On December 16, 2016, the Proposed Five Year Financial Plan for FY 2017-18 through FY 2021-22 was jointly released by the Controller's Office, Mayor's Office, and Board of Supervisors Budget and Legislative Analyst's Office. This memo updates the Plan with the most recent information on the City's fiscal condition. The cost of City services is projected to outpace revenue growth. Total expenditures are projected to grow by \$1.4 billion over the next five years, which represents an increase of 30% over FY 2016-17 budgeted spending levels. In contrast, available General Fund sources are projected to grow 11%, or \$541.3 million over the same period. If the City does not take corrective action, the projected gap between revenues and expenditures will rise from \$87.1 million in FY 2017-18 to approximately \$907.4 million in FY 2021-22.

Executive Summary

- This memo summarizes our offices' current projections of the City's General Fund revenues and expenditures for the coming five fiscal years, through Fiscal Year (FY) 2021-22. The projection updates the Plan that was jointly prepared in December 2016.
- As was the case in the December projection, projected expenditure growth will exceed revenue growth in all years, resulting in growing shortfalls during the forecast period. The Charter requires the City to balance each fiscal year's budget, and to the extent ongoing solutions are adopted in that process, shortfalls in future years will be reduced accordingly.
- This projection shows a \$288 million cumulative shortfall for the upcoming two fiscal years the period for which the City is required to adopt a two-year budget in coming months. This represents an improvement of \$60 million versus the \$348 million projected following issuance of the Controller's Six Month Budget Status Report in February. These changes are detailed in the report, but are primarily driven by lower projected spending on debt service in the early years of the forecast.
- While the shortfalls during the first two years of the forecast have declined, those projected in out years of the forecast have increased. The shortfall for FY 2021-22, the final year of the projection, has increased from \$848 million in the December projection to \$907 million currently. These increases are driven primarily by increasing estimates of inflation during the five year period.
- Importantly, these forecasts do not assume any losses of federal or state revenues (except for
 formula-driven CalWORKS reductions), which together account for approximately 20% of City
 revenues. Although proposals that would have a significant negative impact on the City budget
 are pending at both the state and federal level, it is unclear which will ultimately be adopted and
 what the specific impacts will be. Our offices will continue to keep a close watch on potential
 state and federal budget changes over the coming months.

Five Year Financial Plan Update

On December 16, 2016, the Proposed Five Year Financial Plan for FY 2017-18 through FY 2021-22 was jointly released by the Controller's Office, Mayor's Office, and Board of Supervisors Budget and Legislative Analyst's Office. This memo updates the Plan with the most recent information on the City's fiscal condition.

The cost of City services is projected to outpace revenue growth. Total expenditures are projected to grow by \$1.4 billion over the next five years, which represents an increase of 30% over FY 2016-17 budgeted spending levels. In contrast, available General Fund sources are projected to grow 11%, or \$541.3 million over the same period. If the City does not take corrective action, the projected gap between revenues and expenditures will rise from \$87.1 million in FY 2017-18 to approximately \$907.4 million in FY 2021-22, as shown in Table 1 below.

Since December, the City has seen changes to its fiscal outlook due to:

- Additional sources identified in the Controller's FY 2016-17 Six-Month Budget Status Report and a revision of the City's revenue projections based on recent information;
- Increased inflationary costs, as projected by the California Department of Finance and Moody's; and
- Changes in projected expenditures for capital improvements, as recommend by the City's Capital Plan, released in early March 2017.

Background

The Five Year Financial Plan is required under Proposition A, a Charter amendment approved by the voters in November 2009. The City Charter requires the plan to forecast expenditures and revenues during the five year period, propose actions to balance revenues and expenditures during each year of the plan, and discuss strategic goals and corresponding resources for City departments. The Proposed Five Year Financial Plan for FY 2017-18 through FY 2021-22 was jointly released by the Mayor's Office, Controller's Office and Budget and Legislative Analyst's Office on December 16, 2016.

This memo updates projections in that Plan, and also addresses Charter Section 9.101, which requires the Controller to identify whether there will be significant increases in revenues or expenditures in FY 2017-18 for those departments with a fixed two-year budget: the Public Utilities Commission, the Port, the Airport, Child Support Services, and the Employees' Retirement System. None of these departments are projected to have significant changes to their approved FY 2017-18 budgets.

Changes from the Five Year Financial Plan Projection Released in December 2016

Most of the key assumptions outlined in the Five Year Financial Plan released in December 2016 still apply to this memo, with the changes outlined below. Table 2 identifies changes from the prior plan. The City's projected deficit decreased incrementally by \$31.9 million in FY 2017-18, decreased by an additional \$51.0 million in FY 2018-19, increased by \$110.1 million in FY 2019-20, increased further by \$33 million in FY 2020-21, and decreased by \$1.3 million in FY 2021-22.

The changes from the December 2016 projections are described in more detail below:

SOURCES – Revenue and Fund Balance: Projected General Fund sources have increased by \$26.5 million in FY 2017-18 and \$44 million in FY 2018-19, then decreased by \$86 million in FY 2019-20, increased by \$1.2 million in FY 2020-21, and decreased by \$4.2 million FY 2021-22.

- Fund Balance On February 10, 2017, the Controller's Office issued its FY 2016-17 Six-Month Budget Status Report. The report projected the FY 2016-17 ending fund balance to be \$71.8 million above the balance assumed in the Five Year Financial Plan. This update assumes use of this fund balance to be split one-third in FY 2017-18 and two-thirds in FY 2018-19. In addition, this update assumes \$60 million of unappropriated fund balance ("Reserve for Unknown Impacts") is appropriated and split one-third in FY 2017-18 and two-thirds in FY 2018-19. In the December 2016 Plan, the entire reserve was assumed to be appropriated in FY 2017-18.
- Local Tax Revenue Based on input on the City's underlying economic condition provided during February's Municipal Finance Advisory Committee (MFAC) meeting as well as six months of collections in the current fiscal year, General Fund revenues are projected to grow faster in FY 2017-18 and slower in subsequent years compared to the December 2016 plan. The revenue increase in FY 2017-18 is due to higher than projected real property transfer and property tax, tempered by weakness in most other local taxes, notably declines in hotel tax. In FY 2018-19 and beyond, transfer tax is expected to return to lower, average historic levels, while other local taxes continue to grow but at even more moderate rates than previously assumed.
- CalWORKs Revenue The Human Services Agency anticipates an on-going \$6.6 million decline in State CalWORKs revenues beginning in FY 2017-18 due to statewide declining caseloads. Despite lower caseloads, the City will feel a cost impact because of its robust program which includes supplemental county-funded initiatives. The entire \$6.6 million revenue loss is assumed in the updated deficit projection.

USES – Baselines and Reserves: Increases to projected General Fund sources over the next five years result in corresponding increases to baseline and reserves in all five years except FY 2018-19. These costs increased by \$7.4 million in FY 2017-18, decreased by \$11.3 million in FY 2018-19, increased by \$4.3 million in FY 2019-20 and \$0.9 million in FY 2020-21, and remained steady in FY 2021-22.

- Baselines Net increases in projected revenue increase baseline funding to the Municipal Transportation Agency, Library, Children's and Public Education Enrichment Fund, Street Tree Maintenance Fund, and other baselines in all years except FY 2018-19.
- **Reserves** Revenue increases also trigger additional General Reserve deposits. In addition, the Plan reflects replenishment of \$1.5 million to the General Reserve in FY 2017-18 related to the FY 2016-17 supplemental appropriation supporting funds for legal services for immigrants. The update does not assume any deposit to the Budget Stabilization or Rainy Day Reserves.

USES – Salaries and Benefits: Salary and benefit costs decreased by \$10.5 million in FY 2017-18, increased by \$10.3 million in FY 2018-19, increased by \$17.9 million in FY 2019-20, increased by \$16.7 million in FY 2020-21, and decreased by \$0.3 million in FY 2021-22, due to the following changes:

- Labor Agreements Since the Five Year Financial Plan was released in December 2016, the City has reached a contract extension with many of the City's unions for the upcoming two fiscal years. The contract extension includes salary increases of 3% on July 1, 2017 and an additional 3% increase on July 1, 2018 for most miscellaneous employees. In years where contracts are open, the report continues to assume CPI increases, which are revised in this plan and fully outlined below, including 3.43% in FY 2019-20, 3.19% in FY 2020-21, and 2.76% in FY 2021-22. The contract extension also includes triggers for a six month delay of the raise on July 1, 2018 if the City's projected deficit for FY 2018-19 exceeds \$200 million.
- Retirement Benefits Employer Contribution Rates On February 8, 2017 the SFERS
 Retirement Board approved the results of the July 1, 2016 actuarial funding valuation. These
 results have been incorporated into this update, resulting in slightly lower SFERS contribution
 rates paid by the City for miscellaneous employees. Furthermore, on December 21, 2016, the
 CalPERS Board of Administration approved lowering the CalPERS discount rate assumption, the
 long-term rate of return, from 7.5% to 7% over the next three years. This memo reflects the
 contribution increases by the City for CalPERS employees as a result of the discount rate
 changes beginning in FY 2018-19. The projected rate increases are 1.47% higher in FY 2018-19,
 3.27% higher in FY 2019-20, 6.99% higher in FY 2020-21, and 8.87% higher in FY 2021-22.
- Health and Dental Benefits for Current Employees The update includes a revised assumption for the annual growth in health costs for current employees, increasing from 7% growth per year to 8% growth per year. This assumption has been revised due to several factors including the rising cost of pharmaceuticals and uncertainty in healthcare markets.

USES – Citywide Operating Costs: Citywide operating costs increased by \$0.2 million in FY 2017-18, then decreased by \$11.3 million in FY 2018-19, increased by \$4.8 million in FY 2019-20, increased further by \$18.3 million in FY 2020-21, and decreased by \$11.5 million in FY 2021-22. These changes are primarily due to:

• Updates to the City's Ten-Year Capital Plan – Significant changes to Citywide Operating costs are related to the City's long range capital planning efforts. On February 28, 2017, the City's Proposed Ten-Year Capital Plan for 2018-2027 was introduced to the Board of Supervisors. The assumptions in the plan are reflected in this update. The changes most significant to this memo are related to the proposed schedule of issuances of Certificates of Participation (COPs), which has varied significantly from the schedule paid out in the previous Ten-Year Capital Plan. The new schedule results in General Fund savings, especially in the upcoming two budget years, as

large COP issuances are pushed further out and result in smaller debt service payments in the near term.

