Resolution authorizing the Director of the Mayor's Office of Housing and Community Development to execute a Local Operating Subsidy Program Grant Agreement with CHP Scott Street L.P., a California limited partnership, to provide operating subsidies for formerly homeless transition age youth at 3155 Scott Street, for a fifteen-year

WHEREAS, The Mayor's Office of Housing and Community Development (MOHCD) administers a variety of housing programs that provide financing for the development of new housing and the rehabilitation of single-and multi-family housing for low-and moderate-income households in San Francisco; and

WHEREAS, In 2004, the City and County of San Francisco (City) published its "Ten Year Plan to End Chronic Homelessness," and established a goal of creating 3,000 permanent affordable housing units for homeless households by 2016; and

WHEREAS, MOHCD developed the Local Operating Subsidy Program (LOSP) in order to establish long-term financial support to operate and maintain permanent affordable housing for homeless households. Through the LOSP, the City subsidizes the difference between the cost of operating housing for homeless persons and all other sources of operating revenue for a given project, such as tenant rental payments, commercial space lease payments, Stewart B. McKinney Homeless Assistance Act subsidies, project-based Section 8 rent subsidies and California Mental Health Services Act operating subsidies; and

WHEREAS, All supportive housing projects selected for capital funding by the Citywide Affordable Housing Loan Committee (Loan Committee) pursuant to a competitive Notice of Funding Availability (NOFA) or Request for Proposals (RFP) process and intended to serve homeless individuals or families are eligible to receive LOSP funds; and

WHEREAS, The Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco (Board of Supervisors) authorizes City funding for LOSP projects as part of the Annual Appropriation Ordinance; and

WHEREAS, MOHCD enters into grant agreements with supportive housing owners and operators for LOSP projects in consultation with the Department of Public Health (DPH) and Human Services Agency (HSA), administers LOSP contracts, reviews annual audits and prepares recommendations for annual adjustments to project funding, monitors compliance with LOSP requirements as part of monitoring compliance with capital funding regulatory agreements, and if necessary, takes appropriate action to enforce compliance; and

WHEREAS, CHP Scott Street L.P., a California limited partnership (the Developer), is the owner and developer of the affordable rental housing development located at 3155 Scott Street, which will provide 24 Single Room Occupancy (SRO) units for transitional age youth (the Project); and

WHEREAS, On February 21, 2014, the Loan Committee recommended approval to the Mayor of a LOSP grant award for the Project not to exceed \$8,380,458, which would be used to subsidize the operating costs for the Project; and

WHEREAS, MOHCD proposes to provide a LOSP grant in the amount not to exceed \$8,380,458 to the Developer pursuant to a LOSP Grant Agreement (the Agreement) in substantially the form on file with the Clerk of the Board in File No. 140651 and in such final form as approved by the Director of MOHCD and the City Attorney; and

THIS GRANT AGREEMENT (this "Agreement") is made this ______, by and between CHP Scott Street, L.P., a California limited partnership ("Grantee"), and the CITY AND COUNTY OF SAN FRANCISCO, a municipal corporation ("City") acting by and through the Mayor's Office of Housing and Community Development ("MOHCD").

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, Grantee submitted the Application Documents (as hereinafter defined) to MOHCD for a grant through MOHCD's Local Operating Subsidy Program ("Program"); and

WHEREAS, City desires to provide such a grant on the terms and conditions set forth herein; and

WHEREAS, the City's Board of Supervisors authorized execution of this Agreement on _____, pursuant to Resolution No. _____.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the premises and the mutual covenants contained in this Agreement and for other good and valuable consideration, the receipt and adequacy of which is hereby acknowledged, the parties hereto agree as follows:

ARTICLE 1 DEFINITIONS

- 1.1 Specific Terms. Unless the context otherwise requires, the following capitalized terms (whether singular or plural) shall have the meanings set forth below:
- "ADA" shall mean the Americans with Disabilities Act (including all rules and regulations thereunder) and all other applicable federal, state and local disability rights legislation, as the same may be amended, modified or supplemented from time to time.

"Additional Leasing Date" shall have the meaning given to it in Section 4.1.

"Agreement Date" means the date this Agreement is duly executed and delivered by Grantee and MOHCD.

- "Annual Monitoring Report" shall have the meaning given to it in Section 6.1.
- "Annual Operating Budget" means the operating budget for the Project approved by City attached hereto as Exhibit E, or as otherwise amended by Grantee and City.
- "Applicable Laws" means all applicable present or future federal, state, local and administrative laws, rules, regulations, codes, orders and requirements.
- "Application Documents" shall mean collectively: (i) the grant application submitted by Grantee for a Program grant, including all exhibits, schedules, appendices and attachments thereto; (ii) all documents, correspondence and other written materials submitted in respect of such grant application; and (iii) all amendments, modifications or supplements to any of the foregoing approved in writing by City.
 - "Assisted Units" means 24 residential units at the Project
- "Calendar Year" means each period of twelve (12) calendar months commencing on January 1 and ending December 31 during all or any portion of which this Agreement is in effect.
 - "CFR" means the Code of Federal Regulations.
 - "Charter" shall mean the Charter of City.
 - "Charter Documents" shall have the meaning given in Section 6.2.
 - "City" means the City and County of San Francisco.
- "City Loan Documents" means the MOHCD Loan Agreement and the documents executed in connection therewith.
 - "Controller" shall mean the Controller of City.
 - "Director" means MOHCD's Director or an authorized representative of the Director.
 - "Effective Date" means the Initial Leasing Date.
 - "Event of Default" shall have the meaning set forth in Section 11.1.
- "First Subsidy Payment" shall mean the Subsidy Payment for the initial Fiscal Year starting from the Effective Date.
- "Fiscal Year" shall mean each period of twelve (12) calendar months commencing on July 1 and ending on June 30 during all or any portion of which this Agreement is in effect.
 - "Grant Amount" shall have the meaning set forth in Section 5.1.
- "Grant Funds" shall mean any and all funds allocated or disbursed to Grantee under this Agreement.
 - "HSA" shall mean the City's Human Services Agency.
- "HUD" means the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development acting by and through the Secretary of Housing and Urban Development and any authorized agents.

"Indemnified Parties" shall mean City, including MOHCD and all of City's commissions, departments, agencies and other subdivisions, and City's elected officials, directors, officers, employees, agents, and representatives, and their respective successors and assigns.

"Initial Leasing Date" shall be the date when the first Assisted Unit is leased and occupied by a Tenant.

"Loan Committee" means the MOHCD review committee that selects Program grantees.

"LOSP Clients" means the formerly homeless Transition Age Youth that MOHCD deems eligible for Program assistance pursuant to the Program criteria set forth on the attached Exhibit B (as such criteria may be amended from time to time by MOHCD) and refers to Grantee pursuant to this Agreement.

"Maintenance Duties" shall have the meaning given to it in Section 4.8(a).

"Median Income" means area median income determined by HUD for the San Francisco area, adjusted solely for household size, but not high housing cost area.

"MOHCD" shall mean the Mayor's Office of Housing and Community Development of the City and County of San Francisco.

"MOHCD Loan Agreement" means that certain loan agreement, dated as of November 25, 2013, between MOHCD and Grantee with respect to a \$4,416,508 loan.

"Operating Costs" means the following costs: (a) all charges incurred in the operation of the Project for utilities, real estate taxes and assessments and premiums for insurance required under this Agreement, the City Loan Documents or the Senior Loan Documents; (b) salaries, wages and any other compensation due and payable to the employees or agents of Grantee employed in connection with the Project, including all related withholding taxes, insurance premiums, Social Security payments and other payroll taxes or payments; (c) Qualified Minimal Debt Service Payments, if any; (d) the asset management fees, partnership management fees, investor services fee and deferred developer fees described in the Annual Operating Budget or otherwise approved by MOHCD in writing; (e) all other expenses actually incurred to cover the operation of the Project to the standards required under this Agreement, including maintenance and repairs, and property management fees (to the extent such fees are permitted to be made under the MOHCD Loan Agreement); (f) required deposits to the Replacement Reserve Account (as defined in the MOHCD Loan Agreement), Operating Reserve Account, and any other reserve account required under this Agreement (excluding the Subsidy Reserve Account), the City Loan Documents or the Senior Loan Documents; and (g) any extraordinary expenses arising from the ownership or operation of the Project approved in advance and in writing by MOHCD: "Operating Costs" shall not include any loan payments to be made under the City Loan Documents, the Senior Loan Documents or any other loan payments other than Qualified Minimal Debt Service Payments, nor any costs Grantee incurs in providing services to a Project tenant other than the services to be provided under such Project tenant's lease or otherwise approved hereunder.

"Operating Reserve Account" means the interest-bearing operating reserve depository account Grantee is required to maintain pursuant to the MOHCD Loan Agreement.

"Operating Statement" shall have the meaning set forth in Section 6.1.

"Opinion" means an opinion of Grantee's California legal counsel, satisfactory to MOHCD and its legal counsel, that Grantee is a duly formed, validly existing limited partnership in good standing under the laws of the State of California, has the power and authority to enter into the Agreement and will be bound by their terms when executed and delivered, that each of Grantee's general partners is a duly formed, validly existing nonprofit corporation in good standing under the laws of the State of California,

which has established and maintains valid nonprofit status under Section 501(c)(3) of the United States Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended, and all rules and regulations promulgated thereunder or is a duly formed, validly existing limited liability company whose sole member is nonprofit corporation in good standing under the laws of the State of California, which has established and maintains valid nonprofit status under Section 501(c)(3) of the United States Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended, and all rules and regulations promulgated thereunder and each has the power and authority to act as Grantee's general partner, and that addresses any other matters MOHCD reasonably requests.

"Program" means the Local Operating Subsidy Program, through which MOHCD provides operating subsidies to housing projects that provide permanent supportive housing for formerly homeless individuals and households.

"Program Transition Reserve Account" shall have meaning given to it in Section 2.5.

"Project" means the twenty-five (25) unit housing project commonly known as Edward II, which is located on the Real Property.

"Project Income" means all income and receipts in any form received by Grantee from the operation, use or ownership of the Project, calculated on an accrual basis, including rents, fees, deposits (other than tenant security deposits), reimbursements and other charges paid to Grantee by MOHCD in connection with the Project (other than Grant Funds), and any funds held in the Subsidy Reserve Account.

"Project Operating Account" means a checking account maintained by Grantee, which shall be held in a bank or savings and loan institution acceptable to MOHCD as a segregated account insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation or other comparable federal insurance program.

"Qualified Minimal Debt Service Payment" means a minimal debt service payment that Grantee must make under the MOHCD Loan Agreement, the Senior Loan Documents or any additional state or federal affordable housing loan for the Project, provided that Grantee first obtains MOHCD's written consent to such additional loan.

"Real Property" shall mean the real property described on the attached Exhibit C.

"Referral Report" means the report prepared by Program staff for a LOSP Client, which shall be substantially in the form attached hereto as Exhibit D.

"Rent" means the aggregate annual sum charged to Tenants for rent and utilities, with utility charges limited to an allowance determined by HSA.

"Senior Loan Documents" means the following documents: the loan documents executed by Grantee in connection with the construction loan from Bank of America in the amount of \$6,149,895.

"Services Agreement" means the Contract for Services dated [TBA] _____, and between Tenant Services Contractor and HSA for the provision of services to LOSP Clients at the Project.

"Shortfall" means the amount, if any, by which the Operating Costs for any Calendar Year during the Term exceed the Project Income obtained from the Assisted Units for such Calendar Year.

"Subsidy Payment" means a payment made by MOHCD to Grantee pursuant to the terms of this Agreement, which shall be made in the manner and in the amount specified in Article 5 below.

"Subsidy Reserve Account" means a checking account maintained by Grantee, which shall be held in a bank or savings and loan institution acceptable to MOHCD as a segregated account insured by the

Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation or other comparable federal insurance program, and used only for the purposes specified in <u>Section 4.3</u>.

"Tenant" shall mean a LOSP Client who leases an Assisted Unit.

"Tenant Services Contractor" shall mean Larkin Street Youth Services, a California non-profit public benefit corporation.

"Term" shall have the meaning given to in Section 3.

"Termination Notice Date" shall have the meaning given to in Section 4.1.

"Transition Age Youth" shall mean young adults, age 18 – 24, who are transitioning from public systems (like foster care) or are at risk of not making a successful transition to adulthood.

"Transition Plan" shall have the meaning given to in Section 2.5.

"Underlying Restricted Rent" is the maximum rent allowed under the MOHCD Loan Agreement.

"Vacancy Period" shall have the meaning given to in Section 4.1.

"15-Year Cash Flow" means the cash flow projection described in the attached Exhibit E.

- 1.2 Additional Terms. The terms "as directed," "as required" or "as permitted" and similar terms shall refer to the direction, requirement, or permission of MOHCD. The terms "sufficient," "necessary" or "proper" and similar terms shall mean sufficient, necessary or proper in the sole judgment of MOHCD. The terms "approval," "acceptable" or "satisfactory" or similar terms shall mean approved by, or acceptable to, or satisfactory to MOHCD. The terms "include," "included" or "including" and similar terms shall be deemed to be followed by the words "without limitation". The use of the term "subcontractor," "successor" or "assign" herein refers only to a subcontractor ("subgrantee"), successor or assign expressly permitted under Article 13.
- 1.3 References to this Agreement. References to this Agreement include: (a) any and all appendices, exhibits, schedules, attachments hereto; (b) any and all statutes, ordinances, regulations or other documents expressly incorporated by reference herein; and (c) any and all amendments, modifications or supplements hereto made in accordance with Section 17.2. References to articles, sections, subsections or appendices refer to articles, sections or subsections of or appendices to this Agreement, unless otherwise expressly stated. Terms such as "hereunder," herein or "hereto" refer to this Agreement as a whole.

ARTICLE 2 APPROPRIATION AND CERTIFICATION OF GRANT FUNDS; LIMITATIONS ON CITY'S OBLIGATIONS

2.1 Risk of Non-Appropriation of Grant Funds. This Agreement is subject to the budget and fiscal provisions of the Charter. City shall have no obligation to make appropriations for this Agreement in lieu of appropriations for new or other agreements or for other MOHCD expenditures. Grantee acknowledges that MOHCD's obligation to make Subsidy Payments under this Agreement is expressly conditioned on the (a) appropriation of sufficient funds to HSA for Subsidy Payments and transfer of such funds from HSA to MOHCD (or as MOHCD may direct such funds to be transferred directly by HSA to Grantee), which appropriation and transfer is subject to HSA's annual operating budget, or (b) appropriation of sufficient funds for Subsidy Payments to MOHCD's annual operating budget. If the funds appropriated for Program subsidy payments in a Fiscal Year will be insufficient to fund the total Program subsidy payments MOHCD intended to make in such Fiscal Year, MOHCD shall have the right to reduce the amount of Program subsidy payments and to select the qualifying projects subject to such reduced payments.

Notwithstanding the foregoing, however, qualifying projects that are not financed with State Department of Housing and Community Development Multifamily Housing Program Supportive Housing Component funds ("HCD Funds") will be subject to such Program subsidy payment reductions before any such reductions are made to qualifying projects financed with HCD Funds.

If MOHCD determines that Subsidy Payments for any given Fiscal Year must be reduced due to a shortfall in appropriated Program funds (a "Non-Appropriation Event"), MOHCD shall notify Grantee that a Non-Appropriation Event has occurred. City's obligation to make any Subsidy Payments in excess of those for which sufficient funds have been appropriated shall automatically terminate as of such Non-Appropriation Event, except as may be required pursuant to Section 2.5 below. Grantee acknowledges that HSA's and MOHCD's annual operating budgets are each subject to the discretion of City's Mayor and Board of Supervisors and a Non-Appropriation Event may occur during the Term and, accordingly, that Subsidy Payments may subsequently not be made in the amounts projected pursuant to this Agreement. Grantee's assumption of such risks is part of the consideration for this Agreement.

- 2.2 Certification of Controller; Guaranteed Maximum Costs. No funds shall be available under this Agreement until prior written authorization certified by the Controller. In addition, as set forth in Section 21.10-1 of the San Francisco Administrative Code:
- (a) City's obligations hereunder shall not at any time exceed the amount certified by the Controller for the purpose and period stated in such certification, the current Controller certification for Grant Funds is only for the First Subsidy Payment, and Controller certification will be a condition precedent for all other Subsidy Payments to the extent that Project Transition Reserve Account funds are not available to fund such Subsidy Payments.
- (b) Except as may be provided by City ordinances governing emergency conditions, City and its employees and officers are not authorized to request Grantee to perform services or to provide materials, equipment and supplies that would result in Grantee performing services or providing materials, equipment and supplies that are beyond the scope of the services, materials, equipment and supplies specified in this Agreement unless this Agreement is amended in writing and approved as required by law to authorize the additional services, materials, equipment or supplies. City is not required to pay Grantee for services, materials, equipment or supplies provided by Grantee if they are beyond the scope of the services, materials, equipment and supplies agreed upon herein and were not approved by a written amendment to this Agreement lawfully executed by City.
- (c) City and its employees and officers are not authorized to offer or promise to Grantee additional funding for this Agreement that would exceed the maximum amount of funding provided for herein. Additional funding for this Agreement in excess of the maximum provided herein shall require lawful approval and certification by the Controller. City is not required to honor any offered or promised additional funding that exceeds the maximum provided in this Agreement, which requires lawful approval and certification of the Controller when the lawful approval and certification by the Controller has not been obtained.
- (d) The Controller is not authorized to make payments on any agreement for which funds have not been certified as available for such purposes in the budget of HSA or MOHCD or by supplemental appropriation.
- **2.3** Automatic Termination for Nonappropriation or Nontransfer of Funds. This Agreement shall automatically terminate, without penalty, liability or expense of any kind to City, at the end of the period of the Fiscal Year that a Non-Appropriation Event occurs, except as otherwise set forth in Section 2.5.
- **2.4 SUPERSEDURE OF CONFLICTING PROVISIONS.** IN THE EVENT OF ANY CONFLICT BETWEEN ANY OF THE PROVISIONS OF THIS ARTICLE 2 AND ANY OTHER PROVISION OF THIS AGREEMENT, THE APPLICATION DOCUMENTS OR ANY OTHER DOCUMENT OR

COMMUNICATION RELATING TO THIS AGREEMENT, THE TERMS OF THIS ARTICLE 2 SHALL GOVERN.

2.5 Program Transition Reserve Account. All LOSP subsidy payments, including the Subsidy Payments, are conditioned on the appropriation of sufficient funds therefor and the transfer of such funds to MOHCD's annual budget. MOHCD intends to establish a reserve account, as MOHCD deems appropriate and in its sole discretion, to fund all or a portion of selected LOSP subsidy payments in the event sufficient funds are not so appropriated or transferred (the "Program Transition Reserve Account"). If there is a Non-Appropriation Event, City shall use Program Transition Reserve Account funds to disburse such Subsidy Payments to the extent there are sufficient Program Transition Reserve Account funds for such disbursements.

If there is a Non-Appropriation Event, and City fully funds the following Fiscal Year's Subsidy Payment in the amount shown on Exhibit A (whether with Program Transition Reserve Account funds or otherwise), this Agreement shall remain in effect through the last day of the Fiscal Year for which such Subsidy Payment is made. In the event City continues to fully fund subsequent Subsidy Payments, this Agreement shall remain in effect through the last day of the Fiscal Year for which each such subsequent Subsidy Payment is made.

