[Emergency Contract - Kone, Inc. - Elevator Renovation and Upgrade - 170 Otis Street - Not to Exceed \$460,100]

Resolution approving an emergency public work contract under Administrative Code, Section 6.60, with Kone, Inc., to renovate and upgrade the elevators at 170 Otis Street in an amount not to exceed \$460,100.

WHEREAS, The poor operating condition of the three elevators at 170 Otis Street, a public building occupied by the Human Services Agency (HSA) pose a risk to the health and safety of the public and to employees, with doors closing on people attempting to exiting the elevator cab and stranding people inside the elevator for up to two and a half hours; and

WHEREAS, On April 7, 2014, HSA staff requested elevator condition assessments and proposals from three elevator firms, received two proposals, and determined that KONE, Inc. was the most qualified to perform the work; and

WHEREAS, On April 22, 2014, HSA issues a purchase order to KONE, Inc.'s based on its proposal; and

WHEREAS, In November 2014 the renovation and upgrades required to repair the elevators at 170 Otis was determined to be a public works contract; and

WHEREAS, The Director of San Francisco Public Works declared an emergency on December 5, 2014, affirming and recognizing that the poor condition of the elevators at 170 Otis Street jeopardizes the health, safety and property of the Citizens of the City and County of San Francisco; the Emergency Order and Award is on file with the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors in File No. 150718, which is hereby declared to be a part of this resolution as if set forth fully herein; and

WHEREAS, Administrative Code, Section 6.60, authorizes department heads responsible for public work to award an emergency contract, exempt from the competitive

bidding process, in the event of an actual emergency which includes the "breakdown or imminent breakdown of any plant, equipment, structure, street or public work necessitating immediate emergency repair or reconditioning to safeguard the lives or property of the citizens; or the property of the City and County; or to maintain the public health or welfare;" and

WHEREAS, Administrative Code, Section 6.60(D), requires that the Board of Supervisors approve emergency work with an estimated cost in excess of \$250,000; and

WHEREAS, The cost to reconstruct the elevators at 170 Otis Street hillside is \$460,100; and

WHEREAS, Public Works has executed a contract valued at \$460,100 with Kone, Inc. for the reconstruction of the elevators at 170 Otis Street; and

WHEREAS, The Controller has certified that funds are available for this emergency contract; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors approves and authorizes the Director of San Francisco Public Works to proceed with all work necessary to renovate the elevators at 170 Otis Street for a contract amount not to exceed \$460,100; and, be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, That within thirty (30) days of the contract being fully executed by all parties, Public Works shall provide the final contract to the Clerk of the Board for inclusion into the official file.

#### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

#### **Legislative Objectives**

The proposed resolution would approve an emergency public works contract between the City and County of San Francisco and KONE, Inc. to renovate and upgrade the three elevators at 170 Otis Street in an amount not-to-exceed \$460,100.

#### **Key Points**

- Three elevators at the Human Services Agency's (HSA) facility at 170 Otis Street were originally installed in 1976 and have experienced intermittent failures since 2014, with worn cables, doors and interior compartments, resulting in hazardous conditions with doors closing on passengers, and passengers being trapped in the elevators.
- In December 2014, the Department of Public Works declared the elevator an emergency and awarded an emergency construction contract to KONE for \$460,160 to renovate and upgrade the three elevators. In January 2015, KONE commenced work to renovate and upgrade the elevators, which is anticipated to be complete in November 2015.

#### Fiscal Impact

• The estimated cost to renovate and upgrade the three elevators at 170 Otis Street is \$460,160. Of this amount, HSA previously paid \$207,550 to KONE to commence work in FY 2014-15. The remaining amount of \$252,610 was encumbered by HSA in FY 2014-15 and will be paid by Public Works through a work order with HSA. Such funds were previously appropriated by the Board of Supervisors.

### **Policy Consideration**

On June 23, 2015, the Board of Supervisors approved Ordinance No. 108-15 stating that if
the estimated cost of the emergency exceeds \$250,000, the proposed resolution
approving the emergency determination must be submitted to the Board of Supervisors
within 60 days of the department head's emergency declaration. This resolution was
submitted 218 days after Public Works made its emergency declaration.

#### Recommendations

- Amend the proposed resolution to correctly state that the contract not-to-exceed amount is \$460,160, not \$460,100.
- Approve the proposed resolution as amended.

### **MANDATE STATEMENT**

Administrative Code Section 6.60(d) states that contracts entered into for emergency work in the amount of \$250,000 or more are subject to Board of Supervisors approval. Section 6.60(d) also states that if the emergency does not permit approvals of the emergency determination before work is commenced or the contracts entered into, such approvals shall be obtained as soon as possible, with the proposed resolution approving the emergency determination submitted to the Board of Supervisors within 60 days of the department head's emergency declaration.

#### **BACKGROUND**

The City and County of San Francisco owns the facility at 170 Otis Street, which houses the County's Human Services Agency (HSA). Three elevators at 170 Otis Street were originally installed in 1976 and have experienced intermittent failures since 2014, with worn cables, doors and interior compartments, resulting in hazardous conditions with doors closing on passengers, and passengers being trapped in the elevators.

HSA declared an emergency regarding the conditions of the elevators on March 27, 2014 and HSA staff requested elevator condition assessments and proposals to renovate and upgrade the three elevators, from three elevator firms including ThyssenKrupp, Empire Elevator Company, Inc., and KONE, Inc. They received two proposals and determined that KONE, Inc<sup>1</sup>. (KONE) was the most qualified respondent. The KONE proposal estimate was \$415,099, and provided a scope of work including, but not limited to:

- 1) New elevator door operating equipment:
- 2) Fire-rated elevator doors at all openings;
- 3) Digital position indicators;
- 4) Renovated elevator cab interiors;
- 5) Inspection and testing of completed work.

HSA signed a contract with KONE on April 2, 2014 and subsequently paid KONE \$207,550 (50 percent of the total \$415,099) to purchase equipment and materials and begin performing the modifications according to KONE's proposal. On May 2, 2014, HSA introduced a resolution (File #14-0473) to the Board of Supervisors seeking approval of the emergency contract with KONE. However, the San Francisco City Attorney's Office determined that HSA did not have authority to issue public works contracts, pursuant to Administrative Code Section 6.2, and that such services must be procured through the Department of Public Works (Public Works).

