[Accept and Expend Grant - California Governor's Office of Emergency Services, Human Trafficking Advocacy Program - \$110,276]

Resolution retroactively authorizing the Office of the District Attorney to accept and expend a grant in the amount of \$110,276 from the California Governor's Office of Emergency Services for the Human Trafficking Advocacy Program for the grant period October 1, 2015, through September 30, 2016, to ensure human trafficking victims receive comprehensive victim services and to enhance the collaboration with the Mayor's Task Force on Anti-Human Trafficking.

WHEREAS, The Office of the District Attorney (SFDA) applied for funding from the California Governor's Office of Emergency Services for the "Human Trafficking Advocacy Program" and was awarded One Hundred Ten Thousand and Two Hundred Seventy-Six dollars (\$110,276); and

WHEREAS, The purpose of the Human Trafficking Advocacy Program is to provide funding for Victim/Witness Assistance Centers to provide services to victims of human trafficking; and

WHEREAS, SFDA will use grant funds to increase the identification of human trafficking victims, coordinate comprehensive services for those victims, and enhance the collaboration with the Mayor's Task Force on Anti-Human Trafficking; and

WHEREAS, The grant requires a 20% cash or in-kind match valued at \$27,569 which will be provided with volunteer and intern hours; and

WHEREAS, The grant does not require an Annual Salary Ordinance (ASO) Amendment; and

WHEREAS, The grant terms prohibit including indirect costs in the grant budget; now, therefore, be it

Supervisor Tang BOARD OF SUPERVISORS RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors hereby waives inclusion of indirect costs in the grant budget; and, be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors hereby authorizes the Office of the District Attorney to retroactively accept and expend, on behalf of the City and County of San Francisco, a grant from the California Governor's Office of Emergency Services' Human Trafficking Advocacy Program in the amount of \$110,276 to ensure human trafficking victims receive comprehensive services and to enhance the collaboration with the Mayor's Task Force on Anti-Human Trafficking.

VIII. Special Condition for Violence Against Women Act (VAWA)

• Filing Costs for Criminal Charges and Protection

Its laws, policies, and practices do not require, in connection with the prosecution of any misdemeanor or felony domestic violence offense, or in connection with the filing, issuance, registration, or service of a protection order, or a petition for a protection order, to protect a victim of

domestic violence, stalking, or sexual assault, that the victim bear the costs associated with the filing of criminal charges against the offender, or the costs associated with the filing, issuance, registration, or service of a warrant, protection order, petition for a protection order, or witness subpoena, whether issued inside or outside the state, tribal, or local jurisdiction.

Forensic Medical Examination Payment Requirement for Victims of Sexual Assault

The state or territory, Indian tribal government, unit of local government, or another governmental entity incurs the full out-of-pocket cost of forensic medical exams for victims of sexual assault. The state or territory, Indian tribal government, unit of local government, or another governmental entity does not require a victim of sexual assault to participate in the criminal justice system or cooperate with law enforcement in order to be provided with a forensic medical exam, or to be reimbursed for charges incurred on account of such an exam.

Judicial Notification

The state's judicial administrative policies and practices include notification to domestic violence offenders of the requirements delineated in section 922(g)(8) and (g)(9) of title 18, Unites States Code, and any applicable related Federal, State, or local laws.

Polygraph Testing Prohibition

The state or local unit of government's laws, policies, or practices ensure that no law enforcement officer, prosecuting officer or other government official shall ask or require an adult, youth, or child victim of an alleged sex offense as defined under Federal, tribal, state, territorial, or local law to submit to a polygraph examination or other truth telling device as a condition for proceeding with the investigation of such an offense.

 Under 42 U.S.C. 3796gg-8(b), the refusal of a victim to submit to a polygraph or other truth telling examination shall not prevent the investigation, charging, or prosecution of an alleged sex offense by a state, Indian tribal government, territorial government, or unit of local government.

Nondisclosure of Confidential or Private Information Regarding Services for Victims

Recipients and subrecipients may not disclose personally identifying information about victims served with Violence Against Women funds without a written release, unless the disclosure of the information is required by a statute or court order. "Personally identifying information" means individually identifying information for or about an individual including information likely to disclose the location of a victim of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, or stalking. Releases must be written, informed and reasonably time-limited and signed by the victim unless the victim is an un-emancipated minor or a person with disabilities.

