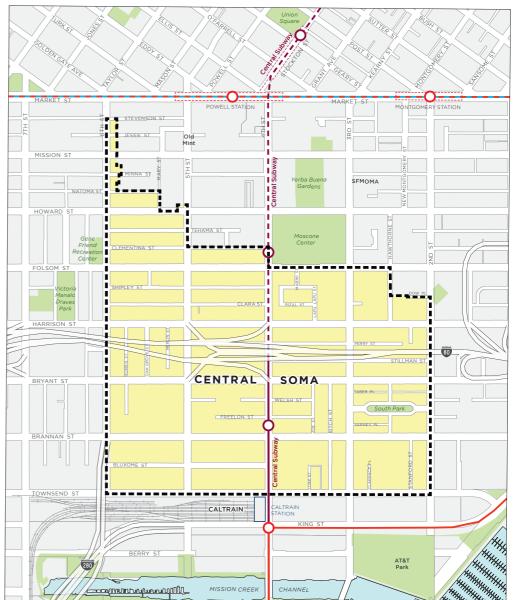

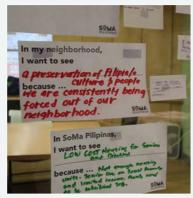




PROCESS – OUTREACH











PROJECT PROFITABILITY

Requirement too high = no development and no public benefits Requirement just right = development and maximum community benefits