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>1</sup> The proposal was submitted by Empire Elevator Company, but was soon after legally acquired by KONE.

In December 2014, Public Works declared that renovating and upgrading the elevators was an emergency, under the provisions of Section 6.60 of the Administrative Code and awarded an emergency construction contract to KONE for \$460,160<sup>2</sup> to renovate and upgrade the three elevators.

In January 2015, KONE commenced work to renovate and upgrade the elevators under the scope of work provided in the contract with HSA. According to Mr. Sung Kim, Analyst at Public Works, the project is currently estimated to be completed in November 2015.

#### **DETAILS OF PROPOSED LEGISLATION**

The proposed resolution would approve an emergency public works contract between the City and County of San Francisco and KONE, Inc. to renovate and upgrade the three elevators at 170 Otis Street in an amount not-to-exceed \$460,100. The contract specifies that KONE has been paid \$207,550 and that the City agrees to pay the remaining \$252,610 to KONE upon completion of the renovation and upgrade of the elevators.

The proposed resolution incorrectly states that the contract not-to-exceed amount is \$460,100, whereas the actual contract not-to-exceed amount is \$460,160, an increase of \$60. The proposed resolution should be amended to provide for the correct not-to-exceed amount of \$460,160.

### FISCAL IMPACT

The estimated cost to renovate and upgrade the three elevators at 170 Otis Street is \$460,160. Of this amount, HSA previously paid \$207,550 to KONE to commence work in FY 2014-15, as noted above. The remaining amount of \$252,610 was encumbered by HSA in FY 2014-15 and will be paid by Public Works through a work order with HSA. Such funds were previously appropriated by the Board of Supervisors. The total estimated cost of \$460,160 to renovate and upgrade the elevators is shown in Table 1 below.

#### **POLICY CONSIDERATIONS**

On June 23, 2015, the Board of Supervisors approved an ordinance (File 15-0175; Ordinance No. 108-15) amending Chapter 6 of the City's Administrative Code, including Section 6.60 regarding emergency repairs, work and contracts, which became effective on August 1, 2015. Under the new provisions, the department head responsible for addressing the emergency may declare an emergency with immediate notice to the Board of Supervisors, the Mayor, Controller and board or commission having jurisdiction over the emergency. In addition, if the estimated cost of the emergency exceeds \$250,000, the proposed resolution approving the emergency determination must be submitted to the Board of Supervisors within 60 days of the department head's emergency declaration.

HSA initially requested authorization to commence with emergency repairs to the elevators in May 2014, or 36 days after the emergency was declared by HSA. However, the current proposed resolution seeking such authorization was introduced to the Board of Supervisors on July 14, 2015, approximately 438 days after the initial determination by HSA that the elevators required emergency repair, and 218 days after Public Works assumed responsibility for the project and made its declaration of emergency.

The intent of seeking authorization from the Board of Supervisors within 60 days of the department head's emergency declaration is so that the Board of Supervisors may review the emergency nature of the contracts shortly after the emergency is declared. Such a significant delay between the emergency declaration and the approval from the Board of Supervisors denies the Board of Supervisors its authority to approve such contracts on a timely basis. Given

the work to repair the elevators has commenced and is expected to be completed in November, 2015, the Board of Supervisors should approve the proposed resolution. In the future, departments requesting approval of emergency contracts should submit such resolutions within 60 days to the Board of Supervisors as required in Section 6.60 of the Administrative Code.

### **RECOMMENDATIONS**

- 1. Amend the proposed resolution to correctly state that the contract not-to-exceed amount is \$460,160, not \$460,100.
- 2. Approve the proposed resolution as amended.

#### EMERGENCY DECLARED AND CONTRACT AWARDED

An Emergency exists as a result of service failures of three elevators at the Human Services Agency building located at 170 Otis Street. Such failures have been occurring for over a year, and the most recent incidents, during the week of November 24, 2014, resulted in members of the public as well as Human Services Agency staff being trapped for upwards of two and a half hours and necessitating rescues by the San Francisco Fire Department. In addition, the elevator doors on each floor suffer untimely operating patterns that close on patrons improperly, and the elevator cables have been found to be worn significantly past their useful lives. These conditions constitute an emergency involving the health, safety and property of the citizens of the City and County of San Francisco.

In advance of these dangerous and unsafe conditions the Human Services Agency Facilities staff had repeatedly attempted to have the existing maintenance contractors remedy these problems. But due to some large repair items that qualified as capital projects (thereby disqualifying maintenance contractors from providing equipment and services) coupled with the rapid decline of the aging equipment, the situation grew worse requiring immediate action by the HSA facilities staff.

On April 7, 2014, the HSA staff commenced requesting elevator condition assessments and proposals from three elevator firms, one of which was the current maintenance contractor. They received two proposals and determined that one of the firms was the most qualified, KONE, Inc. At the same time the Human Services Commission issued an emergency declaration letter to the HSA Director on March 27, 2014. In April, 2014 HSA staff proceeded to issue a purchase order for the long-lead-time parts and equipment required to affect the modifications and upgrades to current code according to KONE Inc.'s proposal.

In order to move forward with the repairs, an Emergency is declared to exist under the provisions of Section 6.60 of the San Francisco Administrative Code, and

is hereby awarded a contract to provide the installation and overhaul work for the three elevators at 170 Otis Street at a cost, when combined with the previously procured equipment will exceed \$250,000, and which will be solidified at a later date.

Contractor shall indemnify and hold harmless the City & County of San Francisco, its officers, agents and employees and furnish certificates of insurance protecting themselves, any subcontractors and the City & County of San Francisco and its officers, agents and employees against claims arising out of work performed pursuant to this order with the City & County of San Francisco, its officers, agents and employees named as additional insureds. Contractor shall deliver certified copies of the certificates of insurance within three working days of this order.

Commercial General Liability Insurance with limits not less than \$1,000,000 each occurrence Combined Single Limit for Bodily Injury and Property Damage.

