Dear Supervisor Tang:

The San Francisco Child Care Planning and Advisory Council (CPAC) is the State mandated policy and planning body appointed by the Board of Supervisors and the Board of Education to advise the City on early care and education issues.

Simon Lee, the executive director of Growth Learning & Opportunities had previously held the District 4 seat. Simon has been a tremendous asset to CPAC, but due to changes in the organization has not been able to attend CPAC meetings. For this reason he has needed to resign from his appointed seat. Under CPAC's by laws, Council membership must be composed of 20% consumers of child care services, 20% child care providers, 20% public agency representatives, 20% community representatives and 20% discretionary appointees. Simon was appointed as a provider and represented the afterschool/out of school time (OST) voice. At this time CPAC has only one other provider who represents OST and for this reason CPAC was hoping that the provider appointed in this seat could continue to strengthen the OST voice on CPAC.

CPAC is grateful for your offices' recommendation of Matt Pemberton, the executive director of the Sunset Neighborhood Beacon Center (SNBC). A few weeks ago I met with Matt to explain the role of CPAC, member expectations, and the importance of having a strong afterschool voice on the Council. Since learning about CPAC Matt has attended a CPAC meeting, has volunteered to give feedback at an upcoming meeting focusing on CPAC's citywide plan, and has moved a standing meeting at his agency in order to attend CPAC meetings.

As the current executive director of the Sunset Neighborhood Beacon Center, Matt provides fiscal oversight, technical assistance, and support to SNBC's after school and summer programs at five local school sites. Previous to this role, Matt served as a District Coordinator for the San Francisco Unified School District's EXCEL After School Programs. Matt experience also includes working as the After School Site Coordinator at Marina Middle School, where he provided daily programming and services for hundreds of youth. An added benefit is that Matt is a lifelong resident of District 4 and is the proud father of twin kindergarteners who attend Jefferson Elementary.

Matt familiarity of OST programs exemplifies his commitment to improving afterschool programs. Matt would also bring the voice of someone born and raised in San Francisco, specifically District 4, as well as the perspective of a father raising his children in a public school. I have no doubt that Matt's experience as a provider, as a native of San Francisco, and as a parent will be a tremendous asset to CPAC. We hope that you agree that Matt's current position, experience, insight, and expertise would be a valuable addition to CPAC.

Please feel free to contact me with any questions you may have regarding CPAC, our work, or our appointment and outreach process. Although the initial recommendation was directly from your office, Matt and I are available to continue discuss his qualifications and appropriateness for the District 4 vacancy. - (ii) Child Care Providers: The list of qualified individuals for nomination and appointment must include a representative from Head Start, and may include members of the following: private and subsidized child care providers, including but not limited to private centers and family day care homes, a Title 5 program, a school age program, Head Start, or Preschool for All (20% or five members).
- (iii) **Discretionary:** The list of qualified individuals for nomination and appointment must include a representative from one of the County's resource and referral agencies and may include members of the following: the public at large and/or any of the other categories, or outside of these categories at the discretion of the appointing agencies (20% or five members).
- (iv) Community Representatives: The list of qualified individuals for nomination and appointment may include members of the following: parent advisory councils of public and private child care programs; associations of child care providers, family child care providers, and Head Start; City College of San Francisco, San Francisco State University, or public interest organizations, including but not limited to the Child Care Law Center, Low Income Investment Fund community organizations, members of labor organizations, and local businesses that fall within the definition of "community representative," as described in San Francisco Administrative Code, Section (e)(1)(B); and other community and public agency representatives that deal with child care (20% or five members).

Board Qualifications:

The Child Care Planning and Advisory Council consists of twenty-five (25) members. The Board of Supervisors appoints twelve (12) members: one (1) nominated by each individual member of the Board, and approved by the full Board; and one (1) nominated by the President of the Board. The Board of Education or County Superintendent of Schools, if the Board of Education delegates the appointment power to him/her, shall also appoint twelve (12) members. One (1) member shall be jointly appointed by the Board of Supervisors and the Board of Education, or the County Superintendent of Schools, if the Board of Education delegates the appointment power to him/her.

The members appointed by the Board of Supervisors shall be representative of the following categories:

- A) "Consumers" Parents, guardians or caretakers with varied income levels who use child care and/or early education services, including but not limited to clients of publicly subsidized programs such as CalWORKS, and other child care programs funded through the San Francisco Human Services Agency, the California Department of Education, Head Start or Preschool for All:
- B) "Child Care Providers" Private and subsidized child care providers including, but not limited to, from a private center, from a family day care home, a Title 5 program, a school age program, from a Head Start center and from a Preschool for All site;
- C) "Discretionary" Representatives of the public at-large and/or representatives from any of the

other categories, or outside of these categories at the discretion of the appointing agencies; D) "Community Representatives" - Parent advisory councils of public and private child care programs; associations of child care providers, family child care providers and Head Start; City College of San Francisco, San Francisco State University, public interest organizations including, but not limited to, the Child Care Law Center, Low Income Investment Fund community organizations, members of labor organizations and local businesses that fall within the definition of "community representative" as described in Subsection (d)(1) (B) and other community and public agency representatives that deal with child care; and E) "Public Agency Representatives" - Representative from two of the following agencies: the Department of Children, Youth and Their Families, Human Services Agency, San Francisco Children and Families Commission, Community Care Licensing, Department of Public Health, Recreation and Park Department, Mayor's Office of Community Investment and San Francisco Housing Authority, or other entities.

The Council is established to advise the Board of Supervisors, the Mayor, the San Francisco Children and Families Commission and, with their consent, the Board of Education and the Superintendent of Schools about child care issues. The Council will serve as a representative advisory and planning body to maintain, expand and improve local child care services. The Council will provide links between government and the community, and will work to maximize the amount and impact of local state, federal and private resources and funding for child care in San Francisco. Powers and Duties are outlined in Administrative Code, Section 5.200.

All terms shall be for three years. Members may serve for up to two consecutive terms, and may be re-appointed after one year off the Council. No terms served prior to March 8, 2010, shall be counted towards the term limit for Council members. A member appointed to serve a term of two years or less, including the initial term provided in the preceding paragraph, shall not be deemed to have served a full term for purposes of this term limit.

Compensation: Upon approval by the Council, each member who is not otherwise compensated to attend meetings may receive a stipend of no more than \$50 per meeting, not to exceed \$300 annually, exclusively from funds provided to the Council by the State of California.
