[Accept and Expend Grant - Exhaust Extractor Systems - \$1,485,014]

Resolution retroactively authorizing the Fire Department to accept and expend a grant in the amount of \$1,485,014 from the Federal Emergency Management Agency to upgrade its Exhaust Extractor Systems in various fire stations for the period of September 21, 2014, through September 20, 2015.

WHEREAS, The San Francisco Fire Department (SFFD) responds to over 120,000 incidents each year, including fires, vehicle accidents, and medical and other emergencies; and

WHEREAS, Exposure to diesel exhaust in fire stations from vehicles is a definite health and safety concern for firefighters; and

WHEREAS, Continued exposure to diesel fumes and other contaminants contained in vehicle exhaust can lead to increased risks of cancer in the long term as well as a variety of other adverse health effects; and

WHEREAS, Due to funding issues, the Department has not been able to replace or upgrade its exhaust extractor units at various fire houses; and

WHEREAS, The SFFD applied for and was awarded a Federal Emergency

Management Agency (FEMA) grant in the amount of \$1,485,014 to replace exhaust extractors

at 37 fire houses; and

WHEREAS, The use of these grant funds would allow the Department to replace its outdated extractors with new units that are more efficient and safe; and

WHEREAS, The FEMA grant requires SFFD to complete the extractor project by September 20, 2015; and

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WHEREAS, The Fire Commission recommended approval of this grant at its meeting on October 23, 2014; and

WHEREAS, The grant does not require an ASO amendment; and

WHEREAS, The grant requires the City to provide matching funds worth 10 percent of the total project award, or \$165,001; and

WHEREAS, The SFFD proposes to maximize the use of the grant funds on program expenditures by not including indirect costs in the grant budget; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors authorizes the SFFD to accept and expend grant funds in the amount of \$1,485,014 from FEMA; and, be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors hereby waives inclusion of indirect costs in the grant budget; and, be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Chief of the SFFD is hereby authorized and empowered to execute, deliver, and perform, in the name of the City and County of San Francisco, all applications, contracts, agreements, amendments, and payment requests necessary for the purpose to secure the FEMA grant funds and implement and carry out the purposes specified in the applicable grant application.

SFFD's Organizational Profile and Community Served

With an estimated population of 805,235 within approximately 47.5 square miles, the City and County of San Francisco is ranked the second most densely populated major city in the United States, yielding roughly 16,952 persons/square miles on its resident population alone. The population dramatically increases to 1.4 million on any given day with the influx of commuters and tourists.

Within the SFFD's response area is an array of critical infrastructures including National monuments and famous landmarks, bridges, sports arenas, postal facilities, fuel tanks, water treatment facilities, educational, medical, research, financial, technological industries and home to over 30 international financial institutions. San Francisco is ranked one of the top seven Tier 1 Urban Area Cities and the Port of San Francisco is identified as a Group 1 Port at highest risk for terrorist attack.

The SFFD's 1,413 Firefighting and Emergency Medical personnel are part of the Metropolitan Medical Task Force (MMTF), Urban Search and Rescue (USAR) and Regional Taskforce (RTF) Response for Chemical Biological Radiological Nuclear Explosive (CBRNE). The SFFD, California's Emergency Management Agency (Cal-EMA) and surrounding 8 Bay Area Counties have developed the first Regional Disaster Response Plan for responding to a catastrophic man-made or natural disaster, such as a paralyzing major earthquake or pandemic. In 2012, the SFFD responded to 120,315 calls for service. All SFFD's Firefighters are 100% compliant in NFPA 1001/1002 Standard. A number of SFFD apparatus rank in the top ten in runs per year in the National Run Survey annually completed by Firehouse Magazine.

