinafter designated persons to serve as members of the Citizen's Advisory Committee for the Central Market Street and Tenderloin Area, pursuant to the provisions in the San Francisco Business and Tax Regulations Code, Article 12-A, for the terms specified:

Peter Masiak, seat 2, succeeding Felice Denia, resigned, must have expertise in job creation and or workforce development, for a term ending August 2, 2017. Seat 2 or seat 3 has to be a member who represents labor.

I moved to San Francisco in August 2005. After a year and a half working on political and union campaigns in the Bay Area, I was lucky enough to be hired as the lead tenant organizer for the Central City SRO Collaborative (CCSRO). Over the next two and a half years I developed a deep love and commitment to the Central Market and Tenderloin neighborhood. As the lead tenant organizer I worked with SRO tenants around a myriad of community concerns identified by SRO tenants. Issues tackled included public safety, pedestrian safety, bedbug legislation and enforcement, lifeline telephone service, job training and placement, budget cuts to social service nonprofits, civic engagement, and many others.

It was due to the obstacles, roadblocks, and opportunities I encountered during my time at CCSRO that I decided to pursue a master's degree in public policy at UC Berkeley's Goldman School of Public Policy (GSPP). I used my time at GSPP to develop a skill set around addressing policy issues that affect the city's most vulnerable populations. After completing my degree in the spring of 2011, I took a job as an organizer with SEIU 1021, and after bouncing around the Bay Area on several campaigns, I have returned to the Central Market and Tenderloin neighborhood as the lead organizer on a series of campaign to help city-funded nonprofit workers gain a voice on the job through unionization.

During my time as active member of the Central Market and Tenderloin community I have worked on the following issues that grant me relevant knowledge and experience in regards to serving on the CAC:

- Developed and ran several community/political campaigns as the lead tenant organizer with the CCSRO.
- Conducted outreach efforts in private and nonprofit SRO hotels.
- As an intern through GSPP, I managed the nonprofit addback list for Supervisor John Avalos for the FY10-11 budget.
- Worked closely with Supervisor Avalos and staff around developing the landmark Local Hire legislation.
- Researched, designed, and implemented a campaign to organize the workers at Larkin Street Youth Services

I am interested in serving on the Central Market and Tenderloin CAC because I feel it is the most important neighborhood in San Francisco. It is the home of thousands of low-income and working class San Franciscans whose ability and right to call the area home is constantly under assault by real estate and business interests. These residents also depend on a web of social services whose budgets are annually debated and threatened. The residents depend on these services to live safe, healthy, and productive lives, and the workers employed by these social service nonprofits are a wellspring of civic engagement and political activism in San Francisco. To significantly alter the character of the Central Market and Tenderloin community without a commitment to receiving input from the residents would negatively affect the character of both the neighborhood and the city in a manner than can never be undone.

With that being said, it is also important to realize that housing and business development in the area is welcome and inevitable. To refuse to acknowledge development is to silence the voice of those affected. Therefore, the diversity of the community must be actively and legitimately engaged in order to ensure that whatever changes do occur create opportunities for the residents of the neighborhood and maintain its unique character. I hope that my experience and my relationships allow me to assist in this difficult endeavor.



Qualifications, Professional Experiences and Civic Activities

I have lived in the "enderloin in 9 years and I've lived in San Francisco for the last 25 years. I was born in San Francisco and am currently a lead tenant organizer for the San Francisco Central City SRO Collaborative. My primary responsibilities at the SF CCSRO Collaborative include:

- conducting emergency preparedness trainings to tenants of the Collaborative as well as privately-tiwned SRO hotels;
- providing first-hand testimony before legislative and policy-making bodies (such as the Board of Supervisors as well as the California state legislature) regarding the issues and challenges that low-income tenants in San Francisco face, such as the importance of Lifeline* to low-income residents of San Francisco;
- consulting, upon request, the district supervisor whose jurisdiction includes the Tenderloin and South of Market neighborhoods;
- performing outreach, education, and support to low-income tenants who reside in the Tenderloin neighborhood.

The individuals that I serve are a diverse group from all racial and ethnic backgrounds and I am in frequent contact and communication with them, especially regarding the matters that are most important to their quality of life, specifically about life in the SRO's of San Francisco. My work allows me to have direct experience and information about daily life in the neighborhood from a wide range of perspectives.

