






- 39,600 housing units built within 1 mile of Downtown C-3 since 1985






Estimated Mode Share in San Francisco for 2015

- 7,800 "block the box" citations for FY 16-17








Reducing Parking Search Time





Transit-Only Lane Enforcement


- Forward-facing cameras on buses
- If a vehicle is stopped or parked in a transit only lane, the bus camera will take a photograph of the vehicle's license plate and a citation will be issued
- 3,361 citations for FY16-17

Red Light Cameras

- Coordinated effort of the SFMTA, the San Francisco Police Department and the City Attorney's Office
- SFMTA's combined automated photo enforcement, engineering and education efforts have resulted in a significant drop in related collisions during the past ten years



SFMTA Construction Permit Activity






Congestion Management

- Regulate construction activities to minimize work during most impactful times
- Optimize traffic signal timing, where possible, to reduce unnecessary delays
- Improve curb management to minimize double parking and circling for parking




Congestion: Highways & Arterials, 2009-2017









Growth Trends, 2009-2016


How many TNCs operate in San Francisco today?



How many TNC trips are occurring in San Francisco?


- ► 170,000 TNC intra-SF vehicle trips on typical weekday

- Conservative estimate (excludes trips with an end outside SF)



When are TNC trips occurring in San Francisco?


- Varies by day-of-week
 - ► 222,500 trips on Friday
 - **▶ 129,000** trips on Sunday
- Varies by time-of-day
 - Peaks at most congested times





Where are TNC trips occurring in San Francisco?

- Concentrated in the densest and most congested parts of San Francisco
- At peak periods, TNCs comprise ~25% of vehicle trips in South of Market.