City shall have no obligation to replenish or supplement the Program Transition Reserve Account. City shall have the right to, at MOHCD's discretion, use Program Transition Reserve Account funds to make subsidy payments to LOSP grantees other than Grantee. The Program Transition Reserve Account shall remain the City's property at all times and any interest that accrues thereon shall remain the sole property of City and will be deemed part of the Program Transition Reserve Account. If any funds remain in the Program Transition Reserve Account at the expiration of the Term or earlier termination of this Agreement, such funds shall remain with City and Grantee shall have no rights thereto.

Grantee agrees that it shall not make any distributions or payments of Residual Receipts, as defined in the MOHCD Loan Agreement, until City has approved the distribution or payment of such Residual Receipts.

ARTICLE 3 TERM

The term of this Agreement (the "Term") shall commence on the Effective Date and shall terminate on the fifteenth (15th) anniversary of the Effective Date, unless earlier terminated in accordance with the terms herein.

ARTICLE 4 PERFORMANCE OF GRANT OBLIGATIONS

4.1 Lease of Assisted Units.

(a) Commencing on the Initial Leasing Date, Grantee shall lease all of the Assisted Units to the LOSP Clients it selects from Referral Reports supplied by the City.

If an Assisted Unit lease terminates at any time, Grantee shall deliver written notice of such termination to City within five (5) business days of such termination (the "Termination Notice Date"). City shall accordingly deliver at least five (5) Referral Reports to Grantee within fifteen (15) business days of receiving such Assisted Unit lease termination notice and Grantee shall lease such vacated Assisted Unit to an LOSP Client it selects from such Referral Reports within the sixty (60) day period immediately following its receipt of such Referral Reports (each such additional lease up date shall be 7 | P a g e

referred to as an "Additional Leasing Date"). The period of time between a Termination Notice Date and the corresponding Additional Leasing Date shall be referred to as a "Vacancy Period". After the Initial Leasing Date, an Assisted Unit may remain vacant during any Vacancy Period applicable to such Assisted Unit. If City fails to timely deliver the required Referral Reports at any time, until City delivers such Referral Reports, Grantee can submit a request to City to use a qualified candidate identified by Grantee that satisfies the requirements of Exhibit B, and such request shall not be unreasonably denied.

- (b) Grantee shall have sole discretion in selecting the LOSP Clients that will be Tenants, provided that Grantee's decision not to rent an Assisted Unit to an LOSP Client referred to Grantee by City shall not be unreasonably withheld or conditioned, and provided further that Grantee shall not, except as otherwise required by this Agreement, discriminate against or permit discrimination against any person or group of persons because of race, color, creed, national origin, ancestry, age, sex, sexual orientation, disability, gender identity, height, weight, source of income or acquired immune deficiency syndrome (AIDS) or AIDS related condition (ARC) in the leasing of the Assisted Units.
- (c) Grantee shall comply with the Tenant Selection Plan Policy set forth in the attached Exhibit H.
- (d) Grantee shall comply with the Tenant Screening Criteria Policy set forth in the attached Exhibit I.
- (e) Grantee shall rent each Assisted Unit to a Tenant pursuant to a separate lease agreement that complies with this Agreement. Each Tenant lease shall provide for termination of such lease and such Tenant's consent to immediate eviction if the Tenant has made any material misrepresentation in the initial income certification made by Tenant to City or in any later income certification made by Tenant to Grantee.
- (f) Grantee shall obtain each Tenant's recertification of his/her household income on an annual basis. Such income certifications shall be prepared pursuant to low income housing tax credit guidelines for household income and shall be maintained on file at Grantee's principal office for no less than five (5) years following the date of such certification, and Grantee must file or cause to be filed copies thereof with MOHCD promptly upon MOHCD's request therefor.
- (g) Security deposits may be required of Tenants only in accordance with applicable federal regulations, state law and this Agreement. Any security deposits collected must be segregated from all other funds of the Project in an account held in trust for the benefit of the Tenants and other tenants of the Project and disbursed in accordance with California law. The balance in such security deposit account must at all times equal or exceed the aggregate of all security deposits collected plus accrued interest thereon, less any security deposits or interest thereon returned to Tenants or any other tenants of the Project.
- (h) To the extent permitted by applicable state and federal law, the Grantee shall comply with the Operational Rules for Residential Certificate of Preference Holder and Ellis Act Housing Preference set forth in the attached Exhibit J. The requirements of the attached Exhibit J apply to the Assisted Units as defined in this agreement as well as any other units in the project that are required by any agreement to be used as affordable housing.

4.2 Rent Restrictions.

- (a) Rent charged to any Tenant shall be the lower of thirty percent (30%) of a Tenant's gross monthly income, or the maximum rent allowed under the MOHCD Loan Agreement.
- (b) With the written approval of HSA, the Rent charged to a Tenant may be increased as a result of a determination by HSA that such Tenant is no longer eligible under the Program, so long as the Rent charged does not exceed the Underlying Restricted Rent. Notwithstanding the forgoing, Tenants deemed

no longer eligible by HSA who remain occupants of the Project shall still be considered a LOSP Client and the Tenant's Unit shall still constitute an Assisted Unit for purposes of compliance with the requirements of this Agreement.

- (c) Grantee must provide MOHCD at least annually a report showing actual household income level and Rent for each Tenant.
- 4.3 Operating Reserve Account; Subsidy Reserve Account. Grantee shall comply with all of its requirements for the Operating Reserve Account under the MOHCD Loan Agreement. In addition, if the Subsidy Payment made to Grantee for a Calendar Year exceeds the certified Shortfall for such Calendar Year, as determined pursuant to the reports delivered under Section 6.1, Grantee shall deposit such excess amount in the Subsidy Reserve Account. Grantee shall not use Subsidy Reserve Account funds, or any interest earned thereon, for any purpose other than as provided in this Agreement The only funds that shall be held in the Subsidy Reserve Account shall be the moneys deposited therein pursuant to this Section and the interest earned thereon.

If the Shortfall for a Calendar Year exceeds the Subsidy Payment made to Grantee for such Calendar Year, Grantee shall first use Subsidy Reserve Account funds, to the extent available, to pay the Operating Costs that comprise such excess Shortfall. If the Subsidy Reserve Account plus Subsidy Payment funds are insufficient to pay all of the Operating Costs in any given Calendar Year, Grantee shall use Operating Reserve Account funds, if any, to pay the remaining Operating Costs], subject to any approval Grantee must obtain from any lender under the Senior Loan Documents or Grantee's tax credit limited partner to so use the Operating Reserve Account funds.

4.4 [Intentionally Omitted]

4.5 Annual Operating Budget. The Annual Operating Budget attached hereto as Exhibit E sets forth Grantee's anticipated Operating Costs, Project Income and Shortfall for the Term of the Agreement. Grantee shall pay Operating Costs in conformity with the approved Annual Operating Budget. MOHCD's prior written consent shall not be required before Grantee can spend funds on Operating Costs that differ in amount from the amounts in the Annual Operating Budget.

Grantee can submit requests to change the amount of the Annual Operating Budget and corresponding Subsidy Payment for any year during the term by supplying a written proposal with the Annual Monitoring Report. Such proposals should include a variance analysis that includes a quantitative assessment of the difference between projected annual income and expenses and actual annual income and expenses, and explanations for the cause of any significant variances.

4.6 Grantee's Board of Directors. Grantee's manager, if Grantee is a limited liability company, or Grantee's general partner or the sole member of the limited liability company general partner, if Grantee is a limited partnership, shall at all times be governed by a legally constituted and fiscally responsible board of directors. Such board of directors shall meet regularly and maintain appropriate membership, as established in such entity's bylaws and other governing documents and shall adhere to applicable provisions of federal, state and local laws governing nonprofit corporations. Such entity's board of directors shall exercise such oversight responsibility with regard to this Agreement as is necessary to ensure full and prompt performance by Grantee of its obligations under this Agreement.

4.7 [Intentionally Omitted]

4.8 Maintenance and Management of Project.

(a) Grantee shall be responsible for ensuring all Project maintenance, repair and management functions, including the collection of rents, routine and extraordinary repairs and replacement of capital items, and for keeping the Project in a safe and sanitary manner and in good operating condition in

accordance with all Applicable Laws, the City Loan Documents and the Senior Loan Documents (collectively, the "Maintenance Duties").

- (b) Grantee may contract with a management agent for the performance of the Maintenance Duties subject to MOHCD's prior written approval of both the management agent and the management contract, provided, however, that the arrangement will not relieve Grantee of responsibility for performance of those duties. A management contract must contain a provision allowing Grantee to terminate the contract without penalty upon no more than thirty (30) days' notice.
- (c) MOHCD will provide written notice to Grantee if MOHCD determines that the Maintenance Duties are not being performed in accordance with this Agreement. If Grantee is then in contract with a management agent pursuant to subsection (b) above, and such management agent fails to fully cure such failure within thirty (30) days of the date that MOHCD delivers such written notice, Grantee shall exercise such thirty (30) day termination right, terminate the management contract and make immediate arrangements for cure of such failure and for the continuous and continuing performance of the Maintenance Duties. If, at the time of such notice, Grantee is not in contract with a management agent pursuant to subsection (b) above, in addition to MOHCD's rights hereunder, MOHCD shall have the right to require that Grantee, at Grantee's sole cost, contract with a management agent to perform the Maintenance Duties, or to make other arrangements the City deems necessary to ensure full and timely performance of the Maintenance Duties.
 - (d) Grantee shall operate the Project in compliance with all Applicable Laws.

4.9 Services Agreement; Provision of Services.

- (a) Grantee hereby agrees to allow the Tenant Services Contractor (and any subsequent service provider) access to the Project at all reasonable times for the provision of services to the Project's LOSP Clients.
- (b) Grantee shall promptly provide written notice to MOHCD if Grantee obtains knowledge of any default, or event that with notice or the passage of time or both could constitute a default, under the Services Agreement.
- (c) In the event that the Services Agreement is terminated for any reason, or that MOHCD and/or HSA determines that the Tenant Services Contractor needs to be replaced, Grantee shall cooperate in good faith with MOHCD and HSA in obtaining a new service provider for the LOSP Clients in the Project. In such an event, the selection of the new service provider for the Project shall require Grantee's prior consent, which shall not be unreasonably delayed or denied. Grantee hereby agrees and acknowledges that nothing in this Agreement gives Grantee any right to consent to the MOHCD and/or HSA determination to terminate the Services Agreement or to replace the Tenant Services Contractor.

ARTICLE 5 USE AND DISBURSEMENT OF GRANT FUNDS

5.1 Maximum Amount of Grant Funds; Disbursement of Subsidy Payments. In no event shall the total amount of Grant Funds disbursed hereunder exceed Eight Million Three Hundred Eighty Thousand Four Hundred Fifty-Eight Dollars (\$8,380,458) (the "Grant Amount"). Subject to Grantee's performance of its obligations under this Agreement and MOHCD's receipt of sufficient funds, as further set forth in Article 2, the Grant Funds shall be disbursed through Subsidy Payments.

Provided that Grantee is in compliance with all of the conditions for receipt of the First Subsidy Payment, City shall deliver the First Subsidy Payment to Grantee within ten (10) business days immediately following the Effective Date. For every subsequent Fiscal Year during the Term, provided that Grantee is in compliance with all of the conditions for receipt of a Subsidy Payment, City shall

deliver the Subsidy Payment for such Fiscal Year to Grantee within fifteen (15) business days immediately following the commencement of the applicable Fiscal Year.

5.2 Subsidy Payment Amounts and Adjustments.

- (a) The 15-Year Cash Flow is the Parties' current expectations of Operating Costs and Shortfalls during the Term. The Parties anticipate that the amount of the First Subsidy Payment and each subsequent Subsidy Payment shall be as shown on **Exhibit A**. The First Subsidy Payment amount reflects the Shortfall for the Fiscal Year starting on the Effective Date. Notwithstanding the foregoing initial calculations of the 15-Year Cash Flow and the Subsidy Payment amounts, however, each Subsidy Payment (including the First Subsidy Payment) is subject to further adjustment pursuant to this Section and City's annual review and approval of the applicable Annual Operating Budget. The City shall reduce the subsequent Subsidy Payments by the amount of any funds held in the Subsidy Reserve Account.
- (b) The total amount of all Subsidy Payments made hereunder shall not exceed the Grant Amount. If the total amount of all Subsidy Payments made hereunder equals the Grant Amount at any time prior to the expiration of the Term, no further Subsidy Payments shall be made hereunder. If any Subsidy Payment would, if made, cause the total amount of all Subsidy Payments made hereunder to exceed the Grant Amount, such Subsidy Payment shall be accordingly reduced so the total amount of Subsidy Payments made hereunder equals the Grant Amount.
- 5.3 Use of Grant Funds. Grantee shall use the Grant Funds only for Operating Costs and for no other purpose. Grantee shall expend the Grant Funds in accordance with the Annual Operating Budget.
- 5.4 Conditions Precedent to Payment of First Subsidy Payment. Grantee shall fully satisfy each of the following conditions prior to delivery of the First Subsidy Payment.
- (a) Grantee must have delivered to the City fully executed (and for documents to be recorded, acknowledged) originals of the following documents, in form and substance satisfactory to the City: (i) this Agreement (in triplicate); (ii) the Opinion; and (iii) the Authorizing Resolutions.
 - (b) Grantee must have delivered its Charter Documents to the City.
- (c) Grantee shall be in compliance with all of its obligations under City Loan Documents and the Senior Loan Documents.
- (d) Tenant Services Contractor shall be in compliance with all of its obligations under the Services Agreement, and no default, or event that with notice or the passage of time or both could constitute a default, shall exist and remain uncured under the Services Agreement; provided however that disbursement of the First Subsidy Payment shall not be withheld due to an uncured default under the Services Agreement if at the time of expected disbursement, Grantee provides City with sufficient evidence that it is cooperating in good faith with the City and HSA to diligently pursue a cure of said default, which may or may not include Grantee directly providing the required services under the Services Agreement.
- (e) No Event of Default, or event that with notice or the passage of time or both could constitute an Event of Default, shall exist and remain uncured as of the date of the Initial Subsidy Payment is to be disbursed hereunder.
- 5.5 Conditions Precedent to Payment of Subsequent Subsidy Payments. Grantee shall fully satisfy each of the following conditions prior to delivery of any Subsequent Subsidy Payment:
- (a) Grantee shall be in compliance with all of its obligations under the City Loan Documents and the Senior Loan Documents.

- (b) Tenant Services Contractor shall be in compliance with all of its obligations under the Services Agreement, and no default, or event that with notice or the passage of time or both could constitute a default, shall exist and remain uncured under the Services Agreement; provided however that disbursement of any Subsequent Subsidy Payment shall not be withheld due to an uncured default under the Services Agreement if at the time of expected disbursement, Grantee provides City with sufficient evidence that it is cooperating in good faith with the City and DPH to diligently pursue a cure of said default, which may or may not include Grantee directly providing the required services under the Services Agreement.
- (c) No Event of Default, or event that with notice or the passage of time or both could constitute an Event of Default, shall exist and remain uncured as of the date of such Subsidy Payment is to be disbursed hereunder.

ARTICLE 6 REPORTING REQUIREMENTS; AUDITS; PENALTIES FOR FALSE CLAIMS

6.1 Regular Reports; Operating Statements.

Grantee must file electronically with the City no later than one hundred twenty (120) days after the end of Grantee's calendar year annual report forms (the "Annual Monitoring Report") that include audited financial statements including any management letters; an income and expense statement for the Project covering the applicable reporting period "Operating Statement"; a statement of balances, deposits and withdrawals from all Accounts; and evidence of required insurance. The Annual Monitoring Report must be in substantially the form attached as Exhibit G or as later modified by MOHCD during the Term.

Such Annual Monitoring Report shall include a list of the Operating Costs paid by Grantee during such applicable prior Calendar Year and Grantee's certifications that (a) the total Grant Funds received by Grantee as of the end date of the applicable Calendar Year have been used only to pay Operating Costs , (b) all of Grantee's representations and warranties in this Agreement remain true and correct in all material respects as if made on the end date of such the applicable Calendar Year, (c) there is no Event of Default by Grantee as of the end date of the applicable Calendar Year, and (d) the party signing the Annual Monitoring Report is an officer of Grantee authorized to do so on Grantee's behalf.

- 6.2 Organizational Documents. Prior to the Effective Date, Grantee shall provide to City the following documents (collectively, the "Charter Documents"): a certified certificate of status and (a) if Grantee is a corporation, its bylaws, and a certified copy of its articles of incorporation; (b) if Grantee is limited partnership, its partnership agreement, a certified copy of its certificate of partnership, and the organizational documents of its general partner; and (c) if Grantee is a limited liability company, its operating agreement, a certified copy of its certificate of limited liability company, and the organizational documents of its manager. All certified documents to be provided pursuant to this Section shall be certified by the California Secretary of State or, if the entity for which a certified document is to be provided was not organized in the State of California, certified by the Secretary of State of such entity's state of organization, no earlier than two (2) months prior to the Effective Date. The Charter Documents must be delivered to the City in their original form and as amended from time to time.
- 6.3 Notification of Defaults or Changes in Circumstances. Grantee shall notify City immediately of (a) any Event of Default or event that, with the passage of time, would constitute an Event of Default; and (b) any change of circumstances that would cause any of the representations and warranties contained in Article 8 to be false or misleading at any time during the term of this Agreement.
- 6.4 Financial Statements. As noted in Section 6.1, Grantee shall also deliver to City, no later than one hundred twenty (120) days following the end of any Calendar Year, an audited balance sheet and the related statement of income and cash flows for such Calendar Year, certified by a reputable accounting

firm as accurately presenting the financial position of Grantee, including any management letters supplied by the auditors.

