13	Section	on 1. Findings.
14	(a)	The Planning Department has determined that the actions contemplated in this
15	ordinance comply with the California Environmental Quality Act (California Public Resources	
16	Code Sections 21000 et seq.). Said determination is on file with the Clerk of the Board of	
17	Supervisors in File No. 151106 and is incorporated herein by reference. The Board affirms	
18	this determination.	
19	(b)	The Building Inspection Commission considered this ordinance on,
20	at a duly noti	ced public hearing, pursuant to Charter Section D3.750-5.
21	(c)	The Governor of California has issued multiple successive Executive Orders
22	proclaiming a statewide drought, and ordering water districts to take action to meet deep	
23	conservation goals, specifically including accelerated use of technologies such as onsite	
24	reuse systems.	

- 1 (d) The evidence suggests that household gray water reuse for irrigation poses a 2 negligible public health hazard and there is a general trend, both nationally and in California, 3 towards a more permissive standard for gray water irrigation.
 - (e) An increasing number of Western states, including Arizona, Nevada, Utah, and Wyoming, are shifting from proscriptive standards to either exempting gray water systems from the permit requirement, or granting a general statewide permit to gray water systems that meet a short list of proven, reasonable performance standards.
 - (f) The rate of gray water usage in California is the highest in the country, but the compliance rate for California's proscriptive standards is among the lowest of any code, standard, or rule. This low compliance rate has raised serious questions about whether California's proscriptive standards and permit requirements have dissuaded homeowners from hiring professionals to install the gray water systems and instead encouraged homeowners to install the systems themselves.
 - (g) The effect of California's exemption since 2009 of laundry-only systems from the permit requirement appears to have resulted in creating jobs for professional installers, increasing the percentage of professionally-installed systems, and elevating the quality of the systems.
 - (h) California Plumbing Code, Section 1602.1.2, requires a construction permit for installation of a gray water system, but authorizes a local agency to exempt a simple gray water system from the permit requirement after consulting with the local water purveyor for any public water system providing drinking water to the dwelling or non-residential structure.
 - (i) It is in the public interest to promote the use of gray water systems by reducing regulatory barriers that do not provide significant improvement in public health or environmental protection.

1	Section 2. The Building Code is hereby amended by revising Section 106A.2, to read

8	23. A simple gray water system described and regulated in Section 1602.1.2 of the Plumbing

12	Section 3. The Plumbing Code is hereby amended by revising Section 103.1.1, to read			
13	as follows: 103.1.1 Exempt Work. A permit shall not be required for the following:

16	(9) Installation of a simple gray water system, as defined in Section 1602.1.2 of this Code, if			
17	such system meets the requirements of the San Francisco Public Utilities Commission, set forth in its guidelines/manual for the design of outdoor irrigation systems using gray water, as amended from time

23	Section 4. Effective Date. This ordinance shall become effective 30 days after			
24	enactment. Enactment occurs when the Mayor signs the ordinance, the Mayor returns the			
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1	ordinance unsigned or does not sign the ordinance within ten days of receiving it, or the Board		
2	of Supervisors overrides the Mayor's veto of the ordinance

4	Section 5. Scope of Ordinance. In enacting this ordinance, the Board of Supervisors		
5	intends to amend only those words, phrases, paragraphs, subsections, sections, articles,		
6	numbers, punctuation marks, charts, diagrams, or any other constituent parts of the Municipal		
7	Code that are explicitly shown in this ordinance as additions, deletions, Board amendment		
8	additions, and Board amendment deletions in accordance with the "Note" that appears under		
9	the official title of the ordinance.