In addition to my professional responsibilities as a tenant organizer with the Collaborative, I also am a part of community—based initiatives in the Tenderloin, such as the Tenderloin Healthy Corner Store Coalition and Safe Passages. The Tenderloin Healthy Corner Store Coalition strives to ensure that the stores that operate in the Tenderloin are providing culturally diverse products, healthier products, and a greater range of healthy options for food products at a reasonable price in the neighborhood. Currently, we are obtained the cooperation of 53 stores out of a total of 70 operating stores to participate in our assessment and we will be issuing findings and recommendations at its conclusion. The Safe Passages Program is a grass—roots initiative to ensure the safe travel of children to and from school and their after-school programs/activities and home. As a Safe Passages Corner Captain, I am on the street every week and I interact frequently with the parents, caregivers, and staff of community-based programs.

As a former Merchant Marine for several years (2.5 yrs), I learned at an early age of 19 how to deal with the most challenging environment and with the most challenging personalities. These are skills that I often apply to my current professional and personal life in the Tenderloin.

My involvement in all of the above provides me with insight and on-the-ground information about this neighborhood that is unique in its breadth and depth. Last but not least, I love the Tenderloin neighborhood and am committed in seeing it grow in a positive direction.

THE RISING OF THE TENDERLOIN HISTORICAL DISTRICT THE LITTLE BLOCK THAT COULD

When was the last time anyone reading this has taken a stroll through the Historical District of San Francisco? If you're like most people, the answer may be awhile to never. However, if you have cheated yourself by not doing so, you will have missed the vast improvements taking place here. I moved to the 300 Block of Hyde Street just over a year ago, and the differences from one year ago to present day are night and day. However, to explain where we are, this block is, and where it is so clearly headed, I must explain where we were. Let me take you back to when I first moved here, and tell you the true story of how the community worked hand in hand with SFPD, SF Safe, and the results that are possible.

In April of 2011, I crash landed here on the 300 Block of Hyde after a failed engagement in Sacramento. I grew up in the Bay Area, Burlingame to be more exact. However, before meeting my fiancé I lived in San Francisco's Mission District for eight years, and over the better advice of my friend Dave I left the City that I love and has always seemingly loved me back. I was beat up emotionally, sleeping on my Grandmother's couch. I knew I had to get back to my San Francisco. To the City that always took care of me, showed me a good time, and never judged me. After much hassle and ado I ended up on the 300 Block of Hyde Street, heartbroken and starting over as a 34 year old with his life.

It wasn't too long after I moved in that I noticed that a certain criminal element had mistakenly came to believe that the 300 block of Hyde belonged to them, and not the good and honest residents of the 300 Block who were essentially prisoners in their own homes held captive by the degenerate crooks whom had taken over the street of this fair block. I found this highly unacceptable, so I set out to form a civic association after reading the Cities Charter. A Civic Association may, as ours does, have a multi-functional role. A prime example is how the 300 Block Hyde Street Association has a strong neighborhood watch element to it. However, I found that using the term "neighborhood watch" may make some uneasy.

I immediately began putting up flyers, stating there were people on the block whom were as sick of this criminal element as I believed my neighbors to be. At first the out of town crack dealing crooks, would rip down my flyers, and try to intimidate me. This only steeled my resolve, and forced me to seek greater resources then my own. At the same time this was happening, my neighbor Adam and Co-Founder contacted me, and stated as the manager of a building, a PHD, and the son of a military officer he found the situation unacceptable as well. Together we contacted Captain Garrity of the Tenderloin Police Station.

Captain Garrity provided us with information and contacts on how to create a neighborhood watch group. The Non-profit association which Captain Garrity put us in contact with was SF Safe. SF Safe is a free service provided any community that wishes to create a community watch group. They give lectures, and will do much of the leg work for any San Francisco community whom wishes to start a neighborhood watch group, but has no idea about how to go about creating one.

While Adam, SF Safe, and I, handled the non-governmental civil side of the coin, the good Captain, his Lieutenants, Sargent's, and other hero's which serve the public did step up patrols on the 300 Block of Hyde greatly. Using sophisticated tactics and timing, SFPD was able to arrest as many as 35 of these violent, vicious, and predatory crack dealers, at the height of SFPD's sweeps of the block. Moreover, I informed the Captain that Princess Market desperately sought to rid the block of the criminal element which routinely loitered and blocked the entrance to their business. The next day uniformed Officers were in Princes Market, and provided them with SFPD posting Civil Ordinance 25.