Business Automobile Liability Insurance with not less than \$1,000,000 each occurrence Combined Single Limit for Bodily Injury and Property Damage.

Workers' Compensation, with Employers' Liability limits not less than \$1,000,000 each accident.

This Order will consitute the Notice To Proceed.

WHEREAS, the DIRECTOR awarded this AGREEMENT to CONTRACTOR on the 5<sup>th</sup> day of December, 2014, under AWARD OF EMERGENCY CONSTRUCTION CONTRACT ORDER NO. 183,176, as more fully appears in the formal record of the DIRECTOR:

#### DPW ID No. ECA16017 Emergency Elevator Repair at 170 Otis Street

NOW, THEREFORE, CONTRACTOR, in consideration of the mutual covenants set forth in this AGREEMENT, promises and agrees to provide all services to construct the Project in accordance with the requirements of the Contract Documents, to perform the Work in good and workmanlike manner to the satisfaction of the DIRECTOR, to prosecute the Work with diligence from day to day to Final Completion, to furnish all construction work, labor and materials to be used in the execution and completion of the Work in accordance with the Contract Documents, and to otherwise fulfill all of CONTRACTOR's obligations under the Contract Documents, as and when required under the Contract Documents to the satisfaction of the DIRECTOR.

CONTRACTOR's execution of this AGREEMENT signifies its acceptance of the Contract Time and Contract Sum as being sufficient for completion of the Work, as well as acceptance of the other terms and conditions of the Contract Documents.

#### **ARTICLE 1 - WORK**

- 1.01 Contract Documents. CONTRACTOR shall provide all Work according to the Contract Documents, which are incorporated into and made a part of this AGREEMENT by this reference, and all labor and materials used in providing the Work shall comply with the Contract Documents. The Contract Documents, which comprise the entire agreement between CONTRACTOR and the CITY concerning the Provision of the Work.
- 1.02 Contractor's General Responsibilities. CONTRACTOR shall provide a fully functional, complete and operational Project constructed in accordance with the Contract Documents, including but not limited to, all investigations, analyses, surveys, engineering, procurement, materials, labor, workmanship, construction and erection, commissioning, equipment, shipping, subcontractors, material suppliers, permits, insurance, bonds, fees, taxes, duties, documentation, spare parts, materials for initial operation, security, disposal, startup, testing, training, warranties, guarantees, and all incidentals.

#### 1.03 Compliance with Laws.

A. CONTRACTOR shall keep itself fully informed of and comply with the Charter, ordinances and regulations of the CITY and other local agencies having jurisdiction over the Work, and all federal and state laws and regulations in any manner affecting the Contract Documents, the performance of the Work.

- B. All construction and materials provided under the Contract Documents shall be in full accordance with the latest laws and requirements, or the same as may be amended, updated or supplemented from time to time, of the Code specified in the Contract Documents, Americans with Disability Act Accessibility Guidelines, CAL-OSHA, the State Division of Industrial Safety of the Department of Industrial Relations, the Division of the State Architect Access Compliance, the Public Utilities Commission of the State of California, the State Fire Marshal, the National Fire Protection Association, the San Francisco Department of Public Health, state and federal laws and regulations, and of other bodies or officials having jurisdiction or authority over same, and they shall be observed and complied with by CONTRACTOR and any and all persons, firms and corporations employed by or under it.
- C. Authorized persons may at any time enter upon any part of the Work to ascertain whether such laws, ordinances, regulations or orders are being complied with.
- D. No additional costs will be paid or extensions of time granted as a result of such compliance.

#### ARTICLE 2 - CONTRACT TIME

2.01 <u>Completion Dates</u>. The Work shall be Substantially Completed within 330 consecutive calendar days, beginning with and including the official date of Notice to Proceed as established by the DIRECTOR.

#### **ARTICLE 3 - CONTRACT SUM**

#### 3.01 Contract Sum.

A. CONTRACTOR and the CITY agree that, the total value of the Work to repair the three elevators specified in Attachment "A," Scope of Work, which includes labor, materials, and permit fees, is \$460,160.00.

CONTRACTOR and the CITY agree that as of July 22, 2015, CONTRACTOR has been paid to date for \$207,550.00, for purchase of materials and other costs related to the Work.

CONTRACTOR and the CITY agree that, upon performance and fulfillment of the mutual covenants set forth herein, the CITY will, in the manner provided by law and as set forth in the Contract Documents, pay or cause to be paid to CONTRACTOR a lump sum for the remaining value of the Work specified in Attachment "A," Scope of Work, of \$252,610.00.

The price(s) and amount set forth above shall be adjusted during performance or upon final completion of the Work in accordance with the Contract Documents.

- B. CONTRACTOR understands and agrees that the CONTRACTOR shall be solely responsible for providing all resources that may be necessary to provide the Work, and that the CITY shall have no obligation whatsoever to finance any part of such costs except with respect to those amounts which become due under the terms and conditions of the Contract Documents.
- 3.02 <u>Certification by Controller</u>. This AGREEMENT is subject to the budget and fiscal provisions of the CITY's Charter. Charges will accrue only after prior written authorization certified by the Controller, and the amount of the CITY's obligation hereunder shall not at any time exceed the amount certified for the purpose and period stated in such advance authorization.