- **6.5** Staffing Assessment. By no later than March 1, 2016, Grantee shall provide to the City an analysis of the Project's staffing pattern (both property management staff and services staff) including an assessment of the need for 24-hour staffing. Based on the report provided, the City shall determine, in its reasonable discretion, whether it is appropriate to eliminate the 24-hour staffing requirement contained in the Neighborhood Benefits Agreement. If City so determines, then Grantee shall make good faith best efforts to negotiate with neighbor organizations to amend the Neighborhood Benefits Agreement in order to eliminate the 24-hour staffing requirement contained therein.
- 6.6 Books and Records. Grantee shall establish and maintain accurate files and records of all aspects of Operating Expenses and Project Income and the matters funded in whole or in part with Grant Funds during the term of this Agreement. Without limiting the scope of the foregoing, Grantee shall establish and maintain accurate financial books and accounting records relating to Operating Costs incurred and paid and Grant Funds received and expended under this Agreement, together with all invoices, documents, payrolls, time records and other data related to the matters covered by this Agreement, whether funded in whole or in part with Grant Funds. Grantee shall maintain all of the files, records, books, invoices, documents, payrolls and other data required to be maintained under this Section in a readily accessible location and condition for a period of not less than five (5) years after final payment under this Agreement or until any final audit has been fully completed, whichever is later: Grantee agrees to maintain and make available to MOHCD, during regular business hours, accurate books and accounting records relating to the Project and the Tenants. The State of California or any federal agency having an interest in the subject matter of this Agreement shall have the same rights conferred upon MOHCD by this Section. All financial reports must be prepared and maintained in accordance with GAAP as in effect at the time of performance.
- 6.7 Inspection and Audit. Grantee shall make available to MOHCD, its employees and authorized representatives, during regular business hours all of the files, records, books, invoices, documents, payrolls and other data required to be established and maintained by Grantee under Section 6.5. Grantee shall permit MOHCD, its employees and authorized representatives to inspect, audit, examine and make excerpts and transcripts from any of the foregoing. The rights of MOHCD pursuant to this Section shall remain in effect so long as Grantee has the obligation to maintain such files, records, books, invoices, documents, payrolls and other data under this Article 6.
- **6.8** Submitting False Claims; Monetary Penalties. Grantee acknowledges and agrees that it is a "contractor" under and is subject to San Francisco Administrative Code Section 21.35. Under such Section 21.35, any contractor, subgrantee or consultant who submits a false claim shall be liable to City for three times the amount of damages which City sustains because of the false claim. A contractor, subgrantee or consultant who submits a false claim shall also be liable to City for the costs, including attorney's fees, of a civil action brought to recover any of those penalties or damages, and may be liable to City for a civil penalty of up to Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000) for each false claim. A contractor, subgrantee or consultant will be deemed to have submitted a false claim to City if the contractor, subgrantee or consultant: (a) knowingly presents or causes to be presented to an officer or employee of City a false claim or request for payment or approval; (b) knowingly makes, uses, or causes to be made or used a false record or statement to get a false claim paid or approved by City; (c) conspires to defraud City by getting a false claim allowed or paid by City; (d) knowingly makes, uses, or causes to be made or used a false record or statement to conceal, avoid, or decrease an obligation to pay or transmit money or property to City; or (e) is a beneficiary of an inadvertent submission of a false claim to City, subsequently discovers the falsity of the claim, and fails to disclose the false claim to City within a reasonable time after discovery of the false claim.
- 6.9 Project Monitoring Generally. Grantee understands and agrees that it will be monitored by the City from time to time to assure compliance with all terms and conditions in this Agreement and all Laws. Grantee acknowledges that the City may also conduct periodic on-site inspections of the Project. Grantee

must cooperate with the monitoring by the City and ensure full access to the Project and all information related to the Project as reasonably required by the City.

6.10 Notice Requirement for Changes in Director Positions. Grantee must provide written notice of the replacement of its executive director, director of housing development, director of property management and/or any equivalent position within thirty (30) days after the effective date of such replacement.

ARTICLE 7 TAXES

- 7.1 Grantee to Pay All Taxes. Grantee shall pay to the appropriate governmental authority, as and when due, any and all taxes, fees, assessments or other governmental charges, including possessory interest taxes and California sales and use taxes, levied upon or in connection with this Agreement, the Grant Funds or any of the activities contemplated by this Agreement.
- 7.2 Use of City Real Property. If at any time this Agreement entitles Grantee to the possession, occupancy or use of City real property for private gain, the following provisions shall apply:
- (a) Grantee, on behalf of itself and any subgrantees, successors and assigns, recognizes and understands that this Agreement may create a possessory interest subject to property taxation and Grantee, and any subgrantee, successor or assign, may be subject to the payment of such taxes.
- (b) Grantee, on behalf of itself and any subgrantees, successors and assigns, further recognizes and understands that any assignment permitted hereunder and any exercise of any option to renew or other extension of this Agreement may constitute a change in ownership for purposes of property taxation and therefore may result in a revaluation of any possessory interest created hereunder. Grantee shall report any assignment or other transfer of any interest in this Agreement or any renewal or extension thereof to the County Assessor within sixty (60) days after such assignment, transfer, renewal or extension.
- (c) Grantee shall provide such other information as may be requested by City to enable City to comply with any reporting requirements under applicable law with respect to possessory interests.
- 7.3 Earned Income Credit (EIC) Forms. Administrative Code Section 12O requires that employers provide their employees with IRS Form W-5 (The Earned Income Credit Advance Payment Certificate) and the IRS EIC Schedule, as set forth below. Employers can locate these forms at the IRS Office, on the Internet, or anywhere that Federal Tax Forms can be found.
- (a) Grantee shall provide EIC Forms to each Eligible Employee at each of the following times: (i) within thirty (30) days following the date on which this Agreement becomes effective (unless Grantee has already provided such EIC Forms at least once during the calendar year in which such effective date falls); (ii) promptly after any Eligible Employee is hired by Grantee; and (iii) annually between January 1 and January 31 of each calendar year during the term of this Agreement.
- (b) Failure to comply with any requirement contained in subparagraph (a) of this Section shall constitute a material breach by Grantee of the terms of this Agreement. If, within thirty (30) days after Grantee receives written notice of such a breach, Grantee fails to cure such breach or, if such breach cannot reasonably be cured within such period of thirty (30) days, Grantee fails to commence efforts to cure within such period or thereafter fails to diligently pursue such cure to completion, the City may pursue any rights or remedies available under this Agreement or under applicable law.
- (c) Any Subcontract entered into by Grantee shall require the subgrantee to comply, as to the subgrantee's Eligible Employees, with each of the terms of this Section.

(d) Capitalized terms used in this Section and not defined in this Agreement shall have the meanings assigned to such terms in Section 120 of the San Francisco Administrative Code.

ARTICLE 8 REPRESENTATIONS AND WARRANTIES

Grantee represents and warrants each of the following as of the date of this Agreement and at all times throughout the term of this Agreement:

- 8.1 Organization; Authorization. Grantee shall be a limited liability company or a limited partnership, and Grantee's manager, if Grantee is a limited liability company, or Grantee's general partner, or the general partner's sole member of the general partner (if general partner is a limited liability company), is a nonprofit corporation, duly organized and validly existing and in good standing under the laws of the jurisdiction in which it was formed, and which has established and maintains valid nonprofit status under Section 501(c)(3) of the United States Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended, and all rules and regulations promulgated thereunder. Grantee has duly authorized by all necessary action the execution, delivery and performance of this Agreement. Grantee has duly executed and delivered this Agreement and this Agreement constitutes a legal, valid and binding obligation of Grantee, enforceable against Grantee in accordance with the terms hereof.
- **8.2** Location. Grantee's operations, offices and headquarters are located at the address for notices set forth in Section 15.
- **8.3** No Misstatements. No document furnished or to be furnished by Grantee to MOHCD in connection with the Application Documents, this Agreement, or any other document relating to any of the foregoing, contains or will contain any untrue statement of material fact or omits or will omit a material fact necessary to make the statements contained therein not misleading, under the circumstances under which any such statement shall have been made.
- **8.4** Conflict of Interest. Through its execution of this Agreement, Grantee acknowledges that it is familiar with the provision of Section 15.103 of the City's Charter, Article III, Chapter 2 of the City's Campaign and Governmental Conduct Code, and Section 87100 et seq. and Section 1090 et seq. of the Government Code of the State of California, and certifies that it does not know of any facts which constitutes a violation of said provisions and agrees that it will immediately notify MOHCD if it becomes aware of any such fact during the term of this Agreement.
- 8.5 [Intentionally Omitted]

ARTICLE 9 INDEMNIFICATION AND GENERAL LIABILITY

9.1 Indemnification. Grantee shall indemnify, protect, defend and hold harmless each of the Indemnified Parties from and against any and all Losses arising from, in connection with or caused by:
(a) a material breach of this Agreement by Grantee; (b) a material breach of any representation or warranty of Grantee contained in this Agreement; (c) any personal injury caused, directly or indirectly, by any act or omission of Grantee or its employees, subgrantees or agents; (d) any property damage caused, directly or indirectly by any act or omission of Grantee or its employees, subgrantees or agents; (e) the use, misuse or failure of any equipment or facility used by Grantee, or by any of its employees, subgrantees or agents, regardless of whether such equipment or facility is furnished, rented or loaned to Grantee by an Indemnified Party; (f) any tax, fee, assessment or other charge for which Grantee is responsible under Article 7; or (g) any infringement of patent rights; copyright, trade secret or any other proprietary right or trademark of any person or entity in consequence of the use by any Indemnified Party of any goods or services furnished to such Indemnified Party in connection with this Agreement. Grantee's obligations under the immediately preceding sentence shall apply to any Loss that is caused in

whole or in part by the active or passive negligence of any Indemnified Party, but shall exclude any Loss caused solely by the willful misconduct or gross negligence of the Indemnified Party. The foregoing indemnity shall include, without limitation, reasonable fees of attorneys, consultants and experts and related costs and City's costs of investigating any claims against the City.

- 9.2 Duty to Defend; Notice of Loss. Grantee acknowledges and agrees that its obligation to defend the Indemnified Parties under Section 9.1: (a) is an immediate obligation, independent of its other obligations hereunder; (b) applies to any Loss which actually or potentially falls within the scope of Section 9.1, regardless of whether the allegations asserted in connection with such Loss are or may be groundless, false or fraudulent; and (c) arises at the time the Loss is tendered to Grantee by the Indemnified Party and continues at all times thereafter. The Indemnified Party shall give Grantee prompt notice of any Loss under Section 9.1 and Grantee shall have the right to defend, settle and compromise any such Loss; provided, however, that the Indemnified Party shall have the right to retain its own counsel at the expense of Grantee if representation of such Indemnified Party by the counsel retained by Grantee would be inappropriate due to conflicts of interest between such Indemnified Party and Grantee. An Indemnified Party's failure to notify Grantee promptly of any Loss shall not relieve Grantee of any liability to such Indemnified Party pursuant to Section 9.1, unless such failure materially impairs Grantee's ability to defend such Loss. Grantee shall seek the Indemnified Party's prior written consent to settle or compromise any Loss if Grantee contends that such Indemnified Party shares in liability with respect thereto.
- 9.3 Incidental and Consequential Damages. Losses covered under this Article 9 shall include any and all incidental and consequential damages resulting in whole or in part from Grantee's acts or omissions. Nothing in this Agreement shall constitute a waiver or limitation of any rights that any Indemnified Party may have under applicable law with respect to such damages.
- 9.4 LIMITATION ON LIABILITY OF CITY. CITY'S OBLIGATIONS UNDER THIS AGREEMENT SHALL BE LIMITED TO THE AGGREGATE AMOUNT OF GRANT FUNDS ACTUALLY DISBURSED HEREUNDER. NOTWITHSTANDING ANY OTHER PROVISION CONTAINED IN THIS AGREEMENT, THE APPLICATION DOCUMENTS OR ANY OTHER DOCUMENT OR COMMUNICATION RELATING TO THIS AGREEMENT, IN NO EVENT SHALL CITY BE LIABLE, REGARDLESS OF WHETHER ANY CLAIM IS BASED ON CONTRACT OR TORT, FOR ANY SPECIAL, CONSEQUENTIAL, INDIRECT OR INCIDENTAL DAMAGES, INCLUDING LOST PROFITS, ARISING OUT OF OR IN CONNECTION WITH THIS AGREEMENT, THE GRANT FUNDS OR ANY ACTIVITIES PERFORMED IN CONNECTION WITH THIS AGREEMENT.

ARTICLE 10 INSURANCE.

- 10.1 Types and Amounts of Coverage. Without limiting Grantee's liability pursuant to Article 9, Grantee shall maintain in force, during the full term of this Agreement, insurance in the following amounts and coverages:
- (a) Workers' Compensation, in statutory amounts, with Employers' Liability Limits not less than One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000) each accident, injury, or illness.
- (b) Commercial General Liability Insurance with limits not less than One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000) each occurrence Combined Single Limit for Bodily Injury and Property Damage, including Contractual Liability, Personal Injury, Products and Completed Operations.
- (c) Commercial Automobile Liability Insurance with limits not less than One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000) each occurrence Combined Single Limit for Bodily Injury and Property Damage, including Owned, Non-Owned and Hired auto coverage, as applicable.

- (d) Professional liability insurance for negligent acts, errors or omission with respect to professional or technical services, if any, required in the performance of this Agreement with limits not less than One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000) each claim.
- **10.2** Additional Requirements for General and Automobile Coverage. Commercial General Liability and Commercial Automobile Liability insurance policies shall:
- (a) Name as additional insured City and its officers, agents and employees. With respect to the Commercial Automobile Insurance the City and its officers, agents and employees shall only be additional insured as to liability arising out of the use, by Grantee's employees, of automobiles, whether owned, leased, hired or borrowed, in connection with the Project.
- (b) Provide that such policies are primary insurance to any other insurance available to the Additional Insureds, with respect to any claims arising out of this Agreement, and that insurance applies separately to each insured against whom claim is made or suit is brought, except with respect to limits of liability.
- 10.3 Additional Requirements for All Policies. Contractor shall provide thirty (30) days' advance written notice to City of cancellation of policy for any reason, nonrenewal or reduction in coverage and specific notice mailed to City's address for notices pursuant to Article 15.
- 10.4 Required Post-Expiration Coverage. Should any of the insurance required hereunder be provided under a claims-made form, Grantee shall maintain such coverage continuously throughout the term of this Agreement and, without lapse, for a period of three (3) years beyond the expiration or termination of this Agreement, to the effect that, should occurrences during the term hereof give rise to claims made after expiration or termination of the Agreement, such claims shall be covered by such claims-made policies.
- 10.5 General Annual Aggregate Limit/Inclusion of Claims Investigation or Legal Defense Costs. Should any of the insurance required hereunder be provided under a form of coverage that includes a general annual aggregate limit or provides that claims investigation or legal defense costs be included in such general annual aggregate limit, such general annual aggregate limit shall be double the occurrence or claims limits specified above.
- 10.6 Evidence of Insurance. Before commencing any operations under this Agreement, Grantee shall furnish to City certificates of insurance, and additional insured policy endorsements, in form and with insurers satisfactory to City, evidencing all coverages set forth above, and shall furnish complete copies of policies promptly upon City's request. Before commencing any operations under this Agreement, Grantee shall furnish to City certificates of insurance and additional insured policy endorsements with insurers with ratings comparable to A-, VIII or higher, that are authorized to do business in the State of California, and that are satisfactory to City, in form evidencing all coverages set forth above. Failure to maintain insurance shall constitute a material breach of this Agreement.
- 10.7 Effect of Approval. Approval of any insurance by City shall not relieve or decrease the liability of Grantee hereunder.

ARTICLE 11 EVENTS OF DEFAULT AND REMEDIES

- 11.1 Events of Default. The occurrence of any one or more of the following events shall constitute an "Event of Default" under this Agreement:
- (a) False Statement. Any statement, representation or warranty contained in this Agreement, in the Application Documents, or in any other document submitted to City under this Agreement is found by City to be false or misleading when made.

- (b) Improper Use of Grant Funds; Failure to Perform Other Covenants and Obligations. Grantee uses Grant Funds for any purpose other than for the payment of Operating Costs (or reimbursement for its advance payment thereof), fails to use the Subsidy Payments it receives to pay Operating Costs (or reimbursement for its advance payment thereof), or otherwise fails to perform or breaches any other agreement or covenant of this Agreement to be performed or observed by Grantee as and when performance or observance is due and such failure or breach continues for a period of ten (10) days after the date on which such performance or observance is due, or if such breach can not be cured in ten (10) days, then City shall not exercise its remedies hereunder as long as Grantee continues to diligently pursue a cure of the breach; provided, however, that: (i) in the case of an improper use of Grant Funds, in no event shall such cure period extend beyond thirty (30) days after the date on which such performance or observance is due, and (ii) in the case of other defaults under this Section 11.1(b), in no event shall such cure period extend beyond ninety (90) days after the date on which such performance or observance is due.
- (c) **Default under City Loan Documents or Senior Loan Documents.** Grantee defaults under any City Loan Document or any of the Senior Loan Documents (after expiration of any grace period expressly stated in any such agreement).
- (d) Voluntary Insolvency. Grantee (i) is generally not paying its debts as they become due, (ii) files, or consents by answer or otherwise to the filing against it of, a petition for relief or reorganization or arrangement or any other petition in bankruptcy or for liquidation or to take advantage of any bankruptcy, insolvency or other debtors' relief law of any jurisdiction, (iii) makes an assignment for the benefit of its creditors, (iv) consents to the appointment of a custodian, receiver, trustee or other officer with similar powers of Grantee or of any substantial part of Grantee's property or (v) takes action for the purpose of any of the foregoing.
- (e) Involuntary Insolvency. Without consent by Grantee, a court or government authority enters an order, and such order is not vacated within 60 days, (i) appointing a custodian, receiver, trustee or other officer with similar powers with respect to Grantee or with respect to any substantial part of Grantee's property, (ii) constituting an order for relief or approving a petition for relief or reorganization or arrangement or any other petition in bankruptcy or for liquidation or to take advantage of any bankruptcy, insolvency or other debtors' relief law of any jurisdiction or (iii) ordering the dissolution, winding-up or liquidation of Grantee.
- (f) New Encumbrances. Any lien is recorded against all or any part of the Real Property or the Project without MOHCD's prior written consent, and the lien is not removed from title or otherwise remedied to MOHCD's satisfaction within thirty (30) days after Grantee's receipt of written notice from MOHCD to cure the default, or, if the default cannot be cured within a thirty (30) day period, Grantee will have sixty (60) days to cure the default, or any longer period of time deemed necessary by MOHCD, provided that Grantee commences to cure the default within the thirty (30) day period and diligently pursues the cure to completion.
- (g) **Damage or Destruction**. All or a substantial or material portion of the Project is damaged or destroyed by fire or other casualty or is condemned, seized or appropriated by any non-City governmental agency or subject to any action or other proceeding instituted by any non-City governmental agency for any purpose with the result that the Project cannot be operated for its intended purpose.
- (h) **Dissolution**. Grantee or Grantee's general partners are dissolved or liquidated or merged with or into any other entity or ceases to exist in its present form and (where applicable) in good standing and duly qualified under the laws of the jurisdiction of formation and California for any period of more than ten (10) days, or all or substantially all of Grantee's assets are sold or otherwise transferred except as permitted.

- Assignment. Without MOHCD's prior written consent, Grantee assigns or attempts to assign any rights or interest under this Agreement or encumber its interests hereunder, whether voluntarily or involuntarily, or voluntarily or involuntarily assigns or attempts to sell, lease. assign, encumber or otherwise transfer all or any portion of the ownership interests in Grantee or of its right, title or interest in the Project or the Real Property, other than: (a) leases, subleases or occupancy agreements to occupants of Units and/or Commercial Space in the Project; or (b) security interests for the benefit of lenders securing loans for the Project as approved by the City on terms and in amounts as approved by City in its reasonable discretion (c) transfers from Borrower to a limited partnership or limited liability company formed for the tax credit syndication of the Project, where Borrower or an affiliated nonprofit public benefit corporation is the sole general partner or manager of that entity; (d) transfers of the general partner's or manager's interest in Borrower to a nonprofit public benefit corporation approved in advance by the City; (e) transfers of any limited partnership or membership interest in Borrower to an investor pursuant to the tax credit syndication of the Project or any subsequent transfer of a limited partnership interest in Borrower by an investor limited partner in Borrower, or any direct or indirect transfer of a limited partnership interest or membership interest in any investor limited partner in Borrower; (f) any transfer permitted under the City Documents; or (g) the grant or exercise of an option agreement between Borrower and Borrower's general partner or manager or any of its affiliates in connection with the tax credit syndication of the Project. Any other transfer, assignment, encumbrance or lease without the City's prior written consent will be voidable and, at the City's election, constitute an Event of Default under this Agreement. The City's consent to any specific assignment, encumbrance, lease or other transfer will not constitute its consent to any subsequent transfer or a waiver of any of the City's rights under this Agreement.
- (j) Account Transfers. Without MOHCD's prior written consent, to the extent such consent is required pursuant to this Agreement, Grantee transfers, or authorizes the transfer of, funds in any account required or authorized under this Agreement.
- (k) Changed Financing Condition. Any material adverse change occurs in the financial condition or operations of Grantee, such as a loss of services funding or rental subsidies (excluding the reduction of any Subsidy Payment hereunder) that has a material adverse impact on the Project.