Consultation and Documentation with Local Victim Services Programs (Applies only to law enforcement, prosecution and the courts)

Tribal, territorial, State, or local prosecution, law enforcement, and courts must consult with tribal, territorial, State or local victim service programs during the course of developing their grant applications. This will ensure that proposed activities and equipment acquisitions are designed to promote the safety, confidentiality, and economic independence of victims of domestic violence, sexual assault, stalking and dating violence.

All appropriate documentation must be maintained on file by the project and available for Cal OES or public scrutiny upon request. Failure to comply with these requirements may result in suspension of payments under the grant or termination of the grant or both and the Recipient may be ineligible for award of any future grants if the Cal OES determines that any of the following has occurred:

Project Narrative

I. PROBLEM STATEMENT

Introduction. Evidence is mounting that the City and County of San Francisco is a hot spot for human trafficking. Since 2010, San Francisco government and community-based agencies have been collaborating to address this insidious crime through coordinated efforts, including the Mayor's Task Force on Anti-Human Trafficking and the San Francisco Collaborative Against Human Trafficking. The San Francisco District Attorney's Office (SFDA), which views human trafficking as a top law enforcement priority, is implementing new data driven approaches to uncover human trafficking networks and activity, particularly those related to sex trafficking and the commercial sexual exploitation of youth. Through this targeted prosecution strategy, SFDA will identify many new victims. The Victim Service Division of the San Francisco District Attorney's Office will be at the forefront of this work: even in the absence of criminal charges, the Victim Services Division can serve as a frontline human trafficking intervention.

Service Area: The City and County of San Francisco is the financial and cultural hub of a metropolitan area composed of nine Bay Area counties. San Francisco covers approximately 47 square miles and is home to approximately 827,442 people (2013 US Census Bureau), with a daytime population exceeding 1.5 million. San Francisco is a major international tourism and commuter destination. San Francisco is ethnically, linguistically, and socio-economically diverse. The ethnic diversity includes approximately 54% White, 6% Black or African American, 34% Asian, 15% Hispanic or Latino, and 4% people of two or more races. A disproportionally large number of Limited English Proficient (LEP) families and communities come to San Francisco seeking community based services and government systems that are more culturally and linguistically competent to meet their basic needs. About 283,000 immigrants live in San Francisco, which accounts for 35% of the San Francisco population. Lastly, about 13% of the population lives below the poverty line, with a majority being between the ages of 18 to 24. Of

the population, 4.6% are under the age of 5, 13.4% are under the age of 18, and 14.2% are over the age of 65.

Human trafficking in San Francisco: The San Francisco District Attorney's Office (SFDA) is committed to achieving justice for San Francisco's most vulnerable residents. Assistant District Attorneys, Investigators and Victim Witness Advocates work tirelessly to hold offenders accountable, protect and support victims, and innovate to break the cycle of crime.

The proposed project for addressing human trafficking crimes will focus on sex trafficking, including the commercial exploitation of youth, and ways to prevent and intervene to help victims of this crime by providing comprehensive services to mitigate the myriad challenges they face. Unfortunately, San Francisco's position as a center of tourism, economic activity, and immigration has also led it to become a hot spot for human trafficking.

According to The Covering House, a nonprofit organization that provides refuge and restoration to female victims of sex exploitation and sex trafficking, San Francisco is one of the top 20 human trafficking jurisdictions in the entire country. A preliminary analysis of the connections across advertisements on Backpage, the most popular sex buyer website in the United States, found that San Francisco is likely to be a primary hub for the sex industry as well. SFDA is partnering with an independent research organization to further explore the relationship between online sex industry ads, international human trafficking and the commercial sexual exploitation of children. It appears likely that there is a strong intersection between international human trafficking and the sex industry in San Francisco, with hundreds of unidentified victims.

Tragically, many sex trafficking victims are children. In the state of California, between 2010 and 2012, approximately 1,277 victims were pulled into the sex trafficking industry, and 26% of all human trafficking victims are children. Researchers have determined that the high proportion of youth sex trafficking victims exist due to their vulnerability. Sixty percent of youth victims have spent time in the foster care system or in group homes, and 85% of youth victims have experienced child abuse or incest. Furthermore, a high proportion of gay, lesbian, and

transgender youth are forced to the streets due to homophobic living situations. About one in three young persons is drawn into prostitution within 48 hours of becoming homeless.

