HONORING THE MEMORY OF THE LATE JUSTICE HARRY A. BLACKMUN AND COMMENDING HIM FOR HIS YEARS OF SERVICE AS AN ATTORNEY AND JUDGE; URGING THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS TO IMPLEMENT AND ENFORCE THE POLICIES BLACKMUN ADVOCATED FOR ON BEHALF OF THE VULNERABLE AND POWERLESS.

WHEREAS, Justice Harry A. Blackmun passed away last week at the age of 90; and,

WHEREAS, Justice Blackmun served for 24 years on the United States Supreme Court; and,

WHEREAS, Justice Blackmun worked tirelessly and diligently to make reasoned decisions in the cases that came before him; and,

WHEREAS, Over his years on the Court, Justice Blackmun came to be a voice for the vulnerable and powerless; and,

WHEREAS, Justice Blackmun wrote the opinion in Roe v. Wade, the 1973 decision that established a constitutional right for women to obtain abortions; and,

WHEREAS, After the Roe decision, Blackmun continued to reaffirm the constitutional right to abortion even when the Court at times attempted to erode that right; and,

WHEREAS, Blackmun favored extending the constitutional right to privacy to homosexual behavior between consenting adults, writing in a dissenting opinion in Bowers v. Hardwick that "a necessary corollary of giving individuals freedom to choose how to conduct

their lives is acceptance of the fact that different individuals will make different choices"; and,

WHEREAS, Justice Blackmun opposed the use of the death penalty because he believed it was administered in a random and arbitrary way and therefore could not be carried out in a manner consistent with the Constitution; and,

WHEREAS, In the seminal Bakke case, Blackmun dissented from the majority on the Court and voted to uphold a minority admissions program at the University of California; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco honors the memory of the late Justice Blackmun and commends him for his years of service as a lawyer and a judge and his work on behalf of the vulnerable and powerless; and, be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco will work to implement and enforce the policies advocated by Justice Blackmun on behalf of the vulnerable and powerless including upholding the right to privacy and protecting individuals against discrimination.
