#### Chief of Science & Sustainability, California Academy of Sciences (www.calacademy.org)

Nicknamed the "real-life Lorax" by National Geographic and "Einstein of the treetops" by Wall Street Journal, Meg Lowman pioneered the science of canopy ecology. For over 30 years, she has designed hotair balloons and walkways for treetop exploration to solve mysteries in the world's forests, especially insect pests and ecosystem health. Meg is affectionately called the mother of canopy research as one of the first scientists to explore this eighth continent. She relentlessly works to map the canopy for biodiversity and to champion forest conservation around the world. Her international network and passion for science have led her into leadership roles where she seeks best practices to solve environmental challenges and serves as a role model to women and minorities in science.

Formerly a Professor at North Carolina State University and the founding director of North Carolina's innovative Nature Research Center (NRC) at the Museum of Natural Sciences, Meg oversaw the creation, construction, staffing, and programming of this research wing in partnership with NCSU. She was subsequently hired by the California Academy of Sciences to lead their twenty-first century strategy that integrates research with sustainability initiatives both local and global. As the external voice for the Academy's collections and research, she promotes its mission to groups ranging from elementary classes to corporate executives to international conferences. Lowman's academic leadership has included Vice President of the Ecological Society of America; Treasurer of the Association for Tropical Biology and Conservation; founder of the TREE Foundation; Board of Directors for The Explorers Club and Earthwatch; and Climate Change Adviser to Alex Sink, former CFO of the Florida cabinet. Previously, she served as Director of Environmental Initiatives at New College of Florida, CEO of The Marie Selby Botanical Gardens, and Professor of Biology & Environmental Studies at Williams College.

Lowman's academic training includes Williams College (BA, Biology); Aberdeen University (MSc, Ecology); Sydney University (PhD, Botany); and Tuck School of Business (Executive Management). Her numerous awards include the Margaret Douglas Medal for Excellence in Conservation Education from the Garden Club of America, Girls Inc. Visionary Award, the Mendel Medal for achievements in science and spirit, the Lowell Thomas Medal for canopy exploration, Kilby Laureate and Aldo Leopold Leadership Fellow. She has authored more than 125 peer-reviewed scientific publications, and her first book, "Life in the Treetops," received a cover review in the New York Times Sunday Book Review. Working tirelessly on sustainability initiatives at home and abroad, "CanopyMeg" was a Fulbright Senior Specialist Scholar to both India and Ethiopia, and National Geographic funds her conservation work on Ethiopian church forests. She is the proud mother of sons Edward and James, both science majors from Princeton University.

## What has been your proudest accomplishment?

To be one of the world's first ARBORNAUTS (translation: an astronaut explores outer space, whereas an arbornaut explores the treetops). As one of the only women in tropical biology at the time, my tree-climbing career led me to discover that half of the world's biodiversity on land lives in the tops of trees. (Amazingly, this discovery about treetop life virtually in our own backyards occurred 20 years after we put a man on the Moon!) And now I am proud to share my treetop science with children and families who visit the California Academy of Sciences.

## Who was the best mentor you ever had?

My best mentor(s) are my two boys, Eddie and James — who have inspired me to retain a sense of wonder about the natural world. As a single mom, I often brought the boys to work, which included expeditions to remote jungles. They enthusiastically counted bugs, measured leaves, and even climbed trees with their scientist-mom using tiny kid-harnesses. My children also inspire me to conserve forests and leave the world a better place for future generations.

## What can be done to help women in business advance?

By advising, mentoring, and providing women with opportunities and technology, we can give them that much-needed inspiration to advance in their own businesses. I passionately mentor women in science, especially in developing countries where I also work on forest conservation, including Ethiopia, India, and Peru.

#### What you do to unwind?

I love to read, walk on the beach, and cook for the people I love, both friends and family.

#### What is your dream super power?

My dream super power is children – I strongly believe that engaging youth with the magic and wonder of science will inspire solutions, leaving our world in good hands.

#### Who is your female role model?

I never had a female science teacher, alas, so my role models are from history. Harriet Tubman, who was an extraordinary naturalist who could "read" the moss on the treetrunks to navigate the underground railway to free the slaves; and also Rachel Carson, who had the courage to expose the hazards of DDT to Americans through her book *Silent Spring*, which saved songbirds and reduced the use of toxic pesticides.

#### Tell us a surprising fact about you.

I am an *entomophagist*, meaning that I eat bugs. My kids and I have lots of recipes for things like tarantula tempura and cricket h'ordeurves, some of which we learned from living in places like the Amazon jungle where I carried out my research. Eating insects is actually one of the planet's most sustainable diets. As the new Chief of Science and Sustainability at the California Academy of Sciences, I want to be a good role model for youth and citizens, which includes leading a sustainable lifestyle. Insects are not only high protein and low cholesterol, but also have a small energy footprint to grow and harvest!

#### **Board Qualifications:**

The Urban Forestry Council protects the community interest and ensures that San Francisco realizes the full range of tree benefits into the future. Council members will represent the full range of urban forest stakeholders, including City agencies, non-profit organizations, tree management organizations, and community members.

The Urban Forestry Council shall be comprised of fifteen (15) voting members, seven (7) of whom are appointed by the Board of Supervisors, as follows:

- > One (1) member from an educational organization involved with tree management (University of California Cooperative Extension, etc.);
- > Two (2) members certified by a professional tree management organization (International Society of Arboriculture, American Society of Consulting Arborists, or American Society of Landscape Architects);
- > Two (2) members of non-profit organizations involved in urban forestry or other environmentally-related issues; and
- > Two (2) members from the community.

The Mayor shall appoint two (2) voting members, as follows:

- > One (1) member from the tree care industry; and
- > One (1) member at large.

# San Francisco BOARD OF SUPERVISORS

The following Director or General Manager of each of the following departments, or his/her designee, shall each serve as a voting member:

- Director of the Department of Public Works (1);
- > Director of the Planning Department (1); and
- > General Manager of the Recreation and Park Department (1).

The following bodies shall also appoint a voting member:

- > Public Utilities Commission (1);
- > Golden Gate National Recreation Area (GGNRA) (if GGNRA does not make an appointment within 60 days after the seat is vacant, the Presidio Trust may appoint a voting member to serve that term; if the Presidio Trust does not make an appointment within 30 days after it is authorized to do so, the Mayor shall appoint an at-large member to fill the seat) (1); and > Port of San Francisco (1).

Members shall serve for two-year terms and can serve successive terms if reappointed by the authority that originally appointed the member. The appointing authority that appoints Council members also may appoint at-large members to serve any unfilled Council positions.

The Council shall meet at least six times per year and establish its own operating procedures, which at a minimum, shall meet the public notice, meeting, voting, agenda and other procedural requirements set forth in local law. Subcommittees shall be created to adequately address other special areas of concern on an as needed basis.

The Department of the Environment, with adequate funding to assist the Council in carrying out its mission, shall provide professional and administrative staff to the Council.
