San Francisco needs to support all families better! Starting when their child is in the womb, parents worry about getting adequate time off to have and spend time with their newborn. Next is the challenge of searching for high quality affordable care for their child. Once they've sorted infant, toddler and preschool care, it's time to heading to kindergarten. Families have to take off time from work to tour, apply and interview. Once accepted, many public schools' aftercare isn't guaranteed and the quality of care is questionable and varies greatly from site to site.

Last week I went an early childhood event sponsored by The Re(a)d Zone, which is an early literacy initiative of the 50 Fund. After speaking with Norman Yee about the many ideas he has for early childhood in the city, and meeting a myriad of other literacy stakeholders from around the country, I realize that I'm ready to expand my early childhood community beyond preschool. The San Francisco Child Care Planning and Advisory Council (CPAC) is a State mandated policy and planning body appointed by the Board of Supervisors and the Board of Education to advise the City on early care and education issues.

The membership of CPAC is required to be comprised equally of 20% consumers, child care providers, public agency representatives, community representatives and discretionary appointees. The Board of Education (BOE) and the Board of Supervisors (BOS) appoint 12 members to the council. Per CPAC's bylaws, the BOE and BOS jointly appoint the final member to reach the mandated 25 person council.

Kelly Dotson currently represents District 1, but her term expires on September 14, 2017. I am happy that you had an opportunity to meet with Kelly during the budget process to discuss the early care and education issues facing District 1 and San Francisco. The Council is established to advise the Board of Supervisors, the Mayor, the San Francisco Children and Families Commission and, with their consent, the Board of Education and the Superintendent of Schools about child care issues. The Council will serve as a representative advisory and planning body to maintain, expand and improve local child care services. The Council will provide links between government and the community, and will work to maximize the amount and impact of local state, federal and private resources and funding for child care in San Francisco. Powers and Duties are outlined in Administrative Code, Section 5,200.

All terms shall be for three years. Members may serve for up to two consecutive terms, and may be re-appointed after one year off the Council. No terms served prior to March 8, 2010, shall be counted towards the term limit for Council members. A member appointed to serve a term of two years or less, including the initial term provided in the preceding paragraph, shall not be deemed to have served a full term for purposes of this term limit.

Reports: None referenced.

Compensation: Upon approval by the Council, each member who is not otherwise compensated to attend meetings may receive a stipend of no more than \$50 per meeting, not to exceed \$600 annually, exclusively from funds provided to the Council by the State of California.
