I am writing to urge you to reappoint Joseph Calderon to the Reentry Council. I am a social worker and a psychoanalyst in San Francisco. In that capacity, I am the cochair for a series of clinical evenings at the San Francisco Center for Psychoanalysis. This is our 7th year of programming and we present programs that are focused on social justice while also being theoretically rigorous. Our target population is early career and seasoned social workers and well as mental health clinicians of all varieties who work in the public sector.

This evening we were lucky enough to have a panel of speakers that included Mr. Joseph Calderon He is a remarkable speaker and teacher. What makes Joe Calderon a stand out is his ability to see the big picture, think about policy and then weave a personal, indvidual story into his narrative. Tonight he was on a panel with his adult daughter, Jessica Calderon as well as Mr. Ernest Kirkwood and his son, Keesu Kirkwood. Our auditorium was nearly filled to capacity with an audience of 100 attendees. The auditorium at our center was struck with an enrapt silence as Joe Calderon and the other speakers generously helped us to understand what their lives were like. Mr. Calderon spoke movingly about the changes that he went through, the connections he made with other incarcerated men who were willingly to talk about the importance of their family relationships and how that impacted change in his violent behavior. He also met with a group of us earlier to help plan this event. Many people came to me at the end of the evening to let me know that this was one of the best events we have ever had. They also asked to have more of this kind of programming.

Mr. Calderon is a natural teacher and is especially adept at thinking on several levels at once. He was eloquent in articulating both his personal story but pointing out the impact of culture, politics, and violence on his life. The audience was very

moved and Joe made people able to think about trauma, violence, resiliency, and hopefulness. I think that you are very lucky to have him on your committee and I strongly urge you to retain him.

I am a San Francisco native and raised here for most of my life. I lived in the Bayview, Fillmore, and Sunnydale communities. As an African American woman who was formerly incarcerated, I represent African Americans who are disproportionately impacted by incarceration and reentry. I work at Glide Foundation in social services in the Tenderloin neighborhood with a large post-release population of men and women. I work with people that come here to live post-release that are on parole or probation. I was also formerly incarcerated where I served 22 months in prison and 1 year in county jail, and am also in recovery from drugs and alcohol for 11 years. I graduated from Walden House in 2005. Ten years later in May 2015, I successfully graduated from City College San Francisco as a Drug and Alcohol Counselor.


Business and/or professional experience:

During my 11 years here at Glide I have held many different staffing positions: Security Monitor, Client Advocate, Family Case Manager and was host of Speak Out for 4 years. I am currently a Case Manager in Glide's Walk In Center and specifically focus on supporting the reentry population to stabilize and thrive. As Case Manager I serve a diverse population which I assist with goal planning, treatment options and assessments, housing assistance, basic needs, and connecting with primary care and mental health services. The Walk In Center served 2,964 unduplicated clients with 9,184 units of service in the fiscal year 2014-2015. In addition, to my role in the Walk-In Center, I also facilitate a Recovery Circle twice weekly for men and women who struggle with drug use and other addictions and provide them with individual counseling as needed. I have jail clearance and visit County Jail #2 every Monday to facilitate reentry support for women who will be exiting soon. I often correspond with incarcerated individuals who send us letters inquiring about services and support from prisons all over California, and many connect with me upon release.

I am writing to urge you to reappoint Ernest Kirkwood to the Reentry Council. I am a social worker and a psychoanalyst in San Francisco. In that capacity, I am the cochair for a series of clinical evenings at the San Francisco Center for Psychoanalysis. This is our 7th year of programming and we present programs that are focused on social justice while also being theoretically rigorous. Our target population is early career and seasoned social workers and well as mental health clinicians of all varieties who work in the public sector.