SFDA & The Victim Services Division. The San Francisco District Attorney's Office serves the dual jurisdiction of the City & County of San Francisco. The Victim Services Division is one of four divisions of the Office. SFDA is committed to the concept of parallel justice, whereby the needs and outcomes of victims are prioritized equally to criminal case processing outcomes. In 201, the Victim Services Division served 6,300 victims and survivors of all crimes by providing the following counseling and support services: linking victims to trauma-informed community-based services to help them stabilize and recover; helping with claims for victim compensation; providing information about the criminal justice system; advising clients on claims status; helping with transportation; providing court support; court accompaniment and helping write victim impact statements. In 2012, SFDA expanded the reach of the Victim Services Division by establishing office hours in four neighborhoods across the City, in partnership with community-based organizations. At all of these sites, residents are able to access culturally and linguistically competent services with trained Victim/Witness Advocates from the District Attorney's Office. The Victim Services Division provides services in English, Cantonese, Mandarin, and Spanish. In cases where the victim requires additional language assistance, advocates utilize the city's Language Line services. Meeting victims where they are both geographically and emotionally safe - in places of comfort that are close to home - is essential to best serve vulnerable victims, including victims of human trafficking.

Current efforts and barriers. All criminal cases involving human trafficking are handled by the SFDA Sex Assault Unit, a specialized vertical prosecution unit, staffed by five experienced attorneys. A dedicated prosecutor serves as the Office's human trafficking liaison. Along with the Chief of Victim Services, the Human Trafficking Attorney attends all interagency meetings on the issue, including the Mayor's Task Force on Anti-Human Trafficking.

In spite of evidence that San Francisco is a national hot spot for human trafficking, especially sex trafficking; most victims in San Francisco remain unidentified. In 2014, 21 cases of human trafficking were presented by the police to SFDA, 14 of which have been prosecuted. There are currently seven active, pending cases involving co-defendants in the SFDA. The Victim Services Division is currently providing comprehensive, culturally competent services to 12 victims of human trafficking. The greatest gap in San Francisco is that between the incidence of human trafficking and its detection, and it is a priority of the District Attorney's Office to change this.

With the implementation of a new Crime Strategies Unit (CSU) this past summer, the Office is expanding its efforts to identify and prosecute human trafficking, especially sex trafficking and the commercial sexual exploitation of children. Using innovative data and information driven approaches, CSU is working closely with the Sex Assault Unit and the Victim Services Division to increase our Office's ability to detect and prevent human trafficking, and identify and connect victims to services.

The Victim Services Division is integral to this effort. Because these victims are often unlikely to self-identify or report the crimes against them, and because human trafficking is hidden so far underground, this issue warrants an intensive, focused approach that is coordinated across law enforcement and social service sectors. The Victim Services Division is seeking funding to implement this approach for San Francisco's human trafficking victims, most of whom are currently receiving no assistance.

II. <u>PLAN</u>

In order to address the identified gap between the incidence and the detection of human trafficking in San Francisco, the San Francisco District Attorney's Office Victim Services Division plans to implement a Human Trafficking Program. The Human Trafficking Program will include four major components: (1) Hire a full-time Human Trafficking Advocate, with expertise in social

work and human trafficking; (2) Ensure that all human trafficking victims receive comprehensive victim services; (3) Enhance the collaboration with the Mayor's Task Force on Anti-Human Trafficking and its member agencies to increase the identification of victims of human trafficking and coordinate services; and, (4) Implement a public awareness and outreach campaigns regarding human trafficking.

Strategy 1. The Victim Services Division will recruit and hire a full-time advocate, with experience in social work, who will respond specifically to victims of human trafficking and collaborate with institutions and community-based organizations that address human trafficking. Victims of human trafficking present areas of need that are often beyond the scope of traditional victim services, particularly in terms of mental health and trauma. Victims may need ongoing counseling, treatment and recovery services for post-traumatic stress disorder, depression, anxiety, self-blame, suicidal thoughts or attempts, or other mental trauma. The Human Trafficking Advocate's social work background will enable the Human Trafficking Program to meet these needs in-house by providing trauma-informed services, and/or by providing culturally competent, community-based referrals. Victims of trafficking often necessitate special supports, including shelter and permanent housing, to escape their captors and avoid retribution. The Human Trafficking Advocate will work closely with community-based organizations and the District Attorney Investigations Bureau to ensure that these victims are safe. Sexually exploited minors require age appropriate interventions and services; the Human Trafficking Advocate will have experience working with this population. Victims of international trafficking also need assistance regarding their immigration status, which the Human Trafficking Advocate will facilitate.

