3	Ordinance amending the Administrative Code to establish a fund to pay for City
4	services and capital improvements addressing transportation and other needs of the
5	community in connection with events at the Golden State Gate Warriors Event Center
6	and Mixed Use Project, and to create an advisory committee to make recommendations
7	about the use of monies from the Fund; and adopting findings under the California
8	Environmental Quality Act.

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14	Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco:
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16	Section 1. Environmental Findings.
17	In accordance with the actions that this ordinance contemplatesa tentative map
18	approval, the Board of Supervisors adopted a resolution concerningmotion that included
19	environmental findings pursuant to the California Environmental Quality Act (California Public
20	Resources Code sections 21000 et seq.). For purposes of the actions contemplated herein,
21	the Board relies on the environmental findings in that motion. A copy of such resolution
22	ismotion and the environmental findings are on file with the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors
23	in File No. 150995151205 and isare incorporated herein by reference as though fully set forth.
24	As contained lin that actionClerk of the Board File, the Board recognizeds that the
25	Commission on Community Investment and Infrastructure ("CCII"), on November 3, 2015,

1	approved Resolution No. 70-2015, which adopted California Environmental Quality Act
2	findings ("CCII CEQA Findings"), including a Statement of Overriding Considerations and a
3	Mitigation Monitoring and Reporting Program ("MMRP"), as required by law. As part of the
4	CCII approval of its Resolution No. 70-2015 and other approval actions related to the Golden
5	State Warriors Event Center and Mixed-Use Project, CCII imposed on the Project Sponsor as
6	conditions of approval those aspects of Mitigation Measures M-TR-2b and M-TR-18
7	concerning transportation impacts that are identified as Project Sponsor responsibility in the
8	MMRP. The CCII Resolution and the CCII CEQA Findings are on file with the Clerk of the
9	Board of Supervisors in File No. 150994151205 and incorporated herein by reference.
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11	Section 2. The Administrative Code is hereby amended by adding Section 10.100-364,
12	to read as follows:
13	SEC. 10.100-364. MISSION BAY TRANSPORTATION IMPROVEMENT FUND.
14	(a) Establishment and Purpose of the Fund. The Mission Bay Transportation Improvement
15	Fund (the "Fund") is established as a category four fund, for the purpose of safeguarding monies in
16	the General Fund to pay for: City services and capital improvements to address transportation and
17	other needs of the community in connection with Warriors basketball games and other events
18	(collectively, "Events") at the Golden State Warriors Event Center and Mixed Use Project (the "Event
19	Center") on Blocks 29-32 in Mission Bay South (the "Project Site"), including, but not limited to,
20	measures included in the City's transportation services plan for the Event Center; and enhancements to
21	multi-modal transportation serving Mission Bay South and surrounding areas, including the Potrero
22	Hill and Dogpatch neighborhoods, beyond what is necessary to address the community's needs with
23	regard to Events at the Event Center.
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1	(b) Use of the Fund. In furtherance of the Fund's purpose under subsection (a) above, money
2	received in the Fund as described in subsection (c) below shall be used exclusively to pay for the City's
3	costs relating to Events at the Event Center (collectively, "Required Uses"):
4	(1) Costs of providing services to the Project Site and surrounding neighborhood,
5	including, but not limited to, public transit services, special event shuttles, parking and traffic
6	engineering and control services, pedestrian and bicycle access programs, parking enforcement
7	programs, local access programs (including, without limitation, access to the University of California
8	at San Francisco hospitals in Mission Bay South), police services, litter pick-up, street and sidewalk
9	cleanup, and any other measures to improve services consistent with the purpose of this ordinance; and
10	(2) Costs of procuring transit equipment and making transportation infrastructure
11	improvements, including, without limitation, Municipal Transportation Agency (MTA) costs to
12	purchase additional Municipal Railway light rail vehicles, construct crossover tracks and loading
13	platform improvements in the T-Third right of way, and make parking and traffic improvements (such
14	as, without limitation, cameras, vehicle messaging signs, traffic signals, Municipal Railway and other
15	transportation network upgrades, and power augmentation for light rail vehicles and related
16	transportation services), bicycle and pedestrian access improvements, and other related street
17	improvements, costs to study the feasibility of a ferry landing and service for Mission Bay South and
18	other surrounding areas, and any financing and soft costs related to such equipment purchases or
19	infrastructure improvements.
20	(c) Deposits to the Fund. Deposits to the Fund shall be determined through the process set out
21	below, and appropriated under the Charter's budgetary and fiscal provisions:
22	(1) Beginning in fiscal year 2016-2017, and subject to approval from its Board of
23	Directors in accordance with the public hearing process described in subsection $(d)(3)$ below, the MTA
24	will prepare and submit to the Mayor budgets to pay for all measures that are part of MTA's
25	transportation services plan for the Event Center and all transportation improvement measures,