- Inflation on Non-Personnel Costs This update assumes that the cost of materials and supplies, professional services, contracts with community-based organizations and other non-personnel operating costs will increase at the rate of the updated Consumer Price Index (CPI) projection, which results in increases of 3.43% in FY 2018-19 and FY 2019-20, 3.19% in FY 2020-21, and 2.76% in FY 2021-22.
- Rebalancing Plan Expenditure Update This update assumes the full cost of the Mayor's rebalancing plan that was released in December 2016. This includes funding for homelessness services, street trees, the Free City College program, and immigration services. This Plan also assumes additional costs above the rebalancing plan for the Free City College program and funding for immigration related services at the Public Defender's Office to reflect later agreements made between the Mayor and the Board of Supervisors.

USES – Departmental Costs: Departmental costs decreased by \$2.6 million in FY 2017-18, increased by \$5.3 million in FY 2018-19, decreased by \$2.9 million in FY 2019-20, decreased by \$1.7 million in FY 2020-21, and increased by \$6.4 million in FY 2021-22. These changes are primarily due to changes related to the Moscone Convention Facility and the Local Operating Support Program (LOSP):

- Convention Facilities Subsidy The estimated General Fund operating cost of the City's Moscone Convention Center has decreased due to increased fund balance identified in the Controller's Office Six-Month Report which can be used to decrease the General Fund support needed to operate the facility.
- Hope SF and Local Operating Support Program The projected cost of the City's Local Operating Support Program (LOSP), which provides operating subsidies and social services at affordable housing developments occupied by formerly homeless individuals, has increased. This is due to shifts in the estimated occupancy dates of upcoming developments as well as changes to the estimates for services provision and operating costs.

Key Factors that Could Affect the Forecast

As with all projections, uncertainties exist regarding key factors that could affect the City's financial condition:

- Changes in the Economic Cycle This projection assumes the economic recovery and expansion that began in FY 2009-10 will continue through the forecast period and will be reflected in tax revenue increases. The rapid rates of growth experienced in the early part of the recovery have slowed, and in some cases declined, and low rates of growth are expected to persist in the forecast period. Economic growth, and the revenue derived from it, is heavily dependent on changes in employment, business activity, and tourism. Physical and financial constraints are expected to limit this growth. This report does not assume any economic downturns or large changes in macroeconomic conditions; however, given the duration of economic expansions over the last century, it would be an historical anomaly if there were no recession during the forecast period.
- Federal and State Budget Impacts Since December both the Governor and President have released proposed state and federal budgets. Aside from the formula changes to CalWORKs outlined in the revenue section, this report does not assume significant changes in funding at

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> the state and federal levels. While a number of proposals at both the state and federal levels that would have financial impacts on the City are pending, final legislative adoption of these proposals is uncertain. Additionally, specific federal budget details necessary to more fully estimate the impact on local programs are not yet available. Given this, this projection does not assume potential state and federal losses. However, the table below summarizes several significant pending proposals that are known at this time.

* These estimates are subject to increase based on caseloads, wages, and other inflationary drivers, particularly in the later years of this projection.

 State Budget – On January 10, 2017, the Governor submitted a proposed budget to the California legislature. Based on the proposal, this projection assumes the formula-driven loss of \$6.6 million of revenue, related to decreased statewide CalWORKs caseloads. It does not assume the adoption of any other state budget proposal due to uncertainty. However, there are two proposals which would have a significant impact to the City should they be adopted in their current form: the elimination of the In-Home Supportive Services Maintenance of Effort (IHSS MOE) and the Transportation Funding legislation (SB1).

Eliminating the IHSS MOE, which was put in place in 2012 as part of the Coordinated Care Initiative (CCI), would shift \$43.4 million of costs from the State to the City in FY 2017-18, with growing costs in future years. Since 2012, the IHSS program costs have grown significantly as a result of: impacts of minimum wage laws (state or local); caseload growth (7% per year recently); medical inflation; and administrative cost increases. If the MOE is eliminated and returned to a cost sharing model, the City will have to pay for the full impact of these costs that have grown in the past five years. At this time, the Governor has indicated willingness to work with counties on the implementation of this policy change and the State Assembly has put forward a proposal that would mitigate the impact of the policy changes on counties.

Proposed Transportation Funding legislation (SB 1 Beall) would raise on-going funds through increased gas and diesel taxes, vehicle registration fee adjustments, a new vehicle registration fee for zero-emissions vehicles, and restoring weight fees. Additionally, the legislation accelerates the repayment of outstanding loans to counties, a one-time source. If adopted, these funds would support road and bridge repairs, as well as transit. As proposed, once fully phased in, the local impact is estimated to be \$40 million annually.

• Federal Budget – On March 16, 2017, the President released a preliminary budget blueprint ("skinny budget"), which proposed reductions to numerous federal agencies to fund growth

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> primarily at the Department of Defense and Department of Homeland Security. The proposed budget eliminates Community Development Block Grants and HOME Investment Partnership Program Grants, which would reduce City spending by \$20.6 million starting in FY 2018-19 if enacted as proposed.

On January 25, 2017 the President issued Executive Order 13,768 entitled, "Enhancing Public Safety in the Interior of the United States," which proposes to withhold funds to "sanctuary jurisdictions." Additionally, Congress is currently proposing legislation to "repeal and replace" the Affordable Care Act (ACA).

Changes to the ACA could significantly impact the Department of Public Health, the City's safety net care provider. This update does not include assumptions about any federal budget proposals due to lack of concrete details and significant uncertainty regarding outcome; however, there is great reason to believe some reductions will move forward in the near term.

Conclusion

As noted above, after several years of higher than expected revenue growth, revenues in this update have changed only marginally from December projections, and future growth is curbed by housing, transportation, and other infrastructure constraints. While property-related revenues remain strong, economically sensitive sources, such as hotel, sales and parking taxes, are experiencing slow to negative growth. This shift, coupled with great uncertainty from the state and federal budgets, results in real downside risk to the City's financial outlook.

While the projected shortfalls shown in the Proposed Five Year Financial Plan and this updated memo reflect the difference in projected revenues and expenditures if current service levels and policies continue, San Francisco's Charter requires that each year's budget be balanced. Balancing the budgets will require some combination of expenditure reductions and additional revenues. These projections assume no ongoing solutions are implemented. To the extent that budgets are balanced with ongoing solutions, future shortfalls will decrease.

6 ABOUT SFDPH

The mission of the San Francisco Department of Public Health (SFDPH) is to protect and promote the health of all San Franciscans. SFDPH is an integrated health department with two primary roles and two major divisions to fulfill its mission:

- Protecting the health of the population, which is the primary responsibility of SFDPH's Population Health Division; and
- Promoting the health of our patients, which is the primary responsibility of the San Francisco Health Network.

SFDPH's central administrative functions, such as finance, human resources, information technology, and policy and planning, support the work of SFDPH's two divisions and promote integration.

POPULATION HEALTH DIVISION

SFDPH's Population Health Division (PHD) addresses public health concerns, including consumer safety, health promotion and prevention, and the monitoring of threats to the public's health. PHD implements traditional and innovative public health interventions. PHD staff inspect restaurants, promote improved air and water quality, track communicable diseases, and educate San Franciscans about the negative health impacts of tobacco. PHD staff also promote pedestrian safety, participate in an ambitious campaign to eliminate new HIV infections, and provide technical assistance to corner stores to increase healthy food options for residents. PHD contributes to the health of SFDPH's patients by contributing population health data and data analysis to the San Francisco Health Network.

PHD is currently applying for national public health accreditation which specifically focuses on measurement of health department performance against a set of nationally recognized, practice-focused, and evidence-based standards based on the ten essential public health services, as well as management, administration, and governance. The timeline for final achievement of Public Health Accreditation is Fall of 2016.



SAN FRANCISCO HEALTH NETWORK

The SF Health Network (SFHN) comprises the direct health services SFDPH provides to thousands of insured and uninsured residents of San Francisco, including those most socially and medically vulnerable. The services the SFHN provides are not new – rather, they are newly aligned to achieve the triple aim of Health Reform: better care for individuals; better health for the population; and lower cost through improvement. Unlike other public or private systems, the SFHN contains the crucial components needed to build a seamless continuum of care: patient-centered medical homes provided by primary care clinics located throughout the community; comprehensive behavioral health services; acute care and specialty services provided at San Francisco General Hospital; skilled nursing care provided at Laguna Honda Hospital; and other home- and community-based services. In addition to the health care services, SFDPH provides critical health care services for the broader community. Zuckerberg San Francisco General Hospital, for example, is the only trauma center serving all of San Francisco and northern San Mateo County. Additionally, SFDPH's Community Behavioral Health Services provides mental health and substance abuse services to all low-income San Franciscos afety net.

The SFHN is San Francisco's only complete care system and includes primary care, dental care, emergency and trauma treatment, medical and surgical specialties, diagnostic testing, skilled nursing and rehabilitation, behavioral health services and jail health services. The mission of SFHN is to provide high quality health care that enables all San Franciscans to live vibrant, healthy lives and to be every San Franciscan's first choice for health care and well-being. SFDPH's dedicated staff help realize the organization's mission of protecting and promoting the health of all San Franciscans. The San Francisco Health Network integrates our delivery system and focuses on providing high quality health care services. The Population Health Division leads SFDPH efforts in health protection, promotion, prevention and disaster readiness.



