URGING THE UNITED STATES SENATE TO PASS H.R. 118

WHEREAS, The philosophical foundation of our nation rests, in part, on the premise that we are all created equal regardless of race, color or creed; and,

WHEREAS, Across our nation, motorists of color daily experience the phenomenon of racial profiling whereby law enforcement personnel use a motorist's ethnicity and race in determining whether or not to stop his or her vehicle; and,

WHEREAS, For example, a recent case filed by the ACLU in Maryland revealed that while over 75% of all drivers stopped and searched by police were African American, only 17% of drivers in that area were African American; and,

WHEREAS, Racial profiling also adversely impacts Latinos, Asian Americans and other racial minorities; and,

WHEREAS, The Traffic Stops Statistics Study Act of 1998, H.R. 118, also known as "Driving While Black," passed the US House of Representatives on March 24, 1998, and would require the Department of Justice to conduct a study of stops for routine traffic violations by law enforcement officers that would include consideration of such factors as race or ethnicity, the approximate age of the stopped motorist, and whether a search was instituted as a result of the stop; and,

WHEREAS, H.R. 118 merely investigates the phenomenon of racial profiling and would provide us with data to determine if further action is warranted; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That the City and County of San Francisco urges the United States Senate to pass H.R. 118.