An Event of Default under this Agreement that remains uncured shall be a default under the City Loan Documents.

- 11.2 Remedies Upon Event of Default. Upon and during the continuance of an Event of Default, City may do any of the following, individually or in combination with any other remedy:
- (a) **Termination**. City may terminate this Agreement by giving a written termination notice to Grantee and, on the date specified in such notice, this Agreement shall terminate and all rights and obligations of Grantee hereunder shall be extinguished. In the event of such termination, the City will allow Grantee to use previously disbursed Subsidy Payment funds to pay for only Operating Costs incurred prior to the termination date. The remaining balance of any Subsidy Payment not used to pay for previously incurred Operating Costs must be returned to the City..
- (b) Withholding of Grant Funds. City may withhold all or any portion of Grant Funds not yet disbursed hereunder. Any Grant Funds withheld pursuant to this Section and subsequently disbursed to Grantee after cure of applicable Events of Default shall be disbursed without interest.
- (c) Offset. City may offset against all or any portion of undisbursed Grant Funds hereunder or against any payments due to Grantee under the MOHCD Loan Agreement or any other agreement between Grantee and City the amount of any outstanding Loss incurred by any Indemnified Party, including any Loss incurred as a result of the Event of Default.

- (d) Return of Grant Funds. City may demand the immediate return of any previously disbursed Grant Funds that have been claimed or expended by Grantee in breach of the terms of this Agreement, together with interest thereon from the date of disbursement at the maximum rate permitted under applicable law.
- 11.3 Remedies Nonexclusive. Each of the remedies provided for in this Agreement may be exercised individually or in combination with any other remedy available under this Agreement, any other City Document and/or Applicable Laws. The remedies contained herein are in addition to all other remedies available to City at law or in equity by statute or otherwise and the exercise of any such remedy shall not preclude or in any way be deemed to waive any other remedy.

ARTICLE 12 DISCLOSURE OF INFORMATION AND DOCUMENTS

- 12.1 Proprietary or Confidential Information of City. Grantee understands and acknowledges that, in the performance of this Agreement or in contemplation thereof, Grantee may have access to private or confidential information that may be owned or controlled by City and that such information may contain proprietary or confidential information, the disclosure of which to third parties may be damaging to City. Grantee agrees that all information disclosed by City to Grantee shall be held in confidence and used only in the performance of this Agreement. Grantee shall exercise the same standard of care to protect such information as a reasonably prudent nonprofit entity would use to protect its own proprietary or confidential data.
- 12.2 Sunshine Ordinance. Grantee acknowledges and agrees that this Agreement and the Application Documents are subject to Section 67.24(e) of the San Francisco Administrative Code, which provides that contracts, including this Agreement, grantee's bids, responses to Requests for Proposals (RFPs) and all other records of communications between City and persons or entities seeking contracts, shall be open to inspection immediately after a contract has been awarded. Nothing in such Section 67.24(e) (as it exists on the date hereof) requires the disclosure of a private person's or organization's net worth or other proprietary financial data submitted for qualification for a contract or other benefit until and unless that person or organization is awarded the contract or benefit. All information provided by Grantee that is covered by such Section 67.24(e) (as it may be amended from time to time) will be made available to the public upon request.
- 12.3 Financial Projections. Pursuant to San Francisco Administrative Code Section 67.32, Grantee has on or before the date hereof provided to City financial projections, including profit and loss figures, for the Project. The Grantee acknowledges and agrees that the financial projections and audited financial statements required under this Agreement shall be public records subject to disclosure upon request.

ARTICLE 13 ASSIGNMENTS AND SUBCONTRACTING

- 13.1 No Assignment by Grantee. Grantee shall not, either directly or indirectly, assign, transfer, hypothecate, subcontract or delegate all or any portion of this Agreement or any rights, duties or obligations of Grantee hereunder without the prior written consent of City. This Agreement shall not, nor shall any interest herein, be assignable as to the interest of Grantee involuntarily or by operation of law without the prior written consent of City. A change of ownership or control of Grantee or a sale or transfer of substantially all of the assets of Grantee shall be deemed an assignment for purposes of this Agreement. Notwithstanding any provision of this Agreement to the contrary, this Section 13.1 shall not prevent transfers that are expressly permitted under the City Loan Documents.
- 13.2 Agreement Made in Violation of this Article. Any agreement made in violation of <u>Section 13.1</u> shall confer no rights on any person or entity and shall automatically be null and void.

- 13.3 Subcontracting. Grantee shall not subcontract or assign any portion of this Agreement to any other party without the prior written consent of City; notwithstanding the foregoing, Grantee may subcontract for property management and maintenance without the consent of the City.
- 13.4 Grantee Retains Responsibility. Grantee shall in all events remain liable for the performance by any assignee or subgrantee of all of the covenants terms and conditions contained in this Agreement.

ARTICLE 14 INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR STATUS

- 14.1 Nature of Agreement. Grantee shall be deemed at all times to be an independent contractor and is solely responsible for the manner in which Grantee uses the Grant Funds. Grantee shall at all times remain solely liable for the acts and omissions of Grantee, its officers and directors, employees and agents. Nothing in this Agreement shall be construed as creating a partnership, joint venture, employment or agency relationship between City and Grantee.
- **14.2 Direction.** Any terms in this Agreement referring to direction or instruction from MOHCD or City shall be construed as providing for direction as to policy and the result of Grantee's work only, and not as to the means by which such a result is obtained.

14.3 Consequences of Recharacterization.

- (a) Should City, in its discretion, or a relevant taxing authority such as the Internal Revenue Service or the State Employment Development Division, or both, determine that Grantee is an employee for purposes of collection of any employment taxes, the amounts payable under this Agreement shall be reduced by amounts equal to both the employee and employer portions of the tax due (and offsetting any credits for amounts already paid by Grantee which can be applied against this liability). City shall subsequently forward such amounts to the relevant taxing authority.
- (b) Should a relevant taxing authority determine a liability for past services performed by Grantee for City, upon notification of such fact by City, Grantee shall promptly remit such amount due or arrange with City to have the amount due withheld from future payments to Grantee under this Agreement (again, offsetting any amounts already paid by Grantee which can be applied as a credit against such liability).
- (c) A determination of employment status pursuant to either subsection (a) or (b) of this <u>Section 14.3</u> shall be solely for the purposes of the particular tax in question, and for all other purposes of this Agreement, Grantee shall not be considered an employee of City. Notwithstanding the foregoing, if any court, arbitrator, or administrative authority determine that Grantee is an employee for any other purpose, Grantee agrees to a reduction in City's financial liability hereunder such that the aggregate amount of Grant Funds under this Agreement does not exceed what would have been the amount of such Grant Funds had the court, arbitrator, or administrative authority had not determined that Grantee was an employee.

ARTICLE 15 NOTICES AND OTHER COMMUNICATIONS

15.1 Requirements. Unless otherwise specifically provided herein, all notices, consents, directions, approvals, instructions, requests and other communications hereunder shall be in writing, shall be addressed to the person and address set forth below and shall be (a) deposited in the U.S. mail, first class, certified with return receipt requested and with appropriate postage, (b) hand delivered, (c) sent by facsimile (if a facsimile number is provided below), provided that a copy of such notice shall be deposited in the U.S. mail, first class, or (d) deposited with a nationally-recognized overnight delivery service, provided that next business-day delivery is requested:

15.2 Effective Date. All communications sent in accordance with Section 15.1 shall become effective on the date of receipt. Such date of receipt shall be determined by: (a) if mailed, the return receipt, completed by the U.S. postal service; (b) if sent by hand delivery, a receipt executed by a duly authorized agent of the party to whom the notice was sent; (c) if sent by facsimile, the date of telephonic confirmation of receipt by a duly authorized agent of the party to whom the notice was sent or, if such confirmation is not reasonably practicable, the date indicated in the facsimile machine transmission report of the party giving such notice; or (d) if sent by nationally-recognized overnight delivery service, the next business day following deposit therewith, provided that next business-day delivery is requested.

15.3 Change of Address. From time to time any party hereto may designate a new address for purposes of this Article 15 by notice to the other party.

ARTICLE 16 COMPLIANCE

- 16.1 Left blank by agreement of the Parties.
- 16.2 Nondiscrimination; Penalties.
- (a) Grantee Shall Not Discriminate. In the performance of this Agreement, Grantee agrees not to discriminate against any employee, City and County employee working with such grantee or subgrantee, applicant for employment with such grantee or subgrantee, or against any person seeking accommodations, advantages, facilities, privileges, services, or membership in all business, social, or other establishments or organizations, on the basis of the fact or perception of a person's race, color, creed, religion, national origin, ancestry, age, height, weight, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity, domestic partner status, marital status, disability or Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome or HIV status (AIDS/HIV status), or association with members of such protected classes, or in retaliation for opposition to discrimination against such classes.
- (b) Subcontracts. Grantee shall incorporate by reference in all subcontracts the provisions of Sections 12B.2(a), 12B.2(c)-(k), and 12C.3 of the San Francisco Administrative Code and shall require all 22 | P a g e

subgrantees to comply with such provisions. Grantee's failure to comply with the obligations in this subsection shall constitute a material breach of this Agreement.

- (c) Non-Discrimination in Benefits. Grantee does not as of the date of this Agreement and will not during the term of this Agreement, in any of its operations in San Francisco or where the work is being performed for the City or elsewhere within the United States, discriminate in the provision of bereavement leave, family medical leave, health benefits, membership or membership discounts, moving expenses, pension and retirement benefits or travel benefits, as well as any benefits other than the benefits specified above, between employees with domestic partners and employees with spouses, and/or between the domestic partners and spouses of such employees, where the domestic partnership has been registered with a governmental entity pursuant to state or local law authorizing such registration, subject to the conditions set forth in Section 12B.2(b) of the San Francisco Administrative Code.
- (d) Condition to Contract. As a condition to this Agreement, Grantee shall execute the "Chapter 12B Declaration: Nondiscrimination in Contracts and Benefits" form (Form HRC-12B-101) with supporting documentation and secure the approval of the form by the San Francisco Human Rights Commission.
- (e) Incorporation of Administrative Code Provisions by Reference. The provisions of Chapters 12B and 12C of the San Francisco Administrative Code are incorporated in this Section by reference and made a part of this Agreement as though fully set forth herein. Grantee shall comply fully with and be bound by all of the provisions that apply to this Agreement under such Chapters of the Administrative Code, including the remedies provided in such Chapters. Without limiting the foregoing, Grantee understands that pursuant to Sections 12B.2(h) and 12C.3(g) of the San Francisco Administrative Code, a penalty of Fifty Dollars (\$50) for each person for each calendar day during which such person was discriminated against in violation of the provisions of this Agreement may be assessed against Grantee and/or deducted from any payments due Grantee.
- 16.3 MacBride Principles—Northern Ireland. Pursuant to San Francisco Administrative Code Section 12F.5, City urges companies doing business in Northern Ireland to move towards resolving employment inequities, and encourages such companies to abide by the MacBride Principles. City urges San Francisco companies to do business with corporations that abide by the MacBride Principles. By signing below, the person executing this agreement on behalf of Grantee acknowledges and agrees that he or she has read and understood this Section.
- 16.4 Tropical Hardwood and Virgin Redwood Ban. Pursuant to Section 804(b) of the San Francisco Environment Code, City urges all grantees not to import, purchase, obtain, or use for any purpose, any tropical hardwood, tropical hardwood wood product, virgin redwood or virgin redwood wood product.
- 16.5 Drug-Free Workplace Policy. Grantee acknowledges that pursuant to the Federal Drug-Free Workplace Act of 1989, the unlawful manufacture, distribution, dispensation, possession, or use of a controlled substance is prohibited on City premises. Grantee and its employees, agents or assigns shall comply with all terms and provisions of such Act and the rules and regulations promulgated thereunder.
- 16.6 Resource Conservation; Liquidated Damages. Chapter 5 of the San Francisco Environment Code (Resource Conservation) is incorporated herein by reference. Failure by Grantee to comply with any of the applicable requirements of Chapter 5 will be deemed a material breach of contract. If Grantee fails to comply in good faith with any of the provisions of Chapter 5, Grantee shall be liable for liquidated damages in an amount equal to Grantee's net profit under this Agreement, or five percent (5%) of the total contract amount, whichever is greater. Grantee acknowledges and agrees that the liquidated damages assessed shall be payable to City upon demand and may be offset against any monies due to Grantee from any contract with City.
- 16.7 Compliance with ADA. Grantee acknowledges that, pursuant to the ADA, programs, services and other activities provided by a public entity to the public, whether directly or through a grantee or

contractor, must be accessible to the disabled public. Grantee shall not discriminate against any person protected under the ADA in connection with its activities hereunder and shall comply at all times with the provisions of the ADA.

16.8 Requiring Minimum Compensation for Employees.

- a. Grantee agrees to comply fully with and be bound by all of the provisions of the Minimum Compensation Ordinance (MCO), as set forth in San Francisco Administrative Code Chapter 12P (Chapter 12P), including the remedies provided, and implementing guidelines and rules. The provisions of Chapter 12P are incorporated herein by reference and made a part of this Agreement as though fully set forth. The text of the MCO is available on the web at www.sfgov.org/olse/mco. A partial listing of some of Grantee's obligations under the MCO is set forth in this Section. Grantee is required to comply with all the provisions of the MCO, irrespective of the listing of obligations in this Section.
- b. The MCO requires Grantee to pay Grantee's employees a minimum hourly gross compensation wage rate and to provide minimum compensated and uncompensated time off. The minimum wage rate may change from year to year and Grantee is obligated to keep informed of the thencurrent requirements. Any subcontract entered into by Grantee shall require the subgrantee to comply with the requirements of the MCO and shall contain contractual obligations substantially the same as those set forth in this Section. It is Grantee's obligation to ensure that any subgrantees of any tier under this Agreement comply with the requirements of the MCO. If any subgrantee under this Agreement fails to comply, City may pursue any of the remedies set forth in this Section against Grantee.
- c. Grantee shall not take adverse action or otherwise discriminate against an employee or other person for the exercise or attempted exercise of rights under the MCO. Such actions, if taken within 90 days of the exercise or attempted exercise of such rights, will be rebuttably presumed to be retaliation prohibited by the MCO.
- d. Grantee shall maintain employee and payroll records as required by the MCO. If Grantee fails to do so, it shall be presumed that the Grantee paid no more than the minimum wage required under State law.
- e. The City is authorized to inspect Grantee's job sites and conduct interviews with employees and conduct audits of Grantee
- f. Grantee's commitment to provide the Minimum Compensation is a material element of the City's consideration for this Agreement. The City in its sole discretion shall determine whether such a breach has occurred. The City and the public will suffer actual damage that will be impractical or extremely difficult to determine if the Grantee fails to comply with these requirements. Grantee agrees that the sums set forth in Section 12P.6.1 of the MCO as liquidated damages are not a penalty, but are reasonable estimates of the loss that the City and the public will incur for Grantee's noncompliance. The procedures governing the assessment of liquidated damages shall be those set forth in Section 12P.6.2 of Chapter 12P.
- g. Grantee understands and agrees that if it fails to comply with the requirements of the MCO, the City shall have the right to pursue any rights or remedies available under Chapter 12P (including liquidated damages), under the terms of the contract, and under applicable law. If, within 30 days after receiving written notice of a breach of this Agreement for violating the MCO, Grantee fails to cure such breach or, if such breach cannot reasonably be cured within such period of 30 days, Grantee fails to commence efforts to cure within such period, or thereafter fails diligently to pursue such cure to completion, the City shall have the right to pursue any rights or remedies available under applicable law,

including those set forth in Section 12P.6(c) of Chapter 12P. Each of these remedies shall be exercisable individually or in combination with any other rights or remedies available to the City.

- h. Grantee represents and warrants that it is not an entity that was set up, or is being used, for the purpose of evading the intent of the MCO.
- i. If Grantee is exempt from the MCO when this Agreement is executed because the cumulative amount of agreements with this department for the fiscal year is less than \$25,000, but Grantee later enters into an agreement or agreements that cause Grantee to exceed that amount in a fiscal year, Grantee shall thereafter be required to comply with the MCO under this Agreement. This obligation arises on the effective date of the agreement that causes the cumulative amount of agreements between the Grantee and this department to exceed \$25,000 in the fiscal year.
- 16.9 Limitations on Contributions. Through execution of this Agreement, Grantee acknowledges that it is familiar with Section 1.126 of the City's Campaign and Governmental Conduct Code, which prohibits any person who contracts with the City for the rendition of personal services, for the furnishing of any material, supplies or equipment, for the sale or lease of any land or building, or for a grant, loan or loan guarantee, from making any campaign contribution to (1) an individual holding a City elective office if the contract must be approved by the individual, a board on which that individual serves, or a board on which an appointee of that individual serves, (2) a candidate for the office held by such individual, or (3) a committee controlled by such individual, at any time from the commencement of negotiations for the contract until the later of either the termination of negotiations for such contract or six months after the date the contract is approved. Grantee acknowledges that the foregoing restriction applies only if the contract or a combination or series of contracts approved by the same individual or board in a fiscal year have a total anticipated or actual value of \$50,000 or more. Grantee further acknowledges that the prohibition on contributions applies to each prospective party to the contract; each member of Grantee's board of directors; Grantee's chairperson, chief executive officer, chief financial officer and chief operating officer; any person with an ownership interest of more than 20 percent in Grantee; any subgrantee listed in the bid or contract; and any committee that is sponsored or controlled by Grantee. Additionally, Grantee acknowledges that Grantee must inform each of the persons described in the preceding sentence of the prohibitions contained in Section 1.126.

16.10 First Source Hiring Program.

- a. Incorporation of Administrative Code Provisions by Reference. The provisions of Chapter 83 of the San Francisco Administrative Code are incorporated in this Section by reference and made a part of this Agreement as though fully set forth herein. Contractor shall comply fully with, and be bound by, all of the provisions that apply to this Agreement under such Chapter, including but not limited to the remedies provided therein. Capitalized terms used in this Section and not defined in this Agreement shall have the meanings assigned to such terms in Chapter 83.
- b. First Source Hiring Agreement. As an essential term of, and consideration for, any contract or property contract with the City, not exempted by the FSHA, the Contractor shall enter into a first source hiring agreement ("agreement") with the City, on or before the effective date of the contract or property contract. Contractors shall also enter into an agreement with the City for any other work that it performs in the City. Such agreement shall:
- (1) Set appropriate hiring and retention goals for entry level positions. The employer shall agree to achieve these hiring and retention goals, or, if unable to achieve these goals, to establish good faith efforts as to its attempts to do so, as set forth in the agreement. The agreement shall take into

consideration the employer's participation in existing job training, referral and/or brokerage programs. Within the discretion of the FSHA, subject to appropriate modifications, participation in such programs maybe certified as meeting the requirements of this Chapter. Failure either to achieve the specified goal, or to establish good faith efforts will constitute noncompliance and will subject the employer to the provisions of Section 83.10 of this Chapter.

