

2013 Homeless Count Demographic Survey Information

- 27% of the population (approx. 1,738 people) were female
- 3% of the population (approx. 193 people) were transgender
- 70% of the population (approx. 4,505) were male

2013 Homeless Count

- 679 people in 132 families were identified in the count
- 95% of people in families were sheltered
- 34 people in families were identified outside

<u>Services Provided</u> Adult Emergency Shelters

- Shelters operate 11 24 hours/day, 7 days/week
- Meals that follow SF Shelter Nutrition Project menu
- Provide a mailing address for clients
- Single stop shelter reservation system and 311 Shelter Reservation Waitlist
- On-site storage at most sites
- Shelter security
- Provide support Services as available, including:
 - Orientation to shelter system and homeless service referrals
 - Housing referral to specific opportunities and general search assistance
 - Support groups and social events
 - Some case management

Centralized Intake & Family Shelters

<u>Services Provided</u> 90-180 Day Family Shelters

- Operate 24 hours/day, 7 days/week
- Meals that follow SF Shelter Nutrition Project menu
- Children's Activities Program
- Mailing address for clients
- Support services, including:
 - intake and assessment
 - case management
 - assistance in housing search and obtaining housing
 - benefits advocacy and assistance
 - referrals
 - conflict resolution
 - support groups, social events, organized activities
 - wellness checks
 - referral to health screenings, up-to-date immunizations
 - promote peer support, community building, and team building
 - income saving program

ACCESS

Accessible Child Care Expedited for the Shelter System

- Unique child care subsidy designed specifically to help families obtain child care in San Francisco
 - at least one child under 3 years old
 - living or formerly living in homeless or domestic violence shelters
- Expands opportunities for homeless children and their families to receive quality early care and education services through a mix of quality licensed centers and licensed family child care providers
- Serves approximately 80 children
- Will expand to 120 children in FY14-15

Transitional Housing

- 12-24 month stays possible, many stays are shorter
- Goal is to prepare clients for transition to long-term housing and stability
- Services vary by site, including:
 - case management
 - educational/vocational planning
 - substance abuse/mental health counseling
 - job and housing search
 - workshops and peer support

<u>Services Provided</u> Permanent Supportive Housing

- One housing provider in adult programs is working with HSA to create a women-only floor within a mixed building
- Subsidized rents
- Intake and Assessment
- Outreach and Engagement (Services are voluntary)
- Case Management
- Clinical Services, Roving Behavioral Health support (at some sites)
- Benefits Advocacy and Assistance
- Information and Referral
- Mediation with Property Management, Housing Stability support
- Conflict Resolution
- Support Groups, Social Events and Organized Activities
- Community Meetings
- Food Pantries (at some sites)

Homeless Families in Child Welfare

- 5 year federal grant from Administration of Children and Families to incorporate "housing first" principles into child welfare services
- Partners include Homeless Prenatal Program, Housing Authority, Infant Parent Program, and Public Consulting Group
- Families receive access to immediate housing through rent subsidies, and permanent housing through Section 8 vouchers and Local Operating Subsidy Program units

Homeless Families in Child Welfare

- The project provides intensive wraparound services to provide stability so that once housed, they can complete child welfare case plans.
- Intensive mental health treatment and SSI advocacy services also provided
- The project is research driven, with 32 families per year randomly selected to participate