#### **ARTICLE 4 – LABOR REQUIREMENTS**

- 4.01 <u>Applicable Laws and Agreements.</u> Compensation and working conditions for labor performed or services rendered under this AGREEMENT shall be in accordance with the Contract Documents, the San Francisco Charter, and applicable sections of the San Francisco Administrative Code, including section 6.22(E).
- 4.02 Prevailing Wages. The latest Wage Rates for Private Employment on Public Contracts in the City and County of San Francisco, as determined by the San Francisco Board of Supervisors and the Director of the California Department of Industrial Relations, and, when federal funds are involved, the current General Wage Determination Decisions, as determined by the U.S. Secretary of Labor, as same may be changed during the term of this AGREEMENT, shall be included in this AGREEMENT and are hereby incorporated by this reference. CONTRACTOR agrees that any person performing labor in the provision of the Work shall be paid not less than the highest general prevailing rate of wages as so determined. If federal funds are involved, where the minimum rate of pay for any classification differs among State, City and Federal wage rate determinations, the highest of the three rates of pay shall prevail. CONTRACTOR shall include, in any contract or subcontract relating to the Work, a requirement that all persons performing labor under such contract or subcontract shall be paid not less than the highest prevailing rate of wages for the labor so performed. CONTRACTOR shall require any contractor to provide, and shall deliver to CITY every month during any construction period, certified payroll reports with respect to all persons performing labor in the Provision of the Work.
  - A. Copies of the latest prevailing wage rates are on file at the Department of Public Works, City and County of San Francisco, Project Controls and Services Manager, 1680 Mission Street, 4th Floor, San Francisco, CA, 94103.
- 4.03 <u>Penalties</u>. CONTRACTOR shall forfeit to the CITY back wages due plus fifty dollars (\$50.00) for:
  - A. Each laborer, workman, or mechanic employed in the provision of the Work, for each calendar day or portion thereof during which such laborer, workman, or mechanic is not paid the highest general prevailing rate of wage for the work performed; or
  - B. Each laborer, mechanic or artisan employed in the provision of the Work, for each calendar day or portion thereof during which such laborer, mechanic or artisan is compelled or permitted to work for a longer period than five days (Monday-Friday) per calendar week of eight hours each, and not compensated in accordance with the prevailing overtime standard and rate.

#### **ARTICLE 5 - INDEMNITY**

To the fullest extent permitted by law, and consistent with California Civil Code section 2782, the CONTRACTOR shall assume the defense of, indemnify and hold harmless the CITY, its boards and commissions, other parties designated in the insurance requirements of this AGREEMENT, attached hereto as Attachment "B", and all of their officers, agents, members, employees, authorized representatives, or any other persons deemed necessary by any of them acting within the scope of the duties entrusted to them, from all claims, suits, damages, actions, losses and liabilities of every kind, nature and description, including but not limited to attorney's fees, directly or indirectly arising out of, connected with or resulting from the performance or nonperformance of the Work. The liability of CONTRACTOR shall not be limited to the amount of insurance coverages required under the insurance requirements of this AGREEMENT, attached hereto as Attachment "B". This indemnification shall not be valid in the instance where the loss is caused by the sole negligence or intentional tort of any person indemnified herein.

#### **ARTICLE 6 – RIGHTS AND REMEDIES**

- General. The provisions of the Contract Documents shall not limit the duties, obligations, rights and remedies otherwise imposed or available by law or in equity. No action or failure to act shall in any way abridge the rights and obligations of the Parties to the Contract Documents, or condone a breach thereunder, unless expressly agreed to by the Parties in writing. All remedies provided in the Contract Documents shall be taken and construed as cumulative; that is, in addition to each and every other remedy herein provided, the CITY shall have any and all equitable and legal remedies that it would in any case have.
- 6.02 <u>No Waiver</u>. No waiver of any breach of any provision of the Contract Documents shall be held to be a waiver of any other or subsequent breach. The only waiver by the CITY shall be a waiver in writing that explicitly states the item or right being waived.
- 6.03 <u>CITY's Remedies for False Claims and Other Violations</u>. The Contractor or any Subcontractor or Supplier who violates any provision of Chapter 6 of the Administrative Code or who submits a false claim to the CITY may be subject to monetary penalties under Administrative Code Chapter 6, Article V. The Contractor or any Subcontractor or Supplier who engages in willful misconduct compromising its good faith dealings with the City or other public entities may be declared non-responsible and debarred under Administrative Code Chapter 28.
  - A. CONTRACTOR shall include in each subcontract and purchase order for Work a clause incorporating the provisions of this Paragraph 6.03.

#### ARTICLE 7 - RESOLUTION OF CONFLICTING TERMS

7.01 The Contract Documents and any other agreements between the Parties relating to the Project are intended to be read together and integrated as a whole, and shall be construed and interpreted in a manner so as to avoid any conflicts to the extent possible. Supplementary provisions in the Contract Documents shall not be deemed to be in conflict. It is expressly agreed by and between CONTRACTOR and the CITY that should there be any conflict between the terms of this AGREEMENT and the Bid of CONTRACTOR, then this AGREEMENT shall control and nothing herein shall be considered as an acceptance of any terms of the Bid which conflict with this AGREEMENT.

#### ARTICLE 8 - GOVERNING LAW AND VENUE

- 8.01 Governing Law. The Contract Documents shall be interpreted in accordance with the laws of the State of California and the provisions of the CITY's Charter and Administrative Code, including but not limited to Chapter 6 of the San Francisco Administrative Code, which is incorporated by this reference as if set forth herein in full.
- 8.02 <u>Venue</u>. All Claims, counter-claims, disputes and other matters in question between the CITY and CONTRACTOR arising out of or relating to this AGREEMENT or its breach will be decided by a court of competent jurisdiction within the State of California.

#### **SCOPE OF WORK**

Summary: Furnish the labor and materials to perform the work described below on three (3) traction passenger elevators serving nine landings in line. In all cases where a device is herein referred to in the singular number, it is intended that such reference shall apply to as many such devices as are required to complete the installation.

Location: 170 Otis Street, San Francisco, CA Passenger Elevators 1-3

#### 1. DOOR OPERATING EQUIPMENT:

- a. Provide new GAL model MOVFR solid-state door operator complete with header, track, hanger rollers, clutch, door restrictor, gate switch, and programming tool.
- b. Provide new hoistway door operating equipment complete with headers, tracks, interlocks, releases, hanger rollers, closers and gibs.

#### 2. ELEVATOR LOBBIES:

- a. Provide new fire-rated hoistway doors at all openings, satin stainless steel finish.
- b. Clad hoistway entrance jambs and transoms at main lobby with satin finished stainless steel, 18 Ga.
- c. Clad hoistway entrance frames at floors B, 2-8 with satin finished stainless steel, 18 Ga.
- d. Provide fill pieces at main lobby entrance to compensate for non-standard door construction and thickness, satin stainless steel finish.
- e. Provide new cover plate for emergency power panel with satin stainless finish.
- f. Provide new surface mount type hall lanterns with digital position indicators at main landing, satin stainless steel finish. Digital position indicators use a segmented display with a 2-inch character height.
- g. Provide new surface mount type hall lanterns at floors B, 2-8 satin stainless steel finish.
- h. Provide new extruded aluminum sill.
- i. Provide new extruded aluminum type threshold.

