8. Proposed Grant Project Summary:

The overall purpose of the San Francisco Safe Routes to School (SF SRTS) program is to promote walking and biking to and from San Francisco schools. Specifically, SF SRTS will deliver an integrated set of services based on four of the five Es – Education, Encouragement, Engineering and Evaluation - to 35 elementary, 3 middle and 2 high SFUSD schools from September 2014 to August 2017.

SF SRTS began offering services at elementary schools in San Francisco in fiscal year 09-10, while also building capacity—at the school-site and district level—to provide ongoing services that promote safe walking and biking to school. SF SRTS utilizes the internationally accepted five Es of the SRTS model – Education, Encouragement, Engineering, Enforcement and Evaluation. In addition, the SF SRTS team has put into place an interagency system for prioritizing schools for future SRTS services and infrastructure projects, thus building the long-term capacity of San Francisco schools to promote walking and biking to school. The SF SRTS coalition includes a multi-disciplinary group of city agencies, non-profit organizations, and public schools working together to make San Francisco safer for all school-aged children to walk and bike safely to school.

The Metropolitan Transportation Commission awarded an additional \$360,000 to the SF Safe Routes to School **Project in school year 16-17.** With these additional funds, specific program deliverables will include:

- Expanding SRTS communication and evaluation;
- Expanding parent/caregiver outreach;
- Expanding SRTS assemblies on pedestrian and bike safety;
- Expanding hands-on bike education to middle schools;
- Expanding reach of Walk and Roll to School Day 2016;
- Expanding reach of school transportation toolkits; and
- Expanding annual school commute study to school year 16-17.