The SFFD also provides first response aid to the San Francisco Presidio, a former U.S. Military base which consists of 1,480 acres with 800 commercial and residential buildings dating back to 1861, and mutual aid response to 8 surrounding Bay Area counties. The SFFD has been a contributor to the State of California Master Mutual Aid Agreement since its inception in 1950, providing mutual aid to 49 counties within the State of California, as well as parts of southern Oregon and western Nevada. The SFFD also provides water response mutual aid under the same Agreement to Alameda, San Mateo, Contra Costa, Marin, Solano and Sonoma counties.

The San Francisco Fire Department (SFFD) is requesting much needed financial assistance to upgrade and replace its exhaust extractor systems in its fire stations as part of the AFG Modifications to Facilities Activities, as well as provide all of the training courses required to develop a State and FEMA certified Incident Management Team. Given the recent economic recession, the SFFD has found it extremely difficult to fund needed repairs and upgrades to these systems. Due to a variety of factors including reductions to commercial and residential property tax revenue, State sales tax and Vehicle License Fee revenue reductions, increased unemployment rates as well as reductions in State funding for various programs, the City's general fund has seen a large negative impact to its ability to fund City Departments and programs. At the onset of the most recent budget process, the City of San Francisco was looking at a fiscal year with a projected shortfall of \$129 million for Fiscal Year 2013-14 and a cumulative \$263million for Fiscal Year 2014-15.

Given this fiscal environment, the SFFD has not been able to procure funds for the improvements to facilities or provide critical training. Due to the harsh economic realities of the past few years, the Department has not been able to keep pace with needed capital upgrades, and as a result has over \$350 million in deferred maintenance and repair to its facilities, including the replacement and upgrade of its exhaust extractors. Much of this work has been pushed back repeatedly as funding has dried up. As the City of San Francisco continues to grapple with increasing personnel and benefit costs, requests for increases to capital and other facility line items remain challenging.

The SFFD's Fiscal Year 2013-14 Operating budget is approximately \$332 million, over 70% of which is supported through the City's General Fund. The remaining 30% is funded through State sales tax revenue (13%), EMS Ambulance revenue (10%), Fire Prevention fees (4%), and other fees for services (3%). Of the SFFD's total operating budget, 91%

is for personnel costs, including salaries, overtime, and fringe benefits. That leaves the SFFD with 9% to cover all of the non-personnel costs for the Department, including much needed facility upgrades such as exhaust extractors or provide supplemental training.

Firefighting Modify Facilities - Narrative

The San Francisco Fire Department (SFFD) is requesting funding from the 2013 Assistance to Firefighters Grant Program to modify current fire stations for the purchase and installation of new Sole Source Capture Exhaust Extraction Systems at 37 of the Department's Fire Stations. The Department currently has exhaust extractors installed in its stations and most apparatus bays, but these units were installed in the 1980s and are outdated and over 30 years old. AFG funding will be used to purchase and install new exhaust extractors to replace outdated units, as well as install units in apparatus bays that currently do not have an exhaust extractor installed. This project will have direct benefits to the health and safety of the SFFD's members by helping to reduce exposure to cancer-causing toxins.

Cancer is a very real risk of the occupation of firefighters. A recent study by the U.S. Fire Administration (USFA) and National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health

(NIOSH) provided evidence of a relation between firefighting and cancer, a correlation that has long been believed in the profession. While firefighters are exposed to cancercausing agents in a variety of situations in the field as a direct result of the occupation, the SFFD is requesting to use 2013 AFG funds to address the issue of toxins encountered in the stations themselves, specifically in exposure to diesel exhaust. As a result of studies, NIOSH considers whole diesel exhaust emissions to be a potential occupational carcinogen. In addition, a study in the New England Journal of Medicine suggests diesel exhaust may also be associated with heart disease. The diesel exhaust in the fire stations is combatted by the use of Vehicle Exhaust Extraction Systems.