SF HEALTH COMMISSION

As SFDPH's governing and policy-making body, the San Francisco Health Commission is mandated by City and County Charter to manage and control the City and County hospitals, to monitor and regulate emergency medical services and all matters pertaining to the preservation, promotion and protection of the lives, health, and mental health of San Francisco residents. The full Health Commission meets on the first and third Tuesday of each month at 4:00 p.m. in Room 300 at 101 Grove Street. The Health Commission's committee structure consists of:

A BIG MOVE: ZSFG'S NEW HOSPITAL BUILDING

The staff of Zuckerberg San Francisco General (ZSFG) has come to appreciate the truth that there is building a new hospital and there is opening it for patient care, and that those two things are very different undertakings. The city's voters approved Proposition A on the 2008 ballot, which authorized the sale of \$887.4 million in bonds to pay for a new inpatient hospital. Planning started soon after, followed by construction. It seemed a daunting task and, indeed, it was.

The opening of the new hospital and patient move was an extraordinary accomplishment. What has been involved in its opening is a long list of tasks which included: planning, improvement work, training, construction, cleaning, stocking, licensing and feeding thousands of people. After construction of the new hospital was completed in November 2015, it was certified for occupancy and then went through the process of licensing for patient care. The licensing process alone required months of training, work and preparation. For months before patients rolled into the new building, the staff of ZSFG trained to provide care in it and, at the same time, continued to provide the worldclass care that has been the hallmark of the hospital for generations.

So, nearly eight years in the making, Priscilla Chan and Mark Zuckerberg San Francisco General Hospital and Trauma Center (ZSFG) has opened its doors. With 1,000 providers, nurses and staff, facilitating the seven-hour transfer, almost 200 patients who were receiving care from the existing 1970s-era hospital building were moved into the brand-new main hospital on the ZSFG campus in one, long day. "Both our patients and our staff are delighted being in our new building,"

said ZSFG CEO Dr. Susan Ehrlich. "This outstanding facility enables us to provide a level of patient care that rivals any hospital, anywhere."

The new facility - which features both modern white steel and glass and brick work that echoes the original centuryold brick buildings remaining on campus - is nine stories tall, with seven stories above ground-level. The new emergency department, which is now accessible from the campus' 22nd Street entrance, nearly triples the capacity of the former hospital, and will allow staff to more quickly respond to emergencies and disasters. Extraordinary original art is placed throughout the new hospital building, providing a beautiful and healing environment for patients, visitors and staff alike. ZSFG can now see more patients, welcome them into a world-class facility, and provide them with even better care.

COMMUNITY HEALTH NEEDS ASSESSMENT

On May 17th, the Health Commission formally adopted the 2016 Community Health Needs Assessment (CHNA). This assessment is an important tool in the ongoing community health improvement process. The CHNA provides data enabling identification of priority issues affecting health, and is the foundation for citywide health planning processes including the Community Health Improvement Plan, the San Francisco's Health Care Services Master Plan, the San Francisco Department of Public Health's Population Health Division's Strategic Plan, and each of San Francisco's non-profit hospitals' Community Health Needs Assessments and Hospital Community Benefit Plans. It is also required for Public Health Accreditation.

The 2016 CHNA was completed in collaboration with community partners through the San Francisco Health Improvement Partnership (SFHIP). Additionally, community groups played a key role to bring the voices of community members to this process. The 2016 CHNA takes a comprehensive look at the health of San Franciscans through an extensive data review of a broad range of variables affecting health outcomes. Through this process, key health needs in San Francisco were identified, and health disparities and inequities were revealed. The 2016 CHNA included four components--a community health status assessment, an assessment of prior assessments, community engagement, and a health need identification process. Through this process, two foundational issues were identified: Economic Barriers to Health, and Racial Health Inequities-which affect health at every level and must be addressed to improve health in San Francisco. In addition, the 2016 CHNA identified seven health needs that heavily impact disease and death in San Francisco -- Psychosocial Health; Healthy Eating; Safety and Violence Prevention; Access to Coordinated, Culturally, and Linguistically Appropriate Services Across the Continuum; Housing Instability/ Homelessness; Substance Abuse; and Physical Activity.

The 2016 CHNA will informs the Community Health Improvement Plan in which health needs identified in the Community Health Needs Assessment are prioritized, and objectives and strategies to address the prioritized health needs and foundational issues are developed. ZIKA PREPAREDNESS

The Zika epidemic spread in Latin America and the Caribbean in 2015-2016. In early 2016, cases of Zika virus began to be seen in travelers returning to the United States. As of July 2016, there were 56 confirmed cases of travel-associated Zika diagnosed in California, with 3 of these in San Francisco residents. There have been no locallytransmitted cases of Zika in California, and the Aedes mosquito has not been detected in San Francisco. San Francisco public health and medical providers have been understandably concerned about Zika. Because of the strong evidence linking Zika to microcephaly and other birth defects, concern has been strongest among pregnant women. The sexual transmission of Zika also emerged as an issue as local cases appeared in Florida. SFDPH actively responded to Zika, by working with multiple partners and stakeholders. Highlights of the response included:

- Development of a staged response plan addressing public concern and public health risk.
- Public posting of travel advisories, mosquito precautions, and San Francisco Zika case counts.
- Frequent communications to San Francisco medical providers, updated as clinical guidance evolved.
- Mosquito surveillance and abatement program; mosquito awareness education campaign.
- Meeting with leaders of Latino community-based organizations to discuss risk communication and community impacts.



ZSFG PROGRAM CERTIFICATIONS

In February 2016, a surveyor from The Joint Commission (TJC) arrived on campus to initiate the Stroke Certification survey for re-certification of the Stroke Program at ZSFG. Overall, the surveyor was enthusiastic and complimentary about ZSFG and the Stroke program. The Stroke Program was re-certified by the Joint Commission following this visit.

Similarly, in March 2016, another surveyor from TJC arrived on campus to initiate the Joint Commission Traumatic Brain Injury Certification survey. The Joint Commission Surveyor stated "ZSFG has one of the best Traumatic Brain Injury Programs in the country. The program thrives because of the dedication and passion of the clinical teams who care for patients daily". The result was that the Traumatic Brain Injury Program was certified.

With the certification of these two programs, ZSFG continues to be recognized for excellence in care. These certifications signify ZSFG's dedication to providing the best possible care to all San Franciscans as the only level 1 trauma center in the City.



OCCUPATIONAL HEALTH AND SAFETY

The goals of the Occupational Safety and Health Section are to prevent occupational injuries and illnesses among SF City and County staff and to minimize workers' compensation costs. The key efforts of FY 15/16 included:

- Maintaining effective injury and illness prevention programs including work site inspections to identify hazards, employee trainings, and technical assistance.
- 8 Developing a new SFDPH policy and procedure to promote worker health and improve office ergonomics. The Ergonomic Computer Workstation Policy provides guidance and specifications for the purchase of new workstation furniture. It requires all new furniture for office-use to have a range of adjustments. This allows employees of all sizes to work in appropriate postures, reducing potential risk factors that can lead to discomfort or injuries. The policy supports SFDPH goals to be able to move staff, rather than furniture, as organizational needs change.
- Reducing exposures to blood and body fluids by maintaining effective Bloodborne Pathogen Exposure Control Plans and staffing the SFDPH Safe Devices Committee.
- Maintaining the SFDPH Temporary Transitional Work Assignment Program, which facilitates returning injured employees to work as soon as medically feasible.

SUPERBOWL 50

It was a great honor for San Francisco to host the 2016 Super Bowl. For the 50th anniversary of the game, there were many additional activities and celebrations held at "Superbowl City" at Justin Herman Plaza and the "NFL Experience" at Moscone Center leading up to the game on February 7th.

For SFDPH, the primary goal was to ensure Bay Area residents and visitors from around the world had a safe and positive visit while in our community. Many of our efforts included:

- Environmental Health's multi-faceted responsibilities in food and water safety and hazardous materials response
- Communicable disease monitoring for infectious diseases and sharing information with surrounding county health departments.
- The SF Homeless Outreach Team continuing their work to provide services and support to homeless individuals
- Expanded sobering services to offload our healthcare partners and assist in maintaining bed capacity for emergency departments

These efforts, along with various other efforts across San Francisco agencies and organizations, helped keep residents and visitors safe allowing them to enjoy the festivities. OFFICE OF MANAGED CARE The Office of Managed Care (OMC) completed a number of operational projects that further improved the San Francisco Health Network (SFHN)'s managed care

operations in FY 15-16.

- OMC formally established a joint operating committee with each payor at the operational and senior leadership level to allow operational issues to be escalated as needed. Internally, OMC established a monthly managed care operations meeting where representatives from functional areas (including Admitting & Eligibility, Billing, Primary Care, Specialty Care, etc.) identify issues and discuss causes and resolutions.
- OMC established an SFHN interim process for member grievance and appeals, in order to stay compliant with CA Department of Managed Health Care regulations.
- OMC completed phase I of the managed care data warehouse project. It established a process with San Francisco Health Plan to receive monthly encounter and claims data for SFHN members to monitor cost and utilization.
- Working with the Business Intelligence Unit and the Controller's Office, OMC developed the SFHN Managed Care Revenue Dashboard and transitioned the existing Managed Care Enrollment Dashboard to Tableau. These tools provide easily accessible and filterable data about SFHN revenue and membership.

GETTING TO ZERO

The San Francisco Getting to Zero (SFGTZ) Consortium, formed in 2014, to develop a more coordinated response to reduce HIV infections, HIV-related deaths, and HIV-related stigma in San Francisco. SFGTZ is a volunteer-driven, multi-sector consortium with over 200 members from public health, academia, advocacy, private sector, community-based organizations, and community members.

SFGTZ has four signature strategies: 1) expand access to pre-exposure prophylaxis (PrEP), 2) RAPID (same day) anti-retroviral therapy initiation, 3) programs to link or re-engage people living with HIV to care, and 4) reducing HIV-related stigma. Committees were formed to prioritize programmatic goals for implementation and to measure the impact of interventions. The Steering Committee provides guidance and strategic direction in line with SFGTZ's vision.