This evening we were lucky enough to have a panel of speakers that included Mr. Ernest Kirkwood. He is a remarkable speaker and teacher. What makes Ernest Kirkwood so unique is that he has a real capacity to be reflective and to think about the circumstances that brought him to commit the crimes that he was incarcerated for, and then also to think and talk about what he did to keep his humanity, to come to know himself and to become the citizen that he is today. He was so generous with his time but even more importantly with his experiences. He allowed a room of 100 clinicians learn about what it is like to be an incarcerated parent and to hear about the kind of connections, interventions and programs that helped him overcome his impulsive, violent history. He helped a group of clinicians learn something about intergence ational trauma, resiliency, and the role of relationship in healing.

The auditorium at our center was struck with an enrapt silence as Ernest generously helped us to understand what his life is like. Mr. Kirkwood also met with a group of us earlier to help plan this event. Many people came to me at the end of the evening to let me know that this was one of the best events we have ever had. They also asked to have more of this kind of programming.

Mr. Kirkwood is a natural teacher and has very powerful gifts for making connections with other people and getting them to think about trauma, violence, resiliency, and hopefulness. I think that you are very lucky to have him on your committee and I strongly urge you to retain him.


I am pleased to write this recommendation for Ernest Kirkwood in support of his reappointment to the San Francisco Reentry Council.

Dear Supervisors Tang, Cohen and Mar:

I am writing to wholeheartedly recommend Mr. Earnest Kirkwood be reappointed to a designated exoffender seat on the San Francisco Reentry Council. Mr. Kirkwood spent 29 years incarcerated for two counts of second degree murder and was paroled on January 12, 2012. He has been a sitting member of the SF Reentry Council, works for Health Right 360 and has obtained his Community Health Care Worker Certificate from CCSF. During this time, he earned an early discharge from parole – a feat that is not to be taken lightly. Additionally, Earnest spends much of his free time speaking to and working with many of the men and women currently incarcerated in our jails as well as making appearances at community and educational institutions educating the rest of us on what it means to be an ex-offender and how we can change our systems to better break down systemic barriers to reentry.

I first met Mr. Kirkwood when he was keynote speaker at Grace Cathedral for the Archdioceses Reentry Fair in 2103. I was impressed from the start as he recounted how he ended up in prison, the process of getting paroled and how he was ultimately successful in navigating the many barriers to successful reentry. I later sat down with Mr. Kirkwood and had a chance to get to know him a little better. During our conversation I asked him how long he had been in prison before he turned his life around in order to be approved for parole. He told me that at about 14 years in he realized that if he went through the motions and participated solely for the benefit of the parole board—even if he was granted parole—he would not be successful upon release. It was then that he made the decision to work on himself and that was when things became clearer and the real change began.

Needless to say, this is the message that we want the population we serve to hear. They need to want to change and want to do it for themselves with no extrinsic reward. The fact is that going through the

motions just to get out of jail, receive a lighter sentence or get a job, is not going work and the value of having someone like Mr. Kirkwood deliver this message is without parallel.

Finally, I have attended many Reentry Council meetings and have always been impressed with Mr. Kirkwood's thoughtful and articulate contributions. Moreover, as an attorney and an ex-offender myself, I find his zealous advocacy for the population we are attempting to serve and his willingness to speak up on a distinguished panel of elected officials and department heads is without parallel. If Mr. Kirkwood is not reappointed it will be a loss for the entire reentry community.



Advocacy Work and Prisoners' Rights

The MAC is a prisoner advocacy group with bodies in all 33 prisons intended and designed to communicate and advance the rights of prisoners to programs and fair treatment, and to compel, through litigation and legislation, an evolving reform of California's prison system.

Chair of the Statewide Council on Inmate Affairs, representing the interests of all 33 MAC executive bodies to Sacramento.

- Elected by collective vote of the Advisory Councils at each of California's 33 prisons.
- Successfully negotiated expansion of educational, vocational and rehabilitative services, including access to computer software and technology.

Filed hundreds of administrative appeals and petitions, as well as State and Federal writs.