SFFD stations are staffed 24 hours a day/7 days a week. As part of its Capital program, the SFFD has done a comprehensive assessment of the exhaust extractors at its stations. Due to the age of the current inventory of extractors, many are in need of an upgrade to reach 100% removal of all vehicle exhaust for the apparatus that are housed at the various fire stations. Many of the SFFD's current extractors are in need of frequent repair due to their age, and the vast majority are outdated from an operational perspective and do not capture 100% of diesel exhaust. Old, outdated exhaust extractors can pose significant problems: allowing exhaust to exist in the apparatus bays; potential for the members' PPE stored in the fire house to be coated with diesel residue; contamination of equipment on the apparatus with diesel exhaust; and the potential for exhaust to move into the living and sleeping quarters of the fire station due to the close proximity of the areas to the apparatus bays.

The SFFD is committed to the health and safety of its members, and by installing new exhaust extractors at its stations, the Department can reduce the risks of one of the proven cancer-causing agents encountered by firefighters.

The major benefit of the exhaust extractors that the Department is requesting with this AFG project proposal is directly to the health and safety of firefighters, specifically their long term health. As discussed in Section 1, cancer is an occupational hazard of firefighting. While members are outfitted with PPE and SCBAs to assist with protection from toxins in their normal fire suppression duties, members become vulnerable to hazard exposure upon their return to the station if diesel exhaust is not properly contained and directed out of the station. Exhaust generated by vehicles in the stations can carry throughout the station and into the living and sleeping quarters, settling on walls, food, equipment, and clothing. While advancements have been made in both the composition of diesel fuels as well as apparatus emission controls to limit exposure to fumes, the issue of diesel exhaust and its corresponding hazardous chemicals is still a very real problem. The continued exposure to diesel fumes can lead to increased risks of cancer in the long term, in addition to a variety of other adverse health effects.

Funding to allow for the purchase and installation of new exhaust extractors will help address the concern of exhaust furnes in the fire house. Due to funding issues, the SFFD has over \$350 million in deferred maintenance and repair on its facilities. As such, the SFFD has been unable to begin the much needed replacement and update of exhaust extractors throughout its facilities. This can have a direct impact on member health and safety. In its 1997 document "Safety and Health Considerations for the Design of Fire and Emergency Medical Services Stations," FEMA states that "exhaust source capture is considered the most reliable means to reduce or eliminate exposure of fire station occupants to diesel exhaust emissions". The SFFD is proposing, at an average cost of \$44,595 per station, the installation of a direct source exhaust extractor at 37 of its fire stations. This cost includes purchase and installation of the extractors. The Department has 43 stations in operation on a daily basis, but with general obligation bond funding from the 2010 Earthquake Safety and Emergency Response bond passed by voters, the Department anticipates being able to address the extractors at six of its stations (1, 5, 12, 16, 35, 36) as part of more comprehensive work planned outside of the Department's budget,

There are minor fiscal benefits to the Department as well as a result of this project. Due to the lack of funding to upgrade and replace these exhaust systems, the Department has seen increased maintenance and repair costs for the current extractors. Operational issues pop up more frequently due to the age and condition of the units. With replacement units funded through this grant, the Department anticipates more efficient equipment from an operational perspective, as well as increased reliability and efficiency from the units.

SFFD firefighters, along with all firefighters, face a large number of risks on a daily basis. Many of these risks relate to the toxins and other contaminants they encounter as a result of their job duties, including exposure to contaminants at a structure fire, contact with blood-borne and communicable diseases, and the threat of hazardous materials and

other chemical agents from a terrorist event. The SFFD is extremely committed to protecting its members to its best ability from these dangers, and has worked with members to reduce the hazards for which it can control. The SFFD implemented a number of projects over the past few years to assist in reducing this risk in the field -the SFFD has undergone a redesign of its personal protective equipment (PPE) to take advantage of technological improvements, and has also done a complete replacement and upgrade of its Self-Contained Breathing Apparatus (SCBA) units, funded in part by 2011 AFG grant funds. However, the exposure to risk does not cease for firefighters when the members return to the station. Exposure to diesel emissions from apparatus within the station poses a significant risk to firefighters. Members are staffed at fire stations on a 24 hour a day/7 day a week basis, and use the quarters for eating and sleeping as well. Many stations have multiple apparatus assigned there, and some stations house upwards of 15 members daily. The exposure to diesel fumes and emissions is of large concern to the Department.