Lastly, successful identification, intervention, and prosecution of human trafficking requires a high level of coordination between Victims Services, the police and the prosecutor to adequately resolve the legal, physical, and emotional results of human trafficking. The Human

Trafficking Advocate will collaboratively triage human trafficking victimization situations and coordinate efficiently with other agencies to secure the best possible outcome for the victims.

Strategy 2. The Human Trafficking Program of the Victim Services Division will ensure that all victims of human trafficking receive the full range of intervention and supportive services that are provided to all victims of crime (as described on page 3).

The Victim Services Division receives referrals from the San Francisco District Attorney's Office, and other community-based organizations and the Special Victims Unit of the San Francisco Police Department (SFPD). Staff makes initial phone contact with a victim within one business day of case assignment. If a victim cannot be reached by phone, the advocate will follow up with letters and information on resources within 72 hours of the initial phone call attempt. Upon making contact with the victim, the advocate sets up a meeting of relevant partners including the police investigator and the assigned prosecutor. During the initial meeting, the Victim Services staff explains the criminal justice system, assesses the victim's immediate needs, provides information about and referrals to specialized community based support and services, and develops a uniquely tailored, trauma-informed case plan. Specific services include transportation to court or other appointments, in-court support and advocacy, victim compensation assistance, facilitating access to appropriate mental health services and filling out applications. The Victim Services Division ensures that victims of human trafficking get emergency, post-adjudication and long-term support. With the addition of the Human Trafficking Advocate, these services will be expanded to better meet the unique needs of trafficked persons.

Strategy 3. The Human Trafficking Program will enhance interagency collaboration to increase the identification of victims of human trafficking and coordinate services. As of January 2010, nearly 30 nongovernmental organizations and governmental agencies in the San Francisco Bay Area, including the SFDA's Victim Services Division, have come together to address human trafficking in San Francisco. The City of San Francisco currently has two efforts

addressing this issue. The San Francisco Mayor's Task Force on Anti-Human Trafficking, staffed by the Department on the Status of Woman, is working to improve policies and increase the city's responsiveness to human trafficking and to identify gaps in services. The San Francisco Collaboration Against Human Trafficking primarily focuses on public outreach, conferences, and workshops in San Francisco.

The Human Trafficking Advocate will continue to participate in both bodies. Additionally, the Human Trafficking Advocate, under the direction of the Victim Services Division Chief and the Managing Attorney of the Sex Assault Unit, will develop new strategies with member agencies to better serve identified victims and identify new victims, and serve as the point person for interagency collaboration. For example, the Human Trafficking Program is developing a protocol with the San Francisco Police Department (SFPD) to alert the Human Trafficking Advocate of all suspected victims, regardless of whether the incident is reported or presented to SFDA. Additionally, SFDA and SFPD are developing protocols to include the Human Trafficking Advocate on human trafficking operations. In this way, the advocate can interact with potential victims immediately, potentially reducing their likelihood to leave the scene, and increase service uptake.

In regards to commercially sexually exploited youth, enhanced partnerships between the Victim Services Division and the Juvenile Probation Department will significantly improve the identification of these youth, who may be arrested for other criminal activity. The Human Trafficking Advocate will work with justice-involved juveniles who have been trafficked to address trauma and develop skills to develop meaningful relationships. Additionally, the Human Trafficking Advocate will partner with Family & Children Services (child protective services) to identify foster youth who may be exhibiting signs of trafficking, or may be vulnerable to trafficking as part of the city wide FCS Commercial Sexual Exploitation Child Protocol.

Finally, the Human Trafficking Advocate will provide one point of contact for community based organizations serving vulnerable populations, facilitating reporting of criminal activity that

may be trafficking related, the protection of human trafficking victims' safety, and effective coordination of services for victims of trafficking.

