[Public Works Landmark Trees]

Resolution approving designation of four (4) tree locations for Landmark Status because of their historical significance, aesthetic qualities, or contribution to the City's overall character.

WHEREAS, Article 16, Section 810 of the Public Works Code provides that the Board of Supervisors may designate as a landmark tree any tree in the public Right-of-Way that meets the Department's Landmark Tree Criteria; and

WHEREAS, the Director of Public Works has recommended the following trees to be declared Landmark Trees:

- One (1) Laurus nobilis (Sweet Bay) located at 555 Battery Street. This tree is considered to be a very large and well-pruned example of the Laurus nobilis species.
- 2. Thirteen (13) Phoenix canariensis (Canary Island Date Palms) located throughout the median of Quesada, west of Third Street to the dead end. These 13 Phoenix canariensis trees are well established, vary in size and age, and play an important ecological and environmental service to the community.
- 3. Two (2) Phoenix rupicola (Cliff Date Palms) located in the Dolores Street median. One tree is located in the median between Liberty and 29th Streets, across from 730 Dolores Street. The second tree is between 28th Street and Valley Street, across from 1546 Dolores Street. The Phoenix sylvestris is a rare species in San Francisco. These trees were part of the historic palm plantings along Dolores Street, and are mixed in with the Phoenix canariensis. They are beautiful, healthy examples of this rare (in San Francisco) species.

4. The Grove of Brahea edulis (Guadalupe Palms) in the Dolores Street median. The grove is found in the median between 29th Street and Day Street, and across from 1608-1650 Dolores Street. These Brahea edulis trees were also part of the historic palm plantings on Dolores Street and are also a rare species in San Francisco. Although small, these palm are quite old, and are in good health.

WHEREAS, the aforementioned trees meet the Department's Landmark Tree Criteria because of their historical significance, aesthetic qualities, and/or contributions to the City's overall character; and

WHEREAS, the Department believes the inclusion of the aforementioned trees will raise the overall appreciation of the City's urban forest; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, that this Board of Supervisors hereby designates the aforementioned trees as Landmark Trees with all the status and protection such a designation provides and to execute any and all provisions necessary therefore.