Requirement too low = development but reduced public benefits

PUBLIC BENEFITS: TOTAL

No Plan = \$500 million in Public Benefits

Central SoMa Plan = \$2.0 Billion in Public Benefits

400% increase due to the Plan

Plus ~\$1 billion in increased General Fund tax revenues

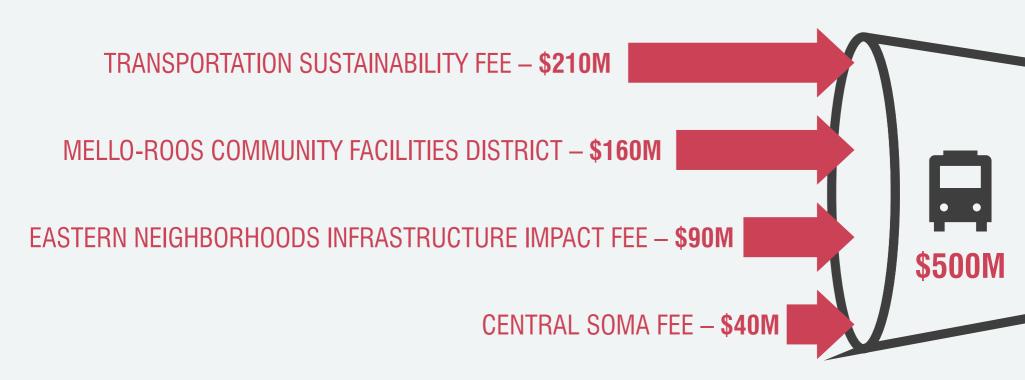

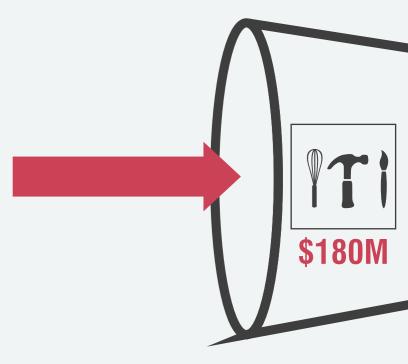

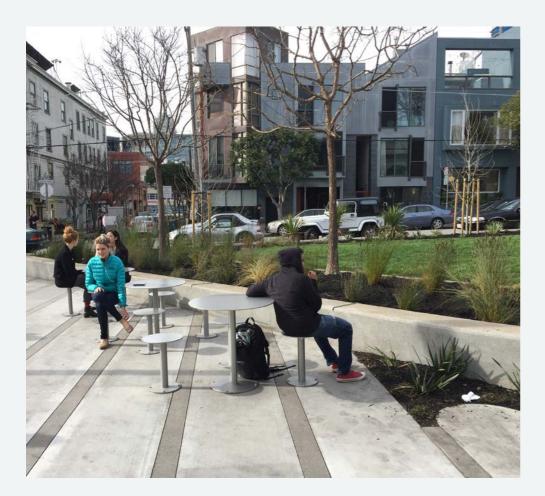


PDR SPACE BUILT IN NEW DEVELOPMENT - \$180M

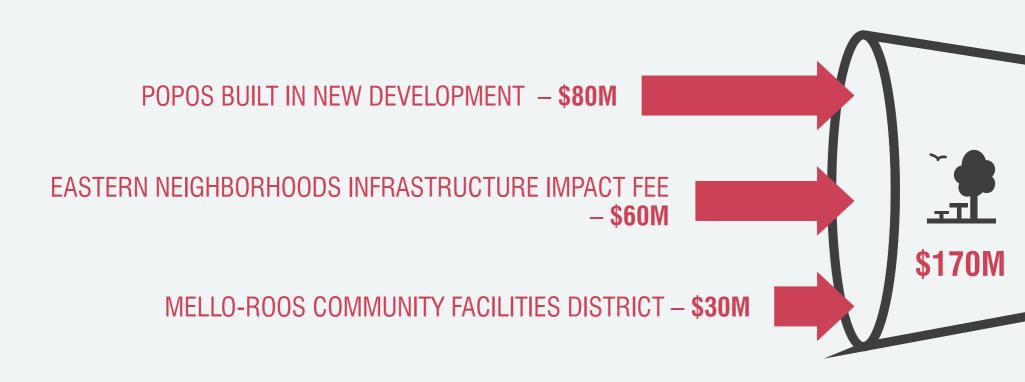

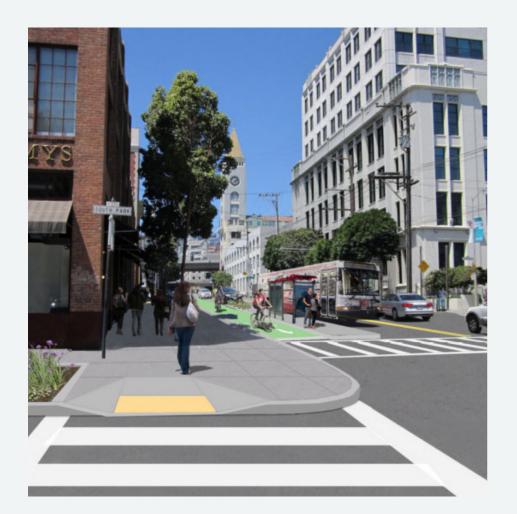

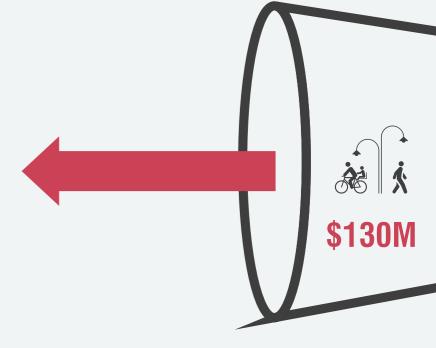

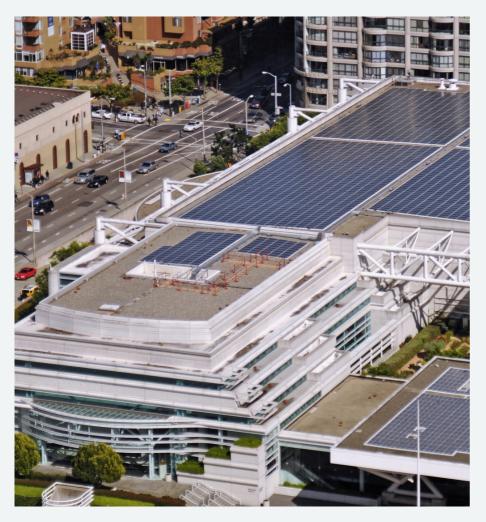

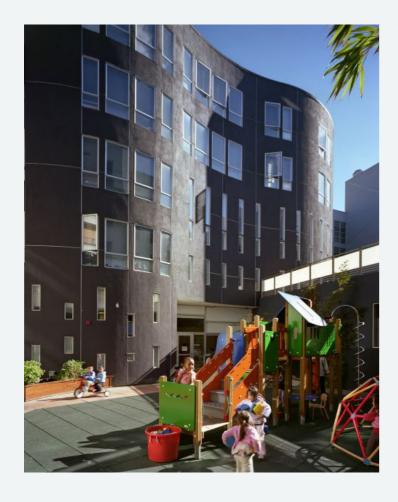

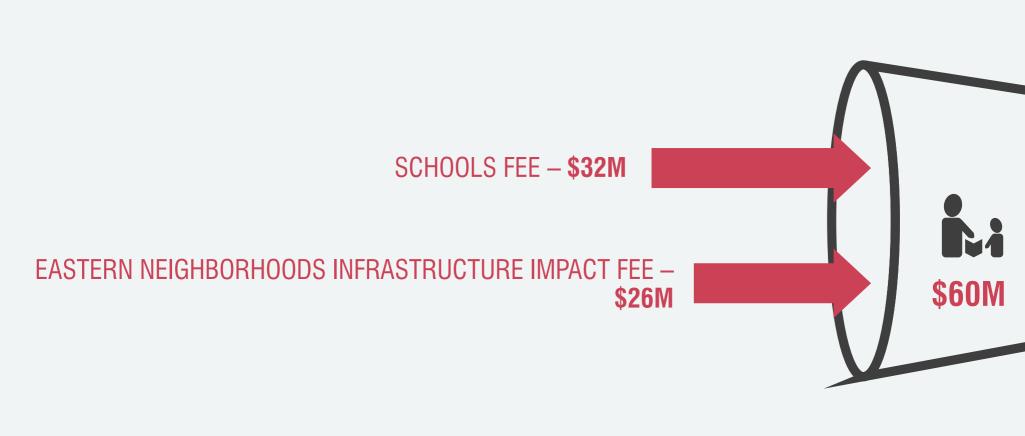

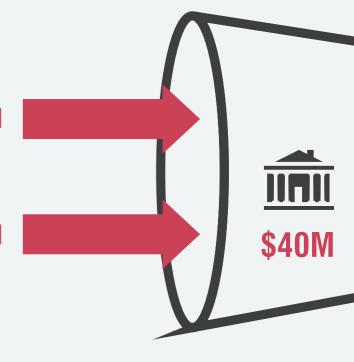

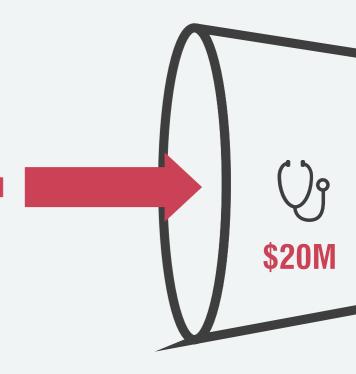