Strategy 4. The Human Trafficking Program will work with the District Attorney's Public Outreach Coordinator and Task Force member agencies to implement a multi-pronged public awareness campaign against trafficking. Combating human trafficking is particularly challenging because victims often do not admit to their victimization or exhibit obvious signs of being trafficked. SFDA will implement a public outreach strategy that targets victims and potential victims, as well as those who interact with victims, including the community at large. As a first step, the San Francisco Unified School District is partnering with Love Never Fails, an organization that provides anti-trafficking training in middle schools in Oakland to pilot the curriculum in San Francisco high schools this fall. The Human Trafficking Advocate will support this effort, which is targeting those youth most likely to be vulnerable to sexual exploitation.

SFDA will also pursue training and outreach opportunities for a wide range of potential first responders, including victim advocates, law enforcement and health care professionals, as well as less traditional responders, such as hotel/motel staff, restaurant associations, faith based organizations, educational organizations and taxi drives. The training will include information about indicators of human trafficking, as well as information regarding the safest way to report suspicious activity.

Lastly, SFDA has embarked on a process to update the curriculum of its longstanding First Offender Prostitution Program, a sex buyer intervention diversion program, to ensure that it is evidence based. Information about human trafficking has always been part of the curriculum, and this area will be enhanced to ensure that sex buyers know how to identify human trafficking and understand the consequences of purchasing sex from trafficked persons.

III. CAPABILITIES

Roles & Responsibilities of Program Staff: Under the leadership of the Chief of Victim Services, the Human Trafficking Victim Advocate will be focused on achieving all grant objectives. The newly hired Chief of Victim Services is a leader in the field of trauma informed care, and has extensive experience working on the issue of human trafficking, particularly that of young people.

Human Trafficking Victim Advocate Training and Qualifications: The Victim Services Division will hire a full-time victim advocate to work exclusively with victims of all forms of human trafficking, providing comprehensive victim services. The Human Trafficking Advocate will work directly with community-based organizations that respond to symptoms of human trafficking in San Francisco, and will focus on referring victims to the Victim Services Division. Given the complexity of human trafficking, the Advocate will bring a background in commercial sexual exploitation, as well as social work, to enable the Human Trafficking Program to meet these needs in-house or provide effective referrals. Additionally, the human trafficking advocate will ensure that the victim receives all relevant information regarding the criminal case.

Volunteers: Given resource limitations, the Victim Services Division makes full use of volunteers through a formal internship program that includes extensive training. Interns are recruited from local universities and colleges. Once accepted, interns make a minimum nine-month commitment to the Program through a contractual agreement. These volunteer interns, supervised by a victim advocate, follow up with client requests, support victim advocates in their assistance of victims, provide information and referrals to drop-in clients, update resource and referral materials to be distributed to the public, and provide various administrative functions. Volunteers use timesheets to keep track of their time. The Program expands its use of interns during the summer months to augment its ability to provide services to victims. All interns must pass a background check before acceptance into the Program.

IV. GOALS AND OBJECTIVES

Goal #1: Address the emergency and long-term needs of victims of human trafficking.

Objectives:

- o The Human Trafficking Advocate will contact all referred human trafficking victims.
- Human trafficking victims will understand their legal rights, services available to them and develop a clearer understanding of the criminal justice system.
- Human Trafficking Advocate will contact referring agencies within 24 hours after the initial referral.
- A clear comprehensive trauma-informed service plan that meets each individual's needs
 will be implemented for all victims of human trafficking.
- o Human trafficking victims will be calmed by the clarity and quality of support provided.

Activities

- Recruit and hire a Human Trafficking Advocate with experience working successfully with victims of human trafficking, and a background in social work, to provide comprehensive trauma-informed services and service referrals.
- Hold one-on-one meetings with partner agencies' case managers, probation officers,
 and peer counselors to obtain a complete assessment of each victim's circumstances.
- Streamline service delivery, including eliminating the use of nonessential documentation and consolidating information from multiple forms into a single document.
- Provide opportunities for ongoing training in the provision of trauma-informed services and human trafficking to the Human Trafficking Advocate.

Outcomes:

- o Victims will receive a more streamlined advocacy process.
- 100% of human trafficking victims will have a comprehensive trauma-informed service plan that addresses short and long-term needs.