In less than a year time, SFPD along with phone calls from concerned citizens like Adam, Princess Market, and I, did clean up the block. However, this quite literally is only where the story began. An amazing thing happened once the SFPD had cleared the block from its infestation of crack dealers. At first the residents whom live here, started coming outside and enjoying where they live. Next, the building owners and landlord's realized that the block was about to change for the better, and so they started fixing up the buildings here. New construction and renovation came to our little microcosm.

Before long, new and young tenants unable to afford the sky-rocketing rents of San Francisco, but still seeking to enjoy all the perks and benefits associated with living in this great town started moving in. The Brown Jug Saloon, hired security for its door on peak nights. Students, working class, young professionals, and decent people soon replaced the crack dealers. I spoke with the Brown Jug's bartender, whom reports a new influx of young party goers living locally with-in the last three months.

The situation has so drastically changed that I have begun speaking to neighbors about if they would attend "Welcome to the block" and SF Safe meeting at the Brown Jug Saloon, where the bar tender has agreed to host such an event. The beauty in a Civic Association is it is just that, as the motto of this great city translates "Golden in Peace, Iron in War." Since we are no longer at a metaphorical war, I believe it'd be a useful community building tool to have a meet and greet, and have SF Safe hold a networking and neighborhood class.

As property values are rising here, as the neighborhood has strong momentum in a positive direction, I would like to see these changes made permanent. The Mission has become over expensive; as did the Haight which became over expensive and so the Mission became the next best thing. The Mission has become over expensive and the Historical Tenderloin District the

newest best thing. There are artists here now, a new elementary school across from the Police station, a recording studio, a film studio, a museum, and more. I believe having spoken to my neighbors; I am not the only one whom has been noticing the changes.

The crooks are on the run or already gone, decent folks of all races are moving in, and those whom were once afraid to enjoy this great City, are taking another look at the Historical District of San Francisco. People are drinking here, people are eating here, people are moving in here. This is the new place to be. The ground floor of a community and neighborhood rising from a once obscure if not tainted reputation. People feel safe again, tourists and party goers are beginning to realize that the bars, restaurants, and night clubs in the Historical District can not only hold their own with those located in any other district, but often times are even better priced.

The truth be told, I was offered a chance to leave, but I have chosen to stay. In part, because the neighborhood and block are no longer in an unsatisfactory condition, in part because I refuse to quit on people and places that refuse to quit on me, and most importantly I know and have faith in the magic of San Francisco. People actually care here, a societal element which is strongly interwoven into the hearts and minds of the citizenry and public servants of this great city. Moreover, I want to be a part of something, a community, a movement of positive change, which while a year in the making, has most definitely taken off in the right direction. So far in fact, it can never go back, and nor should a true story and positive movement ever be allowed to fizzle out. Instead, true stories of possessiveness, hard work by the SFPD, and a group of neighbors whom decided to get involved, should burn bright as a beacon and guiding light to other embattled neighborhoods everywhere in this city, state, and country of what can be done when people do something as small as actually care.

Citizen's Advisory Committee must fill 7 vacant seats

DOZEN APPLICANTS have stepped forward to be considered for the seven vacant seats on the Citizen's Advisory Committee, which helps frame the terms of the city's community benefit agreements with companies seeking the payroll tax break.

Following are descriptions of the 11 CAC seats that are intended to include representatives of the neighborhood's main constituencies, the people who occupy, or seek to occupy, those positions, and the credentials they claim.

SEAT 1: Eva Pirring, whose CAC term expires in 2015, was one of four CAC members who survived the purge. A care provider with In-Home Supportive Services Consortium and a member of the Tenderloin Filipino-American Community Association, she represents low-income families in the neighborhood. She also was a sales associate with DSW Shoes and a First Bank customer service representative. SEAT 2: This seat and Seat 3 are reserved for experts in job creation or workforce development, and one of the two must also represent labor. Felice Ana Denia, a dancer, founder of Denia Dance Co. and former member of Mid-Market Redevelopment PAC, held the seat until the May purge. She has not reapplied; the seat's term exiends until August 2017.