#### 3. CAB INTERIOR:

- a. Design: Provide twelve (12) panel interior design complete with handrail backer, ceiling, base, reveals, car doors, cladding, car operating station, sill, flooring, hardware, and CAD drawings. (See drawing for design representation and preliminary laminate selections)
- b. Wall Panels: Provide ½" fire-rated substrate faced and edged with purchaser selected plastic laminate. Panels shall be horizontally oriented, four (4) per wall. Heavy duty clips will be used for hanging.

- c. Handrail Backers: Provide 6" high on side and rear walls, brushed stainless steel finish. Backer will be flush with the raised wall panel system.
- d. Reveals: Provide flat reveals for corners between all panels, brushed stainless steel finish.

Car Station: Provide new applied type operating panel with the devices required for the operation, including call buttons, door open and door close buttons, service cabinet, light and fan switches, braille, integral hands-free emergency phone, digital position indicator, emergency components and signage as required by code. Lamps shall be the long lasting LED type.
- k. Sill: Provide new extruded aluminum type.
- I. Flooring: Provide new vinyl sheet flooring. Price based on manufacturer's standard finishes. Purchaser to selector color.

#### 4. INSPECTION/TESTING:

a. Upon completion, conduct required inspection with Elevator Rider and Tramway unit.

#### 5. WORK BY OTHERS:

- a. Work needed to expose entrance jamb return as necessary to clad entrance jambs, and any patching and refinishing work that is required once cladding is installed.
- b. Floor demo and repair/replace/refinish flooring once new entrance sills and thresholds are installed.

#### 6. ADDITIONAL WORK:

- a. Provide new suspension ropes of proper size, strength, and composition.
- b. Replace leaking seals on hoist machines to cease oil leakage.
- c. Clean gear case and provide new gear oil.
- d. Clean machine room and hoistway areas and elevator equipment within these areas to remove oil, rouge, dust and debris.

#### **INSURANCE REQUIREMENTS**

#### 1.1 SUMMARY

This Document includes the applicable insurance requirements.

#### 1.2 CONTRACTOR'S LIABILITY INSURANCE

A. Contractor shall maintain in full force and effect, for the period covered by the Contract, the following liability insurance with the following minimum specified coverages or coverages as required by laws and regulations, whichever is greater:

Worker's Compensation in statutory amount, including Employers' Liability coverage with limits not less than \$1,000,000.00 each accident, injury, or illness. The Worker's Compensation policy shall be endorsed with a waiver of subrogation in favor of the City for all work performed by the Contractor, its employees, agents and subcontractors.

2. Commercial General Liability insurance with limits not less than \$1,000,000.00 each occurrence, and \$2,000,000 general aggregate, combined single limit for bodily injury and property damage, including coverage for Contractual Liability, independent contractors, Explosion, Collapse, and Underground (XCU), Personal Injury, Broadform Property Damage, and completed operations.

3. Commercial Automobile Liability insurance with limits not less than \$1,000,000.00 each occurrence combined single limit for bodily injury and property damage, including owned, hired or non-owned vehicles, as applicable.

### 1.3 ADDITIONAL COVERAGES

- A. Professional Liability Insurance: In the event that Contractor employs professional engineering or land surveyor services for performing field engineering or preparing design calculations, plans and specifications, Contractor shall require the retained engineers and land surveyors to carry professional liability insurance with limits not less than \$1,000,000 each claim with respect to negligent acts, errors, or omissions in connection with professional services to be provided under this Contract.
- B. Environmental Pollution Liability: In the event that hazardous / contaminated material is discovered during the course of the work, and the Contractor or its subcontractors is required to perform abatement or disposal of such materials, then the Contractor, or its sub-contractor, who perform abatement of hazardous or contaminated materials removal shall maintain in force, throughout the term of this Contract, Contractor's Pollution Liability and/or Asbestos Pollution Liability and/or Errors & Omissions insurance applicable to the work being performed with limits not less than \$1,000,000 per claim or occurrence and \$2,000,000 aggregate per policy period of one year, including coverages for on-site or off-site third party claims for bodily injury and property damage. This coverage shall also be endorsed to include Non-Owned Disposal Site coverage.

#### 1.4 INSURANCE FOR OTHERS

A. For general liability, environmental pollution liability and automobile liability insurance, Contractor shall include as additional insured, the City, its board members and commissions,

and all authorized agents and representatives, and members, directors, officers, trustees, agents and employees of any of them.

- B. Other parties to be protected by Contractor's liability insurance shall be as follows:
  - 1. City's consultants and/or subconsultants: None.
  - 2. Non-City Agencies: None.