Community engagement is central to SFGTZ. Community updates are convened quarterly for partners to present on important and relevant topics, committees to report back on progress, and the broader SF community to share ideas and feedback. While recent SFDPH data shows overall improvement in HIV prevention and treatment, disparities remain among people of color, youth, and homeless individuals. SFGTZ is committed to bridging these gaps by implementing targeted programs to reach the most disproportionally impacted communities. 15

CHILDREN'S ENVIRONMENTAL HEALTH

The Children's Environmental Health Promotion (CEHP) Program was asked by community advocates to assist a family living in a moldy unit within the Sunnydale Family Development, and to help address other environmental hazards at this site. The Housing Authority's regional manager provided CEHP with a list of all families with children six years of age and under, so that CEHP could offer lead hazard and healthy homes assessment of their unit. In addition to mailing this offer to the families. CEHP hired SF Department of Environment community outreach workers to explain the service by going door-to-door to meet 187 families. CEHP also provided Sunnydale residents with a social determinants of health survey, produced a video on what tenants can do to prevent cockroach infestation, and connected residents to city and community resources to improve health hazards.

Throughout the process, CEHP developed a working relationship with the HOPE SF Peer Leaders at Sunnydale's Wellness Center, which led to creating a community Beautification Celebration in November 2015.



VISION ZERO

Vision Zero is San Francisco's commitment to eliminating traffic deaths by 2024. Each year approximately 30 people are killed and 200 are seriously injured on City streets. Pedestrians comprise over 60% of deaths, half are seniors. SFDPH co-chairs the Citywide Vision Zero Task Force and works with SFMTA, SFPD, and other agencies to target engineering, education, enforcement and policy efforts and factors associated with the worst health outcomes. Milestones in FY 15-16 include:

- SF Safe Routes to School Partnership, now serving nearly half of SFUSD
 Elementary schools, was awarded
 \$2.4M to increase safe walking and biking to school through 08/2019.
- US Surgeon General Murthy joined Mayor Lee, City officials, students and parents for Walk & Roll to School Day on October 7, 2015 and recognized SFDPH's leadership on Vision Zero SF.
- SFDPH presented on TransBASESF.org

 the online, open spatial data resource
 for Vision Zero developed by SFDPH at the Transportation Research Board
 Annual Meeting in January 2016, and
 has since published a paper on the tool.
- SFDPH launched Safe Streets for Seniors in April 2016, reaching 175 seniors. Staff will work with SFMTA and fund CBOs to work with seniors and people with disabilities to identify and request engineering and enforcement improvements.



SYRINGE ACCESS & DISPOSAL

Syringe access and disposal programs have provided sterile syringes, supplies, and treatment referrals to people who inject drugs (PWID) in San Francisco since 1990. In 2015-2016, SFDPH continued to fund community-based organizations to provide client-centered harm reduction services to PWID. HIV prevalence among PWID remains low (14% in 2015) and stable, likely due to early implementation of syringe access programs in San Francisco. Syringe access and disposal programs are a centerpiece in the larger effort to improve the health of PWID in San Francisco through:

- Reductions in overdose mortality;
- Improved access to primary care;
- Hepatitis C prevention, testing, and cure; and
- Access to effective substance use treatment programs.

SFDPH also offers multiple options for syringe disposal, which include:

- The Rapid Response team to respond to needle litter in real time;
- Placement of 11 outdoor disposal boxes;
- Enhanced education with PWID about importance of syringe disposal;
- Partnership with Walgreens as a disposal point; and
- Syringe access sites across the City that provide opportunities for disposal.

BLACK/AFRICAN AMERICAN HEALTH

There were two major highlights for Black/ African American Health in FY 15-16 -Black/African American Health Initiative (BAAHI) and the Black History Celebration Conference. BAAHI focuses on disparities in four clinical areas - hypertension, chlamydia, alcohol use disorder and breast cancer and two staff focused areas - workforce development and cultural humility. Six working groups, the governing body, and a think tank have brought the initiative through its development phase with some notable achievements. The Hypertension Working Group helped design interventions for Black/ African American hypertensive patients that increased the percentage in good control from 53% to 57%. The Chlamydia Working Group worked with youth clinics to increase screening from 75% to over 85%. The Cultural Humility Working Group spearheaded training of over 300 staff in Racial Humility. HR added a Cultural Humility Trainer position and staff to focus on workforce diversity.

Another major highlight was Laguna Honda's Black History Celebration Conference. This inaugural event on racial trauma featured two speakers, Dr. Joy DeGruy and Dr. Kenneth Hardy, who addressed historical trauma and today's societal need for racial humility. There were more than 300 attendees, including staff and leaders from across the department. An additional simulcast was even added to accommodate the immense interest. The Black History Planning Committee are working on next year's activities.



LAGUNA HONDA MISSION AND VISION

The new Laguna Honda (LHH) building approached its five year anniversary in December 2015. While much was accomplished in that time, LHH wanted to set a direction for the future and position itself for further success by establishing a new mission and vision statement.

More than 20 departments provided input for a new 5-year strategic plan. LHH's new mission is to "provide a welcoming. therapeutic and healing environment that promotes the individual's health and well-being", which is befitting to the purpose of the facility built back in 2010. The vision is "building healthier lives as the leader in post-acute care." LHH also developed specific goals as part of the strategic plan, including improving internal and external communications, building centers of excellences, supporting cultural humility amongst residents and staff, enhancing philanthropic efforts, and leveraging technology to improve working environments.

Laguna Honda continues to make progress operationalizing the new strategic plan. By developing a plan with hospitalwide engagement, there are already measurable execution efforts at all levels of the organization. As the San Francisco population continues to age, LHH, with this new strategic plan and a wide-breadth of services including rehabilitation, is primed to serve the health needs of senior adults.



NEWCOMERS CONNECT

The Newcomers CONNECT (Community Outreach Navigation for Newcomer Education, Change, and Transformation) team is a new initiative of the SFDPH focused on reducing disparities in linkages and access to health care and social services among vulnerable low-income workers and possible victims of human trafficking.

In its initial phase, Newcomers CONNECT staff are conducting a community needs assessments and planning outreach to support linkages between workers of massage establishments to health and social resources.

Planning and outreach efforts have included a series of trainings with Environmental Health Branch Inspectors who are the ears and eyes at the worksites and who work in close collaboration with the CONNECT team.

Successful linkages to date include connecting workers and their families/ friends to resources, such as food stamps, minimum wage laws, and health care access with Health SF and Family Health Center. Next steps are expanding outreach efforts through worksites and community partners, and continuing to provide direct assistance and linkages to resources for workers across the City.

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ENDING HEPATITIS C

SFDPH made great strides to expand access to hepatitic C (HCV) testing and treatment. In early 2016, the State awarded SFDPH a 3-year, \$1.37 million award for HCV testing, linkage, and treatment projects. The grant supports Glide's communitybased HCV testing and linkage program, the expansion of SFDPH primary-care driven HCV treatment, and a demonstration project to provide HCV treatment at the Opioid Treatment Outpatient Program (OTOP) at ZSFG.

The Glide and OTOP components have been crucial for detecting HCV in vulnerable populations and linking patients to treatment. Between March and end of June 2016, Glide screened over 376 clients for HCV with an antibody prevalence rate of approximately 27%. Many of these patients were linked to treatment. In addition, OTOP hired a HCV nurse in the first months of the grant who is helping to manage HCV treatment onsite for OTOP patients.

SFDPH's model for expanding primary care-based HCV treatment includes training for SFHN clinicians, developing a primary care-driven eReferral system, and technical assistance for clinics. In January 2016, approximately 85 clinical staff participated in trainings, and 30 primary care providers have utilized eReferral to treat 73 patients.

Finally, SFDPH collaborated with 28 community partner agencies to launch End Hep C SF, a collective impact initiative that envisions HCV elimination in SF.



HEALTHIER ENVIRONMENTS

In FY 2015-16, SFDPH worked on creating a new comprehensive Department policy to eliminate sugar sweetened beverages (SSB) from vending, ensure healthy food vending, and encourage healthy food at meetings. During the same period, ZSFG implemented a healthy beverage initiative on its campus.

The new SFDPH policies being implemented in 2016 are designed to ensure:

- SFDPH and its contractors are compliant with recent legislation prohibiting the use of City funds to purchase SSB.
- Vending machines at SFDPH facilities are compliant with legislation that packaged foods meet nutrition guidelines and do not offer SSB.
- SFDPH serves healthy food options at meetings or events and no SSB.

Organizational wellness policies, like these, help shift the culture and make the healthy choice the easy choice. The science on health risks linked to liquid sugar has grown more robust over the years. Type 2 diabetes, heart disease, cancer, hypertension are some of the chronic diseases linked to SSB.

Additionally, two collaboratives staffed by SFDPH, the San Francisco Health Improvement Partnership (SFHIP) and Shape Up SF (SUSF) Coalition, worked together to impact SSB consumption. In FY 15-16, SUSF and SFHIP partners educated over 2,500 people through 55 workshops and health fairs. Together, education and policy are shifting the culture away from SSB consumption.



TENDERLOIN HEALTH

For the past two years, the Environmental Health Program on Health, Equity, and Sustainability (EHB-PHES) staff have supported planning and evaluation efforts of two large community improvement efforts in the Tenderloin neighborhood: the Tenderloin Health Improvement Partnership (TLHIP) - a collective impact initiative led by St. Francis Memorial Hospital and its foundation - and the Office of Economic and Workforce Development's (OEWD) Central Market/Tenderloin Strategy. These efforts have taken on the immense task of coordinating non-profit and City efforts and investment to achieve meaninoful change in a neighborhood struggling with poverty, environmental and housing hazards, and poor health outcomes. EHB-PHES has provided geographic data on issues ranging from crime to housing to help support the selection of "Action Zones" and strategies. In FY 2015/16, EHB-PHES also completed an in-depth analysis of evictions data in Central Market/Tenderloin, which led to increased funding for eviction defense in the neighborhood.