The applicant for Seat 2 is Peter Masiak, who-lives on Haight Street and lists his workplace as the SEIU offices on Rhode Island Street. His experience includes several years as a tenant organizer with the Central City SRO Collaborative and efforts to organize nonprofit workers. As a graduate student at UC Berkeley's Goldman School of Public Policy, he wrote or co-wrote studies of the Central Market Street payroll expense tax break. SEAT 3: Steven Suzuki did not survive the purge and has reapplied for this seat, the lone candidate for it. Architect Suzuki is executive director of Asian Neighborhood Design, located South of Market. The nonprofit uses architecture, community planning, employment training and support services to help revitalize low-income area. Suzuki has served on the board of a handful of Bay Area organizations and currently is a board member of Japanese American Religious Federation-Housing Inc.

SEAT 4: Incumbent Nella Corpuz Manuel remains a member until 2015 in this seat, representing senior or disabled residents. Manuel, a senior who lives in the Tenderloin, is the coordinator for TNDC's People's Garden at Larkin and McAllister, and treasurer of the Canon Kip Senior Advisory Council.

SEAT 5: Brad Paul, ousted in the May purge, has reapplied for the seat, reserved for someone with expertise in affordable housing or tenant protection and anti-displacement policies and strategies. He is the only applicant for the seat, which expires in 2015. Paul is a long-ago TL resident who helped start the neighborhood down its improvement path and create the trend toward supportive housing in SROs. Executive director of the North of Market Planning Coalition from 1982-87 and later a housing, urban development and planning consultant, he was a senior program officer focusing on strengthening neighborhoods for the Evelyn and Walter Haas Jr. Fund. He now is deputy director for the Association of Bay Area Govern-

SEAT 6: Robert Marquez, the only CAC member who never missed a meeting, represents a community organization that provides direct services. He is director of S.F. Mental Health Client's Rights Advocates, the state-mandated program every county is required to program every county is required to the seat when his term ends at the end of July.

SEAT 7: Reserved for someone with "small business expertise and a familiarity with the Central Market Street and Tenderloin Area," according to the vacancy notice, this seat became vacant when former CAC Chair Dina Hilliard resigned at the end of April to have a baby. Four people have applied for the seat; the term expires in August 2017.

David Addington is the former owner of the Warfield Building and Warfield Theater, and is part owner of Showdogs restaurant. He spent hundreds of thousands of dollars in 2009 on Prop. D, a failed bid to allow for high-wattage advertising on mid-Market buildings. "I spend some time nearly every day in Central Market and am pretty familiar with the goings on," he stated in his CAC application. He also was on the committee that helped form the Tenderloin CBD.

Also applying is self-described educator, designer and artist Julian Prince Dash, whose writes, "I am the neighborhood and the neighborhood is me. ... I see no distinction between the person sleeping in the house on the hills to the person sleeping on

the actual hill." Dash's business, Holy Stitch!, operates from 42 Turk St. He's hired young drug dealers and homeless veterans, he said in the application, and operated two pop-up, "denim-centered" shops, at 986 Market and 1100 Market, in conjunction with the Luggage Store Gallery.

The third applicant is Civic Center CBD Executive Director Robert Savoie, who serves on the advisory board of the Community Justice Center, worked as a fundraiser for the Stop AIDS Project and was executive director of the San Francisco Gay Men's Chorus.

Fourth is Aaron Selverston, founder and CEO of White Rabbit Strategic Consulting, which consults on political and initiative campaigns. He notes in his application that David Addington is one of his clients. "We need level-headed leadership that fights to preserve the creative and cultural core here," he says. He cites his six months of "nurturing relationships with nonprofit, city and business leaders all intent on a thriving low-income community."

SEAT 8: This seat, reserved for someone with expertise on homelessness, transitional age youth or supportive housing, became vacant when Daniel Hlad resigned Jan. 24 to avoid a potential conflict of interest — Hospitality House, where he works as development director, had won a grant from Twitter.

The seat has two applicants, Steven Tennis and Jeff Kositsky.

Tennis lives in the Hartland Hotel on Geary Street, is a Central City SRO Collaborative tenant organizer there and lists his occupation as an activist/ advocate. He's led the Collaborative's regular disaster-preparedness workshops and works at the Tenderloin Healthy Corner Store Coalition as a resident food leader, helping to bring healthier foods items to neighborhood corner stores. He also is a volunteer corner captain for Safe Passage, a volunteer effort to help children navigate the streets of the Tenderloin. Tennis also has applied for Seat 11.

