WHEREAS, On that same day, police and striking workers clashed in Chicago.

During that conflict and the protests that followed, several strikers were killed; and,

WHEREAS, May Day was subsequently designated an official labor holiday in many countries; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors of the city and county of San Francisco recognize May Day for its significance both as a symbol of springtime, flowers and gaiety and for its designation in many countries as an official labor holiday