- Successfully appealed to provide community standard healthcare for prisoners with AIDS and Hepatitis C. The successful litigation on behalf of one prisoner resulted in the CDCR making available a new and more effective Hepatitis C treatment that has improved the lives of hundreds of infected prisoners over the past 15+ years.
- Researched and composed administrative and state appeals resulting in early reforms in California's administrative segregation policies and procedures, such as the requirement that prisoners in Ad Seg be provided with appropriate cleaning supplies, showers, time outdoors and hot food served within view of the prisoner (Toussaint v. McCarthy).
- Under my leadership, San Quentin's MAC was at the forefront of the movement to desegregate and mainline transgendered inmates, thereby providing equal access to rehabilitative and educational programming, without which it was shown they were serving lengthier terms.

Grassroots Community Organizing and Support Programs

- Facilitated multiple fundraisers and charitable events, raising over \$1.5M in 15 years to support victims of violent crime, disaster relief and effective, prisoner-facilitated self-help and growth programs.
- Sought out and established training and state certification courses in crisis intervention and trauma counseling, and created a first-of- its-kind team of 14 peer intercessors aptly named "Brother's Keepers," all trained and qualified to spot signs of depression and suicidal potentialities and intercede before tragic decisions could mature into action.
- Lobbied for, and realized, a hugely successful on-grounds university degree program run by the Prison University Project, as well as computer technology and Microsoft certification programs.

- Negotiated onsite CAADAC courses that realized the first inmates in the nation to become state certified Drug and Alcohol Counselors.
- Created, participated, and received certifications in a Restorative Justice modeled Victim/Offender Reconciliation Group.
- Organized a Computer Network Team of inmates to build computers from scratch, learn several programming languages, and eventually author multiple software programs for Prison Industry Authority valued at over \$150k, including a payroll program that replaced a manual process in the prison's accounting office.

Mediation and Collaboration

Engaged in ongoing mediation and negotiations with everyone from warring prison gangs, to the guard's union (CCPOA), San Quentin's Warden and often the Secretary of Corrections. Typical to these efforts would be:

- Following a 2006 race riot, with reactive violence spreading to 2 additional institutions, I brought together a subcommittee with representatives from each of the major racial factions to meditate a peace and to examine the underlying causes of racial tension in the prisons. More than a year of negotiations culminated in a first ever Day of Peace, with 1400 prisoners participating without incident; the day closed with over 1000 prisoners signing a contract banner indicating their willingness to live as a community. The Day of Peace is now an annual event at San Quentin, and the violence that spurred us to action was quelled.
- Worked in collaboration with staff and the Western Association of Schools and Colleges
 as a stakeholder in the accreditation process for the Mountain Oaks Adult Education
 Center, including meeting with the review committee to provide input on resource
 management and development, student learning, life skills, re-entry resources and
 computer-based curriculum and courseware.

Rules Committee:

My name is Marvin Mutch. After researching the areas of focus central to the Reentry Council seat(s), I believe my experience over the course of a lifetime has been preparatory to this application.

In my life I have been an intimate, albeit unwilling, participant in not only the foster care and juvenile justice systems in California (starting at the age of four) but her Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation (CDCR) as well. I was only recently released from a California prison on February 17, 2016, after having served 41 years of an indeterminate seven-years-to-life term for a crime I did not commit.

I am free today due wholly to the efforts of Professor Heidi Rummel of the USC Post Conviction Justice Project, Professor Emeritus Susan Rutberg from the Golden Gate University Wrongful Conviction Clinic, Attorney Michael Snedeker of Snedeker and Short, and the law firm of Morrison and Foerster here in San Francisco.

I appeared before the Parole Board 22 times over the course of 40 years and was found suitable for release on three separate occasions; however, both the first and second established release dates were reversed at the last possible moment by Governors Davis and Schwarzenegger, respectively, with the third suitability finding coming 10 years later under Governor Brown and surviving review.