To support tracking and communication of key outcomes, TLHIP, OEWD, and EHB-PHES are currently collaborating on a Central Market/Tenderloin Data Portal to track headline indicators, provide geographically granular data for planning, and link measures to significant investments. This collaborative seeks to use a data informed approach to neighborhood service coordination to ensure that investments are protecting and promoting the health of community residents. COMPLIANCE AND PRIVACY

The Office of Compliance and Privacy Affairs (OCPA) oversees compliance with federal/state regulations, involving patients' privacy, data security, and fraud, waste and abuse, across SFDPH including contracted Community Based Organizations (CBOs) and UCSF staff practicing at SFDPH facilities. FY 15-16 highlights included:

- Hired staff to increase oversight of 1 privacy and data sharing.
- Developed a process to document 嬼 investigation's findings and recommendations including corrective and preventative actions that focused on internal controls.
- Revised privacy agreements and 83 compliance attestations for contractors and Data Trading Partners to improve external partners' accountability in protecting healthcare privacy, data security and business ethics.
- Centralized privacy and data security 123 policies into websites to improve access for staff and partners.
- 詞 Revised training modules for Privacy and Compliance. Initiated email reminders resulting in higher training completion rates.
- 88 Provided documentation for state and federal compliance audits and responded to external auditor Corrective Action Plans.
- Monitored privacy and compliance 鸖 regulations for impact on SFDPH practice.
- Recommended changes to federal and 飁 state policies to improve healthcare practice.



PRIME 1115 WAIVER

The PRIME (The Public Hospital Redesign and Incentives in Medi-Cal) program is considered the successor to the 2010 waiver's Delivery System Reform Incentive Program (DSRIP), a pay-for-performance program that improved care delivery to prepare California's Public Health Systems (PHS) for an influx of newly covered patients by Affordable Care Act implementation. PRIME directs PHS to use evidence-based guality improvement methods to achieve ambitious, year-over-year performance targets. All funding for this program is contingent on meeting these targets. SFHN views PRIME as, not only a pay-forperformance incentive program, but as the precursor to alternate payment models or value-based payments. SFHN intends to leverage PRIME to position the network towards managing populations, moving from volume to value, and from reactive to proactive care models. To achieve these transformational goals, SFHN accomplished the following in FY 15/16:

- Established project teams and 5 governance across the 9 PRIME projects focusing on ambulatory care, high risk/high cost populations, resource efficiency, and reducing disparities
- Created the quality improvement and 83 analytics teams to measure, report, and improve PRIME measures
- Established baseline rates for 58 8 measures to allow SFDPH to fully earn the allocated \$34+ Million available.



LEAN

Lean is a continuous improvement methodology first implemented in the car manufacturing industry, but has more recently been used in healthcare to streamline processes, reduce costs, and improve quality and timeliness of services. Various sections across SFDPH's SFHN and PHD divisions have been using lean to improve service delivery dating back as early as 2012 when ZSFG launched its first value stream.

Significant lean-related progress was made throughout SFDPH's divisions in FY 15-16. SFHN developed its vision, mission, and True North, a precise set of ideals that we are striving toward to be successful. Both SFHN and its Primary Care section, as well as PHD's Environmental Health branch, held inaugural hoshin kanri (lean strategic planning) sessions to identify their key priorities for the year. ZSFG launched a value stream in the emergency department, resulting in the creation of a fast-track system for lowacuity patients and decreased overall length of stay. In preparation to move into new spaces, PHD's Public Health Laboratory and Tuberculosis Clinic completed 3P (Production, Preparation, Process) workshops to develop customized workflows and configure their future spaces.

SFDPH is becoming a lean organization and by doing so anticipates improving health care and population health for all San Franciscans.

In FY 15/16, SFDPH's budget was \$2,033,997,389. The General Fund subsidy from the City and County contributed \$639,417,357, an increase of \$25,268,517 from the FY 14/15 allocation of \$614,148,840. SFDPH's major fiscal year investments:

POPULATION HEALTH

SFDPH has been a leader in the field of public health for decades, providing important innovations in interventions and programs. However, in spite of these successes, San Francisco faces many health challenges: a striking epidemic of adult and youth obesity and its complications (e.g., childhood type 2 diabetes and hypertension); high rates of infant mortality, and persistent health inequities related to ethnic, social, economic, and environmental factors. SFDPH's ongoing efforts to meet emerging challenges are reflected in the Strategic Plan for our Population Health Division. In Fiscal Year 15/16 PHD conducted the following key programmatic activities that support PHD's strategic plan focus areas.

Executive Summary

The Office of the Controller's City Service Auditor Division (CSA) engaged Cumming Construction Management (Cumming) to audit the expenditures of the 2008 San Francisco General Hospital and Trauma Center Earthquake Safety Bond (2008 SFGH) general obligation (GO) bond program of the City and County of San Francisco (City) to determine whether the bond revenues are expended only in accordance with the ballot measure and no funds are used for any administrative salaries or other general governmental operating expenses.

Cumming found that expenditures for the 2008 SFGH GO bond program were in accordance with the ballot measure and that funds were not used for any administrative salaries or other general governmental operating expenses other than those specifically authorized in the ballot measure for such bonds. Cumming tested \$836 million (98%) out of \$855 million in current expenditures (not including the cost for bond issuance) and found that all audited expenditure were in line with the voter-approved requirements.

Project Description

The 2008 SFGH GO Bond program is comprised of eight (8) components: Site Utilities Relocation, Service Building Modification, Increment 1 – Shoring & Excavation, Increment 2 – Steel Framing, Increment 3 – Foundation, Increment 4 – Build-out (New Hospital), Increment 5 – Medical Equipment, and Increment 6 – Building Enclosure all with an original bond amount of \$887 million. All eight components have been permitted by the Office of Statewide Health Planning & Development (OSHPD) as of April 18, 2013.

Related to the Program, additional OSHPD permitted projects have been initiated including: Existing Hospital (Building 5) remodels, the 2nd floor bridge and basement level tunnel tie-in to the new hospital (Building 25), the Service Building NPC4 Seismic Upgrade Project, and various other follow-on Projects supporting the licensing of the new hospital. Through four bond sales, \$884.5 million was appropriated, and \$855 million had been spent through 2016. The exhibits below shows the bond program projects by scope, budget, and status.

Objective

The purpose of this audit was to determine whether 2008 SFGH GO bond funds were spent in accordance with the ballot measure, including whether funds were used for any administrative salaries or other general governmental operating expenses, which is impermissible unless specifically authorized in the ballot measure for such bonds.

Methodology

To achieve the objective, Cumming collected and reviewed the following documents:

- Construction agreements and change orders.
- Design agreements and amendments.
- Public Works direct labor and non-labor costs.
- Vendors invoices with citywide contracts for which project-specific contracts do not exist.

Cumming reviewed expenditures totaling \$836 million, or approximately 98 percent of the \$855 million (not including cost for Bond issuance) that Public Works and Public Health had spent under the 2008 SFGH GO Bond program through July 31, 2016.

This performance audit was conducted by Cumming and performed in accordance with generally accepted government auditing standards. These standards require planning and performing the audit to obtain sufficient, appropriate evidence to provide a reasonable basis for the findings and conclusions based on the audit objectives. Cumming believes that the evidence obtained provides a reasonable basis for the findings and conclusions based on the audit objectives.

Results

Finding 1 – Audited expenditures under the 2008 SFGH GO Bond program were spent in accordance with the ballot measure, and funds were not used for any administrative salaries or other general governmental operating expenses other than those specifically authorized in the ballot measure.

Public Works and Public Health provided supporting documentation for \$836,042,577.37 in bond expenditures, and Cumming found that all the funds were spent in accordance with the ballot measure. The majority of the bond expenditures, \$787,643,347.22 or 94 percent of expenditures reviewed, consisted of costs from contracts for construction, design, programing and site planning, and A/E services for the new San Francisco General Hospital Medical Center.

There is no recommendation for this finding, Public Works should continue to ensure bond expenditures are spent in accordance with the ballot measure and funds are not used for any administrative salaries or other general governmental operating expenses.

The Office of the Controller's City Service Auditor Division engaged Cumming Construction Management to audit the expenditures of the 2008 San Francisco General Hospital and Trauma Center Earthquake Safety Bond (2008 SFGH) general obligation bond program of the City and County of San Francisco to determine whether the bond revenues are expended only in accordance with the ballot measure and no funds are used for any administrative salaries or other general governmental operating expenses.

While conducting the audit, Cumming also attempted to segregate the design costs associated with the scope of work awarded to Webcor Builders in the amount of \$687,390,455 for constructing the new hospital building. Cumming identified, to the best of our ability, \$75,475,795 of design costs across various cost codes that we believe to be associated with the Webcor Builders scope of work. This equates to design costs being 10.98% of construction costs.

Cumming believes that the design costs associated with construction of the new hospital by Webcor Builders are in line with what we would expect to see on a project of this size and complexity.

Cumming's benchmarking standards are coming from Cumming's cost management department with significant industry experience and knowledge of the region by working on approximately 400 projects per month.

This report is submitted in accordance with Section 3 of Ordinance 77-06, File Number 060255

Background

In April 2006 the Board of Supervisors passed Ordinance 77-06, which approved the Agreement Between the City and County of San Francisco and the San Francisco Fields Foundation ("Agreement"). Through this agreement the Recreation and Parks Department entered into a public-private partnership with the City Fields Foundation to address what at the time was a chronic shortage of accessible sports fields—a 2004 recreation assessment estimated a shortage of 35 soccer fields and 30 baseball fields based on national standards. To date this agreement has leveraged \$22 million in public funding with \$26 million in private funding to renovate 21 athletic fields with synthetic turf and field lights.

Project Summary

Since 2006 the Department's partnership with the City Fields Foundation has enabled the renovation of 21 athletic fields at nine park facilities: Garfield Square, Silver Terrace Playground, Franklin Square, South Sunset Playground, Crocker Amazon Playground, Kimbell Playground, Minnie and Lovie Ward Playground, Mission Playground, and the Beach Chalet Soccer Fields. Coupled with the implementation of a new online permits and reservations system, these synthetic turf field renovations have added more than 90,000 play hours of capacity to the Department's athletic field recreation system. This additional capacity allowed the Department to accommodate the formation of more than 200 additional youth sports teams.

