

WHAT IS PROPOSITION 47?

Prop 47 reduces the classification of most non-serious and nonviolent property and drug crimes from a felony to a misdemeanor *unless* the defendant has prior convictions for murder, rape, certain sex offenses or certain gun crimes.




Crimes affected by the penalty reduction:

- Possession for personal use of most illegal drugs (HS 11350, 11377, 11357(a))
- Shoplifting, where the value of property stolen does not exceed \$950 (PC 459 2nd commercial)
- Grand theft, where the value of the stolen property does not exceed \$950 (PC 487)
- Petty theft with most other theft convictions (PC 666)
- Receiving or buying stolen property, where the value of the property does not exceed \$950 (PC 496)
- Forgery, where the value of forged check, bond or bill does not exceed \$950 (PC 470 et seq)
- Fraud, where the value of the fraudulent check, draft or order does not exceed \$950 (PC 475 et seq)

Prop 47 also permits re-sentencing for anyone currently serving a prison sentence for any of the offenses that the initiative reduces to misdemeanors.

Thousands of inmates are estimated to be eligible for resentencing, but each case requires a thorough review of criminal history and risk assessment before re-sentencing to ensure that they do not pose a risk to the public.



SAVINGS

Estimates for savings range from \$150 million to \$250 million per year.

Savings to counties is expected to be even greater.

The savings will be distributed to fund education, victims and rehabilitation programs.