1	consistent with its two-year budget process under the Charter and MTA Board Resolution No. <u>15-154</u>
2	(the "MTA Resolution"). The budget proposal will include two components. In one component, the
3	MTA will provide for expenditure for Required Uses of City revenues and development impact fees
4	from the Project Site or Events at the Event Center that are dedicated under the City Charter or
5	otherwise by operation of law to the MTA's Municipal Transportation Fund (collectively, "MTA
6	Dedicated Funds"). In the other component of its budget proposal, the MTA will propose how the
7	remaining costs (net of those to be paid from MTA Dedicated Funds) for the Required Uses for the
8	upcoming budget cycle will be paid for from the Fund. In any fiscal year before the fiscal year in
9	which the Controller anticipates that the Event Center will open, the MTA budget will include any
10	funds then required to finance capital expenditures, including hard and soft costs, not to exceed the
11	sum of discretionary, unrestricted General Fund revenues and MTA Dedicated Funds that the
12	Controller determines that the Event Center has generated or will likely generate for that fiscal year.
13	Also, beginning with the fiscal year in which the Controller anticipates that the Event Center will open,
14	the Department of Public Works and the Police Department, shall prepare budget proposals to pay for
15	those expenditures for City services and capital improvements related to the Event Center that qualify
16	as Required Uses under subsection (b), and, no later than March 1 of each year, submit those budgets
17	to the Mayor and Board of Supervisors. The budgets that such departments prepare shall be sufficient
18	to cover all the costs of the department's respective services to address community needs relating to the
19	use and operation of the Event Center and pay for Required Uses consistent with the purpose of the
20	<u>Fund.</u>
21	(2) The Mayor and Board of Supervisors shall include in the City's annual budget
22	monies for deposit into the Fund sufficient to meet the budgeted expenditures in the proposals, provided
23	that for the first five years of operation of the Event Center, the annual deposit shall be at least the
24	amount specified in subsection (c)(3) below and further provided that, for any fiscal year, the total
25	annual deposit in the Fund, plus the Overlapping Event Reserve (described in subsection (c)(4) below),

1	shall not exceed 90% of the total amount that the Controller estimates to be the annual General Fund
2	revenues from the Project site and events at the Event Center as determined through the financial
3	assessment described in subsection (d)(1) below. That 90% shall be the "Maximum Annual Funding
4	Amount" for the Fund.
5	(3) Subject to the Maximum Annual Funding Amount, the required City deposit the first
6	five fiscal years of operation of the Event Center, beginning in the fiscal year in which the Event Center
7	opens to the public, shall be as follows:
8	(A) First fiscal year: the deposit into the Fund shall be no less than \$8,100,000.
9	(B) Second fiscal year: the deposit into the Fund shall be no less than
10	<u>\$8,300,000.</u>
11	(C) Third fiscal year: the deposit into the Fund shall be no less than
12	<u>\$8,500,000.</u>
13	(D) Fourth fiscal year: the deposit into the Fund shall be no less than
14	<u>\$8,800,000.</u>
15	(E) Fifth fiscal year: the deposit into the Fund shall be no less than \$9,100,000.
16	(4) In addition to the annual deposit described in subsections (c)(2) and (c)(3) above,
17	beginning in the fiscal year in which the Event Center is open, there shall be a reserve in the Fund of
18	\$1,000,000, for the term of the Fund (the "Designated Overlapping Event Reserve"). The sum of the
19	annual deposit plus the Designated Overlapping Event Reserve shall not exceed the Controller's
20	determination of the Maximum Annual Funding Amount. Monies in the Designated Overlapping Event
21	Reserve shall be immediately available to the MTA to pay for enhancements to multi-modal
22	transportation serving Mission Bay South and surrounding areas beyond what is needed to address
23	effects from operation of the Event Center, including, but not limited to, operational measures and
24	capital improvements, relating to pre-event peak periods on weekday evenings when an Event, other
25	than a Warriors basketball game, with attendance anticipated by the MTA (based on information

