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COMMENDING THE GATES MILLENNIUM SCHOLARS PROGRAM.

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WHEREAS, Encouraging attendance by low income African-Americans, Native Americans, Hispanics and Asians at colleges and universities continues to present a compelling challenge; and,

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WHEREAS, The absence of financial assistance heads the list of barriers prohibiting enrollment by these groups in institutions of higher education; and,

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WHEREAS, The escalating costs of attending college along with increased dependence on loans contribute to the attrition of African-American, Native American, Hispanic and Asian students; and,

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WHEREAS, It is estimated that more than 30,000 African-American, Native American, Hispanic and Asian students are not attending college annually because of financial limitations; and,

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WHEREAS, In 1997, African Americans made up 7% of the California population but only 3.5% of baccalaureate degree recipients and Latinos made up 29% of the population but only 13.3% of baccalaureate degree recipients; and,

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WHEREAS, In 1997, African Americans made up 7% of the California population but only 4.1% of California graduate degree enrollees and Latinos made up 29% of the population but only 8.8% of graduate

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degree enrollees; and,

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WHEREAS, Almost 70 percent of college going Latino students enroll at two year colleges and only 7 percent of those who start at two year colleges transfer to a four year institution; and,

WHEREAS, The dropout rate of Hispanic students enrolled in college is over 50 percent; and,

WHEREAS, Lower income individuals and minorities lag behind other groups in computer ownership and use and access to the Internet; and,

WHEREAS, Lower income individuals and minorities are at a disadvantage in obtaining information, jobs and other economic benefits because they have less access to computers; and,

WHEREAS, Training more low income and minority individuals in technical fields may help to close the "digital divide" between the computer haves and have-nots; and

WHEREAS, The Gates Millennium Scholars Program, funded by the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation and administered by the United Negro College Fund, will provide \$1 billion in scholarships and fellowships for outstanding low-income African-American, Native American, Hispanic and Asian students to attend the undergraduate and graduate institutions of their choice; and

WHEREAS, The Gates Millennium Scholars Program will assist a minimum of 1,000 students per year over the next 20 years; and

WHEREAS, Gates Scholarships will be available to undergraduate students who have showed promise in mathematics and science and to graduate students who are pursuing degrees in the fields of

engineering, mathematics, science, education or library science; now, therefore be it

RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco commends the Gates Millennium Scholars Program for providing substantial financial assistance to low-income African-American, Native American, Hispanic and Asian undergraduate and graduate students.