Operationally, the Department has realized significant cost and workload savings as a result of its synthetic turf installations. Hourly maintenance requirements for synthetic turf fields are 30 percent less than for natural turf. Materials and Supplies costs for synthetic turf upkeep is 90 percent less than for natural turf upkeep. Synthetic turf fields save millions of gallons of water annually. We estimate the combined water savings at just two of our most recent renovation projects (Minnie & Lovie and Beach Chalet) is 10 million gallons per year. In addition, these fields require no herbicides, fertilizers, or pesticides as part of their upkeep.

Several turf fields are at or nearing the end of their useful life and are being targeted for replacement. Most recently, the Department replaced the turf at Franklin Square (13 years old) and Garfield Square

(10 years old). Fields that will be renovated in the near future include Youngblood Coleman (13 years old), Silver Terrace (11 years old), and Crocker Amazon (9 years old).

Environmental Health & Safety

In order to address concerns about synthetic turf's safety, the Department formed the Synthetic Fields Task Force in 2008 which brought together park stakeholders and city staff members from various departments to discuss key issues and concerns about synthetic turf. The result of this process provided a list of recommendations that the department should consider when moving forward on future field renovation projects. All of these items have been followed at various levels. Some of the key Task Force Team recommendations were to preclude the purchase of turf that contained lead and to purchase only from companies that used recycled content. Another key recommendation was for the Department to stay abreast of new turf technologies, material options, and research. A new organic infill product has been researched and recently installed at the Franklin and Garfield field replacement sites. This product makes use of sustainable cork and sand material rather than traditional tire-crumb rubber.

These recent field renovation projects also accomplished another Task Force recommendation which included encouraging turf manufactures to initiate and implement end-of-product-life recycling programs. Through the assistance of the Department of the Environment, we are happy to report that the old turf and turf infill products have been completely recycled which means they did not end up in a landfill or burned for heat energy, both of which are discouraged by the City.

Since the Task Force recommendations were established, the Department continues to be proactive in making sure that we are moving forward with our field renovation program in a safe and precautionary fashion. The Department has worked closely with an environmental consulting firm to help us development what we consider to be one of the most thorough and stringent turf purchasing/procurement specifications in the country. The specification requires stringent testing which focuses both on human and environmental safety. This specification has been updated over the years to stay currently with changing federal and state regulations as they relate to this topic.

To stay abreast of current research, the Department participated in a turf testing operation conducted by the California Office of Environmental Health Hazard Assessment (OEHHA) back in 2009. The results of this test were inconclusive of any health risk but encouraged more testing be conducted. Most recently, the Department once again volunteered to participate in the State's most recent turf study program again conducted by OEHHA. This study is assessing the potential health impacts associated with playing on synthetic turf fields and playground mats. Scheduled for completion in mid-2019, it will estimate the level of exposures associated with various activities conducted on synthetic turf fields and playground mats and assess whether these exposures pose potential health risks. OEHHA has convened a panel of scientific experts to provide input and advice on this study with all meetings of the panel open to the public and offering opportunity for public comment.

Conclusion

The Agreement Between the City and County of San Francisco and the San Francisco Fields Foundation created a highly successful public-private partnership that continues to bear fruit for the residents of San Francisco to this day. More than \$26 million in private financing has been leveraged to renovate 21 athletic fields, relieving what once was a chronic shortage of accessible sports fields. These fields have significantly reduced the Department's maintenance requirements while providing significant environmental benefits in the form of reduced water consumption and reductions in pesticide, herbicide, and fertilizer usage.

Preliminary discussions with Sergeant Patrick Kennedy, SFPD Alcohol Liaison Unit, and Officer Steve Matthias, SFPD Central Station Alcohol Licensing, were favorable and did not reveal any substantive concerns. The project is supported by Randy Shaw, Tenderloin Housing Clinic and several of the local merchants.

Per the ABC requirements, a notification was mailed to all persons living within a 500' radius of the proposed site. The comment period closed on February 18, 2017 and there were no comments received by the ABC.

Residents that reside within the 500' foot radius were also invited to attend a community meeting on Wednesday, March 8 at 6pm at the SFPD Tenderloin. We also invited Supervisor Kim's office to attend the meeting and offered to provide an in-person project briefing. At the meeting, neighbors had the opportunity meet the project sponsors and architect and ask questions about the project. Over 1,900 invitations were mailed – one community member in support of the project attended the meeting.

Summarv

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On February 28, 2017, Pacific Gas and Electric Company (PG&E) filed its 2016 Energy Resource Recovery Account (ERRA) Compliance application with the California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC) requesting approval to increase rates to recover costs related to the following programs:

- · Seismic (earthquake) studies performed at Diablo Canyon Power Plant; and
- California's Renewable Portfolio Standard, which includes clean energy, clean air and greenhouse gas reduction goals for 2030 and beyond.

Related to the programs above, PG&E is requesting a total of \$5.69 million to be collected in rates from customers. If approved, this application would increase electric rates effective January 1, 2018. This application also includes a review of the recorded costs to the ERRA Balancing Account from the prior year.

Background

The ERRA is used to record fuel and purchased power costs which can be recovered in rates. PG&E recovers these costs with no mark up for return or profit. The purpose of this ERRA Compliance proceeding is to review PG&E's costs associated with obtaining energy for customers and approve rate increases for other program costs noted above. The CPUC will review PG&E's costs to ensure compliance with the previously approved forecast and energy purchasing plans as well as compliance with the goal of minimizing costs for our customers.

How will PG&E's application affect me?

Most customers receive bundled electric service from PG&E, meaning they receive electric generation, transmission and distribution services. Based on rates currently in effect, the bill for a typical residential Non-CARE customer using 500 kWh per month would increase from \$110.77 to \$110.82 or 0.04%. Actual bill impacts will vary depending on electricity usage.

How will PG&E's application affect non-bundled customers?

Direct Access and Community Choice Aggregation customers only receive electric transmission and distribution services from PG&E. PG&E's application will minimally impact these customers with a 0.003% average increase to rates.

Another category of non-bundled customers is Departing Load customers that do not receive electric generation, transmission or distribution services from PG&E. However, these customers are required to pay certain charges by law or CPUC decision. PG&E's application will not impact departing load charges.

These evidentiary hearing are open to the public, but only those who are formal parties in the case can participate.

After considering all proposals and evidence presented during the hearings, the assigned Judge will issue a proposed decision which may adopt PG&E's proposal, modify it or deny it. Any of the five CPUC Commissioners may sponsor an alternate decision. The proposed decision, and any alternate decisions, will be discussed and voted upon at a scheduled CPUC Voting Meeting.

The Office of Ratepayer Advocates (ORA) may review this application. ORA is the independent consumer advocate within the CPUC with a legislative mandate to represent investor-owned utility customers to obtain the lowest possible rate for service consistent with reliable and safe service levels. I am against setting up Comfort Women memorial and its inscription in San Francisco.

The inscription doesn't inform the truth about Comfort Women issue. I hope this will help you to understand this true problem.

This was just when US Congressman Mike Honda's Resolution 121, which calls on the Japanese government to apologize for having forced young women to become sex slaves during World War II, was discussed in the House Committee on Foreign Affairs.

Fareed Zakaria:

Japan's new Prime Minister Shinzo Abe sparked outrage in Asia and beyond when he recently said that there was no evidence that Japan's Army had forced women to work in military brothels during World War II.

The acknowledgement of and apologies for the so-called comfort women has been a stumbling block to better relations with Japan's powerful neighbors China and South Korea. We are joined by Yoshihisa Komori of Japan's daily Sankei Shinbun for a closer look at this hot topic.

FZ: Komori-san, why did Abe feel he had to make that statement?

Yoshihisa Komori : Because he has been asserting that the Japanese military as a matter of policy never coerced the recruitment of young women in Asia. There have been some isolated cases where soldiers and officers who are defying the orders from above forcefully taken away some unfortunate ladies, young ladies, China or Indonesia. But again, there's no proof that the Japanese military as a policy as a whole did such thing.

FZ: But the number of women involved, the scale of it, seems to suggest some kind of systematic effort and the women themselves claim that they were made to, they were almost screened by military authorities so it does seem to have a systemic or institutional aspect to the policy.

YK: Yes, I think Japanese leadership and the people acknowledge that there's a systematic involvement or systematic running or brothels of prostitution; the systematic way. But again it's based on a voluntary basis and there were ...

FZ: You mean voluntary by the military officers. Not by the women?

YK: No, by women. They were. You may be surprised to hear this but there are lots of the newspaper ads and some other commercial advertisements for recruitment for those women. Remind you though, sadly the prostitution per se was legal in those days. Not just in Japan. And between women and the Japanese military there's a huge sort of business people who were running these brothels for the military, maybe at the request of the military. So yes, the military was involved but the military never as a policy was coercing those women and that's the sort of complexity of the issue.

FZ: But there are certainly women who claim to have been coerced.

YK: There were a few cases coerced by those merchants of prostitution. Sometimes the whole family was in debt and instead the parents decided to pretty much sell, human trafficking in other words the very saddest form, those daughters to prostitution houses in exchange for some money. So, in that case on the individual basis on the part of women, yes, there is a coercion.

FZ: But the military was paying for it. Just to get at this institutional nature of the sex trade. As I understand it the soldiers were not paying for the prostitutes but the military as institution was contracting with the intermediaries, buying the services of these women, and providing them to its soldiers.

YK: But each soldier was paying. Yes, the individuals. There are whole record [of it] and many of the women... Again, I don't want to sound like I'm endorsing those sad obviously wrong acts but the fact remains on one hand that some of the women were making a lot of money on the record. They were sending, remitting their money home to their parents and some of them were making much more money than the Japanese Prime Minister [then].

FZ: You're saying that the military in its official capacity never paid for these services?

YK: No, they probably paid for the people who are running the prostitution houses but not the sex itself.

FZ: But there was a setup. There were houses in which on military camps. There were places where this was being done. The military must have been housing these people.

YK: Yes, that's right.

