#### 7. PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

Our steering committee members have identified mass crime victim casualty planning, training and preparedness as the greatest need in the City and County of San Francisco. The committee has met two times prior to submitting this proposal and have committed to participating in meeting the outcomes outlined in this proposal (see attached MOUs). Members include representatives from the Department of Human Services (CPS/APS), Public Health, Law Enforcement(Police, Sheriff, Probation), Medical Examiner, Emergency Services,

the Courts and Community Based Agencies. Each agency has designated a staff member to represent them on the Steering Committee and anticipated work groups to carry out the goals and objective proposed in the grant.

#### 8. PROBLEM STATEMENT

#### Project Narrative

#### 1. Problem Statement

#### Demographics

The City and County of San Francisco is the financial and cultural core of a metropolitan area composed of nine Bay Area counties with a combined population that exceeds 7 million people. The City and County of San Francisco, the only city-county dual jurisdiction government in California, covers approximately 46 square miles and is home to an estimated 852,469 people (U.S. Census Bureau Quickfacts).

San Francisco is the center of international tourism and a major commuter destination; its daytime population exceeds 1.5 million. San Francisco is extremely dense and ethnically, linguistically and socio-economically diverse. A disproportionately large number of Limited English Proficient (LEP) families and communities come to the City and County of San Francisco in search of community based services and government systems that are more culturally and linguistically competent to meet their basic needs than those in other areas of the state. The primary social factors that influence life in San Francisco are the cultural, ethnic, and linguistic diversity of residents and the density of the population with approximately 18,500 residents per square mile, 44% of which are family households. San Francisco's ethnic diversity includes approximately 54% White, 34% Asian/Pacific Islander, 15% Hispanic/Latino, and 6% African American residents. Amongst this ethnic diversity the low-income African Americans and Latinos disproportionately live in neighborhoods which are most impacted by violent crime. In addition to the permanent residents from all over the world.

#### **Crime types**

The Victim Services Division served 7,044 victims and survivors of all crimes in 2015; providing crisis intervention, restraining order assistance, information about the criminal justice system, victims of crime compensation assistance, advising on case status, court escort and waiting, assistance with writing victim impact statements, relocation assistance, funeral arrangements, and restitution. Crime types of victims served included domestic violence, 24%; assault, 23%; robbery, 17%, survivors of homicide and domestic violence of a child, both 4%; child sex assault and elder abuse and threats, each 3%; sex assault, child physical abuse, hit and run all 2% and 13% were crime that fell outside of these categories. Analysis of new victims served in 2015 show ethnic identification of victims as 14% Asian, 21% African American, 25% White, 34% Latino and 6% other ethnicities.

#### Gaps/Needs

San Francisco's risk of natural disasters like earthquakes, tsunamis and severe storms is well documented and planned for, but more uncommon emergencies like terrorism or mass casualty events unfortunately a growing concern for the city.

Events like those in Boston, Paris, Brussels and San Bernardino are a reminder of both the need to plan and prepare, and the impact these terrible incidents can have on our communities. San Francisco is at greater risk of terrorist incidents than other small urban areas due to its high profile, national image and the large number of tourist who visit the city each day (SFDEM.org).

Over the past two years, the San Francisco District Attorney's Office Victim Services Division has been identifying, assessing and responding to gaps and needs in services. Many of those issues have been addressed, but one glaring challenge that has the potential to impact large numbers of victims, witnesses and the entire community is mass casualty crime events. Terrorism, active shooters, and other mass casualty crime events (defined by USC Title 18 as 3 or more victims in a single incident) can have significant impact on large numbers of people in short amount of time. The Federal Bureau of Investigations estimates each victim and witness of a mass crime casualty effects at least four other people, making this type of event a challenging crisis to manage under any circumstance. **Our office has identified and prioritized the goal to collaborate, plan and practice for responding to mass casualty crime events. Our objectives are to 1) develop a plan for multiple scenarios of mass crime victim incidents, 2) determine effective responses and the resources needed, and 3) practice and prepare for the response.** 

#### Impact of Addressing Gaps/Needs

By developing and convening the Victim Services Steering Committee (VSSC) that will evaluate and develop a multiagency plan for responding to victims of mass casualty crime incidents that could affect hundreds, or even thousands of residents in the event of a crisis. The proposal to coordinate, plan, train and practice for critical events involving victims of mass crime casualties will help minimize loss of life, organize and facilitate timely effective responses, plan for maximizing supports and resources for victims, witnesses, their families and the community. In addition, this planning process will help us identify gaps in services, resources and knowledge that can facilitate better coordinated and more effective response in the even that we have to respond to a mass casualty incident.