#### 1.5 FORMS OF POLICIES AND OTHER INSURANCE REQUIREMENTS

- A. Before commencement of the Work of this Contract, or in an emergency, as soon thereafter as possible, certificates of insurance and policy endorsements in form and with insurers acceptable to the City, evidencing all required insurance and with proper endorsements from Contractor's insurance carrier identifying as additional insureds the parties indicated under Article "Insurance for Others" above, shall be furnished to the City, with complete copies of policies to be furnished to the City promptly upon request. Contractor will be allowed a maximum of 10 working days, after the emergency work is commenced, in which to deliver appropriate bond and insurance certificates and endorsements.
- B. Approval of the insurance by the City shall not relieve or decrease the extent to which Contractor or subcontractor of any tier may be held responsible for payment of any and all damages resulting from its operations. Contractor shall be responsible for all losses not covered by the policy, excluding damage caused by earthquake and flood consistent with section 7105 of the California Public Contract Code in excess of 5 percent of the Contract Sum, including the deductibles. All policies of insurance and certificates shall be satisfactory to the City.
- C. The Contractor and its subcontractors shall comply with the provisions of California Labor Code section 3700. Prior to commencing the performance of work, the Contractor and all of its subcontractors shall submit to the awarding department a certificate of insurance against liability for workers compensation or proof of self-insurance in accordance with the provisions of the California Labor Code.
- D. Liability insurance, with an allowable exception for professional liability insurance, shall be on an occurrence basis, and said insurance shall provide that the coverage afforded thereby shall be primary coverage (and non-contributory to any other existing valid and collectable insurance) to the full limit of liability stated in the declaration, and such insurance shall apply separately to each insured against whom claim is made or suit is brought, but the inclusion of more than one insured shall not operate to increase the insurer's limits of liability.
- E. Except for professional liability insurance, should any of the required insurance be provided under a form of coverage that includes an annual general aggregate limit or provides that claims investigation or legal defense costs be included in such annual general aggregate limit, such general annual aggregate limit shall be two times the occurrence limits stipulated. City reserves the right to increase any insurance requirement as needed and as appropriate.
- F. Should any of the required insurance be provided under a claims-made form, Contractor shall maintain such coverage continuously throughout the term of this Contract, and without lapse, for a period 4 years beyond the Contract Final Completion date, to the effect that, should occurrences during the Contract term give rise to claims made after expiration of the Contract, such claims shall be covered by such claims-made policies.
- G. Each such policy shall be endorsed to provide 30 days advance written notice to the City of reduction or non-renewal of coverages or cancellation of coverages for any reason. All notices shall be made to:

Manager, Contract Administration Division City and County of San Francisco 1155 Market Street, 4th Floor San Francisco, CA 94103.

- H. Contractor, upon notification of receipt by the City of any such notice, shall file with the City a certificate of the required new or renewed policy at least 10 days before the effective date of such cancellation, change or expiration, with a complete copy of the new or renewed policy.
- J. If, at any time during the life of this Contract, Contractor fails to maintain any item of the required insurance in full force and effect, all Work of this Contract may, at City's sole option, be discontinued immediately, and all Contract payments due or that become due will be withheld, until notice is received by the City as provided in the immediately preceding Subparagraph "G" that such insurance has been restored to full force and effect and that the premiums therefore have been paid for a period satisfactory to the City.
- K. Any failure to maintain any item of the required insurance may, at City's sole option, be sufficient cause for termination for default of this Contract.

#### 1.6 QUALIFICATIONS

A. Insurance companies shall be legally authorized to engage in the business of furnishing insurance in the State of California. All insurance companies shall have a current A.M. Best Rating not less than "A - VIII" and shall be satisfactory to the City.

If Contractor fails to comply with the requirements specified herein, or fails to promptly take all required remedial actions to the City's satisfaction, the City may withhold progress payments to Contractor until satisfactory compliance has been accomplished and/or may assess statutory liquidated damages or penalties, as applicable.

#### CONFLICT OF INTEREST 1.2

A. By executing the Agreement (Section 00 52 00), Contractor certifies that it does not know of any fact which constitutes a violation of Section 15.103 of the City's Charter; Article III, Chapter 2 of City's Campaign and Governmental Conduct Code; or Section 87100 et seq. or Section 1090 et seq. of the California Government Code of the State of California, and further agrees promptly to notify the City if it becomes aware of any such fact during the term of this ContractAll requirements in this Section are incidental work, unless specified otherwise.

#### 1.3 NONDISCRIMINATION REQUIREMENTS

- A. Incorporation of Administrative Code Chapters 12B and 12C. Left Blank by Agreement of the Parties.
- B. Nondiscrimination in the Provision of Employee Benefits. Left Blank by Agreement of the Parties.
- Title VI Requirements. During the performance of this Contract, the Contractor, for itself, C. its assignees and successors in interest (hereinafter referred to as the "Contractor") agrees as follows:
  - (1) Compliance with Regulations: The Contractor shall comply with the Regulation relative to nondiscrimination in Federally-assisted programs of the Department of Transportation (hereinafter, "DOT") Title 49, Code of Federal Regulations, Part 21, and the Federal Highway Administration (hereinafter "FHWA") Title 23, Code of Federal Regulations, Part 200 as they may be amended from time to time, (hereinafter referred to as the "Regulations"), which are herein incorporated by reference and made a part of this Contract.
  - Nondiscrimination: The Contractor, with regard to the work performed by it during the Contract, shall not discriminate on the grounds of race, color, or national origin, sex,

age, and disability/handicap and low income in the selection and retention of subcontractors, including procurements of materials and leases of equipment. The Contractor shall not participate either directly or indirectly in the discrimination prohibited by 49 CFR, section 21.5 of the Regulations, including employment practices when the Contract covers a program set forth in Appendix B of the Regulations.

- (3) Solicitations for Subcontractors, Including Procurements of Materials and Equipment: In all solicitations either by competitive bidding or negotiation made by the Contractor for work to be performed under a subcontract, including procurements of materials or leases of equipment, each potential subcontactor or supplier shall be notified by the Contractor of the Contractor's obligations under this Contract and the Regulations relative to nondiscrimination on the grounds of race, color, or national origin, sex, age, and disability/handicap and low income.
- (4) Information and Reports: The Contractor shall provide all information and reports required by the Regulations or directives issued pursuant thereto, and shall permit access to its books, records, accounts, other sources of information, and its facilities as may be determined by the City and County of San Francisco ("City") or the FHWA to be pertinent to ascertain compliance with such Regulations, orders and instructions. Where any information required of a Contractor is in the exclusive possession of another who fails or refuses to furnish this information the Contractor shall so certify to the City, or the FHWA as appropriate, and shall set forth what efforts it has made to obtain the information.
- (5) Sanctions for Noncompliance: In the event of the Contractor's noncompliance with the nondiscrimination provisions of this Contract, the City shall impose such Contract sanctions as it or the FHWA may determine to be appropriate, including, but not limited to:
  - (a) withholding of payments to the Contractor under the Contract until the Contractor complies, and/or
  - (b) cancellation, termination or suspension of the Contract, in whole or in part.
- (6) Incorporation of Provisions: The Contractor shall include the provisions of paragraphs (1) through (6) in every subcontract, including procurements of materials and leases of equipment, unless exempt by the Regulations, or directives issued pursuant thereto. The Contractor shall take such action with respect to any subcontract or procurement as the City or the FHWA may direct as a means of enforcing such provisions including sanctions for non-compliance, provided, however, that, in the event a Contractor becomes involved in, or is threatened with, litigation with a subcontractor or supplier as a result of such direction, the Contractor may request the City to enter into such litigation to protect the interests of the City, and, in addition, the Contractor may request the United States to enter into such litigation to protect the interests of the United States.

