## Honorable Members of the Board of Supervisors:

The contract between the San Francisco Municipal Transportation Agency (SFMTA) and our private security contractor, Cypress Security, expires at midnight on Thursday, April 30<sup>th</sup>. We have exhausted our authority to extend the pre-existing contract that was scheduled to expire on March 31, 2014. We respectfully request your approval for a new private security contract on April 21 so that the public and our employees, facilities, revenue and vehicles are adequately protected while traveling and performing their duties on the transit system.

During the Board of Supervisors meeting on Tuesday, April 14<sup>th</sup>, some members of the Board raised concerns regarding SFMTA's proposed private security contract. Those concerns included the use of armed guards, the level of training required of those guards, and SFMTA's procurement process. The purpose of this letter is to address those concerns.

#### Use of armed guards to protect employees carrying cash

Some members of the Board of Supervisors expressed reservations about again approving a contract that included continuing the 20-year practice of deploying armed security guards with SFMTA Fare Collection Receivers who collect and process cash fare payments from the subway system and bus and train facilities. As requested by the Board of Supervisors, we surveyed peer transit agencies and confirmed that this is industry-standard practice. The table below shows how transit operators in the Bay Area and beyond used armed security.

Some of these agencies have their own police forces while others do not. However, even transit agencies with their own police forces, like SEPTA and BART, use contract security guards for revenue collection. This is because of the additional cost of using police officers for this duty. We estimate that it would cost \$2.6 million annually to use SFPD officers instead of private security guards to protect our employees while handling cash. Asking SFPD to perform this duty would also potentially reduce the number of officers available to prevent crime elsewhere on the transit system.

# Current deployment of guards and their duties

There are 90 security guards assigned to the MTA at present, of which 18 (20%) are armed. Armed personnel accompany SFMTA Fare Collection Receivers while they collect tens of millions of dollars in small denominations of cash while performing the following duties:

- Fare media sales at four kiosks
- Collection of revenue from six bus and three rail facilities
- Collection of revenue and replenishment of fare media at nine Muni Metro stations

Additionally, one armed guard is assigned to the MTA Customer Service Center at 11 South Van Ness Avenue.

The immediate impact of eliminating armed personnel with SFMTA Fare Collection Receivers is that they may become defenseless targets of armed robbery attempts. If their lack of arms becomes widely known, the likelihood of such violent occurrences could increase. This concern also applies to other SFMTA employees and members of the public who may potentially become victims of violence as well.

#### Training of armed security guards

Armed security guards receive extensive training, beyond the minimum required by the State of California. Before applying for positions with SFMTA's contractor, guards receive the following training and screening:

- Fourteen hours basic training (six hours on the firing range and eight in the classroom the California minimum requirement to be considered for employment).
- Evaluation by a licensed psychologist using the *Minnesota Multiphasic Personality Inventory* which is assessed by a licensed psychologist.

Before beginning service with SFMTA, guards receive:

- Eight hours of training in general security procedures before employment begins.
- Thirty-two hours of training in SFMTA security policies and procedures, revenue collection security, personnel protection, safety, use of force policies and crime response.

Within the first ninety days of service, guards receive:

• Another 16 hours of training on a firing range, with a former police officer as an instructor. This training is designed specifically for security personnel assigned to the Agency.

Finally, every six months, guards are required to:

- Repeat the 16 hours of firing range training.
- Requalify with their firearms every six months.

# Procurement process for the private security contract

Some members of the Board expressed concern about the integrity of the procurement process. The City Attorney's Office examined the allegations of ethics violations by Chris Grabarkiewctz, project manager for the contract, made in the San Francisco Examiner, and other allegations of wrongdoing. The City Attorney's Office found no ethics violations had occurred by virtue of Mr. Grabarkiewctz's participation in the contract negotiations, and also determined that the sources of allegations of other wrongdoing never produced any evidence supporting their claims. Despite the fact that no State or local laws were violated, some questions remain about the propriety of allowing an employee to participate in negotiations if there is any history of past employment with a prospective contractor, even if it is beyond the minimum of 12 months post private employment. One source within the City suggested that a policy needs to be crafted to address this issue because one does not exist. We respectfully submit that the debate over a possible policy change is one best held between the Ethics Commission and the Board, and not one which should prevent the award of the SFMTA's security contract.

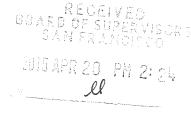

# Greetings:

Andrews International, a National and International Private Security company, legally operating offices and business in the City and County of San Francisco, come forward now in protest of the recent actions of the Board of Supervisors and the SFMTA new proposals set out on April 14, 2015, concerning the above RFP.

During the course of the discussion to award the contract for Armed and Unarmed Security Guard Service to the **Second Place winner**, **Cypress Security**, Andrews International finds several directives resulting from the recent Board of Supervisors' meeting need to be protested as **unfair to the other bidders**. This includes our company, Andrews International, who were the actual winners of the contract according to the point system set out in the RFP. It also sheds light on the **unfair treatment of our local LBE contractors**, who will be adversely affected by the decisions made at the meeting.

During the April 14, 2015 meeting of the Board of Supervisors, Andrews International believes the RFP proposal Scope of Work was changed. The Board now is requesting the armed security portion of the contract be removed from the original RFP drafted, and sent out for bid. This represents more than \$7,000,000.00 of services that were originally requested in the RFP.

According to the RFP the following conditions are the only parameters set in place by the SFMTA: (This is text taken directly from original RFP)

#### I. Introduction and Schedule

#### A. General

The San Francisco Municipal Transportation Agency (SFMTA) is seeking a vendor to provide Armed/Unarmed Security Services.

The contract shall be a firm, fixed price contract payable upon proof of completion of specified work and contain provisions for liquidated damages in accordance with the terms of the contract.

Now, Andrews International comes forward with this formal protest to bring to light what we as a company feel we are being treated with unfair practices by the SFMTA and the Board of Supervisors. With the changing of the Scope of Work, the action will now disavow the terms of the contract being a "fixed" contract for services. Andrews International has not been given an opportunity to negotiate new terms and conditions that will be affected by the consideration of performing a changed Scope of Work in a new RFP, specifically now to be performed without the armed security coverage, prescribed in the original proposal.

The SFMTA and the Board of Supervisors must be made aware that the bidding of only Unarmed Security Guards changes the nature of the entire Scope of Work for any proposal bid, in that many factors are now affected that will change pricing. Insurance and risk for Armed Security is more expensive and that risk is calculated differently in a proposal of this size that would not include this service. This also affects how the LBE, another requirement of the RFP would be affected, as a large percentage of the Armed Security was bid with this company as the contractor.

Andrews International respectfully asks that the SFMTA board and the Board of Supervisors reopen the RFP, for complete rebidding without the use of Armed Security. Andrews International would have bid differently under these new conditions, and Andrews International feels that we are not being offered a fair and equal chance to bid for the real contractual requirements for Security Services.

Andrews International, the top rated private security company bidder for this RFP also respectfully requests a reconsideration of how the Board of Supervisors moves forward at this award without due process for all bidders involved.

To the Board of Supervisors of San Francisco:

My name is Jeanny Ico, 29 years old, female, and I am a San Francisco Resident – living in the Sunset Area. I utilize the public transportation (MUNI) as my commute to work at least 5 days a week. I hope that the City Hall can pass an ordinance or can have Police Officers to provide an undercover cop or security by riding the T Line MUNI travelling by the 3rd Street (Mission Bay) AT ALL TIMES. I boarded MUNI last Sunday, April 19, 2015, at 6:47PM at 3rd Street and Mariposa after my 10AM-6:30PM shift at UCSF Benioff Children's Hospital. I was on my phone texting, when two African American, males, ages between 17 to 21, snatched my phone from my hands and quickly exited at the front entrance/exit of the train by the Caltrain stop (King Street), I think two blocks away from the AT&T Ballpark. A gentleman helped me and recorded a video of me begging to one of them to return my phone. Two more of his friends showed up but the friend who took my phone never showed up and I never got my phone back. Here's what they do, they board the train at a stop and finds a target, quickly grabs the phone from your hands and immediately exits the train before the doors shut. I heard from my colleagues and friends that it is prevalent in that area. I hope there's something that can be done, specially that more people will be travelling by the Mission Bay Area not just because of Caltrain or AT&T Ballpark, but also because of the newly opened UCSF Hospital, employing hundreds of people and catering to thousands of patients. I have filed a police report and I have a recorded video of one of the suspects. I understand that I will never get my phone back, however, I now fear riding MUNI in that area knowing that there's no one who can protect me. I will not be the only first and last victim of such crime, but also many tourists that travels to see Embarcadero and AT&T Park, etc. We don't want them to have a bad perspective of San Francisco. I hope that all of you, as our leaders, can resolve this situation.