This process will also allow us to address the complex issues of 'at risk', vulnerable and special need populations in the city of San Francisco. People who due to age; physical, mental, or cognitive challenges; culture, religion, language or citizenship; or socioeconomic status may have unique barriers or challenges in the event of a mass crime victim event. When we are better able to anticipate and plan for needs, we can better serve victims in the time of a crisis event.

## 2. Plan

The following is our comprehensive plan for identifying gaps and needs, addressing identified victim services gaps/needs, administering the XC Grant Sub-award from Cal OES and acting as the single point of contact for the grant. We have included measurable objectives and detailed activities. Our budget narrative outlines our proposal to provide the required match through leadership staff and 4,160 volunteer hours. Signed Memorandums of Understanding by all San Francisco Victim Services Steering Committee Members are attached.

The San Francisco District Attorney's Office Victim Services Division will lead and manage the San Francisco Victim Services Steering Committee (SFVSSC). Our steering committee members have identified mass crime victim casualty planning, training and preparedness as the greatest need in the City and County of San Francisco. The committee has met two times prior to submitting this proposal and all have singed MOU committing to participating in meeting the outcomes outlined in this proposal (see attached MOUs). Members of the current SFVSSC include:

- Human Services Agency of San Francisco, which includes
  - Adult Protective Services

- o Child Protective Services
- San Francisco Superior Courts
- San Francisco Department of Public Health, which includes
  - o Trauma Recovery Center
- San Francisco Police Department

- La Casa De Las Madres- Domestic Violence and Sexual Assault Services

As the planning process proceeds we anticipate inviting members from our Level One Trauma Treatment Center- San Francisco General Hospital (also under the Dept. of Public Health), the Salvation Army, the Red Cross, San Francisco Fire Department (including the Neighborhood Response Team), Emergency Services, the Port of San Francisco, and other community based organizations.

Our proposal is to develop a Victim Services Steering Committee including the following objectives and activities.

Objective 1: Review existing department and agency plans and develop new plans, protocols or policies as needed or identified.

Activities:

- a. Identify specific people from each department by title or team as responsible for steering committee participation and responsible for updating and maintaining plan (see elements of plan attached)
- b. Review current city and county department disaster and mass casualty event plans
- c. Find appropriate nexus for Victim Services Division
- d. Integrate integration into system and/or develop new plan(s)
- e. Obtain final sign off of report by end of two year grant term
- f. Publish report (hard and electronic)copy and distribute to all partners

g. Meet as a steering committee on a quarterly basis

Objective 2: Train multiagency teams to respond to mass casualty crime victim incidents.

# Activities:

- a. Identify and Train staff members that will be part of the response team from multiple agencies (estimate 100 staff members)
- b. Potential trainings include, but not limited to:
  - Staff Preparedness
  - Crisis Counseling and Services
  - Family Assistance Centers
  - Communication Centers
  - Ongoing Training

Objective 3: Lead and participate in practice drills to test, evaluate and refine performance.

Activities

a. Discussion Based/Table Top Practice- year 1

All SF VSSC members will participate in a daylong crisis preparation exercise consisting on a mass crime casualty event scenario. The goals of the exercise include:

- Providing an opportunity to evaluate plans and operations
- Reinforce team work and relationship building
- Identify gaps and problems
- b. Operations Based Exercise year 2

All SF VSSC members and designated staff from their designated staff members will participate in a day-long large scale crisis response drill consisting on a mass crime casualty event scenario in a large public venue (e.g. ATT Park). The goals of the exercise include:

- Practice deployment, multiagency coordination and logistics
- Test performance of people, equipment and resources

- Identify gaps in resources
- Clarify roles and responsibilities
- Improve individual and team performance
- Evaluate- observe and collect data, analyze data, determine if goals or objectives were met
- Feedback After Action Report
- Refine Plan- After Action Improvement Plan

# 3. Capabilities

The purpose of this section is to further outline the capacity and commitment of the San Francisco District Attorney's Office to implement and manage the proposed grant program. The enclosed organizational chart presents a graphic depiction of the management hierarchy and service delivery plan.

**Capacity to Implement Plan:** The Chief of Victim Services and Parallel Justice Programs, Gena Castro Rodriguez, will bear primary responsibility for the oversight of the grant, including management of programmatic and fiscal requirements. She will be responsible for ensuring the outcomes and objectives of the grant are met during the term of the grant, that all reporting is submitted in timely manner, and supervise the staff and volunteers managing the objectives of the contract. The proposed full time program specialist (Victim Witness Investigator 8133) for the position will be responsible convening and managing the steering committee, coordinating and staffing workgroups, reviewing existing plan and developing new plans and documents, coordinating all trainings, managing practice drills, contributing to reporting and evaluation process, managing all documents, and work products as result of the grant and steering committee work.