It is important to note the extent of my training and how it began... I entered San Quentin a frightened and angry young teen, facing the prospect, in my mind, that I may well die in prison. I joined the Prisoner's Union early on and was an active organizer and litigator until its debilitating implosion in 1977. While the Prisoners Union continued to exist in one form or another after 1977, it was never able to regain its initial momentum; times and politics had changed, and our outside supporters had moved on to a new cause.

For this reason, I felt compelled to rewrite the original proposed platform for the Prisoner's Union, marry it to a diversionary grievance process established by a previous San Quentin Warden, and form the first Men's Advisory Council at San Quentin (a prisoner advocacy group designed to communicate and advance the rights of prisoners to programs and fair

treatment, and to compel, through litigation and legislation, an evolving reform of California's prison system).ⁱ

Throughout the four decades I was incarcerated, I personally penned and crafted several hundred administrative grievances (i.e., CDCR-602s), writs and petitions, and represented the collective rights and needs of as many as 174,000 men and women at CDCR's highest point of population.

In addition to our prisoner rights and advocacy work, our group conducted fundraisers and charitable events to support victims of violent crime and disaster relief. We created truly effective, prisoner-facilitated, self-help and -growth programs. And we lobbied for, and realized, a hugely successful on-grounds university degree program, as well as computer technology and Microsoft certification programs.

We also successfully negotiated onsite Certified Alcohol Drug Counselor (CADC) courses that enabled the first inmates in the nation to become state-certified Drug and Alcohol Counselors. Further, we created, participated, and received certifications in a truly restorative Victim/Offender Reconciliation Group; sought out and established training and state certification courses in crisis intervention and trauma counseling; and created a first-of-its-kind team of peer intercessors aptly named "Brother's Keepers," to spot signs of depression and suicidal potentialities and intercede before tragic decisions could mature into action.ⁱⁱ

Crucially, having once been a participant in both the juvenile justice and foster care systems, I have lived the issues surrounding many troubled youth. Without the necessary knowledge and guidance to self-actualize and understand the justice they are guaranteed, the nation's youth are fatally disadvantaged with little or no path to the processes and protections they are due.

Although I have been gone from public sight for 41 years and have been free only a short six months, I believe I am uniquely qualified, by virtue of my intimate and extensive interaction with California's criminal justice system, to fulfill the areas of focus outlined in the posted seat qualifications.

In my experience as an activist, I have recent (2015-16) expert training certifications from Microsoft and have worked in office management nearly my entire incarceration. I have honed my planning and problem solving skills, and I believe a cooperative and inclusive team effort is key to any successful endeavor.

As both a justice advocate and litigator over the past 41 years, I have come to know that in order to truly establish and affect a restorative model of any kind—one that will have the greatest impact on a failing system—all stakeholders must be involved.

In conclusion, after more than 16 years of collective representation, the Innocence Project and their associates were successful in pleading my case before the Board and compelling my release, but not before suffering 41 years in the penitentiary and appearing before the Board 22 times.

The system, as it exists today, is horribly broken. It is self-perpetuating, creating at one level what it needs for the next. But there is a growing light, and I would like the opportunity to contribute to the evolution of California's criminal justice and parole policies.

While I do not hold a juris doctor degree, I lobbied, litigated, gave speeches, presentations and tours, wrote letters and writs, brokered peace and cooperative living agreements, and engaged in ongoing mediation and negotiations with everyone from warring prison gangs and the guard's union (CCPOA), to the Warden and often the Secretary of Corrections. And I was personally involved in the planning and implementation of every project and program involving the Men's Advisory Council.

In retrospect, I will admit that my actions were often compelled by my own lifelong need to realize fairness and a just resolution over things I perceived as unjust. This did not always make me popular with those who kept the watch, but the drive to make sure that due process was followed, that policy made sense, and that the stakeholders were heard made the wall that divided the incarcerated from the rest of the world seem manageable. The risk of not trying was not an option.

