3	Ordinance amending the Administrative Code to require the Police Department and the
4	Sheriff's Department to gather and regularly report data regarding detentions and
5	traffic stops.

10	Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco:
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12	Section 1. Findings.
13	1. The policies of the San Francisco Police Department and the San Francisco
14	Sheriff's Department prohibit the use, to any extent or degree, of race, color, ethnicity,
15	national origin, gender, age, sexual orientation, or gender identity in determining whether to
16	initiate any law enforcement action in the absence of a specific suspect description.
17	2. The Board affirms the importance of eliminating bias from law enforcement
18	practices.
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20	Section 42. The Administrative Code is hereby amended by adding Chapter 96A,
21	consisting of Sections 96A.1, 96A.2, 96A.3, 96A.4, 96A.5, and 96A.6, to read as follows:
22	CHAPTER 96A: LAW ENFORCEMENT REPORTING REQUIREMENTS
23	SEC. 96A.1. Definitions.
24	SEC. 96A.2. Data Collection.
25	SEC. 96A.3. Quarterly Analysis and Reporting.

1	SEC. 96A.4. Undertaking for the General Welfare.
2	SEC. 96A.5. No Conflict With Federal or State Law.
3	SEC. 96A.6. Severability.
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5	SEC. 96A.1. DEFINITIONS.
6	For purposes of this Chapter 96A:
7	"Detention" means an interaction between an Officer and an individual in which the Officer
8	detains the individual based on reasonable suspicion that the individual has engaged in
9	criminal activityconducted under the authority of Terry v. Ohio, 392 U.S. 1 (1968).
10	"Encounter" means Detention or Traffic Stop.
11	"Gender Identity" means an individual's actual or perceived gender identity, or gender-
12	related characteristics intrinsically related to an individual's gender or gender-identity,
13	regardless of the individual's assigned sex at birth.
14	"Location" means the address where the Encounter occurred, or the closest address or
15	intersection thereto.
16	"Officer" means a peace officer as defined by Section 830 of the Penal Code, employed by the
17	Police Department or Sheriff's Department.
18	"Traffic Stop" means an interaction between an Officer and an individual driving a vehicle, in
19	which the Officer orders the individual to stop the vehicle.
20	"Use of Force" means (a) for purposes of the Police Department, an Officer's use of force
21	on an individual that is required to be reported by the respective departmental policies of the
22	Police Department and the Sheriff's Department department policy, and (b) for purposes of the
23	Sheriff's Department, an Officer's use of force on an individual that results in a known injury.
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1	SEC. 96A.2. DATA COLLECTION.
2	(a) When an Officer conducts an Encounter, the Officer shall collect and record the following
3	information:
4	(1) The date, time, and Location of the Encounter;
5	(2) The statutory or code provision(s) that the Officer believes the individual subject to
6	the Encounter violated;
7	(3) If the Officer conducted a search during the Encounter, the type of search (e.g., pat
8	search, vehicle search, full body search);
9	(4) The outcome of the Encounter (e.g., warning, citation, arrest, release with no
10	further action or admonishment);
11	(5) The perceived age, race or ethnicity, sex, and gender identity approximate age
12	of (A) all individuals subject to the Detention, or (B) all individuals in the driver of a vehicle stopped
13	during a Traffic Stop, and/or (C) the passengers of a vehicle stopped during a Traffic Stop, if
14	the Officer has a lawful reason to identify such passengers. The identification of these
15	characteristics shall be based on the observation and perception of the Officer, and the
16	information shall not be requested from the individual stopped The Officer may collect
17	information on age and sex by verbally asking the individual or by requesting to see
18	identification. The Officer may collect information on race based on observation or by verbally
19	asking the individual. The Officer shall verbally request that each individual disclose gender
20	identity. If the individual refuses to provide any or all of the information sought pursuant to this
21	subsection (a)(5), the Officer will note that the individual refused the request;
22	(6) The name and star number of each Officer who participated in the Encounter;
23	(7) For Encounters conducted by officers employed by the Police Department, the
24	officer shall record the police district to which the officer is assigned, if any.

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1	(b) If two or more Officers conduct an Encounter, the information required by subsection (a)
2	need be recorded by only one of the Officers.
3	(c) The Officer shall promptly report the information recorded pursuant to subsection (a) to the
4	Officer's employing agency in the manner specified by the agency. To the extent not already in place,
5	the Police Department and the Sheriff's Department shall create systems for collecting and storing the
6	information reported by Officers pursuant to this Section 96A.2.
7	(d) The Police Department and the Sheriff's Department shall retain the information reported
8	by Officers pursuant to this Section 96A.2 for a minimum of two years after the fiscal year in which the
9	Officer reported it.
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11	SEC. 96A.3. QUARTERLY ANALYSIS AND REPORTING.
12	On a quarterly basis (the first Tuesday in February, May, August, and November), the Police
13	Department and the Sheriff's Department respectively shall send a written report to the Mayor, and the
14	Board of Supervisors, the Police Commission, and the Human Rights Commission, covering the
15	previous quarter (quarters commencing January 1, April 1, July 1, and October 1). The Police
16	Department shall also send the report to the Police Commission. The first reports shall be due
17	on May 3, 2016, and shall include the data required by this Section 96A.3 for arrests and Use
18	of Force only. Beginning in May 2017, the reports shall fully comply with the requirements of
19	this Section. The reports shall contain the following information for the reporting period:
20	(a) For Detentions:
21	(1) The total number;
22	(2) The total number broken down by race or ethnicity and sex;
23	(3) The total number of searches performed broken down by race or ethnicity and sex;
24	(4) The total number of each type of search performed;