FZ: They created the infrastructure.

YK: They created the infrastructure and for that the Japanese government and successive Prime Ministers acknowledged the wrongdoing of the past and apologized.

FZ: Why is it that apology if it was made seems to be one that has not been accepted or taken as a real apology in either South Korea or China?

YK: See, there's a certain element outside Japan that would never seem to be willing to accept the Japanese apology. Succession, I mean all the Japanese Prime Ministers in the past 14 years- 15 years individually or collectively apologized but that's not enough.

Now they say we have to pass the resolution for apology, you know. A hurdle always has been raised.

But remind you, this is a part of the War effort. And the whole War effort conducted by Japan was punished to death. We paid the price. All those War criminals have been tried and executed. The entire of Nations subjected itself to the winners of the, victors of the World War II, resulting in execution and reparation and the San Francisco Peace Treaty and all that, you know.

So what more can we do? That's our feeling, you know.

They are nitpicking and I think the essence of this issue from the Japanese perspective is double-jeopardy, double-standards, and a tinge of racism.

Why do we have to be held responsible forever and ever for something that our, the people in the two generations, three generations ago did and [which] we acknowledged that was wrong thing. We apologized for it but again somehow the way we apologized is not enough or the way we paid money was not enough. It just comes again and again and again.

Look at Japan now. It's a purely democratic, sort of, have a lot of faith in the democracy and humanism. We have been making a very significant contribution to the international humanitarian causes [through] ODA or other forms. Why do we have to be so attacked and put in a sort of inferior position morally, I mean?

FZ: You said racism but the attacks are really coming from South Korea and China. The United States has actually been very quiet on this issue as an official matter.

YK: Look at what's going on at House of Representatives in the US.

FZ: No, I mean the Executive Branch has not been pushing you hard on this. It's China and South Korea that you're facing the most criticism from.

YK: Criticism is now coming from the United States. New York Times, the Los Angels Times, and Boston Globe. They are bashing Japan and the Japanese leadership as if there is something wrong in the Japanese DNA. None of us was around when these things happened. The comparison between Germany and Japan; what the Nazi Germany did [was] just annihilation, premeditated decision made at the top of the national government to annihilate one entire race, ethnic group that had nothing to do with the War, whereas in Japan there's no such thing even remotely. Everything that Japan has been accused of, happened in the battlefield with the parties, the warring parties. FZ: You know that it causes problems for Japan in East Asia, particularly with the Chinese and the South Koreans, whatever the merits of the issue. Why did Abe feel ... why did the Prime Minister feel he had to do something like this now?

Is it some people claim that he has been losing ground in the polls [so that] he needed to sure up his support and this was a way of throwing an issue to his nationalistic right-winged base?

YK: No, I really have to turn the table around. Prime Minister Abe only reacted to the bunch of questions raised by the Japanese reporters on the resolution that was brought and about to be voted on in the House of Representatives of the United States.

So our question is why do they have to bring up this issue now? We haven't said anything about this. We have not either negatively or positively. So only because of this House of Representatives resolution did Abe have to say something because the resolution specifically calls for un-equitable, a national apology which Abe said that [we] have apologized, so he doesn't need to apologized anymore.

FZ: But he also said that the military was not involved in an official capacity.

YK: So official capacity or not, that's the policy. I mean, that's pretty much an established fact. You really have to show us [that] the military's top level made a decision. Any proof that they were coercing, they were ordering the coerced recruitment of the young women.

FZ: How does Japan get out of this situation?

When Japan tried to get permanent seat in the UN Security Council, it was stunning how little support it had. I mean in all of Asia the only country that gave it its qualified support was Singapore. Despite the fact that Japan has given tens of billions of dollars of aid to all of these countries, I think it's almost \$30 billion to China alone. How does Japan get out of this trap where its image seems tied to what happened during World War II? And its reaction and its handling of that past?

YK: The past 50 years or so, I think the Japanese attitude as well as government policy was to say nothing against any charges.

Just showing our democratic nature and the humanitarian policy but by these policies. But certainly that didn't work so I think what you may be seeing from now is the Japanese leadership or Japanese people are speaking out.

For instance, there's no such thing as a military top decision or policy decision to coerce women even though there are people who say there was. But so now I think people more and more need to be speaking out and engaged in a dialogue, a discussion or a debate.

I think quietly accepting any charges and by doing all those good things just doesn't work. There's a profound disappointment, sadness, and resentment on the part of many people in Japan now.

You may be seeing a new Japan.

This is seriously beginning to erode the Japanese American alliance. Because the kind of people whose pride and other feelings are hurt by this incessant accusation against Japan are the people who most vigorously supported the alliance.

They're more based on democracy with the United States while countries like India or Australia, Britain or France.

But somehow they take something because there's a even behind this current move against Japan. There is a Chinese move. Congressman Mike Honda of California has been receiving a huge amount of political donations from the Chinese activists who are associated with the Chinese organization. Interestingly there's very little supportive activists from Korea. So I see this as a diplomatic maneuver on the part of certain countries to keep Japan in a emasculated way or inferior way just portraying Japan as if the country or the people who are sort of genetically wrong or something inferior. That's how strongly I feel.

FZ: Well, it's always a pleasure to talk to you Komori San. Thank you.

I am writing to request relief from the severe impacts of round-the-clock construction in the Rincon Hill neighborhood.

It's 12:44am on Thur morning and I woke up because there is so much noise from the construction site on Howard and Beale street. Why are they dumping stuff on the ground at this hour. This is not acceptable

For several years now, residents of Rincon Hill have suffered from lack of sleep as a result of endless night construction. The City has been issuing night permits to construction projects as a matter of routine, without any regard for the thousands of residents in the area. In the past, the City acted responsibly, strictly limiting night construction permits; but that neighborhood protection policy has been abandoned, and now there is continuous noise all night long. It is time for the City and developers to act responsibly again and halt all night permits except those strictly required for special circumstances.

Additionally, there are heightened health risks from inconsistent enforcement of mitigation measures against dirt and dust.

Finally, construction sites require proper traffic control--something that has been sorely lacking around Rincon Hill.

Re: Mistreated, Depressed and Broke Taxi Drivers at SFO

President Mazzola:

Please have the SFO Commission read this letter carefully. I am very sorry that I missed your Board Commission hearing today-along with the one at the Board of Supervisors at one p.m. As a San Francisco taxi driver I make seven dollars an hour in the City and clear nine an hour at SFO. Yesterday and this morning, I had to work the city because I was suspended for 24 and then 48 hours at SFO. Because I talk and write too much, I am on a hostile driver list.

In your underground bunker for taxis, one controlled by the tainted Pacific Park Management (PPM), LLC, you have one of the most mismanaged taxi situations at any airport this in USA. I am not stating this casually. I think PPM paid a 4.5 million dollar fine a while back. They still hand out the sticker for FSP PPM Management when that firm-*and let's be clear about this one item*-is no longer connected with SFO. It was part of another union firm like ABM.

For frivolous items, I have been suspended from SFO seven times in the past twelve months. In the previous 19 years while working SFO I was not suspended once. Do not blame Paul Foster at flysfo.com, it is the management at this SFO Commission. And, to put everyone department in the loop, your letter is also going to the Mayor, the Board of Supervisors, the SFMTA and others. You have closed your eyes to what goes on in the bunkers that PPM sucks millions of dollars in funds from. The firm PPM, jacked up our fees, reduced our free shorts and takes in up to \$400,000 a month from the taxi drivers that they control with their sheep dogs. Why? We need an audit here.

PPM employ morons as terminal concierges. One Indonesian concierge with a crooked back or neck, got me suspended last month, at the International Terminal (IT)-in the rain-at midnight. He had no capacity to make a judgment. Four people from India showed up at the terminal with four Smart carts and 18 pieces of luggage. Then, they had a dog they refused to put into the cage they brought with them. They were going to Berkeley. And, I have a ramp van taxi. It can take wheel chairs or excessive luggage, and I do both all the time. I have not had one safety concern or complaint in 20 years. I made a decision which was prudent.

With the rain coming down hard at SFO, I told these passengers, "You need two taxis, I am not going to load all of this stuff into this one." With the weight and passengers I would not be able to see through the back or side windows. But, the IT concierge starts yelling, "You have to take them, you have to take them." Then he tells me, "You have stuff in your cab that is why you do not want to take them-I am calling the manager." Yes, I had soft bags with papers in them, and

two almost flat green bags. But-it was an \$80 trip-so this stuff did not cut into my decision. One could put trunks right on top of these soft bags and they would flatten out. The ramp van is not a truck. It is a non-commercial van that was converted into a ramp van for commercial use. But, this idiot-the concierge-gets the SFPD Bureau up there (they were very professional) everyone takes pictures and I get kicked out of the airport-for 24 hours. I waited four hours and paid \$5 dollars for this event. Then, these four get this five seat cab to make the potential suicide trip up the Berkeley hills. I have stated in previous letters, for these groups you need short-back pick-up trucks made by the big five automobile firms. The airlines charge more for excess luggage, but we are not allowed to do so. Taxi drivers-controlled by the SFMTA- are being ripped-off for what we do at SFO-because the Commission allows it. You just let PPM rape us. The money we pay PPM is not helping us. Last, this type of taxi fare-with these bags and suitcases-almost never tip. We are taxi drivers, and not moving and storage handlers. The passengers should get only two free bags per person. Taxi drivers are not these passenger's servants. They want extra bags handled, they should have to pay for extra bags being handled.

As the Business Manager and Financial Secretary-Treasurer on U.A. Local 38, and a member of the Executive Board of the AFL-CIO since 1917-or Vice President since 2005 of the very powerful union, I have always wondered why-during your long tenure-you did not do much for SFO's taxi medallion fleet or drivers. The reality, you did not care for us. You felt that we were at the bottom end of the economic and academic strata, so you catered to your more credible union friends. Maybe Richard Blum was up for a Smart Cart or new painting contract that you needed to deal with. Instead of repainting cement, try washing it down once a year. The Senator's husband, Blum got all of the Veteran's Administration real estate deals in 50 states, too.