Kositsky, who submitted a threepage resume, has worked in the social sector for decades: He served eight years as Community Housing Partnership executive director and currently is chief operating officer for Green For All, a nonprofit that promotes building a green economy that helps low-income people. Kositsky has consulted various nonprofits and for several years was director of tenant services for the Rural California Housing Corporation.

SEAT 9: Mara Blitzer, senior project manager at TNDC, represents real estate and leasing interests. She oversees large, complex developments - the most recent the newly opened Kelly Cullen Community in the old Central YMCA building. She has a master's degree from Columbia University's Graduate School of Architecture, Planning and Preservation. The term of the seat, which she's held since the CAC was formed in 2011, expires in 2015. SEAT 10: The only applicant for the seat formerly held by Jesus Perez, reserved for a resident of District 6, is Antoinetta Stadlman, If approved, she will be a member for the unexpired term that ends in 2015. StadIman works as a front desk receptionist for a Sixth Street SRO, was a former member and chair of the now defunct South of Market Redevelopment PAC and currently serves on the advisory board for the Tom Waddell Clinic. In 2001, Stadlman received San Francisco Foundation's Koshland Award, given to people who take on the challenges of helping the most problematic neighborhoods. She also applied for seat 11.

SEAT 11: Also reserved for a District 6 resident, this seat has been vacant since Linda Pierce resigned last year to take a new, demanding job. Four applicants are looking to fill the seat. Its term ends in 2017.

Antoinetta Stadlman, who applied for seat 10, also applied for this one, as did Stephen Tennis, who applied for Seat 6.

Peter Gallotta is a LGBT community activist and says he's lived in the Tenderloin for four years. An alumnus of the San Francisco City Hall Fellow program, a public service program for college graduates, Gallotta founded the Mama-G's Thanksgiving Street Dinner in 2009 and works for the S.E. Department of the Environment as an association in its Commute Smart Program.

Adam Leising is a doctoral candidate at Stanford University's Emmett Interdisciplinary Program in Environment + Resources, with fields of study that include economics, sociology and engineering. He is a volunteer for Supervisor David Chiu and works for Best Bay Apartment as a residential manager for an apartment building on Hyde Street in the lower Nob Hill, Tenderloin area.

Board Qualifications:

The Citizen's Advisory Committee shall be composed of eleven members:

- (1) member representing low-income families who lives with his or her family in the Central Market Street and Tenderloin Area or Adjacent Area;
- (2) members who have expertise in job creation and or workforce development, including one member who represents labor;
- (1) member who is a senior or disabled resident of the Central Market Street and Tenderloin Area or Adjacent Area;
- (1) member who has expertise in affordable housing or tenant protection and anti-displacement policies and strategies, and has familiarity with the Central Market Street and Tenderloin Area;
- (1) member who represents a community-based organization or provides direct services to the Central Market Street and Tenderloin Area or Adjacent Area;
- (1) member who has small business expertise and familiarity with the Central Market Street and Tenderloin Area; and
- (1) member with expertise on homelessness, transitional age youth, or supportive housing and familiarity with the Central Market Street and Tenderloin Area or the Adjacent Area.
- (1) member with expertise in commercial real estate and leasing within the Central Market Street and Tenderloin Area.
- (2) members who are residents of the Central Market Street and Tenderloin Area or Adjacent Area.

San Francisco BOARD OF SUPERVISORS

The Rules Committee of the Board of Supervisors shall nominate each Citizen's Advisory Committee member and the appointment of each nominee shall be confirmed by the full Board of Supervisors.

The members of the Citizen's Advisory Committee shall be appointed for a term of four years; provided, however, that members first appointed shall, by lot at the first meeting, classify their terms so that three shall serve for a term of two years and four shall serve for a term of four years.

The Citizen's Advisory Committee shall be an advisory body whose purpose is to make recommendations to the Mayor, Board of Supervisors and City Administrator on policies and programs that mitigate the effects of development, bolster economic development, local employment, and community sustainability and seek to stabilize and protect existing tenants, community based organizations and small businesses in and around the Central Market Street and Tenderloin Area.

Report: Provide a report every six months to the Board of Supervisors regarding the implementation and execution of the Community Benefit Agreements called for under the Central Market Street and Tenderloin Area Payroll Expense Tax Exclusion.

Sunset Clause: The provisions of this ordinance and the operation of the Citizen's Advisory Committee shall expire upon expiration of the Central Market Street and Tenderloin Area Payroll Expense Tax Exclusion under Section 906.3 of this Article.
