Dear Members of the Board of Supervisors:

Enclosed for your consideration is a resolution in support of the programing of \$7,300,000 from the Octavia Boulevard Special Fund for certain transportation projects on corridors on and ancillary to Octavia Boulevard selected by the San Francisco County Transportation Authority (SFCTA).

Background

On January 16, 2001, the State of California transferred certain property formerly occupied by the Central Freeway to the City and County of San Francisco (City) pursuant to Section 72.1 of the California Streets and Highways Code and a Cooperative Agreement dated. November 29, 2000. The City is required to use the proceeds from the sale of these properties for transportation and related purposes permitted under California Constitution Article XIX. These proceeds are held in the Octavia Boulevard Special Fund.

Pursuant to Proposition I adopted by the City's voters in November of 1999, the City must use all proceeds from the sale or disposition of the Central Freeway parcels for (i) a ground surface boulevard along Octavia Boulevard. between Market and Turk streets and (ii) transportation improvements to corridors on or ancillary to Octavia Boulevard (Ancillary Projects). Proposition I also requires that the SFCTA allocate the proceeds for the Ancillary Projects on a competitive basis according to specified criteria and with advice from its Central Freeway Citizens Advisory Committee and its Technical Working Group, which then included the Municipal Railway, the Department of Public Works (DPW), the City's Planning Department, the San Francisco Redevelopment Agency, and regional transit operators.

In 2006, after a process of community and public agency outreach and input, the SFCTA adopted its Ancillary Projects Study. The Ancillary Projects Study identified 12 Ancillary Projects (Selected Projects). Five of the Selected Projects have been completed (McCoppin streetscape improvements; Valencia Street sidewalk trees; pedestrian-scale lighting under and around Valencia Street freeway ramp; Market Street bike lanes between 8th Street and Octavia Boulevard; and 13th Street ADA improvements). Four are in progress (Stevenson/Jessie Street traffic calming; Pearl/Elgin Park traffic calming; McCoppin Community Park/public space; and Caltrans right of way improvements for a skate park and a dog park).

After further study, DPW, SFMTA and SFCTA determined that three of the Selected Projects (street trees along specific sidewalks Phase I and Phase II, and Protected Northbound Left-Turn Signal Phase at Valencia / McCoppin streets) were not necessary. The SFCTA is considering the replacement of these three Selected

Projects with projects that better address the current transportation needs of the corridors on or ancillary to Octavia Boulevard.

Since the SFCTA's Central Freeway Citizens Advisory Committee no longer exists, the SFCTA is making this decision with advice from the Market and Octavia Community Advisory Committee (MOCAC). The MOCAC was created in connection with the 2007 Market and Octavia Plan, which covers the section of Octavia Boulevard described in Proposition I. The SFCTA also considered the advice of the City's Interagency Plan Implementation Committee (IPIC), which was created to formalize interagency coordination for City Area Plan - identified community improvements. The IPIC is also required to make recommendations for Area Plans with respect to capital project implementation and funding and programming via collaboration among SFMTA, SFCTA, the City's Planning Department, DPW, Recreation and Parks Department, Library, Human Services Agency, and Capital Planning Committee.

The IPIC and the MOCAC identified and prioritized the following short and long term projects as possible replacement Ancillary Projects, all of which expected to be prioritized as ancillary projects by the SFCTA Board on July 23, 2013:

Short term projects (anticipated to be implemented within 18 months):

- A. MARKET AND OCTAVIA SAFETY IMPROVEMENTS Red light camera for eastbound traffic as a short term improvement and design costs associated with intersection improvements including traffic calming, pedestrian enhancements, and bicycle enhancements.
- B. OCTAVIA AND OAK SAFETY INTERSECTION IMPROVEMENTS Implement soft hit posts on Oak to separate turn lanes.
- C. PEDESTRIAN SPOT IMPROVEMENTS Update 20 intersections within a block radius of Octavia: add red zones for all approaches, convert all standard crosswalks to continental crosswalks, and upgrade signal timing to accommodate walking speed standards.
- D. GOUGH PEDESTRIAN COUNTDOWN SIGNALS Install pedestrian countdown signals at Fulton, Grove and Page.
- E. RE-OPENING FELL/ GOUGH CROSSWALK Re-open crosswalk and add a pedestrian bulb.
- F. BICYCLE SAFETY SPOT IMPROVEMENTS Includes improvements at Market and Buchannan and short term interventions at Page at Octavia.

Long term projects (scopes to be further refined through the annual IPIC process):

- G. PEDESTRIAN/BICYCLE SAFETY IMPROVEMENTS Implement safety improvements at intersections including Market and Octavia, Oak and Octavia, and Fell and Octavia. Implement other pedestrian improvements along Market.
- H. 5 FULTON TRANSIT IMPROVEMENTS Implement street improvements to reduce travel time for the 5 Fulton bus.