You are the President of the SFO Airport Commission, so I will state this: I have been a resident of the City and County of San Francisco for 45 years. My two daughters were born and raised here. I went to college here under the GI Bill, and with an AA, BA, MBA, and two 30 unit certificates in computer software and office technology, from CCSF and SFSU, so, I am still looking for a job with real pay. Through this cycle, for the last twenty years-I have been driving a taxi. One break was doing database at HUD for \$10 an hour. Simply, it is due to the system, which you are locked into it, from which I am locked out. And, I was a Boy Scout, so I know about your real estate and casino ventures, too.

In the past twelve months, while working at SFO as a taxi driver, I have been suspended seven or more times for 24 hours, based on frivolous and absurd accusations. The suspensions would not pass on any union board. All of my 24 hour suspensions happened after waiting for a fare, for up to four hours. Then, the rip-off, I leave with none. A taxi driver pays \$5 for this privilege. All the other allegations by PPM were, "Pure garbage."

I could apologize for the last two taxi suspensions-which were for the stuff in my taxi which should not have been there. But, to use it to take income from me-suspending me and others when we need the work-when you know that your system is milking drivers, is another story. I am a newspaper reader and no one on this earth likes the fact that I have them all over the place. While clearing \$9 an hour for my work, you prefer smiling drivers looking at their iPods-without newspapers-that can no longer can pay the rent, either. I and hundreds of other San Francisco taxi drivers work at SFO hauling airline passengers to their homes when they no longer have a home. You have cancelled our free-short-fares. We now pay SFO about \$400,000 a month for this privilege. This is the way you thank and help San Francisco taxi drivers. You treat us like illegal aliens in the city. They get better treatment. Although San Francisco taxi drivers are part of the SFMTA and the City, you have pensions and days off with pay and, 'We do not.'

When I state-we are-hauling airline passengers-I meant it. At night, one out of ten passengers' feel-after coming off a long flight-they can abuse the taxi driver. We are told by your terminal leaders to accommodate them. 'You do not want to get suspended. 'Around midnight, these passengers are tired and so are we. When we ask them, "Where are you going?" Many whisper back the answer or bark, "Let's go, I will show you." A couple of days ago, a woman and a Japanese man-gave me directions-and I did not understand a word they said. At the United Terminal, he was speaking with a bad accent and she was whispering during the rocket engine blasts from your vents. Then, they got out of the cab and told your guards, "The cab was full of stuff." The seats were clean, but there were newspapers in a bag on one side. The stuff was not on their seat. But, I did not accommodate them. The older woman refused to raise her voice.

And then there are the cell phone passengers. A couple of weeks back, at the same terminalearly in the morning-I had an Oakland hooker enter the cab. She was a bleach-blond blue-eyed woman, with all of her liquid assets hanging out. Her dress made a V at her crotch while her breasts were coming out of her bra. She was on her iPhone talking as I put her bag in the back. Without skipping a word from the phone she states, "Pleasanton." I tell her, "That is not an address, do you know where in Pleasanton?" I state, "It is also meter plus 50%." She says, "You can drop me off at the first exit." In the gridlock heading on Route 101 to 92 she now states, "I need to go to Oakland." I say, "Oakland is a big place, where in Oakland?" Next, she pushes her phone in my face and says, "Here." I tell her, "It's not an address, it is a route." Then she says, "No, it is the fucking address." I tell her, "You are pulling this misunderstanding because you have no intention of paying me." But, she now says, "My husband is a police officer-you are going to get arrested." But, I tell her, "I don't care if your husband is the President of the USA." I pass 92 and head up Hillsdale to the San Mateo Police Department. There, I tell them the story, and they take her and make her pay me \$35 for my time. This is just another passenger event.

Drivers and passengers listen to the deafening vents all day long, seven days a week. The vents used to have Canadian silencers, but SFO took them off when they moved them. In the past, I have written letters to the Commission about these vents, but, you simply ignored the complaints. I have more of them. We are not on Twitter or Facebook for now.

In the taxi bunker before we exit to the terminal, there is a broken fan motor in the vent that sounds like it is broken. The whirling noise has been barreling at us for least last five years. Do you think you can fix it? I have asked the janitors about it but they do not speak English. How can you have people working at SFO that do not speak the language?

At present, the City has about 3000 taxi medallions in the city. One thousand medallions do not go out every day. So, the taxis medallions sit on the wall of the firms that control them. Many were sold by the SFMTA to drivers that will never see the \$250,000 they paid for them. Today,

the SFMTA is in the middle of their own mismanaged taxi scheme. For drivers that want to sell medallions, there are no buyers. The remaining 2000 taxi medallions head for SFO every day. So, at present there is a taxi line at SFO-during the day-that sometimes stretches into Route 101. The SFPD Bureau closes the T-Turn. This helps to push these cabs back out to the freeway. Here, you have a mess and a major accident waiting to happen. Is this SFO Management? Should the federal government know about this venue?

According to the latest news, there are possibly 75,000 or more "Hail Cabs," on the street circling SFO and the City 18 hours a day. Every unemployed person in America is driving their own car for either Uber, Lyft, Wingz, or their own limousine with these outfits. They are causing a certain gridlock at SFO. There are also side firms that are not part of the "Hail Cabs" which use mini buses, cars and vans with no licenses for any kind of pick-up that use the Net as their medium. In the City these 'new taxis' are now picking up at bus stops and SFO.

So, every month the San Francisco SFO taxi medallion fleet is getting poorer and dying-while the taxi line at SFO stretches into San Bruno. The San Francisco cab firms are heading into bankruptcy. In this scenario, the Hail Cabs use their vehicles to subsidize Uber and we are using our cabs to subsidize SFO. No one is making enough money to pay the rent.

The biggest problem the SFMTA, SFO Commission, the CMA and the TJPA have with their Commissions is the lack of real dynamic street expertise and experience. There are no taxi drivers with street savvy and academic degrees on these commissions. I have been turned down for city posts under the Financial Analyst classes for 12 years-throughout the whole city. Mr. Mazzola, you work in a closed and corrupt system. You get all the rewards and we make some of the payments.

For the posts I had examination scores of a 1035-1060; I filled out over 1100 applications in the time period. I was turned down at SFO 25 times and for the Economic planner 9255, three or four times. You used the system to throw me out. Four different Asian HRs either lost, misplaced, threw out or sat out my multiple applications. Under three different mayors I applied for the Taxi Director's post four times and was turned down by the present SFMTA Director who picked someone with no experience.

You know that unionized BART does not pay \$5 each time to pick up passengers at SFO? And, there is only so much taxi business. So, what should SFO do?

This is what I see. And, change some of your very stupid rules. These dumb rules are killing drivers. Clean up the garage, and reduce the payments we make to you. Use part to build a fund for drivers. Then, give us drinking faucets and a clean dining area. Change the taxi entrance system at SFO to odd and even days. This system will be for all cabs and the limousines. If your license or medallion ends on an odd day, you can enter SFO to pick up. If it is an even number, you cannot enter until the next day when the odd numbered plate will stay away. This act will reduce the carbon print and number of vehicles coming to SFO by the thousands. SFO has two and half times the vehicles that are needed. The line of cabs and police work will end. Drivers will make more on the days they work and wait less. Possibly, make an exception on holidays.

For this idea-when implement-I will want \$10,000 a month for the life of the event. This is intellectual property and an idea which is mine. It will make up for all the jobs your HR agents blocked me from at SFO.

Also, you have no better proposal, at the moment. Enforcement will be miniscule.

I thank you for your time.

Dear Supervisor Kim;

sf.citi, representing nearly 1,000 member and supporting companies, requests the Board of Supervisors delay any action on the resolution urging the State Legislature to amend the Revenue and Taxation Code to enable local jurisdictions to propose for the ballot personal and corporate income taxes.

We at sf.citi have long supported sound tax policy as a key driver to growing our local economy. Proposition E, which we strongly supported, converted our antiquated payroll tax model to a gross receipts tax model and was passed overwhelmingly with 71% of voters in 2012. Similarly, the temporary Mid-Market tax credit of 2011 resulted in businesses of all types moving into long-vacant buildings in the South of Market district, growing property and sales tax revenues in that part of the city. These crucial business tax policies have led to San Francisco boasting one of the lowest unemployment rates in the nation.

Changing tax policies have significant effects on business and job growth. Given that this would be the first time such a tax policy would be implemented in California, there is no precedence for how this could affect the local economy. Without proper evidence and research into these potential effects, implementing such a policy could be disastrous and greatly inhibit growth in our economy.

sf.citi strongly urges the Board of Supervisors to delay any action on this resolution, and rather, to work with the Controller, Treasurer and Tax Collector's offices on a review of the city's tax policies and options for reform as we approach the November 2018 election.

Pursuant to Section 37.6(j) of the Rent Ordinance, Chapter 37 of the San Francisco Administrative Code, the Rent Board is providing its annual report on the number of eviction notices filed with the Department. During the period from March 1, 2016 through February 28, 2017, a total of 1,881 eviction notices were filed with the Department. This figure includes 122 notices given due to failure to pay rent, which are not required to be filed with the Department. The largest percentage increase was in eviction notices for roommate eviction which increased from 52 to 73 notices. Habitual late payment of rent eviction notices increased from 96 to 110 notices. Nuisance notices increased from 348 to 371 notices. The largest percentage decrease was in eviction notices to demolish or remove from housing use which decreased from 60 to 8 notices. The 1,881 total notices filed with the Department this year represents a 21% decrease from last year's total of 2,376¹.

The list on the following page gives the total number of eviction notices filed with the Department, the stated reason for the eviction and the applicable Ordinance section.

During the period March 1, 2016 - February 28, 2017, tenants filed a total of 410 Reports of Alleged Wrongful Eviction with the Rent Board. Of the 410 reports filed, 59 reports involved school-age children, with 51 reports relating to evictions occurring during the school term. Of the 410 total reports, 120 reports specifically objected to no-fault evictions, and 17 of these 120 reports involved school-age children, with 17 reports relating to evictions occurring during the school term.