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1	(5) For each type of search performed, the total number broken down by race or
2	ethnicity and sex; and
3	(6) The total number of each type of outcome, and the total number for each outcome
4	broken down by race or ethnicity and sex; and
5	(7) The total number of Detentions where the reported sex differs from the
6	reported gender identity;
7	(b) For Traffic Stops:
8	(1) The total number;
9	(2) The total number broken down by race or ethnicity and sex;
10	(3) The total number of searches performed broken down by race or ethnicity and sex
11	(4) The total number of each type of search performed;
12	(5) For each type of search performed, the total number broken down by race or
13	ethnicity and sex; and
14	(6) The total number of each type of outcome, and the total number for each outcome
15	broken down by race or ethnicity and sex; and
16	(7) The total number of Traffic Stops where the reported sex differs from the
17	reported gender identity;
18	(c) For Use of Force:
19	(1) The total number of Uses of Force; and
20	(2) The total number of Uses of Force that resulted in death to the person on
21	whom an Officer used force; and
22	(2)(3) The total number of Uses of Force broken down by racial group race or
23	ethnicity and sex:
24	(d) For arrests:
25	(1) The total number; and

1	(2) The total number broken down by race or ethnicity and sex;
2	(d)(e) For purposes of reporting the types of suspected violations that led to the
3	<u>Detentions</u> , and <u>Traffic Stops</u> , and arrests, the department shall develop categories of violations (e.g.,
4	for Detentions and arrests: violent crimes, property crimes, drug crimes, etc.; e.g., for Traffic Stops:
5	moving violations, equipment violations, stops based on suspicion of other criminal conduct, etc.),
6	explaining in the report which violations fall into each category, and shall report the number of
7	<u>Detentions</u> , and <u>Traffic Stops</u> , and arrests for each category. The department shall also report the
8	total number of each category of violation broken down by race or ethnicity and sex.
9	(e)(f) For purposes of Use of Force reporting, the report shall include data for each time a Use
10	of Force occurred during the reporting period, and shall not be limited to Use of Force during a Traffic
11	Stop or Detention.
12	(g) The Police Department shall obtain from the Office of Citizen Complaints ("OCC")
13	and include in its report the total number of complaints for the reporting period received by
14	OCC that OCC characterizes as allegations of bias based on race or ethnicity, gender, or
15	Gender Identity. The Police Department shall also obtain from OCC and include in its report
16	the total number of OCC complaints closed during the reporting period that OCC
17	characterizes as allegations of bias based on race or ethnicity, gender, or Gender Identity,
18	and the total number of each type of disposition for such complaints.
19	(h) The reports of the Sheriff's Department may separate data for the department's
20	custody division and the department's field division.
21	(f)(i) The department may include in the report any other information the department concludes
22	will assist in understanding the information required by subsections (a)-(eh) of this Section 96A.3.
23	Where subsections (a)-(ef) require that total numbers be broken down by race or ethnicity or sex, the
24	department shall also calculate and report the applicable percentages for each group.
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## SEC 96A.4. UNDERTAKING FOR THE GENERAL WELFARE.

In enacting and implementing this Chapter 96A, the City is assuming an undertaking only to promote the general welfare. It is not assuming, nor is it imposing on its officers and employees, an obligation for breach of which it is liable in money damages to any person who claims that such breach proximately caused injury.

## SEC. 96A.5. NO CONFLICT WITH FEDERAL OR STATE LAW.

(a) Nothing in this Chapter 96A shall be interpreted or applied so as to create any requirement, power, or duty in conflict with any federal or state law.

(b) No provision of this Chapter 96A is intended to abrogate or interfere with the constitutional and statutory power and duties of the Sheriff as interpreted under Government Code section 25303, or other applicable State law or judicial decision.

## SEC. 96A.6. SEVERABILITY.

If any section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase, or word of this Chapter 96A, or any application thereof to any person or circumstance, is held to be invalid or unconstitutional by a decision of a court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions or applications of the Article. The Board of Supervisors hereby declares that it would have passed this Chapter and each and every section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase, and word not declared invalid or unconstitutional without regard to whether any other portion of this Chapter or application thereof would be subsequently declared invalid or unconstitutional.

Section 23. Effective Date and Operative Date. This ordinance shall become effective 30 days after enactment. But the provisions of this ordinance shall become operative January 1, 2016, except as to Section 96A.2, which shall become operative on January 1, 2017.

1	Enactment occurs when the Mayor signs the ordinance, the Mayor returns the ordinance
2	unsigned or does not sign the ordinance within ten days of receiving it, or the Board of
3	Supervisors overrides the Mayor's veto of the ordinance.