I. OCTAVIA CORRIDOR TRANSIT IMPROVEMENTS – Implement Fixed Guideway improvements.

On July 16, 2013, the SFMTA Board of Directors adopted a resolution urging the SFCTA to select these 10 proposed projects as ancillary projects, and urging the Board of Supervisors to support the programming of funding for them from the Octavia Boulevard Special Fund. Additionally, the SFCTA Board of Directors will decide whether to select these 10 proposed projects as ancillary projects at its July 23rd Board Meeting. A resolution naming the proposed projects as approved ancillary projects is expected to be received at that time.

Recommendation

The SFMTA recommends that the Board of Supervisors support the programming of funding in the amount of \$7,300,000 for the proposed projects if the SFCTA selects them as ancillary projects.

Projects List

Summary

In 1998, San Francisco voters approved Proposition E, calling for the removal of the Central Freeway structure north of Market Street and for its replacement with a ground level boulevard along Octavia Street between Market and Fell Streets. In 1999, San Francisco voters approved Proposition I, which reaffirmed the earlier vote for Proposition E and required that the City use any proceeds from the sale or lease (e.g. parking revenues) of parcels made available by the demolition of the Central Freeway for the Octavia Boulevard project and transportation improvements to corridors on or ancillary to Octavia Boulevard. Proposition I also designated the Authority as the project's fiscal agent, responsible for approving the overall program budget and prioritizing any remaining revenues for ancillary projects. The Authority Board also established the Central Freeway Citizens Advisory Committee (CFCAC), which was set up to provide input on the Central Freeway Replacement Project (Project), including the ancillary projects. Based on input from the CFCAC, in-2006, the Authority approved a list of prioritized ancillary projects (Attachment 1), which assumed a budget of \$5.75 million. The CFCAC was subsequently disbanded. The City now estimates that an additional \$7-9 million will be available for an expanded list of ancillary projects. The Planning Department, Department of Public Works, the San Francisco Municipal Transportation Agency, and the Office of Economic and Workforce Development have been working with Commissioners Wiener and Breed to develop an expanded list of ancillary projects (Attachment 3) that directs funds to short- and longer-term projects that will help further address neighborhood impacts related to the Project. The Market and Octavia Community Advisory Committee and the City's Interagency Plan Implementation Committee both support the proposed expanded project lists. We are seeking a recommendation to amend the Central Freeway Replacement Project ancillary projects list.

BACKGROUND

In 1998, San Francisco voters approved Proposition E, calling for the removal of the Central Freeway structure north of Market Street and for its replacement with a ground level boulevard along Octavia Street between Market and Fell Streets. In 1999, San Francisco voters approved Proposition I, which reaffirmed the earlier vote for Proposition E and required that the City use any proceeds from the sale or leases (e.g. parking revenues) of parcels made available by the demolition of the Central Freeway for the Octavia Boulevard project and transportation improvements to corridors on or ancillary to Octavia Boulevard. After paying for construction of Octavia Boulevard, funds remaining were to be used to create an interim traffic management plan and bring portions of Van Ness, South Van Ness, and Mission Streets adopted as State Highway 101 into a state of good repair. The Van Ness state of good repair improvements will be constructed concurrent with the Van Ness Bus Rapid Transit Project. Proposition I also designated the Authority as the project's fiscal agent, responsible for approving the overall program budget and prioritizing remaining revenues for ancillary projects. The Authority Board

also established the Central Freeway Citizens Advisory Committee (CFCAC), which was set up to provide input on the Central Freeway Replacement Project, including Octavia Boulevard and the ancillary projects.

Starting in 2004, the Authority began working with the CFCAC and City departments to develop a systematic approach to identifying, defining, screening, ranking and prioritizing of ancillary projects to address neighborhood impacts resulting from the new boulevard and touchdown ramps, and to help these new transportation facilities function more efficiently and safely. At that time, the City projected that the sale of vacant parcels and associated parking revenues would generate approximately \$5.75 million for ancillary projects. In early 2006, the CFCAC recommended and the Authority Board approved, through Resolution 06-40 the Central Freeway Replacement Project Ancillary Projects Study Report, which identified a list of prioritized ancillary projects shown in Attachment 1. Following the Ancillary Projects Study Report's adoption, the CFCAC was disbanded.

The City now estimates that \$7-\$9 million in excess revenues from the sale of vacant parcels is available for additional ancillary projects, and seeks to amend the list of ancillary projects to include additional projects. The purpose of this memo is to brief the Plans and Programs Committee on the proposed additional projects and seek a recommendation to amend the Central Freeway Replacement Project Ancillary Projects List.

DISCUSSION

The current estimated cost of implementing the ancillary projects identified by the CFCAC, originally estimated at \$5.75 million, is \$15.6 million as shown in Attachment 2. About half of the increase (\$5.2 million) is for 20-year leases for the skate park and dog run on Caltrans parcels beneath the new Central Freeway structure. Although the cost of the ancillary projects is higher than anticipated in 2006, the projects are fully funded given that the land sale revenues have come in significantly higher than projected and the cost of the Octavia Boulevard project was below the engineer's estimate. To date, nine of the twelve ancillary projects have been completed or are in the process of being implemented by the Department of Public Works (DPW) and the San Francisco Municipal Transportation Agency (SFMTA). The SFMTA will construct the signal modifications at Valencia and McCoppin through the McCoppin Hub project. DPW analysis for the two tree planting projects recommended by the CFCAC determined there was no need to plant additional trees along identified streets.