- (2) Set first source interviewing, recruitment and hiring requirements, which will provide the San Francisco Workforce Development System with the first opportunity to provide qualified economically disadvantaged individuals for consideration for employment for entry level positions. Employers shall consider all applications of qualified economically disadvantaged individuals referred by the System for employment; provided however, if the employer utilizes nondiscriminatory screening criteria, the employer shall have the sole discretion to interview and/or hire individuals referred or certified by the San Francisco Workforce Development System as being qualified economically disadvantaged individuals. The duration of the first source interviewing requirement shall be determined by the FSHA and shall be set forth in each agreement, but shall not exceed 10 days. During that period, the employer may publicize the entry level positions in accordance with the agreement. A need for urgent or temporary hires must be evaluated, and appropriate provisions for such a situation must be made in the agreement.
- (3) Set appropriate requirements for providing notification of available entry level positions to the San Francisco Workforce Development System so that the System may train and refer an adequate pool of qualified economically disadvantaged individuals to participating employers. Notification should include such information as employment needs by occupational title, skills, and/or experience required, the hours required, wage scale and duration of employment, identification of entry level and training positions, identification of English language proficiency requirements, or absence thereof, and the projected schedule and procedures for hiring for each occupation. Employers should provide both long-term job need projections and notice before initiating the interviewing and hiring process. These notification requirements will take into consideration any need to protect the employer's proprietary information.
- (4) Set appropriate record keeping and monitoring requirements. The First Source Hiring Administration shall develop easy-to-use forms and record keeping requirements for documenting compliance with the agreement. To the greatest extent possible, these requirements shall utilize the employer's existing record keeping systems, be nonduplicative, and facilitate a coordinated flow of information and referrals.
- (5) Establish guidelines for employer good faith efforts to comply with the first source hiring requirements of this Chapter. The FSHA will work with City departments to develop employer good faith effort requirements appropriate to the types of contracts and property contracts handled by each department. Employers shall appoint a liaison for dealing with the development and implementation of the employer's agreement. In the event that the FSHA finds that the employer under a City contract or property contract has taken actions primarily for the purpose of circumventing the requirements of this Chapter, that employer shall be subject to the sanctions set forth in Section 83.10 of this Chapter.
 - (6) Set the term of the requirements.
 - (7) Set appropriate enforcement and sanctioning standards consistent with this Chapter.
- (8) Set forth the City's obligations to develop training programs, job applicant referrals, technical assistance, and information systems that assist the employer in complying with this Chapter.

- (9) Require the developer to include notice of the requirements of this Chapter in leases, subleases, and other occupancy contracts.
- c. Hiring Decisions. Contractor shall make the final determination of whether an Economically Disadvantaged Individual referred by the System is "qualified" for the position.
- d. Exceptions. Upon application by Employer, the First Source Hiring Administration may grant an exception to any or all of the requirements of Chapter 83 in any situation where it concludes that compliance with this Chapter would cause economic hardship.

e. Liquidated Damages. Contractor agrees:

- (1) To be liable to the City for liquidated damages as provided in this section;
- (2) To be subject to the procedures governing enforcement of breaches of contracts based on violations of contract provisions required by this Chapter as set forth in this section;
- element of the City's consideration for this contract; that the failure of the contractor to comply with the contract provisions required by this Chapter will cause harm to the City and the public which is significant and substantial but extremely difficult to quantity; that the harm to the City includes not only the financial cost of funding public assistance programs but also the insidious but impossible to quantify harm that this community and its families suffer as a result of unemployment; and that the assessment of liquidated damages of up to \$5,000 for every notice of a new hire for an entry level position improperly withheld by the contractor from the first source hiring process, as determined by the FSHA during its first investigation of a contractor, does not exceed a fair estimate of the financial and other damages that the City suffers as a result of the contractor's failure to comply with its first source referral contractual obligations.
- (4) That the continued failure by a contractor to comply with its first source referral contractual obligations will cause further significant and substantial harm to the City and the public, and that a second assessment of liquidated damages of up to \$10,000 for each entry level position improperly withheld from the FSHA, from the time of the conclusion of the first investigation forward, does not exceed the financial and other damages that the City suffers as a result of the contractor's continued failure to comply with its first source referral contractual obligations;
- (5) That in addition to the cost of investigating alleged violations under this Section, the computation of liquidated damages for purposes of this section is based on the following data:
- A. The average length of stay on public assistance in San Francisco's County Adult Assistance Program is approximately 41 months at an average monthly grant of \$348 per month, totaling approximately \$14,379; and
- B. In 2004, the retention rate of adults placed in employment programs funded under the Workforce Investment Act for at least the first six months of employment was 84.4%. Since qualified individuals under the First Source program face far fewer barriers to

employment than their counterparts in programs funded by the Workforce Investment Act, it is reasonable to conclude that the average length of employment for an individual whom the First Source Program refers to an employer and who is hired in an entry level position is at least one year;

therefore, liquidated damages that total \$5,000 for first violations and \$10,000 for subsequent violations as determined by FSHA constitute a fair, reasonable, and conservative attempt to quantify the harm caused to the City by the failure of a contractor to comply with its first source referral contractual obligations.

(6) That the failure of contractors to comply with this Chapter, except property contractors, may be subject to the debarment and monetary penalties set forth in Sections 6.80 et seq. of the San Francisco Administrative Code, as well as any other remedies available under the contract or at law; and

Violation of the requirements of Chapter 83 is subject to an assessment of liquidated damages in the amount of \$5,000 for every new hire for an Entry Level Position improperly withheld from the first source hiring process. The assessment of liquidated damages and the evaluation of any defenses or mitigating factors shall be made by the FSHA.

- f. Subcontracts. Any subcontract entered into by Contractor shall require the subcontractor to comply with the requirements of Chapter 83 and shall contain contractual obligations substantially the same as those set forth in this Section.
- 16.11 Prohibition on Political Activity with City Funds. In accordance with S. F. Administrative Code Chapter 12.G, no funds appropriated by the City and County of San Francisco for this Agreement may be expended for organizing, creating, funding, participating in, supporting, or attempting to influence any political campaign for a candidate or for a ballot measure (collectively, "Political Activity"). The terms of San Francisco Administrative Code Chapter 12.G are incorporated herein by this reference. Accordingly, an employee working in any position funded under this Agreement shall not engage in any Political Activity during the work hours funded hereunder, nor shall any equipment or resource funded by this Agreement be used for any Political Activity. In the event Grantee, or any staff member in association with Grantee, engages in any Political Activity, then (i) Grantee shall keep and maintain appropriate records to evidence compliance with this Section, and (ii) Grantee shall have the burden to prove that no funding from this Agreement has been used for such Political Activity. Grantee agrees to cooperate with any audit by the City or its designee in order to ensure compliance with this Section. In the event Grantee violates the provisions of this Section, the City may, in addition to any other rights or remedies available hereunder, (i) terminate this Agreement and any other agreements between Grantee and City, (ii) prohibit Grantee from bidding on or receiving any new City contract for a period of two (2) years, and (iii) obtain reimbursement of all funds previously disbursed to Grantee under this Agreement.
- 16.12 Preservative-treated Wood Containing Arsenic. Grantee may not purchase preservative-treated wood products containing arsenic in the performance of this Agreement unless an exemption from the requirements of Chapter 13 of the San Francisco Environment Code is obtained from the Department of the Environment under Section 1304 of the Code. The term "preservative-treated wood containing arsenic" shall mean wood treated with a preservative that contains arsenic, elemental arsenic, or an arsenic copper combination, including, but not limited to, chromated copper arsenate preservative, ammoniacal copper zinc arsenate preservative, or ammoniacal copper arsenate preservative. Grantee may purchase preservative-treated wood products on the list of environmentally preferable alternatives prepared and adopted by the Department of the Environment. This provision does not preclude Grantee from purchasing preservative-treated wood containing arsenic for saltwater immersion. The term

"saltwater immersion" shall mean a pressure-treated wood that is used for construction purposes or facilities that are partially or totally immersed in saltwater.

16.13 **16.** Supervision of Minors. Grantee, and any subgrantees, shall comply with California Penal Code section 11105.3 and request from the Department of Justice records of all convictions or any arrest pending adjudication involving the offenses specified in Welfare and Institution Code section 15660(a) of any person who applies for employment or volunteer position with Grantee, or any subgrantee, in which he or she would have supervisory or disciplinary power over a minor under his or her care.

If Grantee, or any subgrantee, is providing services at a City park, playground, recreational center or beach (separately and collectively, "Recreational Site"), Grantee shall not hire, and shall prevent its subgrantees from hiring, any person for employment or volunteer position to provide those services if that person has been convicted of any offense that was listed in former Penal Code section 11105.3 (h)(1) or 11105.3(h)(3).

If Grantee, or any of its subgrantees, hires an employee or volunteer to provide services to minors at any location other than a Recreational Site, and that employee or volunteer has been convicted of an offense specified in Penal Code section 11105.3(c), then Grantee shall comply, and cause its subgrantees to comply with that section and provide written notice to the parents or guardians of any minor who will be supervised or disciplined by the employee or volunteer not less than ten (10) days prior to the day the employee or volunteer begins his or her duties or tasks. Grantee shall provide, or cause its subgrantees to provide City with a copy of any such notice at the same time that it provides notice to any parent or guardian.

Grantee shall expressly require any of its subgrantees with supervisory or disciplinary power over a minor to comply with this section of the Agreement as a condition of its contract with the subgrantee.

Grantee acknowledges and agrees that failure by Grantee or any of its subgrantees to comply with any provision of this section of the Agreement shall constitute an Event of Default.

- 16.14 **Protection of Private Information.** Grantee agrees to comply fully with and be bound by all of the provisions of Chapter 12M of the San Francisco Administrative Code ("Protection of Private Information"), including the remedies provided. The provisions of Chapter 12M are incorporated herein by reference and made a part of this Agreement as though fully set forth. Capitalized terms used in this Section and not defined in this Agreement shall have the meanings assigned to such terms in Chapter 12M. Consistent with the requirements of Chapter 12M, Grantee agrees to all of the following:
- (a) Neither Grantee nor any of its subgrantees shall disclose Private Information obtained from the City in the performance of this Agreement to any other subgrantee, person, or other entity, unless one of the following is true:
 - (1) The disclosure is authorized by this Agreement;
- (2) The Grantee received advance written approval from the Contracting Department to disclose the information; or
 - (3) The disclosure is expressly required by a judicial order.
- (b) Any disclosure or use of Private Information authorized by this Agreement shall be in accordance with any conditions or restrictions stated in this Agreement. Any disclosure or use of Private Information authorized by a Contracting Department shall be in accordance with any conditions or restrictions stated in the approval.

- (c) "Private Information" shall mean any information that: (1) could be used to identify an individual, including without limitation, name, address, social security number, medical information, financial information, date and location of birth, and names of relatives; or (2) the law forbids any person from disclosing.
- (d) Any failure of Grantee to comply with Chapter 12M shall be a material breach of this Agreement. In such an event, in addition to any other remedies available to it under equity or law, the City may terminate this Agreement, debar Grantee, or bring a false claim action against Grantee.
- 16.15 Public Access to Meetings and Records. If the Grantee receives a cumulative total per year of at least \$250,000 in City funds or City-administered funds and is a non-profit organization as defined in Chapter 12L of the San Francisco Administrative Code, the Grantee shall comply with and be bound by all the applicable provisions of that Chapter. By executing this Agreement, the Grantee agrees to open its meetings and records to the public in the manner set forth in Sections 12L.4 and 12L.5 of the Administrative Code. The Grantee further agrees to make good-faith efforts to promote community membership on its Board of Directors in the manner set forth in Section 12L.6 of the Administrative Code. The Grantee acknowledges that its material failure to comply with any of the provisions of this paragraph shall constitute a material breach of this Agreement. The Grantee further acknowledges that such material breach of the Agreement shall be grounds for the City to terminate and/or not renew the Agreement, partially or in its entirety.
- 16.16 Graffiti Removal. Graffiti is detrimental to the health, safety and welfare of the community in that it promotes a perception in the community that the laws protecting public and private property can be disregarded with impunity. This perception fosters a sense of disrespect of the law that results in an increase in crime; degrades the community and leads to urban blight; is detrimental to property values, business opportunities and the enjoyment of life; is inconsistent with the City's property maintenance goals and aesthetic standards; and results in additional graffiti and in other properties becoming the target of graffiti unless it is quickly removed from public and private property. Graffiti results in visual pollution and is a public nuisance. Graffiti must be abated as quickly as possible to avoid detrimental impacts on the City and County and its residents, and to prevent the further spread of graffiti.

Grantee shall remove all graffiti from any real property owned or leased by Grantee in the City and County of San Francisco within forty eight (48) hours of the earlier of Grantee's (a) discovery or notification of the graffiti or (b) receipt of notification of the graffiti from the Department of Public Works. This Section is not intended to require a Grantee to breach any lease or other agreement that it may have concerning its use of the real property. The term "graffiti" means any inscription, word, figure, marking or design that is affixed, marked, etched, scratched, drawn or painted on any building, structure, fixture or other improvement, whether permanent or temporary, including by way of example only and without limitation, signs, banners, billboards and fencing surrounding construction sites, whether public or private, without the consent of the owner of the property or the owner's authorized agent, and which is visible from the public right-of-way. "Graffiti" shall not include: (1) any sign or banner that is authorized by, and in compliance with, the applicable requirements of the San Francisco Public Works Code, the San Francisco Planning Code or the San Francisco Building Code; or (2) any mural or other painting or marking on the property that is protected as a work of fine art under the California Art Preservation Act (California Civil Code Sections 987 et seq.) or as a work of visual art under the Federal Visual Artists Rights Act of 1990 (17 U.S.C. Sections 101 et seq.).

Any failure of Grantee to comply with this Section shall constitute an Event of Default of this Agreement.

16.17 Food Service Waste Reduction Requirements. Grantee agrees to comply fully with and be bound by all of the provisions of the Food Service Waste Reduction Ordinance, as set forth in San Francisco Environment Code Chapter 16, including the remedies provided, and implementing guidelines and rules. The provisions of Chapter 16 are incorporated herein by reference and made a part of this Agreement as though fully set forth. This provision is a material term of this Agreement. By entering

into this Agreement, Grantee agrees that if it breaches this provision, City will suffer actual damages that will be impractical or extremely difficult to determine; further, Grantee agrees that the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100) liquidated damages for the first breach, two hundred dollars (\$200) liquidated damages for the second breach in the same year, and five hundred dollars (\$500) liquidated damages for subsequent breaches in the same year is reasonable estimate of the damage that City will incur based on the violation, established in light of the circumstances existing at the time this Agreement was made. Such amount shall not be considered a penalty, but rather agreed monetary damages sustained by City because of Grantee's failure to comply with this provision.

16.18 Slavery Era Disclosure.

- (a) Grantee acknowledges that this Agreement shall not be binding upon the City until the Director receives the affidavit required by the San Francisco Administrative Code's Chapter 12Y, "San Francisco Slavery Era Disclosure Ordinance."
- (b) In the event the Director finds that Grantee has failed to file an affidavit as required by Section 12Y.4(a) and this Agreement, or has willfully filed a false affidavit, the Grantee shall be liable for liquidated damages in an amount equal to the Grantee's net profit on the Agreement, 10 percent of the total amount of the Agreement, or \$1,000, whichever is greatest as determined by the Director. Grantee acknowledges and agrees that the liquidated damages assessed shall be payable to the City upon demand and may be set off against any monies due to the Grantee from any Agreement with the City.
 - (c) Grantee shall maintain records necessary for monitoring their compliance with this provision.
- 16.19 Compliance with Other Laws. Without limiting the scope of any of the preceding sections of this Article 16, Grantee shall keep itself fully informed of City's Charter, codes, ordinances and regulations and all state, and federal laws, rules and regulations affecting the performance of this Agreement and shall at all times comply with such Charter codes, ordinances, and regulations rules and laws.

ARTICLE 17 MISCELLANEOUS

- 17.1 No Waiver. No waiver by MOHCD or City of any default or breach of this Agreement shall be implied from any failure by MOHCD or City to take action on account of such default if such default persists or is repeated. No express waiver by MOHCD or City shall affect any default other than the default specified in the waiver and shall be operative only for the time and to the extent therein stated. Waivers by City or MOHCD of any covenant, term or condition contained herein shall not be construed as a waiver of any subsequent breach of the same covenant, term or condition. The consent or approval by MOHCD or City of any action requiring further consent or approval shall not be deemed to waive or render unnecessary the consent or approval to or of any subsequent similar act.
- 17.2 Modification. This Agreement may not be modified, nor may compliance with any of its terms be waived, except by written instrument executed and approved in the same manner as this Agreement.
- 17.3 Administrative Remedy for Agreement Interpretation. Should any question arise as to the meaning or intent of this Agreement, the question shall, prior to any other action or resort to any other legal remedy, be referred to the director or president, as the case may be, of MOHCD who shall decide the true meaning and intent of the Agreement. Such decision shall be final and conclusive.
- 17.4 Governing Law; Venue. The formation, interpretation and performance of this Agreement shall be governed by the laws of the State of California, without regard to its conflict of laws principles. Venue

for all litigation relative to the formation, interpretation and performance of this Agreement shall be in San Francisco.

- 17.5 **Headings**. All article and section headings and captions contained in this Agreement are for reference only and shall not be considered in construing this Agreement.
- 17.6 Entire Agreement. This Agreement and the Application Documents set forth the entire Agreement between the parties, and supersede all other oral or written provisions. If there is any conflict between the terms of this Agreement and the Application Documents, the terms of this Agreement shall govern. - 17.7 Certified Resolution of Signatory Authority. Upon request of City, Grantee shall deliver to City a copy of the corporate resolution(s) authorizing the execution, delivery and performance of this Agreement, certified as true, accurate and complete by the secretary or assistant secretary of Grantee.
- 17.8 Severability. Should the application of any provision of this Agreement to any particular facts or circumstances be found by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid or unenforceable, then (a) the validity of other provisions of this Agreement shall not be affected or impaired thereby, and (b) such provision shall be enforced to the maximum extent possible so as to effect the intent of the parties and shall be reformed without further action by the parties to the extent necessary to make such provision valid and enforceable.
- 17.9 Successors; No Third-Party Beneficiaries. Subject to the terms of Article 13, the terms of this Agreement shall be binding upon, and inure to the benefit of, the parties hereto and their successors and assigns. Nothing in this Agreement, whether express or implied, shall be construed to give any person or entity (other than the parties hereto and their respective successors and assigns and, in the case of Article 9, the Indemnified Parties) any legal or equitable right, remedy or claim under or in respect of this Agreement or any covenants, conditions or provisions contained herein.
- **17.10** Survival of Terms. The obligations of Grantee and the terms of the following provisions of this Agreement shall survive and continue following expiration or termination of this Agreement:

Tenant Selection Plan Policy

This policy is in addition to the obligations to comply with applicable federal, state and local civil rights laws, including laws pertaining to reasonable accommodation and limited English proficiency (LEP),¹ and the applicable provision of the Violence Against Women Act, Pub. Law 109-62 (January 5, 2006), as amended.