1	provided by the Event Center's operator) of more than 12,500 people occurs at the Event Center and a
2	San Francisco Giants baseball game also occurs at AT&T Park. The Advisory Committee referenced
3	in subsection (d)(2) below shall make recommendations to the MTA about expenditure of such funds
4	before the MTA determines how to expend the funds. If the MTA, at either the MTA Board of Directors
5	or MTA Director level, determines not to follow any such recommendations, the MTA will articulate its
6	reasons for its decision. To the extent the MTA draws on monies in the Designated Overlapping Event
7	Reserve during the first five fiscal years of the Event Center's operation, the annual deposit to the Fund
8	for the following year shall include funds to bring the Designated Overlapping Event Reserve to its full
9	funding level, again provided that the annual deposit, plus the Designated Overlapping Event Reserve,
10	do not exceed the Maximum Annual Funding Amount. In addition, if the Advisory Committee
11	determines, based on review of travel time data collected by the MTA for routes to the Event Center,
12	that any considerable additional traffic congestion affecting access by hospital employees to the
13	University of California at San Francisco hospitals at Mission Bay occurs in the pre-event peak period
14	during weekday evenings when there is an event-other than a Warriors game-with more than
15	12,500 people at the Event Center and a Giants game at AT&T Park, and the Advisory Committee
16	recommends using, in addition to the Designated Overlapping Event Reserve, any balance in the Fund
17	that is not budgeted for other purposes under this ordinance, for services or capital projects to address
18	such occurrence, then the Director of Transportation will consider approving such recommendations,
19	which approval the Director will not unreasonably withhold or delay, and the Director will take such
20	actions as are necessary to seek any required approvals and implement such recommendations, all as
21	provided in the MTA Resolution.
22	(5) After the first five fiscal years of operation of the Event Center, if at the end of any
23	fiscal year during the remaining term of the Fund as described in subsection (e) below, the balance in
24	the Fund exceeds expenditures, then, in addition to the Designated Overlapping Event Reserve, such
25	excess monies shall carry forward as a reserve for Required Uses consistent with the Fund's purpose to

1	the extent such excess monies do not exceed 25% of the total expenditures from the Fund for the
2	previous fiscal year. Before the end of the first five fiscal years, 100% of any such Fund balance shall
3	<u>carry forward.</u>
4	(6) The Fund may receive and use for the Required Uses any grants, gifts, or other
5	contributions of money or property that the owner of the Event Center or any other person or entity
6	may offer the City to support the City in furthering the purpose of the Fund. Subject to any applicable
7	legal restrictions, the City may use such grants, gifts, or other contributions of money or property to
8	make its annual deposit to the Fund or to fund the Designated Overlapping Event Reserve.
9	(d) Reports, Public Review, and Accountability.
10	(1) For the fiscal year in which the Controller anticipates that the Event Center will
11	open to the public, and for every five years after the Event Center opens, the Controller shall conduct a
12	financial assessment of the economic impact of the Project. This assessment shall include an estimate
13	of discretionary, unrestricted General Fund revenues that the City and County of San Francisco
14	expects to receive from the Project site and from events at the Event Center. These revenue estimates
15	shall be net of City revenues and development impact fees dedicated for specific purposes under the
16	<u>Charter, Municipal Code, or state law, including, but not limited to, MTA Dedicated Funds. <u>The</u></u>
17	Controller shall, in the assessment, include separate estimates of revenues generated on the
18	Project Site and revenues attributable to demand from Events that are generated off the
19	<u>Project Site.</u> The Controller may conduct such assessment more frequently if the Controller considers
20	it appropriate to do so to monitor the Maximum Annual Funding Amount.
21	If at any time during the term of the Fund the Controller determines that the sum of the
22	annual deposit for the year and the Designated Overlapping Event Reserve exceeds the adjusted
23	Maximum Annual Funding Amount, then the Controller shall make prorata reductions to the deposit
24	and the Reserve to reflect the amount of the reduction in the Maximum Annual Funding Amount;
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1	provided that nothing	o in this ordinance	shall limit the	authority of the	Roard of Sup	ervisors and Mayor
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- 2 to appropriate other monies from the General Fund to make up any such reductions.
- 3 If in any year City expenditures for Required Uses exceed the Maximum Annual Funding
- 4 <u>Amount for the year, regardless of the source of the funds for those expenditures, the City shall be</u>
- 5 *entitled to a credit, distributed on a prorata basis between the annual deposit and the Overlapping*
- 6 *Event Designated Reserve, against its funding obligations under this Section 10.100-364 for the*
- 7 *following year, in the same total amount that those expenditures exceeded the Maximum Annual*
- 8 Funding Amount, unless the Board of Supervisors and the Mayor waive that credit as part of the
- 9 <u>budgetary process.</u>
- 10 (2) In developing the proposed annual budgets for uses of the Fund, the MTA, in
- 11 <u>coordination with the Department of Public Works and the Police Department, will seek the input and</u>
- 12 <u>recommendations from the Warriors Event Center Community Improvement Measures Fund Advisory</u>
- 13 <u>Committee established in Administrative Code Chapter 5, Article XXIII.</u>
- 14 (3) As provided in the MTA Resolution, before submitting to the Mayor the MTA's
- 15 *proposed budget for expenditures from the Fund, the MTA Board of Directors will hold a public*
- 16 <u>hearing on the proposed budget. In the hearing the MTA Board of Directors will consider the</u>
- 17 <u>recommendations of the Advisory Committee.</u>
- 18 (4) In any fiscal year after the fiscal year in which the Event Center opens, before the
- 19 *Mayor or Board of Supervisors make any reduction in the annual budgeted expenditures from the*
- 20 *Fund, there shall be a public hearing before the Board of Supervisors or one of its committees*
- 21 <u>regarding such proposed reduction.</u>
- 22 (e) Term of the Fund. The Fund shall remain in effect for as long as Events are held at the
- 23 <u>Event Center.</u>
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- 25 / / /