As one of the elected officials who has not yet committed to the San Francisco Transit Rider's challenge to ride Muni for 22 days in June, I encourage you to do so now.

With more than 700,000 rides per day, Muni is widely used in every district. It's already operating beyond its capacity and San Francisco's population continues to grow. Those who ride Muni regularly know first-hand what it's like to use the slowest system in the nation and why it's called a "national embarrassment" by Buzzfeed.

In 2014, Muni's on-time performance rate was a pathetic 57%. In April of 2013, Muni riders were delayed a cumulative 19 years and eight months. The 2013 cost to workers in lost productivity totaled \$50 million.

Today, Muni lurches along with multi-billion dollar maintenance backlog. Despite Props A & B, Muni's budget has grown nowhere near the \$250 million SFMTA director Ed Reiskin said it needed just to bring Muni's current assets into a state of good repair.

In 1993 the voters sent a clear signal that they want elected officials to ride Muni. While Proposition AA is not being enforced, SFTRU's #OnBoardSF challenge offers an opportunity for you to prove your commitment to Muni.

"If you're going to be making decisions about transit, you really need to know what it's actually like. Not what it's like in theory, but what it's actually like," said Christof Spieler of the Houson Metro's board of directors in an Atlantic article titled Why the People in Charge of Transit Systems Should Be Required to Actually Ride Transit (SF is mentioned several times in the article).

Yesterday the Mayor posed for an Earth Day photo op boarding Muni. As I noted <u>in a blog post about SFTRU's</u> <u>#OnBoardSF challenge</u>, aside from photo ops, San Francisco citizens don't see the Mayor on Muni. But they do spot the his vehicle parked illegally in bus stops and crosswalks.

Clearly, the time for San Francisco's elected officials start riding Muni is long overdue.

# INTRODUCTION

- 1. This action challenges the decisions by Respondents City and County of San Francisco, Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco, San Francisco Planning Commission, San Francisco Board of Appeals, San Francisco Zoning Administrator, and San Francisco Planning Department (collectively the "City") in connection with the approval of land use entitlements allowing the substantial demolition and expansion of an over 100-year-old building (the "Project") at 312 Green Street in San Francisco's historic Telegraph Hill neighborhood (the "Site"), and the City's exemption of the Project from environmental review under the California Environmental Quality Act ("CEQA").
- 2. The City failed to comply with CEQA by issuing an erroneous determination that the Project was categorically exempt from CEQA as a minor alteration of an existing structure.
- Petitioners challenge the City's exemption of this project from CEQA on two grounds.
- 4. First, the City should not have relied on any categorical exemption for the Project due to unusual circumstances raising "a reasonable possibility that the activity will have a significant effect on the environment." (CEQA Guidelines § 15300.2(c).) Unusual geologic circumstances consisting of unique sandstone bedrock may make it extremely difficult to excavate the Site, potentially requiring blasting. There is a reasonable possibility that blasting would have a significant adverse effect in this dense urban environment. Moreover, a number of other conditions affecting the Site, including

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the unique aesthetic characteristics of the neighborhood, qualify as unusual circumstances. Since the Project could have a significant effect on the environment based on this range of unusual circumstances, the City is precluded from relying on any categorical exemption for the Project.

- 5. Second, because the Project constitutes an increase of more than 50 percent of the existing structure's floor area and/or qualifies as a de facto demolition of the existing structure and the construction of a new structure, the Class 1 categorical exemption was not available for the Project. The resulting defective public notice constituted an abuse of discretion since it denied the public its right to be informed of the true scope of the Project. (See Public Resources Code § 21168.5.)
- 6. Petitioners also challenge the Zoning Administrator's approval of the Project variance and the Board of Appeals' subsequent decision upholding the variance by a vote of 2 to 1. There is no substantial evidence in the record to support the determination that the Project meets the stringent standards for variance approval. (See Planning Code section 305(c).) Furthermore, the ZA's findings did not establish compliance with the requisite standards. Therefore, the ZA and Board decisions on the Project variance constitute a prejudicial abuse of discretion.
- 7. Petitioners seek a writ of mandate, inter alia, ordering the City to set aside its approval of the Project variance and compelling the City to complete environmental review of the Project pursuant to CEQA.

#### **PARTIES**

8. Petitioners Jack Oswald and Anneke Seley own property located at 310 Green Street in San Francisco, immediately adjacent to the Site. Petitioners' property,

along with other neighborhood properties, will be adversely affected by the Project's environmental impacts. Petitioners have a substantial interest in ensuring that the City's decisions on the Project entitlements are in conformity with the requirements of law, and in having those requirements properly executed and the public duties of the City enforced.

- 9. Respondent City and County of San Francisco is a charter city existing under the Constitution and the laws of the State of California. The Site is located within the jurisdictional limits of the City and County of San Francisco. The City and County of San Francisco, including all its officials, boards, commissions, departments, bureaus and offices ("Agents"), constitutes a single "local agency," "public agency," or "lead agency" as those terms are used in CEQA and is responsible under CEQA for evaluating the environmental impacts of the Project. The City and County of San Francisco is also responsible for the actions of its Agents in implementing its system of land use entitlements, including variance approvals, in accordance with State and local laws.
- 10. Respondent Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco is the elected governing body of the City and is the body responsible for deciding appeals of Planning Department determinations regarding CEQA exemptions.
- 11. Respondent City and County of San Francisco Planning Commission (the "Commission") is an executive commission constituted pursuant to Charter section 4.105. The Commission is charged with approving all permits affected by the Planning Code.
- 12. Respondent City and County of San Francisco Planning Department (the "Department") is the executive agency charged with performing the administrative

- 13. Respondent City and County of San Francisco Board of Appeals (the "Board") is a quasi-judicial body established pursuant to Charter section 4.106. The Board is the body charged with hearing appeals of building permits, variances, and other land use entitlements.
- 14. Respondent City and County of San Francisco Zoning Administrator ("ZA"), a position created pursuant to Charter section 4.105, is charged with making Planning Code variance determinations, subject to the requirements set forth in Charter section 4.105 and Planning Code section 305(c).
- 15. Real Parties in Interest ("Real Parties") Bruno Kanter and Suzanne Kanter own the property at 312 Green Street (the "Site") and hold the land use entitlements challenged by this Petition.

# **FACTS**

- 16. The Site consists of a 1,062 square-foot lot zoned for residential use, located at 312 Green Street in San Francisco ("the Site"). The Site is within two blocks of the Telegraph Hill Historic District, one of the City's few designated historic districts.
- 17. The existing structure at the Site consists of a quaint two-story house with a garage and storage space at the lower level and 1,017 square feet of living space on the upper level. The house was built in 1907 during the post-earthquake reconstruction period. While the façade of this building has been altered, it is one of the few remaining structures from this period on the block that maintains its original size and shape.

- 18. The existing structure occupies the entire lot. Since the City now requires a minimum 15-foot rear-yard setback in the RM-1 Zoning District, the structure does not conform to current zoning requirements. However, the structure is legal despite its nonconforming status, because the City required no setbacks at the time it was built.
- 19. The Project consists of the substantial demolition of the existing structure, reconstruction of the existing two floors within the same building footprint, and the addition of two more stories and a roof deck. The existing structure will be virtually unrecognizable once the Project has been completed.
- 20. The first two floors will continue to occupy the entire lot. The City granted the Project a variance so the new third story could encroach ten and a half feet into the required fifteen-foot rear yard, and exterior stairs accessing the roof deck could also encroach therein at the fourth story. The Project will be twice the height of the existing structure and 150% larger in terms of habitable floor space. The Project will also create substantial outdoor living space, including the roof deck above the new fourth floor. The Project will be one of the largest dwelling units in the neighborhood despite the relatively small size of the Site.
- 21. On November 13, 2013, Real Parties filed a building permit application (BPA No. 2013.11.13.1794) for the Project (the "Permit"). The Department found the Project categorically exempt from CEQA under Class 1 [Minor Alteration of Existing Structure].