Application Process

- Application Materials. The housing provider's written and/or electronic application materials should:
 - o outline the screening criteria that the housing provider will use;
 - o provide space(s) for the applicant to explain any conviction, eviction, tenancy issues or credit concerns and present evidence that he or she will be a suitable tenant:
 - o outline how an applicant may request a modification of the admission process and/or a change in admission policies or practices as a reasonable accommodation:
 - o be written in language that is clear and readily understandable.
- First Interview. In accordance with the housing provider policies, each applicant with the
 minimum eligibility requirements for housing unit shall be offered the opportunity for an
 interview.
- Second Interview. Before issuing a denial, the housing provider should consider offering a second interview to resolve issues and inconsistencies, gather additional information, and assist as much as possible with a determination to admit the applicant.
- Confidentiality. All information provided will be kept confidential and be used only by the housing provider, the referring agency and the funding agency for the purpose of assisting and evaluating the applicant in the admission process.
- Delays in the Process. If delays have occurred or are likely to occur in the application
 and screening process or the process exceeds the housing provider's normal timeline for
 application and screening, the housing provider must immediately inform the referring
 agency and the funding agency, of the status of the application, the reason for the delay
 and the anticipated time it will take to complete the application process.
- Problems with the Referring Agency. If at any point the housing provider has difficulty
 reaching or getting a response from the applicant and referring agency, the housing
 provider must immediately contact the referring agency, if possible, and the funding
 agency, DPH or HSA.

• <u>Limited English Proficiency Policy</u>. Throughout the application process, the housing provider must comply with the language access requirements for applicants with limited English proficiency.

Reasonable Accommodation and Modification Policy

Reasonable Accommodation: The application process should provide information about how an applicant may make a reasonable accommodation request. At any stage in the admission process, an applicant may request a reasonable accommodation, if the applicant has a disability and as a result of the disability needs a modification of the provider's rules, policies or practices, including a change in the way that the housing provider communicates with or provides information to the applicant that would give the applicant an equal chance to be selected by the housing provider to live in the unit.

Reasonable Modification: Applicant may request a reasonable modification if he or she has a disability and as a result of the disability needs:

- o a physical change to the room or housing unit that would give the applicant an equal chance to live at the development and use the housing facilities or take part in programs on site;
- o a physical change in some other part of the housing site that would give the applicant an equal chance to live at the development and use the housing facilities or take part in programs on site.

Response to Request: The housing provider shall respond to a request for reasonable accommodation or modification within ten (10) business days. The response may be to grant, deny, or modify the request, or seek additional information in writing or by a meeting with the applicant. The housing provider will work with the applicant and referring agency to determine if there are ways to accommodate the applicant.

The housing provider shall grant the request if the provider determines that:

- o the applicant has a disability;
- o reasonable accommodation or modification is necessary because of the disability; and
- o the request is reasonable (i.e., does not impose an undue financial or administrative burden or fundamentally alter the nature of the housing program.)

If the reasonable accommodation request is denied, the rejection must explain the reasons in writing. If the denial of the reasonable accommodation request results in the applicant being denied admission to the unit, the provisions of the section on Notice of Denial and Appeal Process apply.

Notice of Denial and Appeal Process

- The housing provider shall:
 - o promptly send a written and electronic notice (to the addresses provided) to each applicant denied admission with a written and/or electronic copy to the referring agency and the funding agency. The notice should:

- list all the reasons for the rejection, including the particular conviction or convictions that led to the decision in cases where past criminal offenses were a reason for rejection;
- explain how the applicant can request an in person appeal to contest the decision;
- state that an applicant with a disability is entitled to request a reasonable accommodation to participate in the appeal;
- inform the applicant that he or she is entitled to bring an advocate or attorney to the in person appeal;
- provide referral information for local legal services and housing rights organizations;
- describe the evidence that the applicant can present at the appeal;
- o give applicants denied admission a date within which to file the appeal, which shall be at least ten (10) business days from the date of the notice;
- o unless an extension is agreed to by the applicant and the housing provider, hold the appeal within ten (10) business days of the request for the appeal;
- o confine the subject of the appeal to the reason for denial listed in the notice;
- o give the applicant a chance to present documents and/or witnesses showing that he or she will be a suitable tenant:
- o have an impartial supervisor or manager from the housing provider, but who is not the person who made the initial decision or a subordinate of the person who made the initial decision, conduct the appeal;
- o within 5 business days of the in person appeal, provide the applicant with a written decision that states the reason for the decision and the evidence relied upon. A copy of the written decision must be sent (electronically or otherwise) to the referring agency and the funding agency.
- If the rejection is based on a criminal background check obtained from a tenant screening agency, the Fair Credit Reporting Act and the Investigative Consumer Reporting Agencies Act impose additional notice requirements.²

EXHIBIT I

Tenant Screening Criteria Policy

The City expects that housing providers will use maximum feasible efforts to ensure that those individuals and families who are referred are accepted for occupancy in a timely fashion. To that end, the City has adopted the following screening criteria for applicants with a criminal record. If a problem arises in the application and screening process that may cause unreasonable delay in screening outcome, the housing provider should immediately notify the referring agency and DPH or HSA to assist with an expeditious resolution.

The screening criteria and considerations outlined below encourage providers to "screen in" rather than "screen out" applicants who have a criminal record. They describe a minimum level of leniency; providers are encouraged to adopt less restrictive policies and processes whenever appropriate. For example, providers may opt not to review or consider applicant criminal records at all.

Screening Criteria

- Housing providers shall not automatically bar applicants who have a criminal record³ in recognition of the fact that past offenses do not necessarily predict future behavior, and many applicants with a criminal record are unlikely to re-offend.
- Housing providers shall not consider:
 - o arrests that did not result in convictions, except for an open arrest warrant;
 - o convictions that have been expunged or dismissed under Cal. Penal Code § 1203.4 or 1203.4a;⁴
 - o juvenile adjudications.
- Housing providers shall consider:
 - o the individual circumstances of each applicant; and
 - o the relationship between the offense, and
 - (1) the safety and security of other tenants, staff and/or the property; and
 - (2) mitigating circumstances such as those listed below.
 - only those offenses that occurred in the prior 3 years, except in exceptional situations, which must be documented and justified, such as where the housing provider staff is aware that the applicant engaged in violent criminal activity against staff, residents or community members and/or that the applicant intentionally submitted an application with materially false information regarding criminal activity. As necessary, DPH or HSA will assess the justification for a longer look-back period and determine whether an exception is warranted. In these exceptional situations, the housing provider may consider offenses that occurred in the prior 5 years.
 - o mitigating factors, including, but not limited to:

³ The policy recognizes that some housing may be subject to mandatory laws that require the exclusion of an applicant based upon certain types of criminal activity.

The purpose of the statute is allow a petitioner to request a dismissal of the criminal accusations, a change in plea or setting aside of a verdict and to seek to have certain criminal records sealed or expunged and a release "from all penalties and disabilities resulting from the offense."

- (1) the seriousness of the offense;
- (2) the age and/or circumstances of the applicant at the time of the offense;
- (3) evidence of rehabilitation, such as employment, participation in a job training program, continuing education, participation in a drug or alcohol treatment program, or letters of support from a parole or probation officer, employer, teacher, social worker, medical professional, or community leader;
- (4) if the offense is related to acts of domestic violence committed against the applicant;
- (5) if the offense was related to a person's disability.

Marketing Procedures, Resident Selection Criteria, Application Policies & Move-in Process

Overview

Edward II is a 24-unit supportive housing site located at 3155 Scott Street in San Francisco, California. The building will provide supportive housing to 24 Transition-Age Youth (ages 18 to 24 years at the time of placement), with integrated on-site supportive services designed to increase positive exits from supportive housing through employment.

Community Housing Partnership (CHP) will coordinate with the San Francisco Human Services Agency (HSA) on the applicant referral and qualification process for 24 units at Edward II. CHP is the property manager and Larking Street will be the service provider for the Project.

Because of the depth and breadth of their outreach efforts, the Human Services Agency will serve as the sole referral source for applicants for the 24 units, thus ensuring outreach to a cross-section of racially, ethnically and geographically diverse homeless persons as well as diversity in the other protected classifications under applicable fair housing laws. CHP will be responsible for reviewing and evaluating applications for housing. As part of the application process, CHP will make an assessment of each applicant's eligibility utilizing CHP's uniform resident selection criteria based on information provided by the applicant in the application and gathered through an in-person interview and perhaps other third party verifications. Factors considered during the application process, which is explained further in the resident selection criteria section below, will include the applicant's prior residence and eviction history, a criminal background check and tenant income and assets.

Project Description

Edward II is a small tourist hotel built in 1914, located at 3155 Scott Street at the corner of Lombard St in the Cow Hollow/Marina District of San Francisco. The three-story wood frame building currently contains a reception area, breakfast and meeting rooms, pub, three residential suites and a on-site manager's unit on the ground floor, and 24 units on the upper two floors will all have private bathrooms, and four units – two on each floor – will be enlarged and reconfigured to be ADA compliant. A limited use, limited access elevator will be added to provide access to the second floor.

Edward II will provide 24 units of housing to Transition Age Youth who are emancipating out of foster care and/or are homeless or at-risk of homelessness. The first floor will be remodeled to provide spaces needed for successful supportive housing, including a Community Room/Tenant Lounge, Community Kitchen, Property Manager and Tenant Services Offices, Laundry Room, Public Restroom.

Safety and security systems are an important part of the building systems and include a secured secondary entrance door, unit and office intercom system, camera system, security alarm system, fire alarm system and fire sprinkler system. In addition, a Resident Property Manager will be residing at the building to respond to emergencies at any hour of the day or night.





Edward II will be subject to many program and oversight requirements overseen by local, state and federal agencies. They are currently defined as: Multi-Family Housing Program ("MHP")-State of California; the San Francisco Mayor's Office of Housing ("MOH")-City of San Francisco; the Local Operating Subsidy Program ("LOSP") through the San Francisco Human Services Agency ("HSA"), and the California Tax Credit Allocation Committee ("CTCAC").

Eligibility Requirements

In addition to meeting specific HSA/LOSP and/or TCAC and/or MHP Program criteria, all applicants for housing must meet the following requirements:

- Each applicant must provide a third-party certification of homelessness. The applicant must at least meet the Homeless Youth definition of homelessness. MHP requires eligible households to occupy assisted units under the "Homeless Youth" Definition per Government Code 11139.3 as either:
 - A. A person who is at least 18 years of age, but not older than 24 years of age, and meets one of the following conditions:
 - Is homeless or at risk of becoming homeless.
 - Is no longer eligible for foster care on the basis of age.
 - Has run away from home.
 - B. A person who is less than 18 years of age who is emancipated pursuant to Part 6 (commencing with Section 7000) of Division 1 of the Family Code and who is homeless or at risk of becoming homeless.

"At risk of becoming homeless" means "facing eviction or termination of one's current housing situation." This includes, for example, households who face imminent release from an institution (i.e. jail or hospital) where other housing placement resources are not available, households who reside in an overcrowded setting (more than two persons per living/sleeping area) in which the household does not hold a lease, and households who reside in substandard housing subject to a current official vacation notice. "Homeless" means the same as that term is defined for MHP – Supportive Housing:

- 1. moving from an emergency shelter; or
- 2. moving from transitional housing; or
- 3. currently homeless, meaning:
 - a. an individual who lacks a fixed, regular, and adequate nighttime residence; or
 - b. an individual who has a primary nighttime residence that is:
 - a supervised publicly or privately operated shelter designed to provide temporary living accommodations (including welfare hotels, congregate shelters, and transitional housing for the mentally ill); or
 - 2. an institution that provides a temporary residence for individuals intended to be institutionalized; or
 - 3. a public or private place not designed for, or ordinarily used as, a regular sleeping accommodation for human beings.

Eligible households need not be disabled, as is required under MHP-Supportive Housing funding; however this requirement may be applicable for other funding sources such as AHP.

- Applicant incomes must be at or below the Area Median Income percentages required by the Project's most restrictive funding source.
- A household will be fully screened by Community Housing Partnership before being selected for residency.
 Reasons for denial are described later in this document.

- A household must meet requirements of the Low Income Housing Tax Credit (LIHTC) Program, including but not limited to, regulations concerning Student Status.
- Applicants must meet all HSA eligibility requirements and any additional eligibility requirements set forth by HSA and/or the LOSP.
- HSA requires each household member to complete the HSA application process and be approved for HSA
 housing. All members of the household who are 18 years and older, but not older than 24 at the time of
 application are required to meet HSA eligibility requirements.
- All households must consist of one person and meet income requirements and limits described below.
- All households referred to the project must have at minimum \$4,104 annually or \$342 monthly, as a verifiable source of income in order to qualify for acceptance.

Referral Process

At initial lease-up and upon unit vacancy, CHP will ask HSA to forward applications for vacant units. Sufficient additional applications will be requested at initial lease-up to account for the rate of attrition and denials expected during the screening and lease-up process. The prospective resident(s) will then be screened per the Project's established screening protocols.

- 1. CHP will request applicants from HSA based on the number and type of units available. CHP will not maintain an internal waitlist for this project. All referrals will be provided from the Human Services Agency (HSA).
- 2. HSA will provide the following information for each applicant:
 - Applicant referral form;
 - Proof of Income;
 - Homelessness verification in accordance with MHP's Homeless Youth Definition of homelessness;
 - Disability certification (if applicable to the unit type defined for 18 units);
 - Universal consent release from the referring case manager;
 - Release allowing verification of criminal records, credit and landlord reference checks; and
 - Copy of some form of government-issued photo identification and social security card.
- 3. CHP will review the information and complete a referral checklist for each applicant.
- 4. Once an applicant's initial file is complete, CHP will set an initial appointment for an applicant orientation.
- 5. During application orientation sessions, CHP property management and supportive services staff will describe the housing, explain the application process, and have the applicant complete other required forms for eligibility verification.
- 6. CHP will review the information and complete a referral checklist for each applicant.
- 7. Once an applicant's initial file is complete, CHP will set an initial appointment for an applicant orientation.
- 8. During application orientation sessions, CHP and Larkin Street, the on-site services provider, will describe the housing, explain the application process, and have the applicant complete other required forms for eligibility verification.

Eligibility Determination & Approval Process

- 1. Community Housing Partnership (CHP) will review the application packet and verify the applicant meets the eligibility requirements noted above.
- 2. CHP will conduct a credit, eviction, landlord and criminal background check. CHP may also speak to the applicant's referring case manager identified in the Universal consent release form. Reasons for denial based on these various checks are described in the "Reasons for Denial & Applicant Appeals Procedure" document.
- 3. The contracted supportive services staff will be informed of each applicant's contact information so that supportive services staff can make contact and coordinate with the applicant and referring case manager throughout the process. This includes completing the Services Intake and Assessment at any point in the process, but no later than immediately following the tenant's move in to the building.
- 4. After the orientation, CHP will set an appointment to interview and screen the applicant. *CHP reserves the right to conduct the orientation and screening during the same meeting.
- 5. CHP staff will conduct a screening interview and place the screening form into the applicant's file. CHP staff will have the applicant complete other required forms that may include, but are not limited to, income and asset certification and an Application to rent.
- 6. CHP will then verify all information provided in the Tenant Income Certification Questionnaire according to the guidelines established by the California Tax Credit Allocation Committee ("TCAC") and complete the Tenant Income Certification ("TIC") form as required by TCAC. Applicants will not be approved until CHP's income certification process has been completed. The income certification process MUST be completed prior to a tenant's occupancy of a unit.
- 7. CHP will use the income and assets verification forms to complete an Income Calculation Worksheet, which will document annual income on the TIC form and determine the applicant's initial rent, per MHP and/or LOSP guidelines for rent calculation.
 - a. HSA/LOSP requires that tenants pay 30% of their income in rent unless otherwise specified by a building's funding source.
- 8. After the screening, applicable background checks, and overall eligibility review the Property Manager will forward the applicant's file to the Occupancy & Compliance Division for review. The Occupancy & Compliance Division will review the file for completeness and compliance with eligibility requirements, and will inform the Property Supervisor to conduct the final review.
- 9. Based on whether the tenant has met eligibility requirements and the uniform tenant selection criteria, the Property Supervisor will either accept or deny the applicant for housing and notify the Property Manager who will, in turn, notify both the applicant and the referring case manager. The approval will be contingent upon any final verification of income and assets.
- 10. If denied, the applicant and case manager, assuming appropriate authorization was provided, will receive a letter clearly identifying the grounds for denial of the application, and an explanation of the grievance procedure (outlined in the "Reasons for Denial & Applicant Appeals Procedure" document). The applicant may appeal the denial by making a formal grievance pursuant to the grievance procedure.
- 11. After the grievance period is over, a denied applicant's file will be placed in the "Denied Applicant" files for the building.

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- 12. If the application is approved (or a denial overturned), CHP will send an approval letter to the applicant and case manager. The approval letter will also state that CHP will contact the applicant when a unit is ready for the tenant to move-in. If the applicant does not already have payee services in place, the applicant must have payee services in place prior to the move-in date.
- 13. CHP will determine the unit assignment for the applicant based on unit availability, eligibility requirements and resident selection criteria. Efforts will be made to place individuals with disabilities into appropriate accessible units.
- 14. When a unit is ready, the Property Manager will send a letter informing the approved applicant and case manager of:
 - a. Approved unit number
 - b. Move-in date and time
 - c. Rent amount, or Pro-rated rent amount if move-in is not the 1st day of a month
 - d. Security Deposit amount
 - e. Information regarding move-in procedures
- 15. If needed, the contracted supportive services staff can provide the applicant with referrals for assistance with move-in funds, payee service referrals, furniture, and other services he or she might require.
- 16. The Property Manager will coordinate the move-in and lease signing, and will serve as the applicant's main contact person at CHP during this process.
- 17. The Property Manager will conduct lease signing for the assigned unit at the scheduled move-in appointment time. Tenants will also be required to sign the Tenant Income Certification form and other lease documents at the time of move-in to the building. If any documentation related to TCAC requirements were to become older than 120 days from the date on the document, the applicant will be required to update his/her forms and provide new income/assets statements.
- 18. Payment of the first month's rent and security deposit (equal to one full month of tenant rent) is required on or before the lease signing. If necessary, CHP will allow a Promissory note from an agency for the Security Deposit amount prior to the move in date.
- 19. The contracted supportive services staff will be notified of the new tenant's move-in date and time. The on-site services staff will schedule a time to do the Services Intake and Assessment prior to or immediately following the tenant's move in to the building (if not completed earlier in the process).
- 20. If an applicant does not show up on the move-in date, s/he and their case manager will be sent a letter requesting the move-in be rescheduled. If s/he does not contact CHP in a timely manner (within 72 hours of the original scheduled move-in date), s/he will be sent a denial letter.
- 21. If an applicant does show up on the move-in date, or re-scheduled move-in date, pays the move-in amounts, signs the lease and all related documents, including the MHP Lease Addendum, and follows the move-in procedures, then the applicant will have successfully completed the process and will become a tenant of the Edward II community.

Reasonable Accommodation Policy

CHP is committed to ensuring that its policies and procedures are in compliance with the provisions of all Federal and State laws designed to prohibit discrimination in housing on the basis of all protected classifications including race, color, national origin, religion, creed, sex, familial status, age, handicap/disability, gender, gender identity, gender expression, sexual orientation, marital status, ancestry, source of income, genetic information or other arbitrary characteristics. In addition, CHP adheres to applicable laws and regulations regarding accessibility for the disabled.

It is CHP's policy to make every reasonable effort to accommodate individuals with disabilities so that they are able to have equal use, access, and enjoyment of the premises, regardless of his or her disability. CHP will grant all reasonable requests for accommodations or modifications from disabled applicants and disabled residents as required by applicable laws. Generally speaking, an "'accommodation' is a change, exception, or adjustment to a rule, policy, practice, or service that may be necessary for a person with a disability to have an equal opportunity to use and enjoy a dwelling, including public and common spaces." Modifications generally are defined as structural changes "to an existing premises occupied or to be occupied by a person with a disability if such modifications may be necessary to afford such person full enjoyment of the premises."

