The San Francisco Child Care Planning and Advisory Council (CPAC) is seeking individuals who are interested in applying for appointment. For additional information, call Tony Tyson, CPAC Coordinator at (415) 355-3673.

#### Child Care Planning and Advisory Council (CPAC) Purpose:

The purpose of the San Francisco Child Care Planning and Advisory Council (CPAC) is to advise the Board of Supervisors, the Mayor, the San Francisco Fist 5 Children and Families Commission and, with their consent, the Board of Education and the Superintendent of Schools about early care and education (ECE) and out of school time (OST) issues. CPAC is legislatively mandated to serve as a representative advisory and planning body to maintain, expand and improve local ECE and OST services for 0 - 12 year olds; and the council provides links between government and the community to work to maximize the amount and impact of local, state, federal and private resources and funding for ECE and OST provision in San Francisco.

#### Child Care Planning and Advisory Council (CPAC) Powers and Duties:

Upon approval of the Board of Supervisors and the County Superintendent of Schools, to submit to the California Department of Education - Early Education and Support Division (CDE-EESD) changes in local priorities for the allocation of state child care and development funds. CPAC duties include conducting a Needs Assessment of ECE and OST needs every 5 years and comply with all guidelines issued by CDE-EESD. In addition, CPAC is responsible for reviewing ECE and OST policy issues; conducting research and analysis; making recommendations regarding CDE-EESD funding; and coordinating county-wide projects to assist the development and improvement of early education and OST services for ages 0-12.

#### Child Care Planning and Advisory Council (CPAC) Membership:

CPAC membership is comprised of 25 members from varied backgrounds who have demonstrated expertise and experience in early care and education and out of school time. Members are appointed by the Board of Supervisors and Board of Education. The Board of Supervisors and the Board of Education each appoint 12 members, and the President of the Board of Supervisors appoints one additional member for a total of 25 voting members.

#### Education Code Section 8499.3 mandates that membership composition is equal divided following five categories:

- 1. Child Care Consumers: parents or persons who receive or who have received ECE or out of school time services within the past 36 months (subsidized or unsubsidized; subsidies may be any tuition assistance, whether public or private, on an incomeassistance basis);
- 2. Child Care Providers: persons who provide ECE or OST services or represent persons who provide child care services;
- 3. Public Agency Representatives: persons who represent a city, a county, city and county or local education agency;
- 4. Community Representatives: persons who represent an agency or business that provides private funding for ECE or out of school time services or who advocate for these services through participation in civic or community based organizations, but are not providers and do not represent agencies that contract with CDE-EESD to provide child care and development services;
- 5. Members at discretion of Board or Superintendent: persons from any of the above categories or outside of these categories at the discretion of the appointing agencies.

Along with these categories, San Francisco CPAC has specified that we nominate a diverse population within categories as well, specifying that we represent many types of providers, consumers, etc. (family and private child care, subsidized and unsubsidized parents, etc.) We also are always seeking to represent the San Francisco's spectrum of races, ethnicities, and sexual orientations.

#### The application process is as follows:

- 1. Applicants must submit the reverse side with an application statement to: Tony Tyson, CPAC Coordinator Office of Early Care and Education, 1650 Mission Street, Suite 312, San Francisco, CA 94103 or Anthony. Tyson@sfgov.org
- 2. The Membership Committee will forward selected candidates to the Executive Committee for review.
- 3. If selected, member applications will be forwarded to Board of Supervisors or County Superintendent of Schools. (Applications forwarded to appointing agencies do not guarantee appointment to CPAC).
- 4. New CPAC members will be invited to participate in an upcoming Child Care Planning and Advisory Council meeting as soon as their appointment is confirmed. (CPAC meetings are always open to the public and attendance is encouraged prior to appointment.)

All applicants will be informed of their status at each step of this process.

The San Francisco Child Care Planning and Advisory Council (CPAC) is a State mandated policy and planning body appointed by the Board of Supervisors and the Board of Education to advise the City on early care and education issues.

Michele Rutherford, Deputy Director at the Office of Early Care and Education (OECE) is currently seated as a Public Agency Representative, appointed by Board of Supervisor President David Chiu. Michele has been a tremendous asset to CPAC and taken a variety of leadership roles for the Council over her many years of service. #### **Board Qualifications:**

The Child Care Planning and Advisory Council consists of twenty-five (25) members. The Board of Supervisors appoints twelve (12) members: one (1) nominated by each individual member of the Board, and approved by the full Board; and one (1) nominated by the President of the Board. The Board of Education or County Superintendent of Schools, if the Board of Education delegates the appointment power to him/her, shall also appoint twelve (12) members. One (1) member shall be jointly appointed by the Board of Supervisors and the Board of Education, or the County Superintendent of Schools, if the Board of Education delegates the appointment power to him/her.

The members appointed by the Board of Supervisors shall be representative of the following categories:

- A) "Consumers" Parents, guardians or caretakers with varied income levels who use child care and/or early education services, including but not limited to clients of publicly subsidized programs such as CalWORKS, and other child care programs funded through the San Francisco Human Services Agency, the California Department of Education, Head Start or Preschool for All:
- B) "Child Care Providers" Private and subsidized child care providers including, but not limited to, from a private center, from a family day care home, a Title 5 program, a school age program, from a Head Start center and from a Preschool for All site;
- C) "Discretionary" Representatives of the public at-large and/or representatives from any of the

other categories, or outside of these categories at the discretion of the appointing agencies; D) "Community Representatives" - Parent advisory councils of public and private child care programs; associations of child care providers, family child care providers and Head Start; City College of San Francisco, San Francisco State University, public interest organizations including, but not limited to, the Child Care Law Center, Low Income Investment Fund community organizations, members of labor organizations and local businesses that fall within the definition of "community representative" as described in Subsection (d)(1) (B) and other community and public agency representatives that deal with child care; and E) "Public Agency Representatives" - Representative from two of the following agencies: the Department of Children, Youth and Their Families, Human Services Agency, San Francisco Children and Families Commission, Community Care Licensing, Department of Public Health, Recreation and Park Department, Mayor's Office of Community Investment and San Francisco Housing Authority, or other entities.

The Council is established to advise the Board of Supervisors, the Mayor, the San Francisco Children and Families Commission and, with their consent, the Board of Education and the Superintendent of Schools about child care issues. The Council will serve as a representative advisory and planning body to maintain, expand and improve local child care services. The Council will provide links between government and the community, and will work to maximize the amount and impact of local state, federal and private resources and funding for child care in San Francisco. Powers and Duties are outlined in Administrative Code, Section 5.200.

All terms shall be for three years. Members may serve for up to two consecutive terms, and may be re-appointed after one year off the Council. No terms served prior to March 8, 2010, shall be counted towards the term limit for Council members. A member appointed to serve a term of two years or less, including the initial term provided in the preceding paragraph, shall not be deemed to have served a full term for purposes of this term limit.

Compensation: Upon approval by the Council, each member who is not otherwise compensated to attend meetings may receive a stipend of no more than \$50 per meeting, not to exceed \$300 annually, exclusively from funds provided to the Council by the State of California.