The SFFD is committed to mitigating this risk of diesel emissions to the fullest extent, and is requesting 2013 AFG funds to do so. The current outdated extractors that the Department has at its stations are in use every day. With the large call volume the Department has, and the large number of incidents that the units respond to annually, the extractors play a critical role in protecting members from dangerous toxins at the Stations. Given that the Department's employees work a 24 hours shift, having a properly functioning extractor is crucial to the health and safety of the members. The Department currently operates 43 Fire Stations on a 24hr/7day basis, with over 290 firefighters on duty daily, using those facilities for work but also for eating and sleeping. The health and safety of members are of utmost importance to the Department, and the AFG grant funds can go a long way to improving conditions at the Fire Stations.

The SFFD has used the AFG program in the past to request funding for projects that directly impact firefighter health and safety in a positive way, and this year's request is no different. The SFFD respectfully submits its request for purchase and installation of new exhaust extractors at 37 of its stations to accomplish this goal and continue with the Department's mission to take an active role in protecting its members.

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Article I - Administrative Requirements

All recipients of financial assistance will comply with the requirements of Section 1306(c) of the National Flood Insurance Act, as amended, which provides for benefit payments under the Standard Flood Insurance Policy for demolition or relocation of a structure insured under the Act that is located along the shore of a lake or other body of water and that is certified by an appropriate State or local land use authority to be subject to imminent collapse or subsidence as a result of erosion or undermining caused by waves or currents of water exceeding anticipated cyclical levels. These regulations are codified at 44CFR Part 63.

Article XXIV - Flood Disaster Protection Act of 1973

All recipients of financial assistance will comply with the requirements of the Flood Disaster Protection Act of 1973, as amended (42 U.S.C. § 4001 et seq.), which provides that no Federal financial assistance to acquire, modernize, or construct property may be provided in identified flood-prone communities in the United States, unless the community participates in the National Flood Insurance Program and flood insurance is purchased within one year of the identification. The flood insurance purchase requirement applies to both public and private applicants for DHS support. Lists of flood prone areas that are eligible for flood insurance are published in the Federal Register by FEMA.

Article XXV - Coastal Wetlands Planning, Protection, and Restoration Act of 1990

All recipients of financial assistance will comply with the requirements of Executive Order 11990, which provides that federally funded construction and improvements minimize the destruction, loss, or degradation of wetlands. The Executive Order provides that, in furtherance of Section 101(b)(3) of NEPA (42 U.S.C. § 4331(b)(3)), Federal agencies, to the extent permitted by law, must avoid undertaking or assisting with new construction located in wetlands unless the head of the agency finds that there is no practicable alternative to such construction, and that the proposed action includes all practicable measures to minimize harm to wetlands that may result from such use. In making this finding, the head of the agency may take into account economic, environmental, and other pertinent factors. The public disclosure requirement described above also pertains to early public review of any plans or proposals for new construction in wetlands. This is codified at 44 CFR Part 9.

Article XXVI - USA Patriot Act of 2001

All recipients of financial assistance will comply with the requirements of the Uniting and Strengthening America by Providing Appropriate Tools Required to Intercept and Obstruct Terrorism Act (USA PATRIOT Act), which amends 18 U.S.C. §§ 175-175c. Among other things, it prescribes criminal penalties for possession of any biological agent, toxin, or delivery system of a type or in a quantity that is not reasonably justified by a prophylactic, protective, bona fide research, or other peaceful purpose. The act also establishes restrictions on access to specified materials. "Restricted persons," as defined by the act, may not possess, ship, transport, or receive any biological agent or toxin that is listed as a select agent.

