

1 [Contract funds to the Department of Public Health, Occupational and Environmental Health
2 Services, from the California Department of Food and Agriculture to detect and eradicate
3 infestations of *P. ramorum*, the causal agent of sudden oak death, in host plants in nursery
4 stock in San Francisco.]

5 **Resolution authorizing the San Francisco Department of Public Health, Occupational
6 and Environmental Health Services (SFDPH/OEHS) to enter retroactively into a
7 performance agreement with the California Department of Food and Agriculture
8 (CDFA), and expend funds in the amount of \$3,296 to assist in the implementation in
9 San Francisco of the CDFA Sudden Oak Death (SOD) Program; for the period of March
10 1, 2004 to February 28, 2005.**

11
12 WHEREAS, In FY 2003-2004 the Office of the Mayor and the Board of Supervisors of
13 the City and County of San Francisco dissolved the Department of Consumer Assurances,
14 including the Agriculture Program and the Weights and Measures Program; and,

15 WHEREAS, The Agriculture Program and the Weights and Measures Program were
16 subsequently absorbed by the Department of Public Health's Occupational and Environmental
17 Health Section, including the staff of inspectors and the continuing State performance
18 agreements, one of which implements in San Francisco the SOD Program in the amount of
19 \$3,296; and,

20 WHEREAS, All plant nurseries in California are under a statewide federal emergency
21 order (a quarantine) to detect and control *P. ramorum*, the fungus-like organism that causes
22 SOD; and,

23 WHEREAS, The provisions of this quarantine stipulate that all shipments of *P.*
24 *ramorum* host or associated host plants destined to other states must be certified as to
25 freedom from *P. ramorum*; and,

2 WHEREAS, All nurseries where P. ramorum-infected plants were found must now
3 undergo eradication procedures to ensure freedom from P. ramorum; and,

4 WHEREAS, As a condition of receiving these funds, CDFA requires SFDPH/OEHS to
5 enter into an agreement (The "Agreement"), a copy of which is on file with the Clerk of the
6 Board of Supervisors in File No. 050035, which is hereby declared to be a part of
7 this resolution as if set forth fully herein; and,

8 WHEREAS, The Department proposes to maximize use of available grant funds on
9 program expenditures by not including indirect costs in the grant budget; now, therefore, be it

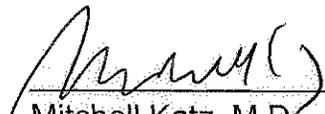
10 RESOLVED, That SFDPH/OEHS is hereby authorized to enter retroactively into a
11 performance agreement with CDFA in the amount of \$3,296; and, be it

12 FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors hereby waives inclusion of
13 indirect costs in the grant budget; and, be it

14 FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Director of Health is authorized to enter into the
15 Agreement on behalf of the City.

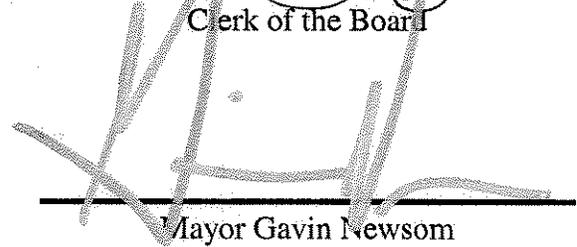
