WHEREAS, Recent vicious and violent crimes against homosexuals have been motivated by hatred and disdain of homosexuals; and,

DEPLORING THE USE OF A "HOMOSEXUAL PANIC" PSYCHIATRIC THEORY AS A

LEGISLATURE TO EXAMINE THE USE OF "HOMOSEXUAL PANIC" IN PSYCHIATRIC

DEFENSE AGAINST HATE CRIMES AND URGING THE CALIFORNIA STATE

WHEREAS, Perpetrators of such crimes have claimed that they "panicked" because of fear of the victim's sexual orientation; and,

WHEREAS, This psychiatric theory of "homosexual panic" has served as a defense to crimes which require a specific intent to do a criminal act, such as murder; and,

WHEREAS, The utilization of the psychiatric theory of "homosexual panic" as a defense has mitigated crimes such as murder to a lesser offense, such as manslaughter; and,

WHEREAS, In Contra Costa County defendant Joshua Puckett was convicted of a lesser offense than first degree murder after killing an openly homosexual man; and,

WHEREAS, Puckett's jury mitigated his crime from murder to a lesser offense based in part on the theory that he panicked because he feared a homosexual making sexual advances toward him; and,

WHEREAS, The alleged panic served as a reason for concluding that the assailant Joshua Puckett could not form the specific intent to commit murder; and,

WHEREAS, A diminished capacity defense based on a theory similar to homosexual panic was used to lessen the murderous crimes committed against Supervisor Harvey Milk and Mayor George Moscone to manslaughter; and,

WHEREAS, California voters eliminated this type of diminished capacity defense by state proposition in 1981; and,

WHEREAS, The state legislature's judiciary committees examine the status of state law with respect to criminal penalties and defenses; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco deplores the use of the psychiatric theory of "homosexual panic" as a method of defense to specific intent crimes such as murder; and, be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco urges the state legislature to examine the propriety of a "homosexual panic" theory in criminal defense proceedings.