#### EXHAUSTION OF ADMINISTRATIVE REMEDIES

22. Petitioners have performed any and all conditions precedent to the filing of this Petition, and have participated in all phases of the administrative and environmental review process, and have fully exhausted their administrative remedies.

## A. CEQA Administrative Remedies Exhaustion

- 23. On July 21, 2014, Petitioners filed an application for discretionary review of the Permit with the Commission.
- 24. Under Planning Code section 311(d), the Commission is empowered to review building permits and require modifications to protect the public interest.
- 25. At a hearing on October 23, 2014, the Commission declined to exercise its discretionary review authority over the Permit and approved the Project, as proposed. Under San Francisco Administrative Code § 31.04(h)(1)(A), this decision qualified as the approval action, triggering a 30-day window in which to appeal the Department's CEQA determination.
- 26. On November 24, 2014, Petitioners filed a timely letter of appeal with the Board of Supervisors, challenging the Department's CEQA determination. The letter set forth objections to the Project CEQA determination, supported by substantial evidence in the form of expert opinion, research studies, and other sources. Petitioners' letter raised each of the legal deficiencies asserted in this petition.
- 27. At the CEQA appeal hearing on January 13, 2014, Petitioners submitted oral argument to the Board of Supervisors in opposition to the CEQA determination. The Board of Supervisors affirmed the Department's CEQA exemption determination for the Project.

#### B. Variance Administrative Remedies Exhaustion

- 28. On October 23, 2014, the ZA conducted a public hearing of the Project variance application. On November 20, 2014, the ZA issued a decision letter approving the Project variance.
- 29. On November 24, 2014, Petitioners filed an appeal of the Project variance approval with the Board.
- 30. Petitioners subsequently submitted a brief to the Board setting forth arguments as to why the ZA's decision was in error, supported by substantial evidence in the form of expert opinion, data analysis, and other sources. Petitioners' brief raised each of the legal deficiencies asserted in this petition.
- 31. The Board heard the appeal on February 11, 2015. Petitioners submitted oral arguments to the Board in opposition to the ZA's variance decision.
- 32. Two Board commissioners voted to uphold the variance, while one commissioner favored granting Petitioners' appeal and overturning the variance. (One commissioner was absent and there was one vacant position at the time.)
- 33. The Board issued a Notice of Decision and Order on February 24, 2015, stating that because there were insufficient votes "to uphold, reverse or amend the departmental action, the [ZA's] action to grant the subject variance became the City's final decision as a matter of law."

## CEQA NOTICE REQUIREMENTS

34. Petitioners have performed all actions required by law precedent to filing this action, including complying with the requirement of Public Resources Code section

21167.5 by mailing notice to the City that this action would be filed. A copy of this notice is attached hereto as Exhibit A.

- 35. Petitioners will also serve a copy of this petition on the California

  Attorney General within ten days after filing, as required by law. (Pub. Resources Code § 21167.7; CCP § 388.)
- 36. Petitioners will serve this Petition and Complaint on the City and file a request for preparation of the administrative record within 10 business days of the filing of this action. (Pub. Resources Code § 21167.6.)

## JURISDICTION AND VENUE

37. The San Francisco County Superior Court has initial jurisdiction of the matters alleged herein pursuant to Public Resources Code section 21168, which authorizes the Court to review and set aside public agency actions that violate CEQA, and Code of Civil Procedure section 1094.5, which authorizes Petitioners to seek a writ of mandate, and which authorizes the Court to review and set aside public agency decisions involving a prejudicial abuse of discretion. Venue is proper pursuant to Code of Civil Procedure section 394(a), which provides that "[a]n action . . . against a . . . city and county . . . may be tried in [that] . . . city and county . . . "

#### RELIEF REQUESTED

- 38. Petitioners seek a writ of mandate, costs, and attorneys' fees.
- A. Writ of Mandate to Compel CEQA Compliance and to Void Variance

  Approval (Code Civ. Proc. § 1094.5; Pub. Resources Code §§ 21168, 21168.9;

  City Charter § 4.105 & Planning Code § 305)
- 39. Petitioners seek a writ of mandate pursuant to Public Resources Code section 21168 (to challenge CEQA decisions of adjudicative bodies) and Code of Civil

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Procedure section 1094.5 (providing for writ issuance to inquire "into the validity of any final administrative order or decision" resulting from a proceeding requiring a hearing and the taking of evidence).

- "The inquiry . . . shall extend to . . . whether there was any prejudicial 40. abuse of discretion," which may consist of (1) agency failure to proceed in the manner required by law; (2) agency decision not supported by the findings; or (3) agency findings not supported by the evidence. (CCP § 1094.5(b).)
- 41. "[A]buse of discretion is established if the court determines that the findings are not supported by substantial evidence in the light of the whole record." (CCP § 1094.5(c).)
- 42. Petitioners seek a writ of mandate on the grounds that Respondents prejudicially abused their discretion in (1) erroneously finding the Project categorically exempt from CEQA, and (2) approving the Project variance by (a) making findings not supported by the evidence, and (b) reaching a decision not supported by the findings.
- 43. Section 21168.9 authorizes a court, after finding a CEOA violation, to issue a peremptory writ of mandate requiring the agency to void or suspend decisions for which CEQA compliance was necessary, or to take other steps necessary to bring its decisions into compliance with CEQA.
- 44. Petitioners request that the Court issue a peremptory writ (1) voiding. pursuant to Public Resources Code section 21168.9(a)(1), all Project approvals relying on the erroneous CEQA determination, and (2) setting aside, pursuant to Code of Civil Procedure section 1094.5(f), Respondents' decisions to approve and uphold the Project variance.

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#### В. Attorneys' Fees and Costs (Code Civ. Proc. §§ 1921.5, 1032; Gov't Code § 800)

- 45. This action involves the enforcement of important rights affecting the public interest. Excavation of the hard sandstone bedrock at the Site may require blasting, which poses a risk of injury to real property and people in the immediate vicinity. Environmental review under CEQA would allow those risks to be fully investigated and mitigated in advance, thereby protecting the public interest. Petitioners are therefore entitled to an award of reasonable attorneys' fees under Code of Civil Procedure section 1021.5.
- 46. Furthermore, since Respondents' conduct in exempting the Project from CEQA and approving the Project variance was arbitrary and capricious, Petitioners request \$7,500 in attorneys' fees under Government Code section 800.
- Finally, Petitioners seek recovery of all costs pursuant to Code of Civil Procedure section 1032.

## FIRST CAUSE OF ACTION

(Violations of CEQA, Pub. Resources Code § 21000 et seq.) (Unusual Circumstances Exception Precludes Reliance on Categorical Exemptions)

- 48. Petitioners hereby reallege and incorporate the allegations contained in paragraphs 1 through 47 inclusive, of this Petition, as if fully set forth herein.
- 49. CEQA applies to all private projects approved by a public agency or for which the agency must issue a discretionary permit, license, or other approval.
- 50. Under CEQA, an agency prejudicially abuses its discretion when (1) it fails to proceed in the manner required by law; (2) its decision is not supported by the

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findings; or (3) its findings are not supported by the evidence. (Pub. Resources Code § 21168; CCP § 1094.5(b).)

- 51. The Project is subject to CEQA, inter alia, because it relies on a variance—a type of discretionary permit—to authorize its construction.
- 52. Petitioners challenge the City's CEQA determination for the Project (i.e., Class 1—categorical exemption) pursuant to California Public Resources Code section 21168.
- Under CEQA Guidelines § 15300.2, "[a] categorical exemption shall not 53. be used for an activity where there is a reasonable possibility that the activity will have a significant effect on the environment due to unusual circumstances." There are two prongs to this exemption that must be met, and each prong is subject to a different standard of agency review.
- 54. "[A] party challenging the exemption has the burden of producing evidence supporting an exception." (Davidon Homes v. City of San Jose (1997) 54 Cal. App. 4th 106, 115.) "A party invoking the exception may establish an unusual circumstance without evidence of an environmental effect, by showing that the project has some feature that distinguishes it from others in the exempt class, such as its size or location." (Berkeley Hillside Preservation v. City of Berkeley (2015) 60 Cal.4th 1086, 1105.) The agency determines the exception's applicability under the substantial evidence standard.
- 55. Then, "the party need only show a reasonable possibility of a significant effect due to that unusual circumstance." (Id.) The agency must evaluate whether this "reasonable possibility" exists under the fair argument test.

