In Rent Board year 2013, there ered evictions in San Francisco. The report is careful to note that it is likely that more tenants reported to the Rent Board for two reasons. First, the City's eviction control laws apply only before June 13, 1979. Second, housing advocates report that landlords often offer "buyouts" to vacate their units in lieu of an Ellis Act eviction.	were 1716 s are displaced than to housing units

The report also shows a relationship between the increase in Ellis Act evictions and the increase in the market value of residential properties in San Francisco with average home prices having increased by 21.9 percent between 2009 and 2013, from \$735,828 to \$897,338. The report shows that rental rates have similarly skyrocketed so that the median rental rate in June 2013 for all types of apartments was \$3,414. Given the high costs of housing (whether one chooses to rent or buy), if someone is evicted today in San Francisco, he or she will likely be forced to leave the City. Also alarming, the report shows that in calendar year 2011, 42.9 percent of all San Francisco households were already rent-burdened, meaning the household pays 30 percent or more of gross household income toward rent.

I am calling a hearing on the Budget and Legislative Analyst report to further understand the level of San Francisco's housing crisis as well as to hear from any interested party about potential solutions. San Francisco will not continue to be a diverse and vibrant City for all if everyone but the ultra rich is priced out.