Whether the request is reasonable will be evaluated on a case-by-case basis consistent with applicable laws. A request generally is not considered reasonable if it poses an undue financial and administrative burden or if granting the request would fundamentally alter the nature of CHP's or a particular property's operations. Requests may also be denied if the request was not made by or on behalf of a person with a disability or if there is no disability-related need for the requested accommodation or modification. If CHP determines a request is not reasonable, CHP will engage in an interactive process with the applicant, during which CHP will discuss, among other things, possible alternative accommodations or modifications that would effectively meet the applicant's disability-related needs without a fundamental alteration to operations and without imposing an undue financial and administrative burden.

Accommodations will be granted or denied on a case-by-case basis.

An applicant or resident (or another person acting on behalf of the individual needing an accommodation) may request a reasonable accommodation or modification at any time—from the point of expressing interest in housing through the duration of tenancy. Although a specific form or format is not required to make a request, CHP highly encourages individuals to use the CHP's reasonable accommodation/modification form so that CHP can ensure that it understands the request. CHP may, if necessary, require the applicant and/or tenant to provide written verification supporting the request, demonstrating:

- the person making the request is disabled as defined by applicable law (if the disability is not obvious);
- · describes the needed accommodation or modification; and
- shows the relationship between the person's disability and the need for the requested accommodation (if the relationship or nexus is not obvious).

Acceptable verification must come from a reliable third party that is in a position to know about the disability, which may include a doctor or other medical professional, a social service agency, counselor, case manager, social worker or similarly-situated third party. CHP may contact the party providing the verification in order to seek only the information that is necessary to process the request including, but not limited to, verifying the information provided and discussing potential alternative accommodations or modifications which may also meet the need of the individual. As with the form/format and/or manner in which a request is made by the applicant or resident, a specific form is not needed in the execution of the third-party verification; however, certain specific information may be required.

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It is the intent of this policy to create an environment which is respectful of all people's differences and special needs and to make all reasonable accommodations in order to welcome diverse perspectives. It is also our intent to make these accommodations in a timely and efficient manner so that minimal impact is felt by all parties involved.

Community Housing Partnership has designated a Section 504 Coordinator to coordinate the Owner's efforts to comply with Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 for the Property.

Unit Transfers

Unit transfers within Edward II will only be approved if the resident requires such a transfer as a reasonable accommodation. Unit transfer may only be permitted once the landlord, CHP, has approved a tenant's reasonable accommodation request. If a tenant receives a Reasonable Accommodation approval for a transfer, s/he may need to wait to transfer if there are no current vacancies that match the accommodation requested. The resident will then be placed on CHP's internal property transfer waiting list in the order approved by CHP for the next available unit that meets the resident's specific needs as granted in the accommodation. Unit transfer requests to a different HSA/LOSP building must be made in accordance with the HSA Building Transfer Policy Guidelines as that request will be decided by the subsidy provider, HSA/LOSP, and not the landlord, CHP.

Reasonable accommodations for unit transfers will be evaluated such as any other accommodation or modification request, on a case-by-case basis. Household(s) affected by a unit transfer(s) are chosen based on the need(s) of the reasonable accommodation, unit size, type of unit, external agency transfer policy guidelines (HSA/LOSP), and composition of existing household in unit.

When a unit becomes available, residents placed on the property internal waiting list will have a maximum of 14 calendar days to complete the transfer. If the resident at the top of CHP's internal waiting list unable to transfer within 14 calendar days, the unit will be offered to the next person and/or household on the waiting list in compliance with the waiting list management policy.

CHP follows occupancy standards that take into account the size and number of bedrooms needed based on the number of people in the household. Occupancy standards serve to prevent the over- or under-utilization of units that can result in an inefficient use of housing assistance. Occupancy standards also ensure that tenants are treated fairly and consistently and receive adequate housing space.

Policy of Non-Discrimination and Fair Housing

- The Project will comply with all Federal, State, and/or local fair housing and civil rights laws and with all equal opportunity requirements set forth in HUD's administrative procedures. The Project will not discriminate against any individual or family household because of race, color, creed, national or ethnic origin or ancestry, religion, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity, age, disability, handicap, military status, source of income, marital status, HIV status and/or acquired immune deficiency syndrome (AIDS), genetic information or any other arbitrary basis or based upon any other protected classification under applicable law. No criteria will be applied or information considered pertaining to attributes or behavior that may be imputed by some to a particular group or category protected by fair housing law. All criteria shall be applied equitably and all information considered on an applicant shall be related solely to the attributes and behavior of individuals as they may affect residency.
- The Project will comply with affirmative fair housing requirements as outlined in any applicable administrative guideline or state or federal law.

- To the extent applicable to the Project, the Project will guard the privacy of individuals conferred by the Federal Privacy Act of 1974, and to ensure the protection of such individuals' records maintained by the Project.
- The Project will seek to identify and eliminate all situations or procedures which create a barrier to equal
 housing opportunity for all. As set forth above, in accordance with Section 504, the Project will make reasonable
 accommodations for individuals with handicaps or disabilities (applicants or tenants). Such accommodations
 may include changes in the method of administering policies, procedures and/or services.
- Human Services Agency, Local Operating Subsidy Program will be responsible for marketing the units and referring tenants to Community Housing Partnership and is responsible for ensuring compliance with all related rules and regulations, including applicable fair housing laws.

Grounds for Denial of Application

It is Community Housing Partnership's intention to screen people into housing rather than screen them out of housing.

The screening team will consider numerous factors when reviewing applications and there are circumstances in which CHP will deny an application for housing. The following is a list of the reasons an applicant can be denied housing.

- Failure to provide required documentation (e.g., documentation of homelessness; note definition of "homelessness" is based on Homeless Youth definition, on attached verification of homelessness).
- Failure to meet program eligibility requirements (described previously).
- Missing two scheduled appointments without re-scheduling in advance. Re-scheduling is only acceptable due to good cause, such as a medical emergency.
- Uncooperative behavior. The screening team will not conduct meetings or screenings with individuals whose behavior is disruptive to the process. This includes threatening, abusive and/or violent behavior toward a CHP employee or contractor. Serious or repeated behavior of this type by the applicant may result in denial of the application.
- Falsification of information by the applicant in the screening process.
- The following history of criminal activity (felony conviction within the prior five years):
 - o: Arson and/or destruction of property
 - o Manufacture and/or distribution of illegal drugs
 - o Violence towards landlords or tenants
 - o Crimes against an at-risk person
 - Being required to register and/or subject to restrictions imposed by California Penal Code 290
 - Other violent criminal activity
- History of behaviors which have impacted the applicant's ability to retain housing or would affect the applicant's
 ability to live in the community. Examples include: history of failure to pay rent and/or abide by lease terms or
 house rules.
- Three or more evictions.
- Failure to move-in on the scheduled date or failure to reschedule the move-in within 72 hours of the original date.
- Failure to meet the requirements at move-in, which include, but are not limited to: 1) Signing the Tenant Income Certification, Lease, and Addendums; 2) Paying the move-in costs; and 3) Complying with the move-in pest control procedures.

CHP's policy on reasonable accommodations, described previously in this document, applies throughout the application process, including in evaluation of the acceptance/denial of applications and appeals.

Right to Appeal

Applicants who are determined ineligible based upon the Tenant Selection Criteria have the right to request a review of CHP's determination and may present additional facts and evidence for consideration during this review.

During processing, letters will be mailed out to all applicants who appear to not meet the eligibility criteria. These denial letters will specify the reason for denial and will inform the applicant(s) that they may request a review of the decision.

Denial letters will include the following language:

"If you disagree with this decision you have ten (10) days from the date of this letter to contact us in writing to request a review of the decision. Your appeal must be accompanied by information or documentation not previously available or not yet submitted that supports your appeal. If you are disabled and feel that the consideration of mitigating circumstances and/or reasonable accommodations would affect this decision, please include this in your request for a review of the decision."

The request for a hearing must be in writing and received by CHP within ten (10) days of the date of the denial letter. If no request is received, or no new evidence is supplied within ten (10) days, the file will be closed. An appointment for the review will be scheduled with the applicant(s) within seven (7) days of the receipt of the appeal. A written decision on the appeal will be made within ten (10) days of the review, unless additional information or documentation is required to complete the appeal. The appeal must be accompanied by information or documentation not previously available or not yet submitted that supports the applicant's appeal, refuting the stated reason for rejecting the applicant.

Units will not be held open during the appeal process. Successful appellants will be offered housing if they are deemed eligible after the appeal and a housing unit is still available. The decision given after the appeal review is final.

Additional Requirements of Occupancy

The following are requirements of occupancy and must be met prior to execution of the lease and move-in and are ongoing requirements of occupancy after move-in.

- Tenants are required to follow applicable HSA/LOSP, TCAC, and MHP program requirements for housing prior to and at all times during tenancy at the building.
- Tenant rents are calculated according to HSA/LOSP, MOH, TCAC, and MHP specific program requirements as a
 percentage of income. CHP requires a minimum \$25 per month rent unless otherwise specified by a building's
 funding source or the subsidy program regulations.
- Tenants must provide a security deposit and the first month's rent (pro-rated if not on the first day of the month). CHP may accept promissory notes prior to the move-in date in lieu of cash payment for the Security deposit portion; however, if the promissory note is not satisfied within 60 days of initial move-in the promissory note shall be deemed invalid and the tenant shall be responsible for making satisfactory payment arrangements.
- Tenants must maintain premises in safe, sanitary condition.
- Tenants must not interfere with CHP employees, contractors or tenants. Tenants must respect everyone's quiet enjoyment of the property.

- Tenants must abide by the terms of the lease and the house rules.
- Tenants are required to participate in an annual unit inspection and income certification conducted by CHP to the extent conducted in accordance with applicable program requirements.
- Tenant rent will be set in accordance with HSA/LOSP and/or MHP and/or MOH requirements and will be adjusted in accordance with program requirements, usually upon annual certification; interim adjustments can be made as appropriate.
- Tenants are required to immediately report any changes in their household income or student status to Community Housing Partnership.
- Falsifying income information is grounds for the collection of back-rent and/or eviction.
- Unless prohibited under any Applicable Law, should a household's income exceed 120% of the AMI, the household will be given 6 months to move to other housing.
- If household size increases beyond the occupancy limit, residents will be given 6 months to move to other housing.
- If household is in a unit modified for the physically disabled and tenant is not in need of the modifications, tenant agrees to move to a comparable unit should the modified unit be required by a household with one or more physically disabled individuals.

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Income Limits

Human Services Agency and/or LOSP subsidized units have 50% San Francisco Area Median Income limits per MOH limits; however HCD-MHP funding poses stricter limits. The stricter MHP income limits, as of 12/18/2013 "2014 Limits", are in effect and are requirements of tenancy for specific units and/or programs at the building:

Occupancy Procedures after Lease-Up

The following is a description of procedures that will be followed when a unit becomes vacant. The following is a description of procedures that will be followed when a unit becomes vacant.

- CHP will notify HSA of unit vacancy within 2 (two) business days of knowing that the unit has become vacant.
- HSA will maintain and manage the process for new applicants according to their internal policies and procedures.
- HSA will forward applicants from its referral access points upon request and within 14 (fourteen) days of the
 request. CHP will include in its request the eligibility requirements of the unit needing a referral such as income
 limit, disability requirement and so forth.
- HSA will provide CHP with the required information on each applicant as described previously in this document.
- The target period for an approved housing applicant to complete the screening process is between 10 and 15 business days. The income verification may take an additional 30-45 days.
- The vacancy preparation time generally will not exceed 7 (seven) business days.
- Unit vacancy should be less than 60 days.
- Should HSA fail to provide CHP applicants in a timely manner, CHP can request the right to market and fill vacant units with eligible applicants as described above. Such requests shall not be unreasonably denied.
- During the application process, CHP will provide copies of all correspondence to HSA and/or the applicant's case manager as requested, assuming appropriate authorizations are received.
- HSA will advise CHP if referred applicants find housing elsewhere prior to completing the requirements of tenancy for the building.
- CHP will advise HSA when applicants are housed or denied housing within 2 (two) business days of the lease-signing or final denial outcome.
- CHP will maintain a list of applicants who have been screened, status of applicants, and will provide information
 to HSA on a weekly basis during the initial rent-up process and monthly during on-going operations. The reports
 will consist of the following:
 - During the initial rent-up process a report listing all of the applicants referred to the project, their current processing status, and decision outcome (including grievance period) will be provided to HSA on a weekly basis.
 - O During on-going operations (once the building is placed in service) CHP will provide reports to HSA on occurrence of the following events:
 - Tenant Move-In (within 72 hours of the tenant lease signing)
 - Tenant Move-Out (within 72 hours of a tenant vacating the unit)
 - End of Month (by the 5th of the following month) a report providing a summary of the number of applicants referred to the project by HSA and the number of placements into housing during the reporting month.
- CHP will request referrals from HSA for vacancies and anticipated vacancies (tenants providing notice of moveout; tenants who surrender possession or abandon their unit; tenants who are scheduled for eviction from the project) to allow HSA as much time as possible to refer an applicant to the project. This will be done to ensure the financial health of the project and the highest level of service to the population the project serves.





Notice of Availability of 2013 Annual Monitoring Report Form and Reminder of Deadline

The Annual Monitoring Report (AMR) forms for Reporting Year 2013 (RY2013) are available. The forms can be downloaded from the <u>Asset Management page</u> of the MOHCD web site.

The report is due on October 31 for projects whose business year ends June 30 and on April 30 for projects whose business year ends December 31. For any projects whose business year ends on a different date than above, the report is due 4 months from the last date of the business year.

Submissions for RY2013 and any outstanding reports from prior reporting years will be accepted only in the RY2013 format.

The RY2013 AMR form was revised from the form for RY2012, but in only a few areas, most notably:

- Worksheet 1A four questions were eliminated.
- Worksheet 2 two rows were added to display sub-totals

Some projects funded by the former San Francisco Redevelopment Agency may be submitting the AMR for the first time. In recognition of this, MOH is prepared to host an AMR training session. Personnel from any projects that are subject to the AMR reporting requirement are welcome to attend:

6724 Directors and Officers Liabilities Insurance. This account records the cost of insurance to cover financial protection for the directors and officers of the ownership entity in the event they are sued in conjunction with the performance of their duties as they relate to the property.

6510 Payroll. This account records the salaries of project employees whose perform services including but not limited to janitorial/cleaning, exterminating, grounds, repairs, elevator maintenance and decorating. This account does not include the property's share of payroll taxes (FICA and Unemployment) or other employee benefits paid by the property.

6515 Supplies. This account records all cost of supplies charged to the property for janitorial cleaning, exterminating, grounds, repairs and decorating.

6520 Contracts. This account records the cost of contracts the owner or agent executes with third parties on behalf of the property for janitorial/cleaning, exterminating, grounds, repairs, elevator maintenance and decorating.

6525 Garbage and Trash Removal. This account records the cost of removing garbage and rubbish from the project. The account does not include salaries paid to janitors who collect the trash.

6530 Security Payroll/Contract. This account records the project's payroll costs attributable to the protection of the project or the costs of a protection contract that the owner or agent executes on behalf of the project.

OPERATIONAL RULES FOR RESIDENTIAL CERTIFICATE OF PREFERENCE (COP) HOLDER AND ELLIS ACT HOUSING PREFERENCE (EAHP) PRIORITY

The Borrower hereby agrees that first preference in occupying units designated for Low Income Households (Low Income Units) will be given to persons displaced from their homes by redevelopment activities who have been issued a Residential Certificate of Preference (COP) and who meet all qualifications for the unit.

The Borrower further agrees that second preference in occupying units designated for Low Income Households will be given to persons displaced from their homes by an Ellis Act Eviction who have been issued an Ellis Act Housing Preference Program (EAHP) Certificate and who meet all qualifications for the unit.

For new residential developments going through the initial lease-up process, the EAHP priority shall apply to twenty percent (20%) of the Low Income Units. Thus, if the number of units available exceeds the number of qualified applicants who hold a COP or other preference as dictated by specific loan documents or marketing plan, the next priority will go to EAHP certificate holders for up to 20% of the total Low Income Units. The EAHP priority does not apply at initial lease-up or sale to buildings having four (4) or fewer Low Income Housing Units. However, the EAHP priority does apply to these same units upon re-rental.

Low Income Units with other occupancy priorities required by law, contract, or program rules may apply the COP and EAHP after other preferences, with COP holders being granted priority above EAHP certificate holders. Preferences required by a former Redevelopment Project Area Plan are not pre-empted by the COP Program or the Ellis Act Housing Preference Program. Preferences required by the LOSP, Direct Access to Housing Program, Housing First Program, or other government program are not be pre-empted by the Ellis Act Housing Preference Program.

The Borrower agrees to supply Mayor's Office of Housing and Community Development (The City) with a complete and updated marketing plan at least six months prior to construction completion. This information shall not be changed without providing The City with fourteen (14) calendar days' written notice.

Outreach to Certificate Holders

The City shall furnish the following:

- Written and/or printed notices to COP and EAHP certificate holders advising them that units will soon be available. COP mailings are at the cost of the Borrower.
- Assistance to qualified tenants in filing COP and EAHP applications by support service staff or referral to an appropriate housing counseling organization

The Borrower agrees to:

- Upon initial lease up, conducting at least one general informational meeting for all persons interested in applying for occupancy in the development, at which the Borrower shall review application procedures.
- Specifically for COP and EAHP certificate holders, make support services staff available to provide assistance throughout the application process, as it may be needed, with the goal of maximizing COP/EAHP participation to the extent possible. The Borrower shall ensure that COP/EAHP holders are aware that such assistance is available.

Application

- A. The Borrower agrees to ask the following questions on all applications for occupancy:
 - 1. "Have you been displaced from your home or residence by the San Francisco Redevelopment Agency?"
 - 2. "Do you have an Ellis Act Housing Preference Certificate?"

The address from which displacement occurred shall be requested, but not required, if the applicant answers affirmatively to either question.

Pre-Lottery Application Status Reports

The Borrower agrees to supply The City with the names, addresses, and certificate numbers (when available) of applicants who indicate they are eligible for COP or EAHP priority status. A status report with this information will be provided, at a minimum, every seven (7) calendar days from the initial date applications are accepted. The City will, in turn, verify within fourteen (14) calendar days which such applicants are qualified as COP or EAHP certificate holders.

If material supplied in any application by a COP or EAHP holder indicates ineligibility on its face because of the Borrower's rules and regulations, such applicant will be notified in writing within seven (7) calendar days, with a copy to The City. The status report to The City shall reflect that the application has been closed and shall indicate the reason for rejection.

After the application period has closed, and prior to lottery proceedings, a non-prioritized list of all interested applicants will be provided to The City. The list shall include applicant names, addresses, and whether the applicant holds a COP or an EAHP certificate.

Lottery

Borrowers shall ensure that all COP holders receive first priority for occupancy and EAHP certificate holders receive second priority for occupancy in 20% of units, except in cases where approved and documented occupancy priorities preempt the COP and EAHP preferences. EAHP certificate holders who are not offered a unit in the 20% set aside shall have equal chance at any remaining units as other qualified applicants.

The Borrower shall hold a public lottery to select renters. Applicants who submit a complete application by the application deadline receive a numbered lottery ticket whose twin ticket is

entered into the lottery. Upon pre-approval from The City, lotteries may also be conducted using names of applicants. Lotteries are held in a public, accessible location. Applicants are invited to attend lotteries, but attendance is not mandatory.