- 56. Here, Petitioners have met their burden of producing evidence supporting an exception. A licensed geotechnical engineer evaluated the geologic characteristics in the immediate environs of the Site and opined that "the sandstone bedrock at the site could be unique, and [] not [] easily excavated." He continued, "[J]ack hammering and potentially blasting may be required to remove the 'floaters,' or 'boulders' of hard sandstone at the project site." The unusual geologic conditions in immediate proximity to the Site qualify as an unusual circumstance, meeting the first prong of the "unusual circumstance" exception under CEQA Guidelines § 15300.2.
- 57. Additionally, there is a reasonable possibility of a significant effect on the environment due to the Site's unusual geologic conditions. Petitioners' geotechnical engineer explained that the "unusual geologic conditions affecting the subject site [] will likely result in severely adverse environmental impacts on the surrounding land and [built] environment." (Emphasis added.) This is because building techniques such as blasting can injure surrounding land and structures—particularly in a dense urban environment. Since the second prong of the "unusual circumstance" exception is met as well, the exception applies and the Project does not qualify for any categorical exemption.
- 58. Petitioners' expert opinion evidence regarding the Site's unusual geologic conditions is not rebutted by the City. The City posited that geologic conditions at the Site will not result in significant environmental effects because (1) the Building Code and Slope Protection Act will apply to the Project, and (2) DBI "may require additional site specific reports, analysis, and monitoring . . . ."

- 59. Conclusory assertions about laws of general applicability and deferral of possible site-specific analyses cannot constitute substantial evidence. The undisputed opinion of an expert geotechnical engineer based on analyses of geologic conditions in immediate proximity to the Site does constitute substantial evidence of unusual and problematic geologic conditions at the Site. The "unusual circumstance" exception applies to the Project, precluding reliance on any categorical exemption.
- 60. The Project implicates a number of additional unusual circumstances under CEQA Guidelines section 15300.2. Due to the following unusual circumstances, there is a reasonable possibility the Project will have a significant effect on the environment.
- 61. The subject property is one of the last remaining structures, in terms of size and shape, from the post-1906 to 1915 reconstruction period. While the fabric and façade of this building have been altered, it is one of the few remaining structures from this period in the area that maintains its original size and shape. Since the subject property is at the crest of a hill, the project's additional height and bulk will disrupt the existing massing patterns on the block. At a minimum, the addition should be set further back from the front to differentiate the new vertical addition from the original structure (contextual massing).
- 62. The proposed structure will create a wall, blocking wind flow and substantially impacting air circulation.
- 63. The proposed structure will cast a shadow in the mid- to late afternoon on Appellant's decks, solar panels, and rear yard. It will also reduce the amount of natural light entering Appellant's dining room, bedroom, and bathroom.

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- 64. The proposed roof deck will tower over Appellant's deck and a sufficient setback between the two decks has not been provided, impacting privacy.
- 65. The Project's floor area-to-lot size ratio is substantially larger than that of other properties in the surrounding neighborhood.
- 66. The structure will obstruct scenic views of the City from surrounding properties.
- The project does not provide the minimum seismic separation between the proposed additions and the adjacent structures. As a result, during an earthquake the new third and fourth floors may pose a danger to the adjacent structures due to earthquake pounding.
- The proposed project will require foundation work that could undermine 68. and destabilize adjacent soil and foundations of the adjacent buildings. Excavation for the project likewise implicates significant runoff and drainage concerns given the project's location at the crest of a hill.

## SECOND CAUSE OF ACTION

(Violations of CEQA, Pub. Resources Code § 21000 et seq.)

## (Lead Agency Reliance on Incorrect Categorical Exemption for Project)

- 69. Petitioners hereby reallege and incorporate the allegations contained in paragraphs 1 through 68 inclusive, of this Petition, as if fully set forth herein.
- The Project Involves Demolition and New Construction, so Class 1 Is A. InApplicable.
- CEOA presumes that certain categories of minor projects (e.g., new 70. construction of a single house) will generally have no significant effect on the environment. (Pub. Resources Code § 21084(a).) The law directs the Secretary of the

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Natural Resources Agency to include a list of such projects in the guidelines for the implementation of CEQA. (Id. §§ 21083, 21084(a).) Projects that fall into these categories are deemed to be categorically exempt from CEQA. (Cal. Code Regs., tit. 14. § 15300 ("CEQA Guidelines").)

- 71. The City failed to comply with CEQA by issuing an erroneous determination that the Project was categorically exempt from CEQA pursuant to CEQA Guidelines section 15301(e) [Class 1 – Existing Facilities].
- 72. "Class 1 consists of the ... minor alteration of existing ... private structures . . . involving negligible or no expansion of use." (CEQA Guidelines § 15301.) "Additions to existing structures" are permissible as long as "the addition will not result in an increase of more than ... 50 percent of the floor area of the structure \(\text{\cl}.\)" (Id \(\delta\) 15301(e)(1).)
- Unlike the Class 1 categorical exemption, the Class 3 categorical 73. exemption applies to new construction of small structures. (CEQA Guidelines § 15303.) A single-family residence in a residential zone is an example of a project that may qualify for a Class 3 exemption. (Id. § 15303(e).)
- 74. The City determined that the Project involved the minor alteration of an existing private structure and thus qualified for a Class 1 CEQA exemption. This determination is not supported by substantial evidence.
- 75. Assuming the applicability of any exemption here, the Project could only have qualified for a Class 3 exemption since the Project actually involves the new construction of a single-family residence. This conclusion is unavoidable based on the City Planning Code and Building Code definitions of demolition.

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- 76. Under Planning Code section 317, a "demolition" is any of the following:
- Any work for which the Department of Building Inspection ("DBI") requires a demolition permit (§ 317(b)(2)(A)); or
- b. Removal of more than 50% of front and rear facades and more than 65% of all exterior walls (§ 317(b)(2)(B)); or
- Removal of more than 50% in area of the vertical and horizontal envelope C. elements ( $\S$  317(b)(2)(C)).
- 77. DBI requires a demolition permit when the principal portions of an existing structure are removed. (S.F. Building Code § 103A.3.2.) The term "principal portion" means either (1) construction that determines building envelope shape and size (e.g., exterior walls, roof, interior bearing elements); or (2) construction that alters twothirds or more of interior elements (e.g., walls, partitions, floors, or ceilings).
- 78. Only one of the three standards in Planning Code section 317(b)(2) need be met for the Project to qualify as a demolition. The Project constitutes a de facto demolition and would necessarily qualify as a demolition under any of these standards.
- 79. Petitioners raised this concern both in writing and at the public hearing before the Board of Supervisors. In its response to Petitioners' appeal, the Department stated that it had "reviewed the Project for compliance with Planning Code Section 317... and found that the Project would not be considered a de facto demolition per the Planning Code." This conclusory statement is false and is unsupported by evidence. Substantial evidence in the record establishes that the Project qualifies as a demolition under the Planning Code, and that a Class 1 exemption is inapplicable.
- The Project Addition's Size Makes the Class 1 Exemption Inapplicable.

80.	Under CEQA Guidelines section 15301(e), "[a]dditions to existing
structures	that will not result in an increase of more than [] 50 percent of the floor
area of the st	ructure[] before the addition" may qualify for the Class 1 [Existing
Facilities] ex	emption.

- 81. The existing structure contains 1,017 square feet of habitable floor area. The Project plans show that the replacement structure will consist of 2,550 square feet of habitable floor area. This represents an increase of more than 150 percent, substantially exceeding the 50-percent threshold allowed under Guidelines section 15301(e)(1). The Class 1 exemption is therefore inapplicable to the Project.
- 82. The City contends that the Project qualifies as an addition under Guidelines section 15301(e)(2), which allows for an addition of up to 10,000 square feet. But that provision is inapplicable here because "the area in which the project is located is [] environmentally sensitive." (Id. § 15301(e)(2)(B).)
- 83. As discussed at paragraphs 56 through 57, *supra*, Petitioners' geotechnical engineer opined that the sandstone bedrock near the Site was unusual, and concluded that excavation at the Site would likely result in severely adverse environmental impacts.