Article XXVII - Environmental Planning and Historic Preservation Screening

AFG funded activities (Modification to Facility or Equipment) that may require an EHP review, involving the installation or requiring renovations to facilities, including but not limited to air compressor/fill station/cascade system (Fixed) for filling SCBA, air improvement systems, alarm systems, antennas, gear dryer, generators (fixed), permanently mounted signs, renovations to facilities, sprinklers, vehicle exhaust systems (fixed) or washer/extractors are subject to FEMA's Environmental Planning and Historic Preservation (EHP) review process.

FEMA is required to consider the potential impacts to natural and cultural resources of all projects funded by FEMA grant funds, through its EHP Review process, as mandated by the National Environmental Policy Act; National Historic Preservation Act of 1966, as amended; National Flood Insurance Program regulations; and, any other applicable laws and Executive Orders.

In order to initiate EHP review of your project(s), you must complete all relevant sections of this form and submit it to the Grant Programs Directorate (GPD) along with all other pertinent project information. Failure to provide requisite information could result in delays in the release of grant funds.

Article XXVIII - Vehicle Awards

If awarded any AFG vehicle grant, you must obtain a vehicle purchase contract from the vendor or manufacturer and send it by e-mail to your AFG Regional Representative. A list of the AFG Regional Representatives and their contact information can be found on the AFG website at http://www.fema.gov/fire-grant-contact-information.

The grantee must include in their vehicle purchase contract specific performance requirements and penalties (penalty clause) for noncompliance with the requirements. The clause should specify a delivery date for the vehicle under contract and include a provision for a penalty for non-delivery on the specified date. Non-delivery by the contract's guaranteed date should require a penalty for non-performance of at least \$100 per day until the date that the vehicle is delivered.

It is recommended that any department/organization that will advance their own local funds to their vendor prior to receipt of the vehicle obtain a performance bond. The bond may be obtained through the vendor or a local bank.

It is required that any department/organization that will advance of Federal funds to their vendor prior to receipt of the vehicle obtain a prepayment bond. A prepayment bond may be obtained through your bank or the vendor. The cost for the bond may be included in the grant.

Grantees that fail to comply with these requirements—fail to provide the AFG with a copy of the vehicle purchase contract, or fail to obtain the necessary prepayment bond - will not be eligible for an extension of the grant's period of performance.

RESOLUTION RECOMMENDING THAT THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS AUTHORIZE THE SAN FRANCISCO FIRE DEPARTMENT TO ACCEPT AND EXPEND A GRANT IN THE AMOUNT OF \$1,485,014 FROM THE FEDERAL EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT AGENCY TO UPGRADE ITS EXHAUST EXTRACTOR SYSTEMS IN VARIOUS FIRE HOUSES

WHEREAS, The San Francisco Fire Department (SFFD) responds to over 100,000 incidents each year, including fires, vehicle accidents, and medical and other emergencies; and,

WHEREAS, Exposure to diesel exhaust in fire stations from vehicles is a definite health and safety concern for firefighters; and,

WHEREAS, Continued exposure to diesel fumes and other contaminants contained in vehicle exhaust can lead to increased risks of cancer in the long term as well as a variety of other adverse health effects; and,

WHEREAS, Due to funding issues, the Department has not been able to replace or upgrade its exhaust extractor units at various fire houses; and,

WHEREAS, The use of these grant funds would allow the Department to replace its outdated extractors with new units that are more efficient and safe; and,

WHEREAS, The SFFD applied for and was awarded a Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) grant in the amount of \$1,485,014 to replace exhaust extractors at 37 fire houses; and,

WHEREAS, The grant requires the City to provide matching funds worth 10 percent of the total project award, or \$165,001; and,

WHEREAS, the FEMA grant requires SFFD to complete the extractor project by September 20, 2015; and,

WHEREAS, The SFFD wishes to accept and expend the grant, to support and promote the health and safety of its members; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That the Fire Commission recommends that the Board of Supervisors authorize the Fire Department to accept and expend a grant from FEMA in the amount of \$1,485,014 to upgrade its exhaust extractor systems in fire houses.