**Capacity to Manage Grant Programs:** The SFDA Grants Manager is lead representative for the office on programmatic grant responsibilities. This position oversees pre- and post-award grant administration and ensures regulatory compliance and may manage grant-funded programs. In addition to grant administration, the Grants Manager may serve as the liaison with the funding

agency and submit reports and modifications to the funding agency. Policy and Grants Manager, Tara Anderson, has over 14 years of experience in grants administration and will support this grant project under the direction of the Chief of Victim Services and Parallel Justice Programs.

The SFDA Assistant Chief of Finance and Administration and the Fiscal Analyst serve as lead for grant related budgetary responsibilities. The finance team is involved in pre-award budget development and the day-to-day fiscal management of the grant, including approval from the Board of Supervisors, tracking expenditures, invoicing, charging personnel time, and cost reimbursement. Only fiscal management staff can draw down federal funds, and coordinate and respond to audits with input from staff with programmatic responsibilities. The finance team under the leadership of Assistant Chief Sheila Arcelona has over 25 years of experience with fiscal administration of grants.

This team works together on multiple grants in our department and is in complete compliance with all requirements for city, state, and federal grants.

# **Budget Narrative**

The following section outlines the project's proposed budget and how it supports the objectives and activities of the grant. We have developed our proposed budget to focus on these outcomes and minimize administrative costs and maximizing matching funds of leadership staff and volunteers.

- A. Personal Services- Salaries/Employee Benefits
  - a. Proposal to hire one full time Victim Witness Investigator III for 2 years to lead the Victim Services Steering Committee Mass Casualty Crime Victim Planning Process. This new staff position will be responsible for coordinating and managing the multiagency steering committee; convening members of the committee and subcommittees; working with partner agencies to review and analyze existing plans, protocols and policies; assist in the writing of a final plan or planning documents; coordinate and manage all division and multi-agency trainings including two large scale drills; evaluate, analyze and report on practice drills, and update plans and protocols as needed; facilitate printing, publication and distribution of report; coordinate all community outreach, engagement and public information campaigns related to work outlined in the proposal and associated with serving victims of crime. Qualification for the position will include: BA in organizational development, social sciences, public health or other related field; experience managing large multiagency steering committees; experience working on disaster or mass casualty events; experience working with victims of crime; experience writing, editing and publishing citywide policy and planning publications.
  - b. Match Funding- 10% FTE Chief of Victim Services and Parallel Justice Programs. This position leads the division of victim services and will be responsible for ensuring the objectives and activities of the proposal are met, will supervise the direct service staff and will chair the steering committee. Additionally we will utilize 4,160 volunteer hours with part time victim services program interns.
  - c. Benefits for designated full time staff member include social security, medicare, health insurance. dependent coverage, retirement, unemployment insurance and dental insurance.
- B. Operating Expenses- Supplies
  - a. Laptop computers for Victim Services Staff members to use for training, practice and in the event of an actual mass casualty crime victim incident. Laptops will be equipped to allow advocates and claim staff to provide direct services to victim in the field including at a command center or family resource center.
  - b. Pre-paid cell phones for use by staff and victims in the field in the event of a mass casualty crime victim incident.

- c. Personal protective gear including hard hats, gloves, identifying vest for trained staff members on response team.
- d. Canopies, folding tables and chairs to be used for practice exercises and mass casualty victim of crime events to facilitate providing services.
- e. Gift cards for victim expenses in the event of a mass casualty victim crime event including: food, medication, transportation, clothing, and other urgent and immediate needs as a result of the event).
- C. Mass Casualty Trainings for victim services staff members and designated staff from the multiagency steering committee (estimated 100) in areas associated with responding to victims of mass casualty crime events, crisis counseling, managing family resource centers, communications and media, girls and loss support and self-care for first responders. We will refine expense including consultants, registration fees, and materials as we identify needs and gaps in training as well as the number of team members in need of training.
- D. Mass Casualty Drills for steering committee members, additional key partners and designated staff members to prepare for responding to mass casualty crime events. Two drill are proposed: a discussion based/desk top drill in year 1 and a city wide large scale drill at a venue to be determined. Expenses could include materials, rental fee for venue & equipment, consultants. We will refine this expense as we explore the scope and partners for the drill.
- E. Printing of materials for the action steps of the steering committee, drills and practice exercises; publication of reports; public information materials.
- F. Travel/Training: Travel expenses for victim services staff including mileage, toll, parking; registration for trainings, other training related expenses.
- G. Indirect expenses including administrative overhead.