  These unusual geologic conditions make the area environmentally sensitive. (CEQA Guidelines § 15301(e)(2).)
- 84. This environmental sensitivity is exacerbated by the dense urban context in which the Site is located. The extreme proximity of the surrounding development is incompatible with the building techniques (e.g., blasting) that may be necessary to build the Project.

- 86. The Project is thus subject to the "50 percent size increase" threshold set forth in Guidelines section 15301(e)(1). As previously stated, the Project will increase the habitable floor space of the structure by more than 150 percent. Since the Project does not qualify as an addition under either of these standards, it was improper for the City to rely on a Class 1 exemption.
- 87. Based on the City's reliance on an inapplicable categorical exemption for the Project, Petitioners have been harmed in that they and other members of the public were not informed of the true nature and scope of the Project. A minor alteration is quite different from a de facto demolition and construction of a new structure, and the City's misclassification of the Project likely caused people to refrain from examining the Project proposal with greater scrutiny and expressing their concerns about the Project to the City. Thus, the defective notice was prejudicial because it "thwart[ed] [CEQA's] goals by precluding informed decision-making and public participation." (San Lorenzo Valley Community Advocates for Responsible Educ. v. San Lorenzo Valley Unified School Dist. (2006) 139 Cal. App. 4th 1356, 1375.)
- 88. Petitioners, as well as members of the general public, will suffer irreparable harm if the relief requested herein is not granted and the Project is allowed to move forward without providing accurate public notice about the Project, as required by law.

## THIRD CAUSE OF ACTION

## (Violations of City Charter sec. 4.105 & Planning Code sec. 305) (Lack of Substantial Evidence to Support Variance Findings)

- 89. Petitioners hereby reallege and incorporate the allegations contained in paragraphs 1 through 88 inclusive, of this Petition, as if fully set forth herein.
- 90. Petitioners request the Court issue a writ of mandate pursuant to Code of Civil Procedure section 1094.5, voiding the ZA's decision granting the Project variance.
- 91. Although Petitioners appealed the ZA's decision to the Board, "the Board was unable to muster sufficient votes to uphold, reverse or amend the departmental action ... [Thus, the ZA's] action to grant the subject variance became the City's final decision as a matter of law." (San Francisco Board of Appeals, Notice of Decision & Order, Appeal No. 14-195, Feb. 24, 2015.) Since this action constitutes an effective denial of Petitioners' appeal by the Board and upholding of the ZA's decision, Petitioners also request that the Court issue a writ of administrative mandate voiding the Board's decision pursuant to Code of Civil Procedure section 1094.5.
- 92. San Francisco Planning Code section 305(a) states that a variance shall be granted "only to the extent necessary to overcome such practical difficulty or unnecessary hardship as may be established in accordance with the provisions of this Section."
- 93. All five of the following findings must be made to justify granting a variance (Planning Code § 305(c)):
- Exceptional or extraordinary circumstances applying to the property involved that do not apply generally to other properties in the same class of district;
- (2) Literal enforcement of the Code would result in practical difficulty or unnecessary hardship not created by or attributable to the property owner;

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- (4) Granting of the variance will not be materially detrimental to the public welfare or materially injurious to the property or improvements in the vicinity; and
- (5) Variance approval will be in harmony with the general purpose and intent of the Code.
- 94. Not one of these five findings is supported by substantial evidence, as set forth below. But if the Court finds that even a single finding is not supported by substantial evidence, it must set aside the ZA's action granting the variance (CCP § 1094.5(b)).

## A. No Exceptional Circumstances Exist Because the Subject Parcel Size Is Not Substantially Different from Size of Nearby Parcels.

- 95. The first requirement a variance applicant must meet is "[t]hat there are exceptional or extraordinary circumstances applying to the property involved or to the intended use of the property that do not apply generally to other properties or uses in the same class of district." The ZA found this requirement met as follows:
  - A. The subject property has an average lot depth of 57.5 feet and a lot width of 18.5 feet, resulting in a total lot area of approximately 1,062 square feet. As such, the subject property is the smallest lot on the subject block. The existing building, which was constructed prior to rear yard controls circa 1907, is nonconforming due to its full lot coverage. The diminutive dimensions of the subject property constrict its Codecomplying development potential.
  - B. The subject property's location is such that the required rear yard would not contribute to the mid-block open space. As stated in the Residential Design Guidelines, rear yards collectively contribute to the mid-block open space that is visible to most residents of the block. This visual open space can be a significant community amenity. The subject property's

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proximity to the intersection and substandard lot size result in a property that cannot contribute to or detract from the mid-block open space.

- 96. The ZA's finding that the Site's "diminutive dimensions ... constrict its ... development potential" does not actually address the key question here. The relevant question is how the Site's dimensions compare with those of other parcels similarly zoned in the neighborhood. A variance may amount to a "special privilege" if "there has been no affirmative showing that the subject property differs substantially . . . from other parcels in the applicable zone." (Topanga Assn., 11 Cal.3d at p. 522 (emphasis added)).
- 97. In voting against the variance, Board Commissioner Frank Fung explained, "Yes, it's a small property, but . . . that's what they purchased, and there are lots of small properties in this area. The issue for North Beach and Telegraph Hill . . . is the organic development that occurred where none of [the] current Planning Codes match up with that district . . . So, I'm not sure that it's an extraordinary circumstance." (San Francisco Board of Appeals hearing, Feb. 11, 2015, accessible at: http://sanfrancisco.granicus.com/MediaPlayer.php?view id=6&clip id=22022 [2:04:56-2:05:30].)
- Commissioner Fung's observation is backed up by an empirical analysis 98. of 88 parcels (including the Site) in the immediate neighborhood that are zoned RM-1. which was presented to the Board. The Site's lot size is 1,062 square feet. The analysis revealed that 21.6 percent of the parcels surveyed were no more than 90 square feet larger than the Site. Over one quarter of these parcels were no more than 13 percent larger than the Site. This trivial difference in lot size cannot justify a variance since it cannot be characterized as "exceptional or extraordinary."

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99. The ZA's finding that the subject parcel cannot contribute to the valuable mid-block open space is also incorrect. While there is no visible ground or vegetation in the subject rear yard, the existing limited height of the structure contributes unobstructed air space, which facilitates the surrounding parcels' enjoyment of the mid-block open space. Extending the building's height in the rear-yard setback would wall off the mid-block open space from the adjacent parcel at 340-346 Green Street – especially its roof deck, which is its only open space.

## B. Enforcement of the Rear-Yard-Setback Requirement Would Not Result in Unnecessary Hardship Because the Project Can Be Revised.

- 100. The second variance requirement is "[t]hat owing to such exceptional or extraordinary circumstances, the literal enforcement of specified provisions of this Code would result in practical difficulty or unnecessary hardship not created by or attributed to the applicant or the owner of the property." The ZA found as follows:
  - A. The diminutive dimensions of the subject property detailed in Finding I(A) above results in an atypically small Code-complying buildable area. This buildable area is further reduced by the need for the project to match two adjacent lightwells per the Residential Design Guidelines, while the vast majority of buildings in the area only match one or none. When combined, the narrowness of the lot and the matching lightwells at the proposed third and fourth floors create a practical difficulty for developing the property in a literal Code-conforming manner.
  - B. The existing rear and middle portions of the first and second stories of the subject dwelling are limited in use due to poor access to light and air. The proposed addition will receive adequate light and will provide better habitable space.
- 101. Constraints of this nature impact many parcels in urban settings, and specifically several such parcels exist in the same block and in adjacent blocks. In considering a variance request, the focus is properly on "[d]isparities between properties, not treatment of the subject property's characteristics in the abstract." (*Topanga Assn.*, 11

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Cal. 3d at p. 520.) "[T]he critical issue [is] whether a variance was necessary to bring the original real party in interest into substantial parity with other parties holding property interests in the zone." (Id. at 520-21.) The proper inquiry here relates to the Site's Codecompliant development potential (as measured in square footage) and whether that amount of living space is comparable to that enjoyed by others in the neighborhood (i.e., whether the owner has been brought into "substantial parity"). The ZA's conclusory reference to the Site's "atypically small . . . buildable area" does not constitute substantial evidence of inadequate Code-compliant development potential or a lack of substantial parity. In fact, the Site's Code-compliant development potential is quite impressive. Based on a review of the plans submitted, the proposed home would contain 2,550 square feet. If the proposal were revised to comply with the rear-yard-setback requirement, it would contain 2,356 square feet. A Code-compliant Project would be more than twice as large as the existing home and would provide a sizeable living area in its dense urban context. The minimal difference in size between the Project and the Code-compliant Project (a mere 194 square feet) does not amount to a "hardship" justifying a variance.

