## **OneBayArea Grant Program**

On May 17, 2012, the Metropolitan Transportation Commission (MTC) adopted the OneBayArea Grant Program (OBAG), which among other features will direct \$38.8 million in federal transportation funds to San Francisco over the next four years. As the Congestion Management Agency (CMA) for San Francisco, the Authority was responsible for issuing a call for projects to select the San Francisco projects to be funded by OBAG. Eligible project types were required to fit into one of the following programs: Bicycle and Pedestrian Improvements (e.g. new bike lanes, wider sidewalks), Local Streets and Roads Preservation (e.g. street resurfacing), Safe Routes to School (e.g. pedestrian crossing improvements, outreach focused on encouraging safe walk/bike access to schools), and Transportation for Livable Communities (e.g. multi-modal improvements such as complete streets projects and transit station/stop improvements). In addition, at least 70% (or about \$24 million) of the OBAG funds must go toward projects that support Priority Development Areas (e.g. transit-oriented development).

After a rigorous selection process, on June 25, 2013, the San Francisco Transportation Authority Board adopted San Francisco's OBAG program of projects for \$35,016,000 in Federal funds. The program of projects included \$17,026,221 in funds for four projects submitted by the Department of Public Works:

Longfellow Safe Routes to School Project (\$670,307): To improve pedestrian safety around the school.

ER Taylor Safe Routes to School Project (\$519,631): To improve pedestrian safety around the school.

Chinatown Broadway Phase IV Street Design Project (\$5,320,537): To extend the streetscape improvements along Broadway implemented in phases one through three, between Powell and the Broadway Tunnel, including pedestrian safety enhancements around Jean Parker Elementary School and greening.

Second Street Streetscape Improvement Project (\$10,515,746): To improve pedestrian and bicycle safety, add landscaping and street furnishings, and improve the pavement condition.