However, after years of effort, and the help of an ever growing number of individuals with the vision to see through the shadows, there remains a real hope that our battered communities may yet realize a restorative and synergetic solution to the problems plaguing California's juvenile and criminal justice systems, as well as her failed sentencing and correctional policies.

I would like the opportunity to meet with the Rules Committee members before you make your decision concerning the offered seat(s). My portfolio is a collection of activist platforms designed to reform California's prisons and mass incarceration policies, the CDCR and the Board of Parole Hearings, as well as a continuing advocacy aimed at correcting the traumatic physical and psychological violence associated with incarceration and the unfair application of law. It would be a pleasure to further discuss your innovative justice model and what needs to be done, from the perspective of one newly emerged from the cave, to correct California's failed and unfortunate choices.

ii The Brother's Keepers program is especially dear to my heart and developed out of a tragedy that affected me very deeply. I had a friend, Robert Dubner, with whom I would go to breakfast and dinner with each and every day for many, many years. One morning, Robert and I shared a breakfast together, exchanged small talk about the prison and then both went our way for the morning. I got to my office, he to his cell to await the morning "yard call." Robert never went to the yard that morning, instead, he committed suicide. When I got back to the block I could not accept it. "Somebody must have killed him," I said. "No," I was told, "he left a note. The cell was tied shut from the inside." I was confounded. How could I have sat across from this person, who I knew for so many years, and not see that he was literally hours away from such a tragic and final decision? I had to know what I had missed, what I failed to see. So I set out trying to find someone who could explain just how to spot the signs and behaviors critical to the early identification of suicidal depression and ideation. I turned to two women who had been coming into California prisons for some time, Marsha Blackstock and Diane Banyon from the Bay Area Women Against Rape (BAWAR). They were facilitating Victim/Offender Reconciliation Groups and agreed to put together an 18-month program that would train 14 men, myself included, in crisis intervention and counseling. Upon completion of this first of its kind training program, we all received state certifications in both crisis intervention and male sexual assault survivor counseling. The Brother's Keepers, I am proud to say, is extant today at San Quentin and two other California prisons. And, I am equally proud to say that San Quentin went from a suicide rate more than 3 times the national average, by population, to zero mainline suicides or attempts in the period after its establishment. All said, over the course of time, our council was able to transform the culture of violence at one of the nation's most violent and notorious prisons into one of learning and altruistic healing. Every endeavor spoken to above contributed to an ongoing and sustained healing in a terribly wounded place.

i Our first legal battle was immediate, as our newly penned constitution called for popular elections to decide both the leadership and body of the council and San Quentin's Warden was vehemently opposed to such a "ridiculous idea." We litigated the right to elect representation and asked the Marin courts to compel the Warden to establish legitimate communication with, and administrative recognition of, our newly formed and duly elected council. Two days before trial, the San Quentin administration capitulated and allowed the first popular election to occur at San Quentin. I was elected to chair the first elected body in the state, staffed not by members handpicked by a Warden, but fairly elected by those for whom they would speak. I was humbled by, and had the distinct honor of realizing, reelection by popular vote to the Chairmanship of San Quentin's Men's Advisory Council (MAC) every year for the next 27 years. I was also elected to chair the Statewide Council on Inmate Affairs, representing the shared grievances of 174,000 prisoners across California. During my tenure over the MAC, our council was at the forefront of early AIDS and Hepatitis C litigation and demands for community standard treatment; we also represented the San Quentin arm of the Stop Prison Rape movement; led demands for fair pay in PIA prison labor jobs; joined litigation compelling access to the courts and expanding law library resources; litigated to end censorship of our libraries, literature and personal mail; expanded visitation programs and community contact; partnered with State Child Support and Social Service agencies to negotiate a reasonable reduction of huge unpaid child support liens and facilitate future payments going forward; mediated factional gang disputes and deescalated racially motivated violence; and, most recently, our council was involved in the fight to end indefinite Security Housing Unit terms (solitary confinement), and we shared in the successful outcome of the Ban-the-Box movement, garnering more than 35,000 signatures from formerly incarcerated prisoners and their families to remove the questions concerning previous arrests from applications for employment, and lobbied for expanded pre- and post- release resources and programs. (This is a non-exhaustive list.)