- 102. Furthermore, the new dwelling unit on the Site will be much larger than others in the neighborhood, exceeding by far the "substantial parity" standard. The aforementioned analysis of similarly zoned parcels in the vicinity showed that the median-size dwelling unit is 767 square feet, including multifamily units. The average size single-family dwelling unit is 2,183 square feet—nearly 200 square feet smaller than a Code-compliant version of the Project described above.
- 103. The ZA also noted that the existing first and second floors have limited access to light and air and that the third and fourth floors would be more livable as they

- 104. The proposed third and fourth floors would not be eliminated by complying with the code; the third floor would merely be reduced in size by 194 square feet. So the light and air benefits noted by the ZA would still accrue to these two new stories, even without a variance. In fact, light and air access would likely be further improved by complying with the rear-yard-setback requirement.
- that the Real Parties are required, per the San Francisco Residential Design Guidelines, to provide lightwells that line up with those of adjacent neighbors. Because there are no side-yard setbacks, the matching lightwells are a primary means of ensuring greater light and air access to rooms along the side property lines. Although the lightwells do minimally reduce the overall Project size, the benefit they confer on the Project is substantial. The ZA's characterization of the lightwells' inclusion in the Project as a "hardship" is totally inconsistent with his Finding 2(B) above, where the ZA describes the Project's superior light access as a benefit of the Project.
- 106. The Project also fails to meet the "unnecessary hardship" requirement because any reduction in Project square footage was attributable to design choices made by Real Parties. Real Parties initially proposed a structure similar to the Project, but with no front setback at the third floor. Real Parties subsequently modified the proposal by

pulling the third floor back about 4.5 feet from the front property line. This redesign of the project resulted in a reduction in square footage and was "created by or attribut[able] to" Real Parties. The Planning Code does not require that these upper levels be set back from the front property line. Real Parties appear to have redesigned the project at least partially in response to the request of one neighbor whose view would have been blocked by the original proposal.

107. Real parties are not entitled to make up for this voluntarily foregone square footage by extending the structure into the required rear yard. That design choice (the basis of this variance) will injure surrounding homes by depriving them of adequate light and air circulation (as set forth below). To the extent Real Parties desire additional square footage, the Project can be redesigned to push out the upper levels at the front. This Code-compliant strategy would give the structure additional square footage. A variance is entirely inappropriate where design choices made by Real Parties caused the very problem from which they seek relief.

- C. Since a Code-Compliant Version of the Project Would Allow for the Enjoyment of Substantial Property Rights, the Rear Yard Variance Is Not Necessary.
- 108. The third requirement is "[t]hat such variance is necessary for preservation and enjoyment of a substantial property right of the subject property, possessed by other property in the same class of district." The ZA's findings in this regard were that:
  - A. Granting this variance will allow the construction of a third and fourth story addition to the existing building that will receive light at the front and rear of the property. The subject building is located between two four-story structures, and the majority of existing buildings on the subject block are either three or four stories. The proposed construction contextually relates to the neighboring buildings in terms of massing. The construction of a contextual addition that complies with the

- B. The project is comparable to the others in the immediate context in terms of square footage and height. It also creates more useable open space on the third and fourth floor roofs. The provision of useable open space in rear yards or roof decks is a substantial property right of the subject property, possessed by other property in the same class of district.
- C. The proposed rear extension matches the building depth of the neighboring buildings and will have a negligible effect on neighboring rear yards' access to light and air. The proposed third and fourth stories are appropriately set back five feet from the existing front building wall and serves as a transition between the setbacks of the neighboring four-story buildings.
- of useable open space in rear yards or roof decks" are in fact substantial property rights, that does not necessarily mean a variance is necessary for the enjoyment of those rights in this case. As the California Supreme Court states, "[w]e must be careful to distinguish... between those circumstances which prevent a builder from profitably developing a lot within the strictures of the planning code and those conditions which simply render a complying structure less profitable than anticipated." (Broadway, Laguna, Vallejo Ass'n v. Board of Permit Appeals of City and County of San Francisco (1967) 66 Cal.2d 767, 775.)
- additional square footage from the fact that the existing non-conforming structure occupies the entire lot. As a result, the home has an extra 277.5 square feet at both the first and second floors beyond what would be allowed under the Planning Code. This existing non-conforming space should have been factored into any decision as to whether the project sponsor merits additional relief from current zoning regulations.

111. Furthermore, as described at paragraph 101, *supra*, a substantial addition can be made to the existing structure (more than doubling its habitable square footage) while still complying with the rear yard setback requirement. A Code-compliant version of the Project would be only about 194 square feet smaller than the Project as proposed. Additionally, a Code-compliant version of the Project would continue to offer substantial useable open space, as the third-floor rear deck could increase from 83 to 277.5 square feet.

- property right possessed by neighboring properties, it would be inappropriate to grant a variance to allow for the construction of one of the largest homes in the neighborhood. At most, a variance should not allow more than the average size home in the vicinity.

  Otherwise, the subject property would benefit from an impermissible special privilege.
- 113. The Site is located in the RM-1 Zoning District (Residential, Mixed: Low Density). (Planning Code § 209.2.) This District allows for a mix of single-family and multifamily structures, but the "overall density of units remains low." (Id.) Based on an analysis of 87 contiguous parcels zoned RM-1 (including the Site) and containing 407 dwelling units, median dwelling size in the neighborhood is just 767 square feet.
- 114. The ratio of building square-footage to lot size ("Floor Area Ratio" or "FAR") is frequently used as a measure of development density. The median FAR of the parcels surveyed is 2.06 (i.e., the equivalent of a two-story structure covering the entire lot).
- 115. The ZA found that the "project is comparable to the others in the immediate context in terms of square footage and height." Yet, of the 407 dwelling units

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surveyed, only three were larger than the Project. Thus, the ZA's statement that the "project is comparable to others in the immediate context in terms of square footage" is truly at odds with the data. The fact that two of the three homes larger than the Project are in the same block as the Project is not relevant. The ZA should have been looking at dwelling size in the surrounding RM-1 Zoning District—not just within two houses of the Site.

- A Code-compliant version of the Project, discussed at paragraph 101, 116. supra, would remain the fourth largest dwelling unit within the area surveyed, with 2,356 square feet. A variance is thus unnecessary here to allow Real Parties to construct one of the largest dwelling units within an area consisting of multiple City blocks.
- In terms of development density, the Project FAR is 2.40, as compared 117. with an average FAR of 1.33 for all existing single-family dwellings in the surveyed area. Even when compared with the average FAR of 2.09 for all developed parcels surveyed (which are heavily skewed toward multifamily development), the Project FAR is substantially larger. Given that the Code-compliant version of the Project would have a FAR of 2.22, Real Parties are already permitted, with no variance, to build one of the denser structures, and the densest single-family dwelling, in the neighborhood.
- 118. Two critically important terms are contained within this third requirement for variance approval: "necessary" and "substantial property right." A reduction in dwelling size of only 194 square feet (of the proposed 2,550 square-foot unit) does not infringe on a substantial property right. It is not "necessary" to have the fourth largest dwelling unit in the neighborhood, particularly when the Project density greatly exceeds that of surrounding properties.

## D. <u>Property and Improvements in the Vicinity Will Be Materially Injured in</u> Terms of Light Access, Air Circulation, and Obstruction of Private Views.