#### 1.7 PROHIBITION ON USE OF PUBLIC FUNDS FOR POLITICAL ACTIVITY

A. In performing the Work, Contractor shall comply with San Francisco Administrative Code Chapter 12.G, which prohibits funds appropriated by the City for this Agreement from being expended to participate in, support, or attempt to influence any political campaign for a candidate or for a ballot measure. The provisions of Chapter 12.G, including but not limited to the penalties for noncompliance provided therein are incorporated by reference and made a part of this Agreement as though fully set forth herein.

#### 1.8 LIMITATIONS ON CONTRIBUTIONS

By executing the Agreement (Section 00 52 00), Contractor acknowledges that it is familiar A. with section 1.126 of the City's Campaign and Governmental Conduct Code, which prohibits any person who contracts with the City for the rendition of personal services, for the furnishing of any material, supplies or equipment, for the sale or lease of any land or building, or for a grant, loan or loan guarantee, from making any campaign contribution to (1) an individual holding a City elective office if the contract must be approved by the individual. a board on which that individual serves, or the board of a state agency on which an appointee of that individual serves, (2) a candidate for the office held by such individual, or (3) a committee controlled by such individual, at any time from the commencement of negotiations for the contract until the later of either the termination of negotiations for such contract or six months after the date the contract is approved. The prohibition on contributions applies to each prospective party to the contract; each member of Contractor's board of directors; Contractor's chairperson, chief executive officer, chief financial officer and chief operating officer; any person with an ownership interest of more than 20 percent in Contractor; any subcontractor listed in the bid or contract; and any committee that is sponsored or controlled by Contractor. Contractor must inform each such person of the limitation on contributions imposed by Section 1.126 and provide the names of the persons required to be informed to City.

#### 1.9 NONDISCLOSURE OF PRIVATE, PROPRIETARY OR CONFIDENTIAL INFORMATION

- A. If the Contract Documents require City to disclose "Private Information" to Contractor within the meaning of San Francisco Administrative Code Chapter 12M, Contractor shall use such information only in accordance with the restrictions stated in this Agreement and as necessary in performing the Services. The provisions of Chapter 12M, including but not limited to the penalties for noncompliance provided therein, are incorporated herein by this reference, and made part of this Agreement as though fully set forth herein.
- B. In the performance of Work, Contractor may have access to City's proprietary or confidential information, the disclosure of which to third parties may damage City. If City discloses proprietary or confidential information to Contractor, such information must be held by Contractor in confidence and used only in performing the Agreement. Contractor shall

exercise the same standard of care to protect such information as a reasonably prudent contractor would use to protect its own proprietary or confidential information.

#### 1.10 UNFAIR BUSINESS PRACTICES CLAIMS; ASSIGNMENT TO AWARDING BODY

- A. Under Public Contract Code section 7103.5, Contractor and its Subcontractors shall conform to the following requirements:
  - 1. In entering into the Agreement or subcontract to supply goods, services, or materials under this Agreement, Contractor or its Subcontractors offer and agree to assign the City all rights, title, and interest in and to all causes of action they may have under section 4 of the Clayton Act (15 U.S.C. Section 15) or under the Cartwright Act (chapter 2, commencing with section 16700, of part 2 of division 7 of the Business and Professions Code), arising from purchases of goods, services or materials pursuant to the Agreement or subcontract.
  - 2. The assignment shall be made and become effective at the time the City tenders Final Payment to Contractor, without further acknowledgement by the Parties.
  - 3. Contractor shall include the provisions of this Article in its subcontracts and purchase agreements to supply goods, services, or materials pursuant to the Agreement.

#### 1.11 TROPICAL HARDWOOD AND VIRGIN REDWOOD PRODUCTS BAN

A. Except as expressly permitted by the application of Sections 802(b) and 803(b) of the San Francisco Environment Code, Contractor shall not provide any items to the City in performance of this contract which are tropical hardwoods, tropical hardwood wood products, virgin redwood or virgin redwood wood products. The City urges Contractor not to import, purchase, obtain, or use for any purpose, any tropical hardwood, tropical hardwood product, virgin redwood or virgin redwood wood product.

#### 1.12 PRESERVATIVE-TREATED WOOD CONTAINING ARSENIC

A. Contractor may not purchase preservative-treated wood products containing arsenic in the performance of this Agreement unless an exemption from the requirements of Chapter 13 of the San Francisco Environment Code is obtained from the Department of the Environment under Section 1304 of the Code. The term "preservative-treated wood containing arsenic" shall mean wood treated with a preservative that contains arsenic, elemental arsenic, or an arsenic copper combination, including, but not limited to, chromated copper arsenate preservative, ammoniacal copper zinc arsenate preservative, or ammoniacal copper arsenate preservative. Contractor may purchase preservative-treated wood products on the list of environmentally preferable alternatives prepared and adopted by the Department of the Environment. This provision does not preclude Contractor from purchasing preservative-treated wood containing arsenic for saltwater immersion. The term "saltwater immersion" shall mean a pressure-treated wood that is used for construction purposes or facilities that are partially or totally immersed in saltwater.

#### 1.13 FOOD SERVICE WASTE REDUCTION REQUIREMENTS

- A. Contractor shall comply with the Food Service Waste Reduction Ordinance, as set forth in San Francisco Environment Code Chapter 16, including but not limited to the remedies for noncompliance provided therein. The provisions of Chapter 16 are incorporated herein by reference and made a part of this Agreement as though fully set forth herein.
- 1.14 LOCAL BUSINESS ENTERPRISE AND NON-DISCRIMINATION IN CONTRACTING REQUIREMENTS

#### 1.15 SUNSHINE ORDINANCE

A. Contractor acknowledges that the Contract Documents and all records related to their formation, Contractor's performance of Work, and City's payment are subject to the California Public Records Act, (California Government Code §6250 et. seq.), and the San Francisco Sunshine Ordinance, (San Francisco Administrative Code Chapter 67). Such records are subject to public inspection and copying unless exempt from disclosure under federal, state or local law.

