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Resolution affirming San Francisco's commitment to 30 percent female representation in the public realm by the year 2020; urging the Arts Commission, in coordination with the Library, to install a statue of Dr. Maya Angelou at the Main Library; urging the Controller to establish a fund for erecting and maintaining statues of historically significant women; and urging the Board of Supervisors to consider a motion to require including the annual Gender Analysis Of Commission and Boards report produced by the Department on the Status of Women be part of the committee packet considered in Rules Committee appointment hearings.

[Affirming San Francisco's Commitment to 30 Percent Female Representation by 2020]

WHEREAS, Despite compromising 51 percent of the population, women compromise only 20 percent of elected representatives in the Senate and House of Representatives; and

WHEREAS, Women are severely underrepresented in private sector leadership roles, compromising only 20 percent of technology industry executive teams and only four percent of Fortune 500 company heads; and

WHEREAS, Women are severely underrepresented in the media, comprising 14 percent of people interviewed on Sunday News Shows; and

WHEREAS, Studies conducted by the Massachusetts Institute of Technology and the University of Washington indicate that visible representation of women in leadership positions encourage and support young women's careers and educational aspirations via the role model effect; and

WHEREAS, Women's historical contributions are inadequately recognized in public statues, memorials, and other works of art, as demonstrated by the dearth of statues depicting historical women in American cities, including New York City, Washington D.C. and San Francisco; and

WHEREAS, It is acknowledged that the San Francisco Arts Commission has made great strides towards supporting cultural equality in the arts, including gender equality, by awarding 50 percent of its public art commissions to female artists; and

WHEREAS, The San Francisco Civic Art Collection has 585 permanently sited works, and has been the recipient of 87 gifts of sculptural monuments and memorials of which only two depict nonfictional women; and

WHEREAS, When women represent just 30 percent of the senior leadership team or board, organizations start to experience a positive shift, not only in performance, but also in market share that creates competitive advantages; and

WHEREAS, Research further suggests that 30 percent is the proportion when critical mass is reached and in a group setting, the voices of the minority group become heard in their own right, rather than simply representing the minority; and

WHEREAS, The 30 Percent Club was formed in the United Kingdom with the goal of achieving a minimum of 30 percent female representation by women on boards of companies listed on the London Stock Exchange's FTSE-100; and

WHEREAS, There is a national movement to increase female representation in the public realm to 30 percent by the year 2020, the 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the ratification of the 19<sup>th</sup> Amendment to the United States Constitution granting women the right to vote, lead by former Treasurer Rios efforts to put a non-fictional woman on the U.S. currency; and

WHEREAS, The City and County of San Francisco should meet and exceed that minimum threshold of female representation by recognizing the contribution that women have made to San Francisco and the world; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors urges all City Departments to endeavor to ensure to achieve at least 30 percent non-fiction female representation in the public realm through works of art on City property, names of streets and right-of-ways, parks, public buildings and Department websites and publications; and, be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors urges the Arts Commission in coordination with the Library to install a statue of Dr. Maya Angelou at the Main Library as a first step towards achieving the goal of 30 percent female representation in the public realm and in recognition of Dr. Angelou's many accomplishments including breaking the color and gender barrier by becoming San Francisco's first African American female streetcar conductor, an award winning author and poet, a Presidential Medal of Freedom recipient and civil rights leader; and, be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors urges the Controller to establish a Category 8 fund to receive gifts, donations and contributions which may be offered to the City and County for the purpose of erecting and maintaining statues of historically significant women; and, be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors should consider a motion amending the Board Rules to require that the annual Gender Analysis Of Commission and Boards report produced by the Department on the Status of Women be part of the Committee Packet considered in Rules Committee appointment hearings.