- 119. The fourth requirement is "[t]hat the granting of the variance will not be materially detrimental to the public welfare or materially injurious to the property or improvements in the vicinity." The ZA's findings were that:
  - A. Granting the variance will improve the livability of the subject property and will not be materially detrimental to the public welfare or materially injurious to the neighboring properties. The proposed addition is in scale with the two adjacent four story buildings, as well as other buildings on the subject block. Additionally, the proposed rear extension matches the building depth of the neighboring buildings and will have a negligible effect on neighboring rear yards' access to light and air.
  - B. The Planning Department received three letters of support submitted by individuals living on the same block and 36 additional letters of support were submitted from neighbors in the area and other individuals.
  - C. The Planning Department received a Discretionary Review application, four letters in opposition to the project from neighbors on the same block (including one from the Telegraph Hill Dwellers), and 11 additional letters in opposition from residents in the neighborhood. However, the Planning Commission did not take Discretionary Review and recommended approval of the building permit application. Concerns ranged from the effect of the proposed addition on private views, the adverse effects caused by proposed construction, and the scale of the proposal. The Residential Design Team determined that the proposed overall scale, design, and fenestration pattern is consistent with neighborhood character.
- 120. Contrary to the ZA's findings, the adverse impacts on neighboring rear yards' access to light and air will be substantial. The proposed structure will cast a shadow in the mid- to late afternoon on Petitioners' decks, rear yard, and solar panel array, thereby reducing the array's output and increasing Petitioners' energy costs.

  Petitioners' solar array was partially funded through public subsidies in order to support the State's greenhouse gas reduction goals. Petitioners designed their home to be

sustainable to contribute to the State's environmental objectives. Allowing a building, by means of a variance, to shade a preexisting solar array is inconsistent with City and State policies that promote sustainable energy generation. This type of development approval will ultimately impact people's willingness to make important investments in sustainable energy infrastructure. The variance is thus inconsistent with vital public policy objectives and materially injures the public good.

- Petitioners' dining room, bedroom, and bathroom. Moreover, the proposed structure will create a wall, blocking wind flow and substantially impacting air circulation in Petitioners' rear yard. Finally, the excessive depth of the structure will obstruct Petitioners' and other neighbors' scenic views, causing substantial loss in property value. These are all material injuries to Petitioners' property that will be directly caused by the Project variance.
- 122. Petitioners are not the only neighbors whose home would be impacted by the additional massing at the third floor allowed by the variance. The Project abuts the side of the three-story structure at 14-16 Castle Street ("Castle Street"). The proposed new third floor would extend to within 4.5 feet of the existing third floor of Castle Street. The failure to require a 15-foot rear setback for the Project which is required of every other project in the district will adversely impact light and air flow to Castle Street.
- 123. A number of other neighbors wrote to the Board, stating that the Project variance would be injurious to their homes. One resident of Montague Place—a small street to the immediate north of the Site—explained that the Project "would effectively block all direct sunlight into [her] narrow apartment." She further explained that her

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"husband works in this front room every day and depends on this light and air for his well-being." No fewer than sixteen such letters were sent to the Board in opposition to the Project variance.

- The injuries that the Project variance will inflict on neighboring properties 124. thus consist of both tangible economic losses (i.e., property value reductions) and "quality of life" impacts, affecting people's access to light and air. The ZA's description of impacts to neighboring properties as "negligible" demonstrates that the City did not adequately consider the full range and significance of these impacts.
- 125. These impacts are particularly pronounced here because the existing structure was already non-conforming with respect to setbacks. Neighbors of encroaching structures often already suffer negative impacts (e.g., with respect to light, air circulation, and views). These impacts are especially likely to become injurious to neighboring properties when such encroaching structures are permitted to expand further in a non-Code compliant manner.
- The Proposed Expansion Would Not Be in Keeping with Existing Housing E. and Neighborhood Character.
- The fifth requirement is that "[t]he granting of such variance will be in 126. harmony with the general purpose and intent of this Code and will not adversely affect the General Plan." The ZA found in this regard that:
  - A. This development is consistent with the generally stated intent and purpose of the Planning Code to promote orderly and beneficial development. Planning Code Section 101.1 establishes eight priorityplanning policies and requires review of variance applications for consistency with said policies. The project meets all relevant policies, including conserving neighborhood character, and maintaining housing stock.

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- 2. The proposed project will be in keeping with the existing housing and neighborhood character. The proposal will preserve the existing singlefamily dwelling unit on the property.
- The proposed project will have no effect on the City's preparedness to protect against injury and loss of life from an earthquake.
- 7. The project will have no effect on the City's landmarks or historic buildings.
- 127. The proposed project is not consistent with the second Priority Policy— "that existing housing and neighborhood character be conserved and protected" (Planning Code § 101.1(b)(2).) As stated by architectural conservator Jacqui Hogans:

The existing massing of 312 Green Street is in line with the historic urban context of the Telegraph Hill area. . . . Its two-story design fits in with the surrounding buildings — is appropriate for the area . . . . [The existing building is typical of the scale of residences constructed in the area after the 1906 earthquake and fires . . . If the proposed alteration is to take place, which includes the addition of two floors, then the block's original character will be obliterated.

- 128. The mere fact that the subject property is not eligible for official listing as a historic resource does not detract from its contribution to the massing patterns on this block of Green Street, located in close proximity to the Telegraph Hill Historic District. The architectural attributes of a neighborhood indisputably play a large role in defining a neighborhood's character. Adding two stories to the existing 1907, two-story structure would eliminate one of the few remaining structures in the vicinity that retains the size and scale representative of the post-1906 reconstruction era. The loss of such a unique structure would necessarily have a deleterious effect on neighborhood character.
- 129. Additionally, the Project would not be consistent with existing housing and neighborhood character due to its excessive size and density. As explained above, the Project will be the fourth largest dwelling unit of the 407 dwelling units identified in the survey of contiguous RM-1 zoned parcels. Moreover, the average FAR (i.e., density) for

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parcels developed with single-family dwellings in the survey area was 1.33. The Project's FAR is 2.40, showing how much more densely developed this parcel would be as compared to neighboring parcels. Even a Code-compliant Project, with a FAR of 2.22, would remain the densest single-family structure in the neighborhood.

- 130. The average FAR of all developed parcels in the survey area is 2.09. This figure is noteworthy because all but seven of the parcels surveyed contain multifamily housing. So the Project—a single family dwelling—will substantially exceed the density of even multifamily housing in the neighborhood. The Project's excessive density is due in part to the fact that the Project variance authorized Real Parties to retain the entirety of the existing two floors, which occupy the whole lot and are thus non-conforming, while simultaneously reducing the rear-yard setback for the new third and fourth floors.
- Given that "overall density of units [is supposed to] remain[] low" in the applicable zoning district (Planning Code § 209.2.), the ZA's finding that the Project is consistent with "existing housing and neighborhood character" is not supported by substantial evidence.
- 132. Finally, the Project does not provide the necessary seismic separation between the proposed addition and adjacent structures, which could result in damage to adjacent structures during an earthquake. This negates the ZA's finding that the proposed project will have no effect on protection against injury and loss of life resulting from an earthquake.

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## PRAYER

WHEREFORE, Petitioners pray for judgment and relief as hereinafter set forth.

- 1. That this Court issue a peremptory writ of mandate:
  - a. Commanding the City to rescind, void, and set aside the Department's CEQA exemption determination for the Project, and all decisions upholding that determination, and instead require the Department to perform an initial study of environmental impacts to ascertain the proper scope of environmental review for the Project; and
  - b. Commanding the City to rescind, void, and set aside its decision approving and upholding the Project variance;
- 2. For costs of suit herein;
- For reasonable attorneys' fees under Code of Civil Procedure section
   and Government Code section 800;
  - 4. For such other relief as the Court deems just and proper.

## I. Background and Policy Context

This report is a summary of licenses, permits, fines and service charges as submitted with each department's annual budget proposal, organized alphabetically by department. These data are a compilation of departmental budget submissions and represent each department's estimate of fee revenue and related cost recovery.

#### MASTER FEE SCHEDULE DEVELOPMENT

Departments submitted their proposed budgets to the Controller's Office on February 23, 2015. These submissions were to include Budget Form 2b, Department Schedule of Licenses, Permits, Fines & Service Charges. The goal was to ensure that the Controller could compile and forward a list of departmental fee submissions to policymakers and other interested stakeholders informing them of fee levels and related levels of cost recovery.

While most departments submitted the budget forms as requested, some departments have no fees and are noted as such. Additionally, some departments have particularly complex fee schedules that make it more difficult to summarize their data into Budget Form 2b. In these cases, additional attachments are provided. Some departments were only required to provide budget information for Fiscal Year 2015-16, and thus did not provide information on fees for Fiscal Year 2016-17.

## BACKGROUND ON FEES, CHARGES & RATES FOR CALIFORNIA MUNICIPALITIES<sup>1</sup>

State and local governments impose regulatory fees on businesses and individuals to pay for the cost of public programs or projects necessary to regulate activity of the business or person. Before Proposition 26 passed on November 2, 2010, cities had the general authority to impose fees, sometimes called charges or rates, under the police power as defined by Article XI, Section 7, and under the public works power as defined in Article XI, Section 9 of the California Constitution.

