My qualifications to become a member of the San Francisco LGBT Policy Task Force spans my professional and activist background within the California aging services network for over thirty years. Semi-retired in 2011, my tenure as Project Director for The LGBT Elder Law Project established in 1999 by the National Center for Lesbian Rights (NCLR), a nationwide non-profit legal firm dedicated to providing and protecting the legal needs of LGBT individuals and their families. Trained as an Elder Law Paralegal in pilot project sponsored by the State Department On Aging and the California State Bar Association in the mid-1970, creating a statewide legal assistance program. I Learned how critical 'law' is for the survival and access to health and social services for frail and isolated elders navigating the complex bureaucracy steeped in federal, state and local jurisdictions.

Attachment A – Qualifications and Demographic Qualities San Francisco LGBT Seniors Task Force Application James D. Wagoner

I am a 57-year-old, gay male, of Irish/Scottish descent, with a male gender identity that is tempered by a sensitive and empathetic nature often characterized as female. The latter was the aggravating factor in the many years of bullying I endured as a child. My generation followed on the heals of the Stonewall generation. We missed much of the revolutionary zeal of the early movement for LGBT rights, but we made up for it by forming most of the LGBT organizations that have done so much to build a successful civil rights movement. My part has been modest. Early on, I decided to be open about my sexuality, and I paid the price by losing my first teaching job because I was the faculty sponsor of the university's first gay student organization. Fighting for our freedoms carries a price.

I am privileged to have called San Francisco my home for the past 21 years, all but one of those years spent living on the southern hill that embraces the Castro neighborhood, renowned around the world as a center of LGBT activism and refuge. Nevertheless, it has also been a crucible in which many lives were crushed by the AIDS epidemic. In 1994, I contracted HIV, and it was my good fortune that drugs kept the infection in check for a number of years. Yet, by 2003, I began to suffer ever more serious infections that eventually necessitated my going on Social Security Disability Insurance and receiving Medi-Cal and Medicare healthcare benefits. Much can be learned from confronting a disabling, near fatal illness. I hope I have used the experience to understand how fragile our lives are, how important it is for each moment to be lived in dignity, and how essential it is to have a community that cares about its most vulnerable members.

When I began to recover, in 2007, I started looking for a meaningful way to support myself and help others in much the same way that I had been helped by the San Francisco community. It occurred to me that the healthcare professionals at Haight Ashbury Free Clinic and San Francsico General Hospital didn't act alone in stopping the disease. They were assisted in providing the care that I received by the public benefits attorneys who ensured that healthcare services were available to me and that I had money coming in while I was disabled. So, I chose to go to law school and focus on public interest law. The challenges of returning to do graduate work at the ripe age of 53 were many, but the rewards were greater. In May 2012, I was graduated with a Juris Doctor degree from John F. Kennedy University School of Law, with a certificate in Public Interest Law,. At graduation, I shared the Public Interest Advocate Award in recognition of the clinical and internship work I had done at JFK, East Bay Community Law Center, and Disability Rights California.

At about the same time, I was awarded a Borchard Foundation Fellowship in Law and Aging to develop a project with Bay Area Legal Aid. The fellowship project, which I developed with the advice of many colleagues, concerned providing legal assistance to

low-income LGBT seniors in San Francisco so that they would be less likely to have to move out of the community if something interfered with the normal distribution of their public benefits, especially under the Supplemental Security Income (SSI) program, but also including Social Security Disability and Retirement Insurance benefits and healthcare benefits under Medi-Cal and Medicare. The project started up in September 2012 and continues until October 2013. It is the most satisfying and meaningful work of my life. The clients I see are some of the most interesting people I have met in San Francisco. They cross barriers of background and life experience. They carry with them the wisdom and experience of a lifetime. They are invaluable members of our community, and they should never suffer such a hardship that they are forced to move away from the city they consider to be home. The consequences of such a move could be devastating. They might be forced to live in other cities and towns that would be hostile to their lesbian, gay, bisexual, or transgender identities. Indeed, they might be so defenseless in another environment that they might feel that it is necessary to return to the closet, hide themselves in plain sight, and divest themselves of their rich histories, experiences, and memories. That would be a tragedy. I believe there are many things we might do to help low-income LGBT seniors age in place in San Francisco. I am hoping that the GLBT Seniors Advocacy Project will be able to continue providing free legal services to this population long into the future, well beyond the initial fellowship period, as the tsunami of baby boom seniors begins to surge over the coming two decades.

As is so often the case, my life experience of being gay, having HIV/AIDS, and growing older has informed my late arrival at the career that I love and the purpose I have longed for, allowing me to help the most vulnerable among us deal with the most disturbing and difficult problems of a lifetime – how to live with dignity as they age, how to afford to stay in the city they love, how to keep their families of choice close to them as they become less physically adept, and how to remain a vital part of their community, the one they worked so hard to define and defend over the formative years of the LGBT rights movement.

The LGBT Aging Policy Task Force is testament to the commitment that our community has to its seniors. I believe that policy makers from San Francisco, Sacramento, and Washington, D.C., will be consulting the work produced by the Task Force for years to come, both for its data and for its development of a ground-breaking model for assessing the policy issues that arise from an aging LGBT population. I would like to make a contribution to the Task Force's efforts in any way that I can, and I believe that my life experience, education, and identity speak directly to the issues the Task Force is addressing.

Board Qualifications:

The LGBT Seniors Task Force shall consist of 15 members, appointed by the Board of Supervisors. Members shall include LGBT seniors and aging adults, and people with expertise or experience working on issues affecting LGBT seniors. Appointments shall reflect the diversity of the seniors LGBT community, including race, ethnicity, religion, gender identity, socio economic status, disability (including HIV/AIDS status), and other relevant characteristics.

The Task Force may hold hearings and take testimony regarding LGBT senior issues and related matters.

The Task Force may create subcommittees as necessary; provided, however that the Task Force shall establish working groups on: housing; health and social services; legal status and equity; research and demographics; and community-within-community. The working groups shall reach out to and invite other members of the community and experts who can help with the work of the Task Force to participate with the working groups in an advisory role, including the special committee of the Advisory Council on Human Rights for LGBT issues established under Administrative Code Section 12A.6(c).

The Task Force shall review, update and create implementation plans for recommendations in existing reports including, without limitation, the 2003 HRC Report on LGBT Seniors, the 2010 Ryan White HIV Care Council Report on HIV and Aging, and the 2011 Report of the SRO Task Force.

Sunset Date: The LGBT Seniors Task Force shall terminate, 18 months after the first Task Force meeting.

Report: No later than 15 months after its first meeting, the Task Force shall create a written report and transmit that report to the Board of Supervisors. The report shall include action plans for implementation of recommendations, timelines for implementation, estimated costs, and potential funding sources plus additional information to facilitate implementation.
