[School Computer Literacy Project] URGING THE SAN FRANCISCO UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT TO ESTABLISH A COMPUTER LITERACY PROJECT FOR ALL SCHOOLS IN THE BOTTOM 25TH PERCENTILE, TO STRUCTURE THE PROGRAM AS A PUBLIC, PRIVATE NON-PROFIT PARTNERSHIP, AND TO SEEK FINANCIAL SUPPORT FOR THE PROGRAM FROM PRIVATE FOUNDATIONS AND CORPORATIONS, PARTICULARLY THOSE THAT RECEIVE REVENUES FROM THE COMPUTER INDUSTRY.

WHEREAS, Computer and Internet skills are becoming increasingly important to succeed in school and in the workplace and as a means of gathering information; and,

WHEREAS, Congress passed legislation requiring all Federal payments with the exception of tax refunds be made electronically, putting veterans, the disabled, retired federal workers, recipients of Social Security and others without technology skills or access to electronic communications at a considerable disadvantage; and,

WHEREAS, According to a report released by the U.S. Commerce Department, 30% of white households and 26% of Asian households have access to the Internet while only 12% of African American and 13% of Latino households have home access; and,

WHEREAS, Even at the lowest income levels, a child in a white family is three times as likely to have Internet access as a child in a Hispanic family; and,

WHEREAS, Between 1997 and 1998 the disparity in Internet access at home between those at the highest and lowest education levels increased by 25%; and,

WHEREAS, According to a survey conducted by the Public Policy Institute of California, nearly three-quarters of Bay Area residents reported owning a computer at home, while only 40 percent of Latinos reported such ownership; and

WHEREAS, Low income individuals and minorities face barriers to computer access such as insufficient language skills, the cost of equipment, the absence of home telephones, and a lack of awareness about the importance of computers and the Internet; and,

WHEREAS, While computers are still relatively expensive and beyond the budget of many lower income families, providing machines in public spaces like schools can significantly increase access to computers for low income and minority families; and,

WHEREAS, An estimated 90% of students at San Francisco schools in the bottom 25th percentile, ranked in terms of a combination of achievement and economic status, are minorities; and,

WHEREAS, There currently exists a three-year pilot program in one San Francisco school that provides students with computers and parents with computers, Internet access and training; and,

WHEREAS, As a result of the pilot project, participating students' writing skills have improved and their parents have pursued computer classes and have obtained employment or better jobs; now, therefore, be it

SUPERVISOR BECERRIL BOARD OF SUPERVISORS

RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco urges the San Francisco Unified School District to use what has been learned from the computer pilot project in one school to establish a computer literacy project for all schools in the bottom 25th percentile, ranked based on a combination of achievement and academic status; and, be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco urges the San Francisco Unified School District to structure the computer literacy project as a public, private, non-profit venture; and, be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco urges the San Francisco Unified School

District to seek financial support for a citywide computer literacy project from private foundations and corporations, particularly those that receive revenues from the computer industry.