Board Qualifications:

The Reentry Council was created to coordinate local efforts to support adults exiting San Francisco county jail, San Francisco juvenile justice system out-of-home placements, the California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation facilities, and the United States Federal Bureau of Prison facilities.

The Council shall provide the Mayor, Board of Supervisors, the public, and any other appropriate agency with accurate and comprehensive information about programs that serve this population, barriers faced by this population, best practices to meet the needs of this population, and funding sources for programs and practices that address the needs of this population. The Council shall coordinate information sharing, planning, and engagement among all interested private and public stakeholders to the extent permissible under federal and state law.

The Council shall consist of 23 members, seven (7) of whom shall be former inmates in the San Francisco County Jail, a California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation facility, and/or a United States Bureau of Prison facility.

The Mayor, or his designee, shall serve as one (1) member, and shall also appoint three (3) of the members. One (1) of the three (3) members shall be between the ages of 18 and 24 at the time of appointment, and one (1) shall have expertise in providing services to individuals exiting the criminal justice system.

San Francisco BOARD OF SUPERVISORS

The Board of Supervisors shall designate one (1) of its members to serve as a member of the Council, and shall appoint four (4) of the seven (7) members who are former inmates (added and revised by Ordinance No. 44-11). Of these four (4) members:

- > One (1) shall have expertise in providing services to individuals exiting the criminal justice system;
- > One (1) must have been released from custody within two years of his/her appointment;
- > One (1) must have served multiple terms of incarceration; and
- > One (1) must self-identify as a survivor of violence or crime.

All members of the Council shall be exempt from the Charter requirement that they be electors of the City and County of San Francisco (added by Ordinance No. 26-09).

The following City departments or agencies shall appoint one (1) member each to the Council: Public Defender's Office; District Attorney's Office; Sheriff's Department; Police Department; Adult Probation Department; Juvenile Probation Department; Department of Economic and Workforce Development; Human Services Agency; Department of Children, Youth and Families; and Department of Public Health (10 total).

In addition, co-chairs shall invite the San Francisco Superior Court, Department of Child Support Services, California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation Division of Adult Parole Operations, and United States Probation and Pretrial Services System to appoint one (1) member each to the Council. If any of these agencies do not appoint a representative, the co-chairs shall appoint an additional member (4 total).

Members shall serve two-year terms and shall serve at the pleasure of the appointing authority. Members may serve multiple terms. If any member misses two regularly scheduled meetings in a twelve-month period without prior notice, the Council shall certify that fact in writing to appointing authority and the member shall be deemed to have resigned.

Twelve members of the Council shall constitute a quorum and the Council shall have the authority to act on the vote of the majority of the quorum.

The four members appointed by the Adult Probation Department, District Attorney's Office, Public Defender's Office and Sheriff's Department, respectively, as well as the Mayor or the Mayor's representative, shall co-chair the Council. The Council may establish subcommittees. The Council shall meet in full at least three times per year.

Reports: At least once a year, the Council shall prepare and submit a report that shall include but not be limited to information identifying funding streams; programs serving individuals

exiting the criminal justice system; needs of reentry population; and barriers to safe and successful reentry. City departments shall respond within 30 days, if mentioned in report. Reports shall be provided to the Mayor, Board of Supervisors, City departments identified in the report, and the public.

The Council shall be staffed, subject to fiscal and budgetary provisions of the Charter, by the Public Defender's Office, District Attorney's Office, Adult Probation Department, and Mayor's Office who shall designate one staff member each.

Sunset: June 1, 2019, unless the Board of Supervisors adopts an ordinance continuing its existence.