#### 1.16 SUBMITTING FALSE CLAIMS; REMEDIES

- A. Pursuant to Article V of Chapter 6 of the San Francisco Administrative Code, any contractor. subcontractor, supplier, consultant or subconsultant who submits a false claim may be subject to monetary penalties, investigation and prosecution and may be declared an irresponsible bidder or an unqualified consultant and debarred as set forth in that Article. A contractor, subcontractor, supplier, consultant or sub consultant will be deemed to have submitted a false claim to the City if the contractor, subcontractor, supplier, consultant or subconsultant: (a) knowingly presents or causes to be presented to an officer or employee of the City a false claim or request for payment or approval; (b) knowingly makes, uses, or causes to be made or used a false record or statement to get a false claim paid or approved by the City; (c) conspires to defraud the City by getting a false claim allowed or paid by the City: (d) knowingly makes, uses, or causes to be made or used a false record or statement to conceal, avoid, or decrease an obligation to pay or transmit money or property to the City; or (e) is a beneficiary of an inadvertent submission of a false claim to the City, subsequently discovers the falsity of the claim, and fails to disclose the false claim to the City within a reasonable time after discovery of the false claim.CLEAN CONSTRUCTION
- A. Contractor agrees to comply fully with and be bound by the Clean Construction requirements set forth in Section 6.25 of the San Francisco Administrative Code. The provisions of Section 6.25 are incorporated herein by reference and made a part of this Agreement as though fully set forth.
- B. Contractor may seek waivers from the Clean Construction requirements as set forth in Section 6.25(b)(3) of the Administrative Code.
- C. By entering into the Agreement, Contractor and City agree that if Contractor uses off-road equipment and/or off-road engines in violation of the Clean Construction requirements set forth in Section 6.25, the City will suffer actual damages that will be impractical or extremely difficult to determine. Accordingly, Contractor and the City agree that Contractor shall pay the City the amount of \$100.00 per day per each piece of off-road equipment and each off-road engine used to complete Work on the Project in violation of the Clean Construction requirements. Such amount shall not be considered a penalty, but rather agreed monetary damages sustained by City because of Contractor's failure to comply with the Clean Construction requirements.

#### 1.18 CONSIDERATION OF CRIMINAL HISTORY IN HIRING AND EMPLOYMENT DECISIONS

A. Contractor agrees to comply fully with and be bound by all of the provisions of Chapter 12T "City Contractor/Subcontractor Consideration of Criminal History in Hiring and Employment Decisions," of the San Francisco Administrative Code (Chapter 12T), including the remedies provided, and implementing regulations, as may be amended from time to time. The provisions of Chapter 12T are incorporated by reference and made a part of this Agreement as though fully set forth herein. The text of the Chapter 12T is available on the web at <a href="https://www.sfgov.org/olse/fco">www.sfgov.org/olse/fco</a>. A partial listing of some of Contractor's obligations under Chapter 12T is set forth in this Section. Contractor is required to comply with all of the applicable provisions of 12T, irrespective of the listing of obligations in this Paragraph. Capitalized

- terms used in this Paragraph and not defined in this Agreement shall have the meanings assigned to such terms in Chapter 12T.
- B. The requirements of Chapter 12T shall only apply to a Contractor's or Subcontractor's operations to the extent those operations are in furtherance of the performance of this Agreement, and shall apply only to applicants and employees who would be or are performing work in furtherance of this Agreement.
- C. Contractor shall incorporate by reference in all subcontracts the provisions of Chapter 12T, and shall require all subcontractors to comply with such provisions. Contractor's failure to comply with the obligations in this subsection shall constitute a material breach of this Agreement.
- D. Contractor or Subcontractor shall not inquire about, require disclosure of, or if such information is received base an Adverse Action on an applicant's or potential applicant for employment, or employee's: (1) Arrest not leading to a Conviction, unless the Arrest is undergoing an active pending criminal investigation or trial that has not yet been resolved; (2) participation in or completion of a diversion or a deferral of judgment program; (3) a Conviction that has been judicially dismissed, expunged, voided, invalidated, or otherwise rendered inoperative; (4) a Conviction or any other adjudication in the juvenile justice system; (5) a Conviction that is more than seven years old, from the date of sentencing; or (6) information pertaining to an offense other than a felony or misdemeanor, such as an infraction.
  - E. Contractor or Subcontractor shall not inquire about or require applicants, potential applicants for employment, or employees to disclose on any employment application the facts or details of any conviction history, unresolved arrest, or any matter identified in subparagraph D, above. Contractor or Subcontractor shall not require such disclosure or make such inquiry until either after the first live interview with the person, or after a conditional offer of employment.
  - F. Contractor or Subcontractor shall state in all solicitations or advertisements for employees that are reasonably likely to reach persons who are reasonably likely to seek employment to be performed under this Agreement, that the Contractor or Subcontractor will consider for employment qualified applicants with criminal histories in a manner consistent with the requirements of Chapter 12T.
  - G. Contractor and Subcontractors shall post the notice prepared by the Office of Labor Standards Enforcement (OLSE), available on OLSE's website, in a conspicuous place at every workplace, job site, or other location under the Contractor or Subcontractor's control at which work is being done or will be done in furtherance of the performance of this Agreement. The notice shall be posted in English, Spanish, Chinese, and any language spoken by at least 5% of the employees at the workplace, job site, or other location at which it is posted.
  - H. Contractor understands and agrees that if it fails to comply with the requirements of Chapter 12T, the City shall have the right to pursue any rights or remedies available under Chapter 12T, including but not limited to, a penalty of \$50 for a second violation and \$100 for a subsequent violation for each employee, applicant or other person as to whom a violation occurred or continued, termination or suspension in whole or in part of this Agreement.