The City has requested that the Authority Board, in its capacity as fiscal agent, program the estimated \$7-\$9 million in increased revenue. The Planning Department, DPW, SFMTA, and the Office of Economic and Workforce Development have been working with Commissioners Wiener and Breed to develop the expanded ancillary project list that directs funds to short- and long-term projects that will help further address neighborhood impacts related to the Central Freeway Replacement Project. The proposed list of additional projects is shown in Attachment 3. SFMTA and DPW plan to complete the short-term bicycle and pedestrian safety projects within 18 months at an estimated cost of \$2.3 million. The projects are supported by the Market and Octavia Community Advisory Committee (MO CAC), which passed a resolution in support of the potential short-term projects at its June 17, 2013 meeting (Attachment 4). The City's Interagency Plan Implementation Committee (IPIC), established by the Board of Supervisors in 2006 to formalize interagency coordination for City Area Plan identified community improvements, also supports expanding the ancillary project list to include the projects shown in Attachment 3.

The IPIC, in consultation with the MO CAC have also identified a set of long-term projects, which address transportation needs in the project area, but require additional scoping and design (Attachment

6). These include pedestrian and bicycle safety improvements, 5-Fulton Transit Improvements, and Octavia Corridor Transit Improvements. The SFMTA and Planning Department will refine project scopes and cost estimates in the summer of 2013 and then present the projects to the IPIC and MO CAC, which will prioritize improvements based on community priorities, feasibility, and pedestrian/bike safety benefits. In the fall of 2013, the IPIC will make a formal recommendation to the Planning Commission and Board of Supervisors to approve the long-term projects.

With respect to the Octavia Corridor Transit Improvements, we understand that Commissioner Breed is interested in procuring an additional light rail vehicle for use on the N-Judah line to increase transit reliability and efficiency in the project area. While not included as a potential project for these funds because rolling stock is ineligible for parcel revenues due to Article XIX to the State Constitution restrictions, the IPIC recognizes this is an important transportation need for this area. This summer the IPIC will consider a number of fund sources to facilitate light rail vehicle acquisition, including development impact fees, Prop K, and other transportation dollars. The Authority, Planning Department, and SFTMA are committed to developing a funding strategy for transportation investments in the area that includes comprehensive transportation improvements in concert with pedestrian and bicycle safety enhancements. Funding strategies for light rail vehicle acquisition, including potential funding swaps, would be the subject of a future action by the Authority Board or Board of Supervisors.

We are seeking a recommendation to amend the Central Freeway Replacement Project ancillary projects list.

ALTERNATIVES

- 1. Recommend adoption of an amended Central Freeway Replacement Project ancillary projects list, as requested.
- 2. Recommend adoption of an amended Central Freeway Replacement Project ancillary projects list, with modifications.
- 3. Defer action, pending additional information or further staff analysis.

CAC POSITION

The Authority's CAC did not act on items related to the Central Freeway Replacement Ancillary Project Study. This was the purview of the CFCAC which has since been disbanded. Thus, this item is being presented directly to the Plans and Programs Committee.

FINANCIAL IMPACTS

There are no financial impacts on the Authority's budget from the proposed action. The budget for these activities will be funded by land sale revenues appropriated through the City's budget process to the DPW.

RECOMMENDATION

Recommend adoption of an amended Central Freeway Replacement Project ancillary projects list.

The Interagency Plan Implementation Committee (IPIC) 1 recommends that the San Francisco County Transportation Authority (SFCTA) Board amend the 12 ancillary projects selected in its 2006 Central Freeway Replacement Project Ancillary Projects Study to include additional short and long term projects that will address the impacts related to Octavia Boulevard and touchdown ramps in the adjacent neighborhoods and on traffic circulation related to the Boulevard.

In 2006, the SFCTA selected 12 ancillary projects based on the \$5,750,000 then available from excess Central Freeway parcel sale proceeds. Nine of the selected 2006 ancillary Projects have been completed or are in progress, and the remaining three ancillary projects are no longer priorities. The City currently anticipates an additional \$7 to \$9 Million in excess Central Freeway parcel sale proceeds to complete additional ancillary projects, some of which is currently available.

Although the 2006 Study listed additional ancillary projects, more recent studies and plans have identified other high priority transportation projects for the area. The IPIC, in consultation with the Market and Octavia Citizens Advisory Committee (MO CAC), developed a list of alternative additional priority transportation projects. The short term projects will utilize funds currently available to implement pedestrian and bicycle safety projects in the area. The long term projects will be further designed and vetted through the annual IPIC process, including the MO CAC, the IPIC, the Planning Commission, the BOS Land Use Committee, and ultimately the Board of Supervisors.

Please see attached materials detailing specific short-term and long-term projects recommended to be selected as ancillary projects and funded with the excess Central Freeway parcel sales proceeds.