1	Section 3. Chapter 5 of the Administrative Code is hereby amended by adding Article
2	XXIII, Sections 5.23-1 through 5.23-6, to read as follows:
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4	<u>ARTICLE XXIII:</u>
5	MISSION BAY TRANSPORTATION IMPROVEMENT FUND ADVISORY COMMITTEE
6	SEC. 5.23-1. ESTABLISHMENT OF COMMITTEE.
7	The Board of Supervisors hereby establishes the Mission Bay Transportation Improvement
8	Fund Advisory Committee (the "Advisory Committee").
9	
10	SEC. 5.23-2. MEMBERSHIP OF COMMITTEE.
11	The Advisory Committee shall consist of five members, appointed as follows:
12	(a) Seat 1 shall be held by an employee, officer, or other representative of the Golden State
13	Warriors Event Center and Mixed Use Project (the "Event Center"), appointed by the Event Center's
14	owner.
15	(b) Seat 2 shall be held by an employee, officer, or other representative of the University of
16	California at San Francisco, appointed by the Chancellor of the University of California San Francisco
17	or the Chancellor's designee.
18	(c) Seat 3 shall be held by a person who resides in a neighborhood within a half mile of the
19	Event Center, appointed by the Mayor.
20	(d) Seat 4 shall be held by a representative of a business that operates within a half-mile of the
21	Event Center, appointed by the Mayor.
22	(e) Seat 5 shall be held by a person who resides in a neighborhood within a half-mile of
23	the Event Center, appointed by the Supervisor representing the district in which the Event Center is
24	located.
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1	<u>At least one of the appointees to Seats 3 and 4 shall be an individual who has served</u>
2	on the Ballpark/Mission Bay Transportation Coordination Committee, or its successor body as
3	designated by the Mayor, for at least six months before being appointed to the Advisory
4	<u>Committee.</u>
5	In addition, there shall be five alternate members of the Advisory Committee, one designated for
6	each of the five seats. Each alternate member shall meet the qualifications set forth above for the seat
7	as to which the person is designated to serve as an alternate, and shall be appointed by the appointing
8	authority for that seat.
9	
10	SEC. 5.23-3. ORGANIZATION AND TERMS OF OFFICE.
11	(a) Each member and each alternate member shall serve at the pleasure of the member's
12	appointing authority, and shall serve for the life of the Advisory Committee unless removed by the
13	appointing authority.
14	(b) If a vacancy occurs in any seat on the Advisory Committee, the appointing authority for the
15	vacated seat shall appoint a successor to that seat. During the pendency of a vacancy, the alternate
16	member for that seat shall serve as, and have the full powers of, a member of the Advisory Committee.
17	In addition, if a member of the Advisory Committee is not in attendance at a meeting, the alternate
18	member designated to serve as an alternate for the absent member's seat shall attend that meeting and
19	for purposes of that meeting have the full powers of the absent member.
20	(c) Members of the Advisory Committee shall receive no compensation.
21	(d) Any member who misses three regular meetings of the Advisory Committee within a period
22	of 12 months without the express approval of the Advisory Committee at or before each missed meeting
23	shall be deemed by operation of law to have resigned from the Advisory Committee ten days after the
24	third unapproved absence. The Advisory Committee shall inform the appointing authority of the
25	resignation.

