Ordinance amending the Administrative Code to prohibit City entities from using City resources to participate in Urban Shield and other programs that promote the militarization of law enforcement.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco:

Section 1. The Administrative Code is hereby amended by adding Section 7.21, to read as follows:

SEC. 7.21. PROHIBITION ON CITY PARTICIPATION IN URBAN SHIELD AND OTHER PROGRAMS THAT PROMOTE THE MILITARIZATION OF LAW ENFORCEMENT.

- (a) The purpose of this Section 7.21 is to prevent the City's resources from being used to promote the militarization of law enforcement. This Section is not intended to prohibit the use of City resources in training appropriate to the professional development of law enforcement personnel engaged in policing a civilian population.
- (b) No department, agency, commission, officer, or employee of the City and County of San Francisco may use any City funds or other resources to participate in the exercise known as Urban Shield, or in any other exercise or program that includes law-enforcement training that promotes the militarization of law enforcement in a manner substantially similar to the law-enforcement training featured in Urban Shield.

- (c) No City department, agency, commission, officer, or employee may solicit or accept any kind of reimbursement from any other governmental entity—including, but not limited to, the Bay Area Urban Areas Security Initiative or the Federal government—for any expenses that City officers or employees incur in connection with their attendance at an exercise or program described in subsection (b).
- (d) Any City department, agency, or commission whose officers or employees have previously participated in Urban Shield shall, on or before June 30, 2018, report in writing to the Board of Supervisors and the Mayor to explain:
- (1) Whether and how any of its officers or employees participate in any exercise or program held under the auspices of the Bay Area Urban Areas Security Initiative (including, but not limited to, Urban Shield); and
- (2) How it intends to ensure that City funds or other resources are not used to promote the militarization of law enforcement.
- (e) Nothing in this Section 7.21 shall prohibit a City officer or employee from using paid leave (including, but not limited to, accrued vacation, floating holidays, or compensation time off) to attend an exercise or program described in subsection (b), provided that such use is otherwise consistent with the terms that govern the officer's or employee's use of paid leave.
- (f) Nothing in this Section 7.21 is intended to interfere, or shall be construed to interfere, with the duties of the Sheriff or the District Attorney under State law.
- (g) Nothing in this Section 7.21 is intended to interfere, or shall be construed to interfere, with any obligations or functions the City may hold or perform as Fiscal Agent for the Bay Area Urban Areas Security Initiative.

Section 2. The title of Chapter 7 of the Administrative Code shall be revised as follows:

CHAPTER 7: DISASTER COUNCIL. <u>EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS</u> AND RESPONSE, AND RELATED MATTERS

Section 3. Effective Date. This ordinance shall become effective 30 days after enactment. Enactment occurs when the Mayor signs the ordinance, the Mayor returns the ordinance unsigned or does not sign the ordinance within ten days of receiving it, or the Board of Supervisors overrides the Mayor's veto of the ordinance.

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LEGISLATIVE DIGEST

[Administrative Code - Prohibition on City Participation in Urban Shield and Other Programs that Promote the Militarization of Law Enforcement]

Ordinance amending the Administrative Code to prohibit City entities from using City resources to participate in Urban Shield and other programs that promote the militarization of law enforcement.

Background and Existing Law

The City participates in the Bay Area Urban Areas Security Initiative (Bay Area UASI), which is a consortium of twelve Northern California counties that receives funding from the U.S. Department of Homeland Security to guard against terrorist attacks and other catastrophic events. Urban Shield is an annual training exercise organized under the auspices of Bay Area UASI.

Urban Shield has attracted criticism on the ground that it promotes the militarization of law enforcement. Under current law, nothing prevents City entities from using City resources to participate in Urban Shield or in similar programs that are alleged to promote the militarization of law enforcement—and, in fact, City entities do participate in Urban Shield.

Amendments to Current Law

This ordinance would prohibit the use of City funds or other resources to participate in Urban Shield, or in any other exercises or programs that include law-enforcement training that promotes the militarization of law enforcement in a manner substantially similar to the law enforcement training featured in Urban Shield. The ordinance would also prohibit City entities from accepting reimbursement from other governmental entities—including, in particular, Bay Area UASI and the federal government—to participate in such exercises or programs.

Additionally, the ordinance requires City entities that have previously participated in Urban Shield to report to the Board of Supervisors and the Mayor to explain whether and how they continue to participate in exercises or programs organized by Bay Area UASI, and how they intend to ensure that City funds or other resources are not used to promote the militarization of law enforcement.

Finally, the ordinance clarifies that it does not interfere with (1) City officers' or employees' ability to attend such exercises or programs using paid leave, (2) the state-law duties of the Sheriff and District Attorney, and (3) the City's obligations and functions as Fiscal Agent for Bay Area UASI.