 100% of human trafficking victims will be referred to culturally and linguistically appropriate services.

Goal #2: Strengthen collaboration with law enforcement and community-based

organizations.

Objectives:

- Increase the identification and protection of victims of human trafficking through interagency collaboration.
- Effectively coordinate services across agencies and community-based organizations for victims of human trafficking.

Activities:

- Human Trafficking Advocate will continue to participate in the Mayor's Task Force on
 Anti-Human Trafficking and the San Francisco Collaborative Against Human Trafficking.
- Establish protocol with the Juvenile Probation Department to receive referrals for any youth suspected of being trafficked.
- Work with law enforcement to obtain all police reports that exhibit indicators of human trafficking, regardless of the whether or not the incidents have been charged.
- Develop a protocol with law enforcement to participate in human trafficking criminal operations enabling the Human Trafficking Advocate to serve as a first responder for victims of human trafficking.
- Partner with the Family & Children Services Agency to identify foster youth who have been trafficked or are vulnerable to trafficking.
- Establish the Human Trafficking Advocate as the primary point of contact in the District Attorney's Office for all partner agencies and community-based organizations in addressing trafficking victimization.

Outcomes:

- The number of interagency protocols for identifying, protecting and serving victims of human trafficking will increase.
- o The proportion of victims of human trafficking that are identified as such will increase.
- o The number of identified victims receiving victim services will increase.

Goal #3: Enhance knowledge and awareness of human trafficking in the District Attorney's Office, throughout the City, and among current and potential victims.

- All Victim Services Advocates and Prosecutors will learn to effectively identify and address victims of human trafficking.
- A broad range of first responders, from law enforcement, community based organizations and hospitals to hotel workers, cab drivers and others, will learn to identify signs of human trafficking and how to report suspicious activity.
- The community at large will gain an increased understanding of the issue of human trafficking and how to report suspicious activity.
- Vulnerable populations, including youth, will receive educational opportunities to increase awareness of trafficking and how to seek support and services.
- Victims of human trafficking will be exposed to increased information about where to receive services and report criminal activity.

Activities:

- Conduct trainings for advocates and prosecutors regarding cultural sensitivity, trauma informed services, and human trafficking.
- Conduct human trafficking trainings for criminal justice partners, community based
 organization, hospitals, health workers, hotels, and cab and transportation agencies.

- Create compelling public awareness campaigns to educate the public on human trafficking, reporting and service availability.
- Support the School District's development of an anti-trafficking curriculum for school children.
- Implement a public outreach strategy that targets victims and potential victims, and provides information about how to obtain help.

Outcomes

- All Victim Advocates and Prosecutors at the San Francisco District Attorney's Office will receive training on the issue of human trafficking.
- A broad swath of first responders will receive human trafficking training.
- A public awareness campaign including billboards, bus and bus-shelter ads, posters and pamphlets will increase awareness of this issue across our community, for the public, potential victims and victims alike.
- Due to these efforts, additional victims will seek services from the Victim Services
 Division.

Budget Narrative

A. PERSONAL SERVICES

Total personnel costs for the 2016 grant cycle (10/1/2015 – 9/30/2016) is \$137,056. Of that, \$109,487 comes from grant funds and \$27,569 is provided as an in-kind match. The budgeted 8129 Victim/Witness Investigator I classification (job description is attached with original application), 1.0 FTE Human Trafficking Advocate, is fully supported with grant funds and the inkind match of a 0.31 FTE Volunteer Intern Human Trafficking Advocate.

The Victim Services Division of the San Francisco District Attorney's Office seeks to recruit and hire a full-time Human Trafficking Advocate (8129 Victim/Witness Investigator I) to achieve the goals of this RFP. Under supervision, the Human Trafficking Advocate will perform a wide variety of victim/witness assistive and support duties; interview victims and witnesses about criminal case; collect and compile information pertinent to cases; explain criminal justice system to victims and witnesses and develop supportive and cooperative relationship with individual; may provide support to victims and witnesses in court; and assist other public and private agencies in criminal justice functions.