To conduct the lottery, The City and/or the Borrower shall pull application tickets from a vessel and order and record the lottery results in rank order by application ticket number. When using names, Borrower shall pre-enter all applicant names onto individual name cards. All EAHP certificate holders should have two name cards. Names shall be pulled from a vessel in rank order. There should be separate lotteries held for each preference. First, COP holders will be drawn and ranked, followed by EAHP applicants, followed by applicants from the general population. The EAHP certificate holder's second card will be included in the general lottery. Electronic lotteries are not allowed.

The Borrower should use a large computer or projector screen or hand printed flip chart sheets to display all numbers/names drawn and the sequenced lottery number assigned for each preference lottery and the general lottery. This can be done by listing all applicants in separate columns under each preference category.

The Borrower should record each name card/number ticket assigned a lottery number onto a computer master list as well as a hand printed paper list for double checking. Results will remain projected on a screen or posted flip chart paper throughout the lottery drawing process for the public to view and record results.

The Borrower shall record the order of lottery numbers/names drawn and produce a final lottery list for each preference and for the general lottery. Once the lottery preferences have been confirmed and applied, applicants shall be notified of their position in the lottery.

Post-Lottery Status Report

Within seven (7) business days of any lottery the Borrower shall supply The City with the lottery results including the rank order of each applicant and a record of COP and EAHP certificate holders.

Thereafter, at least every seven (7) calendar days following any lottery or upon initiating lease-up, the Borrower shall supply The City with a "status report" listing names, addresses, and certificate numbers (when available) of COP and EAHP certificate holders indicating the status of each application as of that date until all Low Income Units are leased. If ineligibility is determined, the applicant will be notified in writing within one week after such determination is made, with a copy to The City. These applicants will also appear on the status report.

Response Deadline

Applicants who have been accepted and notified in writing by the Borrower shall have at least ten (10) calendar days thereafter to enter into a lease agreement. If the applicant fails to affirmatively respond, the application may be closed, making that unit available to the next eligible tenant. Written notice shall be provided to applicants whose applications are closed after 10 days due to a lack of response. Rejection of the unit by a COP or EAHP certificate holder and closed applications must be shown on the status report to The City.

Final Documentation

Within fourteen (14) calendar days after execution of a lease, the Borrower shall supply The City with a copy of the following for all COP and EAHP tenants:

- signed copy of lease
- copy of complete application
- a demographic report on all COP and EAHP applicants

Re-rental of Low Income Units

Upon re-rental of any Low Income Unit or when re-opening the project waitlist to new applicants, the Borrower shall notify The City in advance of any vacancy or waitlist opportunity. In no event shall The City be notified fewer than thirty (30) days before the date of re-occupancy for a vacant unit. In no event shall The City be notified fewer than thirty (30) days before a closed waitlist is re-opened for new applications. Violation of the thirty (30) day notification requirement may delay re-occupancy.

Appeals, response deadline, application forms, and final documentation requirements listed above shall apply to all re-rentals.

Waitlists

Borrowers filling unit vacancies off a waitlist must accept applications from approved COP and EAHP certificate holders at any time, regardless of whether the waitlist is closed to other applicants. If a COP or EAHP certificate holder is found eligible for a Low Income Unit in the building, they shall be placed at the top of the waitlist.

No more than seven (7) calendar days following the date that any new applications are accepted for a waitlist, the Borrower shall supply The City with a status report listing names, addresses and certificate numbers (when available) of COP and EAHP certificate holders indicating the status of each application as of that date and the reason for any rejections.

The City will, in turn, verify within seven (7) calendar days which such applicants are qualified as COP or EAHP certificate holders.

On an annual basis and each time a new waitlist is established, The City shall be provided with a complete list of all applicant names, rank on the waitlist, and whether they hold a COP or EAHP certificate upon finalization of the waitlist.

Lotteries

Borrowers that fill unit vacancies using a lottery process must adhere to the procedures pertaining to lotteries and status reports for new and vacant buildings.

Other Re-rental Processes

Borrowers that fill unit vacancies using some other process than an established waitlist or a lottery, such as those who use a first-come first-served method, must consult The City prior to beginning the lease up process. This will ensure a fair, transparent process that adheres to the required COP and EAHP priorities.

1. SUMMARY

CHP Scott Street, L.P. (the Sponsor) is requesting \$113,147 in General Funds for Calendar Year 2014 to subsidize housing operations at the Edward II project, which will provide 24 units of supportive housing for Transition Age Youth referred by San Francisco's Human Services Agency (HSA). Community Housing Partnership (CHP), the Sponsor's General Partner, will operate the project. The requested amount for 2014 is for three months of a total Year One budget of \$453,667. The proposed contract is for a period of 15 years, totaling \$8,380,458, and will subsidize 100% of the units. Construction began in November 2013, is on time and on budget, and is expected to be complete 5 weeks ahead of schedule, in October 2014. HSA will fund supportive services through a separate contract.

Operating costs for the project are higher than average, at \$16,167 per unit per year, due to the small size of the project and due to a Neighborhood Benefits Agreement that commits the Sponsor to providing 24-hour staff coverage at the site. LOSP costs per unit are also the highest within the LOSP portfolio, at \$18,356 per unit per year.

Staff recommends approval of this request.

2. BACKGROUND

In 2006, Mayor Gavin Newsom convened the Transitional Youth Task Force to address the needs of Transition Age Youth in San Francisco. The Task Force published findings in July 2006 and charged City departments with developing detailed work plans for several relevant areas, including housing. MOH facilitated a six-month process focused on TAY housing, which included representatives of City agencies and nonprofit organizations, and culminated in a 2007-2012 Work Plan. The plan calls for MOHCD to fund 400 units of housing – using a number of housing models – for various subpopulations of TAY. As of February 7, 2014, 242 TAY units have been developed or are in the pipeline, including the 24 units at Edward II. The need for supportive housing for TAY who are homeless or at risk of homelessness continues to be critical, and is further exacerbated San Francisco's dramatically escalating rents over the past year.

As part of the implementation of the TAY Housing Plan, MOH issued a Notice of Funding Availability (NOFA) for capital funds for TAY projects in Fall 2009 and received five applications for funding, including an application from Community Housing Partnership for the Edward II project.

The Edward II project is the first supportive housing project to be developed in Supervisorial District 2. In 2010, during the predevelopment period, there was significant opposition to the project from neighborhood groups including the Cow Hollow Association, the Marina Community Association ("MCA"), the Marina Merchants Association ("MMA"), Marina Cow Hollow Neighbors and Merchants ("MCHNM"), and Union Street Merchants Association ("USMA"). Specifically, the groups opposed the City's approval under CEQA; the Conditional Use Permit related to the change in use from tourist hotel to group housing; a Special Use District (SUD) legislation allowing more than 16 group housing units; and the perceived process for the siting and approval of the project. After incurring significant delay and expense caused by the community opposition, CHP negotiated a Neighborhood Benefits Agreement which allowed the project to move forward without legal opposition.

3. PROJECT OPERATIONS

The Edward II project is a three-story plus basement former tourist hotel consisting of 24 Single Room Occupancy (SRO) units with private baths, as well as one one-bedroom manager's unit, for Transition Age Youth who are at or below 20 percent of Area Median Income. The Project also includes 6,479 square feet of community space as well as various support services offices. Edward II has been developed in partnership with Larkin Street Youth Services (LSYS), which will provide supportive services at the site.

3.1. Annual Operating Budget

Please see the attached annualized budget for this initial year.

<u>Tenant Rents – LOSP Units:</u> Tenants in LOSP units funded by the Human Services Agency's Housing and Homeless Programs typically pay 30% of their income for rent. The projected \$102 tenant rent/unit shown in the budget assumes that residents will receive CAAP (General Assistance) benefits. This calculation was also the basis for the tenant rent portion at 1100 Ocean Avenue Apartments, recently approved by the Loan

Committee, and is supported by the Sponsor, HAS, and Larkin Street as an accurate and realistic projection for TAY. These parties will work together to develop guidelines for minimum income and minimum rent.

<u>Local Operating Subsidy Assistance Payment.</u> The Year One budget shows income and expenses for the first full year of operations; however the request for Calendar Year 2014 is for \$113,417, for the three months spanning October 1, 2014 through December 31, 2014.

<u>Operating Expenses</u>: Operating expenses for Edward II are largely budgeted based on CHP's experience owning and operating the LOSP portfolio's closest comparable project, Zygmunt Arendt House, which provides 47 units of LOSP-subsidized supportive housing for formerly homeless adults, with referrals by the Human Services Agency.

The total operational cost in Year One for Edward II is \$388,008 (\$16,167/ PUPA) excluding debt service and reserves, which is higher than all comparable LOSP projects. The LOSP per unit subsidy for Edward II (\$18,903/ PUPA) is higher than the average of the four most comparable projects presented on the attached LOSP Operating Cost Comparables sheet (\$8,466 / PUPA). Operating costs for the project are higher than average due to several factors:

- the small size of the project; fixed costs are spread across fewer units, resulting in a higher per-unit cost
- a Neighborhood Benefits Agreement that commits the Sponsor to providing 24-hour staff-coverage at the site.
- Low tenant-paid portion of rent (budgeted at \$102 per month) in recognition of TAY characteristics

Bad Debt and Legal: Bad debt is calculated as 5% of rental income (4.6% across CHP's entire portfolio) and Legal is calculated at \$60/unit (CHP comparables are \$76 at Richardson House, and \$74 at Arendt House). CHP has confirmed with the operator of 864 Ellis, a comparable 24-unit TAY housing project, that these projects are reasonable. A slightly lower-than-comparable legal cost has been budgeted due to expected positive impacts of the high staff:tenant ratio as well as the significant presence of supportive services staff.

<u>Staffing</u>. The staffing plan for the building includes <u>5.445</u> FTE, not including supportive services staff.

The staff:tenant ratio is 1:4.4. Arendt House, CHP's 46 unit property, also has a high staff:tenant ratio of 1:5.4, with 8.5 full time staff. Edward II requires 22% greater staffing/unit than Arendt House, largely the result of the 24-hour security costs getting distributed over far fewer units. At 24 units Edward II is the smallest building operated by CHP, so the fixed cost of 24-hour staffing is higher per unit. Twenty-four-hour coverage, provided by the onsite Property Manager and Desk Clerks, accounts for 78% of the site's staffing. All other staffing is efficiently shared with other sites.

During the predevelopment stage, when CHP was securing a Special Use District (SUD) and other entitlements for the Edward II project, certain neighbors and community members expressed concern about inadequate staffing at the site and its potential effects on the neighborhood. As a result, and to pre-empt legal action blocking the project's entitlements, CHP and a number of neighborhood groups entered into a Neighborhood Benefits Agreement governing a number issues, including staffing coverage, as follows:

"The Project will have: (i) one on-site day-time manager during the hours of 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. five days a week, but visiting staff will substitute as a daytime manager when the manager is off for Project Sponsor and/or Larkin Street-wide recognized holidays, vacation or due to illness; (ii) a lobby security desk staffed during the hours of 4:00 p.m. to 8:00 a.m., seven days a week, the foregoing holidays included; (iii) a live-in, resident manager (or other Project Sponsor management staff) will be available for emergency response after 7 p.m., 7 days a week, the foregoing holidays included; and (iv) two (2) full-time on-site social services staff from 9:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m., 7 days a week, holidays included. A minimum of one staff member will be on the premises at all times, that is, 24 hours per day and 7 days per week, holidays included, and, in addition, the live-in, resident manager (or other Project Sponsor management staff) will be available as set forth in clause (iii) hereinabove."

<u>Management Fees</u> - \$62 per unit per month, as allowed by HUD's policy on fees. <u>Administrative/Office Expenses</u> - These are reasonable and are broken down as follows:

Utilities. - Based on Arendt House, and pro-rated.

Supplies and Maintenance - Reasonable; based on Arendt House.

Taxes and Insurance - Reasonable; based on Arendt House.

Replacement Reserve Deposits: Replacement reserve deposits of \$600 unit /year are higher than MOHCD's underwriting guidelines, but required by California's Department of Housing and Community Development (HCD) under the Multifamily Housing Program (MHP). They are in addition to \$112,105 in capitalized replacement reserves required by the investor, which includes funding for kitchenette installations (\$87,105) found to be necessary for marketability in case the LOSP subsidy is eliminated, plus \$1000 a unit for standard capitalized reserves.

Operating Reserve Deposits. The project is obligated to maintain an operating reserve account equivalent to 25% of expenses and debt and reserves, assuming expenses increase by 3.5%. No deposits are shown on the cashflow.

Asset Management and Partnership Management Fees: \$15,000 total is budgeted for asset management fee (\$5,000) and partnership management fee (\$10,000), as originally proposed by the Sponsor.

<u>Deferred Developer Fee.</u> According to the MOHCD developer fee policy, the project is entitled to a total fee of \$1.2MM; however, the Sponsor only requested \$575,000 during the development phase in its initial funding application submitted to MOH in December 2009. As a result of community opposition and the resulting project delays of almost two years, the Sponsor requested the balance of \$625,000 as a deferred fee. MOHCD has approved a deferred fee of \$525,000, which is being provided to the Sponsor through the LOSP grant over a ten-year period, which differs from MOHCD's typical five-year disbursement for deferred fees.

- 3.2. <u>20-Year Cash Flow</u>. The attached 20-year cash flow projection includes the 15-year period for this contract request.
 - Tenant rent income trends at 1.0%, which is meant to mirror increases in the assumed GA income for the TAY population.
 - First year vacancy rates are compliant with standard MOHCD underwriting guidelines at 5%.
 - Operating expenses trend at 3.5% per year, per MOHCD Underwriting Guidelines.
 - Projected LOSP subsidy will trend at a rate of 3% year to year.

4. TARGET POPULATION AND SERVICES

Tenant referrals will be coordinated through the San Francisco Human Services Agency (HSA). CHP, Larkin Street and HSA will work together over the next 3 months to identify the appropriate access points for the project. Currently TAY referrals to other LOSP-funded projects are provided by Larkin Street programs but also by single-adult emergency shelters.

CHP has set the goal at Edward II of full lease up by the end of January 2015, less than 4 months from construction completion. In order to meet this target, CHP will need to begin the referral process in collaboration with HSA several months before lease up begins.

<u>Supportive Services:</u> Larkin Street Youth Services (Larkin Street) will serve as the provider of services that will be available to residents living at the 3155 Scott Street site, also known as the Edward II. The mission of Larkin Street Youth Services is to create a continuum of services that inspires youth to move beyond the street. Larkin is nationally recognized as a model of innovative and effective care for youth.

Larkin Street Youth Services will offer a complete program of supportive services to Edward II tenants, provided both by on-site services staff and at Larkin Street's off-site service centers. The estimated services budget is \$200,411, which will provide onsite coverage by direct service staff at least 10 hours per day year round (including weekends and holidays), as required by the Neighborhood Benefits Agreement, well as staff supervision and other necessary program related costs such as food, supplies, etc. Larkin, HSA and CHP will be working together over the next 3 months to develop the final contract scope of work and establish both a start-up budget for FY 2014-2015, and an annualized budget for subsequent years.

Larkin's wraparound services include outreach, intake and assessment; education, technology and employment training; life skills training including financial management; healthcare, including mental health, substance abuse, and HIV services; and case management. Several of these services are outlined below:

- a) Outreach: make efforts to contact, interact, inform and invite tenants to make use of Support Services to assist with and address individual needs or issues. These efforts shall include written messages, in person interactions, phone messages and calls, and emails as available.
- b) Intake and Assessment: provide one or more meetings or interviews with a tenant to establish strengths, skills, needs, plans and goals that are useful to the tenant and shall help the client maintain housing.
- c) Referrals: assist clients to identify and access services available within the community that meet specific needs or support progress toward identified goals. This can include providing information about mental health programs, substance abuse treatment programs, employment training or counseling, job search, calling to help establish appointments, assisting with the completion of applications, helping with appointment reminders, follow up/checking in with clients regarding the process, and, as necessary, re-referral.
- d) Case Management: provide on-going meetings and counseling services with a tenant to establish goals, support individualized service plans (ISP) and track progress toward long-term and short-term goals. The plan should outline desired goals and

activities necessary to achieve their goals. The plan should be updated regularly and consistently.

- e) Education and Employment Training: offer customized employment and education services that allow youth to complete their high school education; enroll in postsecondary education; learn technology; participate in internships; build job readiness skills; and secure and maintain career-track employment so that they can achieve personal and financial independence.
- f) Mental Health Services: offer counseling, case management, case coordination, referrals to outside care, mental health focused groups, individual counseling, harm reduction services, consulting psychiatric services and peer-based counseling.
- g) Community Building: provide individual and group activities and support designed to assist tenants in creating a sense of community, as well as in the neighborhood and greater community. Examples of such activities include Tenant Associations, holiday celebrations, community volunteering, and representation on Larkin Street's Youth Advisory Board.

5. RECOMMENDED CONDITIONS

After the first full year of operations, Sponsor to present an analysis of the staffing pattern (both property management staff and services staff) including an assessment of the need for 24-hour staffing to MOHCD. Based on the analysis, and if appropriate, Sponsor to approach neighbor organizations to amend the Neighborhood Benefits Agreement in order to eliminate the 24-hour staffing requirement.

ATTACHMENT A

LOSP PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

The requested funds would be delivered to the sponsor through a grant agreement with a term of up to 15 years, and, with the exception of the current fiscal year, will be subject to annual appropriations by the Board of Supervisors. Funds for the 2014 Calendar year will be included in San Francisco's Human Services Agency budget in the amount of up to \$113,416 and will be work-ordered to MOHCD for administration. The total amount of funds requested is based on Community Housing Partnership's current operating budget and 15-year cash flow projection using MOHCD's standard underwriting guidelines. The first full year's amount of subsidy (year two of operations) required is \$453,667 and the \$113,416 represents the partial year required to cover 3 months' worth of operations from October 1, 2014 to December 31, 2014 (CY 2014).

Actual subsidy payment for the next fiscal year would be based on the attached annual operating budget and cash flow. Subsidy payments for the remaining years of the contract would be based on subsequent operating budgets to be approved annually by the City. These budgets would be informed by actual financial performance of the project, per annual audits, and would include reasonable costs based on the specific needs of this building and reflect prudent property management practices and supportive housing industry standards. The subsidy payments for a given year will be equal to the projected shortfall (difference between income and expenses/reserve deposits/fees) as shown in the approved operating budget for that year. The City will make one subsidy payment to the sponsor per year at the beginning of each fiscal year.

If the subsidy payments made to a sponsor in any given fiscal year exceed the projected shortfall, then the sponsor must deposit the excess subsidy amount into a Local Operating Subsidy reserve specifically set up to accommodate any over-payments received from the operating subsidy. If the shortfall exceeds the subsidy payments, then the sponsor may withdraw funds from the project's operating reserve to cover project operating expenses not covered by the subsidy payments.

Currently, the LOSP program requires sponsors to submit to the City, within 4 months of the end of each year, or by April of each year, an audited financial statement showing the actual project income, expenses and shortfall for the prior year. If the statement shows that the actual shortfall was lower than the projected shortfall in the approved annual operating budget, then the subsidy payments for the subsequent year will be reduced by the difference between the actual and the projected shortfall. If the statement shows that the actual shortfall was higher than the projected shortfall such that the sponsor had to withdraw funds from the operating reserve, then the subsidy payments for the following year will be increased to allow for the additional costs and also to replenish the reserve if increased expenses are approved by MOHCD.