1	(e) As provided in Municipal Transportation Agency (MTA) Board of Directors Resolution
2	<u>No. 15-154, the MTA will provide administrative support for the Advisory Committee.</u>
3	<u>SEC. 5.23-4. DUTIES OF COMMITTEE.</u>
4	The Advisory Committee shall be the central City-sponsored community advisory body charged
5	with providing input to the MTA <sub>2</sub> - the Department of Public Works, and the Police Department ("Other
6	City Departments") and decision-makers regarding allocation of monies in the Mission Bay
7	Transportation Improvement Fund (the "Fund"), established in Administrative Code
8	Section 10.100-364, for Required Uses, as defined in that section. The Advisory Committee shall be
9	advisory, as appropriate, to the MTA and the Board of Supervisors. The Advisory Committee shall
10	perform the following functions as needed:
11	(a) Collaborate with the MTA, and Other City Departments, and the Ballpark/Mission Bay
12	Transportation Coordinating Committee on prioritizing the community improvement measures for
13	Required Uses and identifying implementation details as part of the annual budget process;
14	(b) Recommend to the MTA uses of the Designated Overlapping Event Reserve, as defined in
15	Administrative Code Section 10.100-364;
16	(c) Collaborate with the MTA and the Other City Departments and decision-makers, including
17	the Ballpark/Mission Bay Transportation Coordinating Committee, in the monitoring of the uses
18	of the Fund for the purpose specified in Administrative Code Section 10.100-364; and,
19	(d) Review travel time data collected by the MTA for routes to the Event Center to determine if
20	traffic conditions associated with the Event Center, especially when there are weekday evening
21	overlapping events with large attendance at the Event Center and AT&T Park, should entail additional
22	City actions and expenditures from the Fund or the Designated Overlapping Event Reserve, and make
23	recommendations to the MTA on additional actions and expenditures.
24	
25	SEC. 5.23-5. MEETINGS AND PROCEDURES.

1	Not less than six months before the date on which the Event Center is anticipated to open as
2	determined by the Controller, the Advisory Committee shall hold its inaugural meeting. There shall be
3	at least ten days' notice of the inaugural meeting. Notwithstanding Rule 2.21 of the Board of
4	Supervisors Rules of Order, which provides that advisory bodies created by the Board shall
5	meet at least once every four months, following its Following the inaugural meeting, the Advisory
6	Committee shall hold a regular meeting not less than once every six months until the sunset date set
7	forth in Section 5.23-6. The Advisory Committee shall elect its own officers and may establish rules for
8	its own organization and procedures.
9	
10	<u>SEC. 5.23-6. SUNSET DATE.</u>
11	<u>Unless extended by an ordinance adopted by the Board of Supervisors, this Article XXIII shall</u>
12	expire by operation of law, and the Advisory Committee shall terminate, on the date on which the Fund
13	<u>expires. Notwithstanding Rule 2.21 of the Board of Supervisors Rules Rule of Order, which provides</u>
14	that advisory bodies created by the Board should sunset within three years, the Board intends the
15	Advisory Committee to exist for longer than three years. After the expiration of the Advisory
16	Committee, the City Attorney shall cause this Article XXIII to be removed from the Administrative
17	<u>Code.</u>
18	
19	Section 4. Effective Date. This ordinance shall become effective 30 days after
20	enactment. Enactment occurs when the Mayor signs the ordinance, the Mayor returns the
21	ordinance unsigned or does not sign the ordinance within ten days of receiving it, or the Board
22	of Supervisors overrides the Mayor's veto of the ordinance.