The Human Trafficking Advocate will respond specifically to victims of human trafficking and collaborate with institutions and community-based organizations that address human trafficking. The Human Trafficking Advocate will provide trauma informed victim services to trafficked persons and make culturally competent referrals to community-based organizations working with this population. The Human Trafficking Advocate will develop interagency partnerships and protocols to increase the identification of trafficked persons.

This position requires completion of a four-year college or university, with a baccalaureate degree, with major course work in social service. Requires one year of experience as a social worker in a recognized social service agency working with victims of human trafficking.

The work of the Human Trafficking Advocate is supervised by the 8135 Assistant Chief Victim Witness Investigator at 0.15 FTE. The Assistant Chief will oversee day to day activities related to the grant and ensure successful implementation of the Human Trafficking Program (1) Hire a full-time Human Trafficking Advocate, with expertise in social work and human trafficking; (2) Ensure that all human trafficking victims receive comprehensive victim services; (3) Enhance the collaboration with the Mayor's Task Force on Anti-Human Trafficking and its member agencies to increase the identification of victims of human trafficking and coordinate services; and, (4) Implement a public awareness and outreach campaigns regarding human trafficking.


San Francisco District Attorney Executive Staff Organizational Structure

Both agencies believe that implementation of the District Attorney's Office Victim Services Human Trafficking Program will further this goal, if funded by the Human Trafficking Advocacy Program. To this end, each agency agrees to support the program.

The District Attorney's Victim Services Division Human Trafficking Program will coordinate human trafficking services with the Mayor's Task Force on Anti-Human Trafficking through:

Project staff participating in all meetings of the Mayor's Task Force on Anti-Human Trafficking.

Project staff collaborating with member agencies of the Mayor's Task Force on Anti-Human Trafficking to develop policies and procedures that effectively support victims of human trafficking and the development of trauma-informed services for these victims.

DURATION

This operational agreement is effective from October 1, 2014 to September 30, 2017. This agreement may be terminated by either party or amended with the express written consent of both parties.

In order to address the identified gap between the incidence and the detection of human trafficking in San Francisco, the San Francisco District Attorney's Office Victim Services Division plans to implement a Human Trafficking Program. The Human Trafficking Program will include four major components: (1) Hire a full-time Human Trafficking Advocate, with expertise in social work and human trafficking; (2) Ensure that all human trafficking victims receive comprehensive victim services; (3) Enhance the collaboration with the Mayor's Task Force on Anti-Human Trafficking and its member agencies to increase the identification of victims of human trafficking and coordinate services; and, (4) Implement a public awareness and outreach campaigns regarding human trafficking.

8. PROBLEM STATEMENT

The City and County of San Francisco, the only city-county dual jurisdiction government in California, covers approximately 46 square miles and is home to approximately 805,235 people (2010 U.S. Census Bureau). San Francisco is the center of international tourism and a major commuter destination; its daytime population exceeds 1.5 million. San Francisco is extremely dense and ethnically, linguistically and socio-economically diverse. Unfortunately, San Francisco's position as a center of tourism, economic activity, and immigration has also led it to become a hot spot for human trafficking. San Francisco is one of the top 20 human trafficking jurisdictions in the entire country. A preliminary analysis of the connections across advertisements on Backpage, the most popular sex buyer website in the United States, found that San Francisco is likely to be a primary hub for the sex industry as well.

9. OBJECTIVES

#1: Address the emergency and long-term needs of victims of human trafficking.

#2: Strengthen collaboration with law enforcement and community-based organizations.

#3: Enhance knowledge and awareness of human trafficking in the District Attorney's Office, throughout the City, and among current and potential victims.

10. ACTIVITIES

N/A

Recruit and hire a Human Trafficking Advocate with experience working successfully with victims of human trafficking, and a background in social work, to provide comprehensive trauma-informed services and service referrals. Hold one-on-one meetings with partner agencies' case managers, probation officers, and peer counselors to obtain a complete assessment of each victim's circumstances. Streamline service delivery, including eliminating the use of nonessential documentation and consolidating information from multiple forms into a single document. Provide opportunities for ongoing training in the provision of trauma-informed services and human trafficking to the Human Trafficking Advocate. Conduct trainings for advocates and prosecutors regarding cultural sensitivity, trauma informed services, and human trafficking. Establish the Human Trafficking Advocate as the primary point of contact in the District Attorney's Office for all partner agencies and community-based organizations in addressing trafficking victimization.
