(COMPENSATION AND RETENTION ENCOURAGE STABILITY) PROGRAM, DESIGNED TO ENCOURAGE LOCAL CHILD CARE TEACHERS AND PROVIDERS TO CONTINUE THEIR EDUCATION AND REMAIN IN THE CHILD CARE FIELD BY PROVIDING INCENTIVE STIPENDS TO REWARD CHILD CARE PROFESSIONALS AND FAMILY CHILD CARE PROVIDERS.

WHEREAS, In San Francisco, child care programs are experiencing a severe staffing crisis; and,

WHEREAS, The current staffing shortage is preventing some child care programs from adequately serving the children currently in care; and,

WHEREAS, Many child care centers are unable to serve children on waiting lists, even for state subsidized care, because they cannot hire qualified teachers to care for them; and

WHEREAS, As the need for child care services increases due to welfare reform and other demographic trends, many child care programs will be unable to expand their services or open available space because of the inability to secure qualified staff; and,

WHEREAS, The single most important determinant of child care quality, according to a growing body of research, is the presence of consistent, sensitive and well compensated caregivers; and,

WHEREAS, The high job turnover in the field, fueled by poor compensation and few opportunities for advancement, is causing the quality of services that children and parents receive to decline; and,

WHEREAS, The Center for the Child Care Workforce documents that child care teachers are among the best educated but lowest paid professionals in the United States; and,

WHEREAS, Nearly 1 in 3 child care teachers leaves the field each year, and, with class-size reduction in the elementary schools and a strong economy in California, underpaid child care teachers are leaving the field for better paying jobs; and,

WHEREAS, Research has clearly linked poor compensation with poor quality of care; and,

WHEREAS, California State legislature is considering AB 2025, the California C.A.R.E.S. (Compensation and Retention Encourages Stability) legislation, to provide incentive stipends to reward child care teachers and family child care providers who pursue education and training and remain in their child care jobs; and,

WHEREAS, The local proposal would provide incentives and bonuses ranging from \$500 - \$6,000 annually to reward child care teachers and family child care provider who pursue education and training and remain in their child care jobs; and,

WHEREAS, With this legislation, approximately 500 - 600 teachers and providers and 4,500 children will be impacted annually; and,

WHEREAS, Localities which commit local funds will receive priority in state distribution of C.A.R.E.S. funds; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco urges the Department of Children, Youth and their Families (DCYF) to create and implement a San Francisco C.A.R.E.S. (Compensation and Retention Encourage Stability) program, designed to encourage local child care teachers and providers to continue their education and remain in the child care field by providing incentive stipends to reward child care professionals and family child care providers.