Proposition 26 added a new definition of "tax" into the California Constitution (California Constitution, Article XIIIC, Sec. 1 (e) providing that any government imposed charge, levy or exaction of any kind is a tax that is subject to requirements for voter approval and constitutional limitations unless it falls under one of seven exemptions. Fees adopted prior to November 2, 2010, are not subject to the measure until they are increased or extended and it is determined that none of the exemptions applies.

The categories of charges exempt from Proposition 26 are:

1. A charge imposed for a specific benefit conferred or privilege granted directly to the payer that is not provided to those not charged, and which does not exceed the reasonable costs to the local government of conferring the benefit or granting the

privilege.

- 2. A charge imposed for a specific government service or product provided directly to the payer that is not provided to those not charged, and which does not exceed the reasonable costs to the local government of providing the service or product.
- 3. A charge imposed for the reasonable regulatory costs to a local government for issuing licenses and permits, performing investigations, inspections and audits, enforcing agricultural marketing orders, and the administrative enforcement and adjudication thereof.
- 4. A charge imposed for entrance to or use of local government property or the purchase rental or lease of local government property.
- 5. A fine, penalty, or other monetary charge imposed by the judicial branch of government or a local government as a result of a violation of law.
- 6. A charge imposed as a condition of property development.
- 7. Assessments and property-related fees imposed in accordance with the provisions of Article XIII D, established by Proposition 218, which defined a subset of user fees called property-related fees imposed to fund a property-related service. Specific substantive restrictions and procedures in state statutes and in the California Constitution must be followed to impose such fees.

## III. Eligible Costs in Setting Fees

Fee levels should be set to recover the full cost of service and therefore should reflect both direct and indirect expenses. Indirect costs are those costs incurred for a common or joint purpose, benefiting more than one program in a department, and are not directly assignable to a particular program without efforts disproportionate to the level of cost allocation achieved. Indirect costs should include both (1) the overhead costs for the unit performing the function related to the fee and (2) the costs of central government services distributed through the cost allocation plan (COWCAP) and not otherwise treated as a direct cost. Examples of costs typically treated as indirect are: utilities, rent, administrative staff, and equipment rental.

Direct costs are those for activities or services that benefit specific projects, e.g., salaries for project staff and materials required for a particular project. Bank charges and other costs of processing payments including credit card processing fees online and over the counter are considered eligible costs and should be included as costs in setting fee levels. In many cases departments also have the option of assessing a service fee to cover the cost of in-person and on-line card payment transactions.

<u>CPI Indexing</u>: The City Controller will annually adjust the fee amounts on this fee schedule by the two-year average consumer price index (CPI) change for the San Francisco/San Jose Primary Metropolitan Statistical Area (PMSA). #### SCHEDULE W-44: Service Fees

#### 48-HOUR NOTICE

Prior to shutting-off water service for non-payment, the General Manager posts notice on the customer's premises. A charge of \$50.00 will be added to the amount owed for water service to cover the cost of this notice.

A shut-off of water service during normal business hours (eight a.m. to four-thirty p.m. daily except Saturday, Sunday and holidays) will be assessed a service charge of \$50.00. A shut-off or turn-on at times other than normal business hours will be assessed a charge of \$55.00.

#### SERVICE TURN-ON

\$50.00

A service turn-on during normal business hours (eight a.m. to four-thirty p.m. daily except Saturday, Sunday and holidays) will be assessed a service charge of \$50.00. A shut-off or turn-on at times other than normal business hours will be assessed a charge of \$55.00.

LOCK CHARGE \$14.00

Any customer whose service is shut-off for non-payment may also be charged for the cost of a meter lock installed in accordance with the Water Enterprise regulations.

#### METER TEST

Any customer who requests to test the accuracy of their water meter will be assessed \$100 for the Arst test and a \$325 charge for any subsequent test within a 24-month period. If the meter is found to register more than the limit of error speciAed in the "Rules and Regulations Governing Water Service to Customers," the testing fee will be returned.

#### LIEN FEE

Any account with an outstanding balance of greater than \$50.00 and which is delinquent by more than one billing cycle may be recorded as a lien against the property. Any account recorded as a lien against the property will be assessed a lien fee as provided in the Administrative Code of the City and County of San Francisco.

#### BUILDERS & CONTRACTORS CONNECTION FEE

\$113.00

Builder and Contractor customers that connect to the system will be assessed a Builders and Contractors connection charge of \$113 to cover the administrative costs for connecting a meter.

#### DOCKS & SHIPPING CONNECTION FEE

\$231.00

Docks and Shipping customers that connect to the system will be assessed a Docks & Shipping connection charge to cover the administrative costs for setting up a billing account and Àeld work to provide connecting equipment.

## METER RENTAL DEPOSIT

Builder and Contractor customers that connect to the system, in addition to payment of a Builders and Contractors connection fee, shall also pay a meter deposit of \$800 for a 1" meter and \$2,700 for a 3" meter. This deposit is refundable when the account is closed.

#### NO-REPORTING PENALTY FEE

Builder and Contractor customers that do not bring the rented meter in for reading and testing according to the meter reading schedule, will be assessed a penalty fee equivalent to 25 units (Ccf) of water at the effective W-5 water rate per every delinquent month.

## MANUAL METER-READING FEE

\$5.00

Any customer who has opted out of automatic meter reads will be assessed a manual meter-reading charge of \$5.00 per month to cover the cost of manual meter reading.

## FOR SCHEDULES W-40 THROUGH W-44:

The General Manager may each year adjust the fees and charges in schedules W40 through W44, without further action by the Commission, to refect changes in the relevant Consumer Price Index. ## SCHEDULE R-M: Medical Necessity Assistance Program

#### General

Available to residential customers served by the SFPUC Power Enterprise. Under the Medical Necessity Assistance Program, the number of kilowatt-hours (kWh) of electricity billed in the initial step of the residential customer's applicable rate may be increased. To qualify for this program, the residential customer must have a full-time resident in the customer's home who has a medical disability. The Medical Necessity Use Allowance for eligible residential customers in each step of the applicable rate will be increased by seventy-Àve percent.

#### Eligibility:

To qualify for the Medical Necessity Assistance Program, a customer must submit an application and certify in writing that a full-time resident in the customer's home is:

 Dependent on electrically powered life-support device(s) plugged into the home electric system such as an aerosol tent, pressure pad, apnea monitor, pressure pump, compressor, respirator (all types), electronic nerve stimulator, suction machine, ultrasound nebulizer, electrostatic nebulizer, inhalation pulmonary pressure breather machine (IPPB) iron lung, dialysis machine, hemodialysis machine, motorized wheelchair, or oxygen generator to sustain the life of the patient/ person or to prevent deterioration of the patient/ person's medical condition; or

 A paraplegic, hemiplegic, or quadriplegic, multiple sclerosis patient, neuromuscular patient, scleroderma patient, or person with a compromised immune system being treated for a life-threatening illness that requires special electrically powered heating and/ or cooling to sustain the life of the patient/ person or to prevent deterioration of the patient/ person's medical condition.

Application for the Medical Necessity Assistance Program must include certiÀcation by a physician and surgeon licensed in the State of California, or by a person licensed by the State of California in accordance with the Osteopathic Initiative Act, that the person named in the application qualiÀes for the Medical Necessity Assistance Program.

#### RecertiÀcation:

Unless a permanent disability is demonstrated, application for the Medical Necessity Assistance Program must be submitted annually, in accordance with the rules and procedures provided by the General Manager of the SFPUC.

**Ethics Regulation Takes Effect** 

The Ethics Commission referred to the Board of Supervisors (Board), the following amendment to a regulation that was approved /adopted at the Ethics Commission's February 23, 2015 meeting:

Amendment to SFEC Regulation section 1.142-2(c) – to require candidates
participating in the City's public financing program to file eligibility
information with the Commission "electronically in a manner to be
designated by the Commission."

Under San Francisco Charter section 15.102, the Board had 60 days after adoption, to hold a hearing for the purpose of vetoing this regulation. The deadline was April 24, 2015, no hearing was requested, we, therefore understand that the regulation took effect April 25, 2015.
