Resolution authorizing the Department of Homelessness and Supportive Housing to apply for a technical assistance grant in an amount up to \$150,000 from the California Department of Housing and Community Development to support the planning and implementation of No Place Like Home.

WHEREAS, The City and County of San Francisco Department of Homelessness and Supportive Housing (Applicant) desires to apply for \$150,000 in technical assistance funding from the No Place Like Home (NLPH) program to support planning and implementation of the program; and

WHEREAS, The technical assistance grant may be used for application assistance, implementation support, NPLH coordination of activities, data collection, capacity building, and other eligible activities; and

WHEREAS, The amount was set by the state at \$150,000 for large counties and the application is due to DHCD by September 30th, 2017; and

WHEREAS, On July 1, 2016, Governor Brown signed landmark legislation enacting the NPLH program to dedicate \$2 billion in bond proceeds to invest in the development of permanent supportive housing for persons who are in need of mental health services and are experiencing homelessness, chronic homelessness, or who are at risk of chronic homelessness. The bonds are repaid by funding from the Mental Health Services Act (MHSA); and

WHEREAS, Like many communities across California, San Francisco is experiencing a housing affordability and homelessness crisis; and

WHEREAS, According to the 2015 Homeless Point in Time Count there were approximately 6,700 people experiencing homelessness; and

WHEREAS, Approximately 3,500 of these people are living unsheltered in our community; and

WHEREAS, Despite this crisis San Francisco does not have the shelter, Navigation Center, and Permanent Supportive Housing capacity to meet the need; and

WHEREAS, Since 2011 nearly 11,000 people have been re-housed with the support of city programs; and

WHEREAS, Housing is the only known solution to homelessness, and for those with disabilities and long-term homelessness, supportive housing is an evidence-based best practice; and

WHEREAS, Supportive Housing in San Francisco has success rates above 95%; and

WHEREAS, San Francisco has more units of supportive housing, per capita than any other major city, yet we are unable to meet the overwhelming need on our streets; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That Applicant is hereby authorized and directed to apply for and submit to Department of Housing and Community Development an application for technical assistance to support the planning and implementation of NPLH; and, be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, That Applicant is hereby authorized and directed to respond to any Notice of Funding Availability issued by the California Department of Housing and Community Development for funding from the NPLH program; and, be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Director of the Department of Homelessness and Supportive Housing, or a designee, as agent of the Mayor will conduct all negotiations, execute and submit all documents including, but not limited to applications, agreements,

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

Jeff Kositsky is thationally recognized leader in innovative horited s services and has over 20 years of

experience managing nonprofit organizations in Suppravise Supervised as the executive director of the Hamilton Family Center. During his tenure, the organization expanded its rapid re-housing program and developed an innovative partnership with the San Francisco Unified School District to prevent and end homelessness among school children and their families. From 2001 to 2010, he was executive director of Community Housing Partnership, a nonprofit affordable housing developer in San Francisco. He has served on several nonprofit boards, including San Francisco's Coalition on Homelessness and the Treasure Island Development Authority Board of Directors. Mr. Kositsky holds a Bachelor's degree in Economics and International Relations from American University in Washington, DC and a Master's degree in Public Affairs from the University of Texas.

#### Kerry Abbott, Deputy Director for Programs

Kerry Abbott started her career fighting homelessness at the General Assistance Advocacy Project, a small agency that assisted people in obtaining public assistance. From there, she moved to the Tenderloin Housing Clinic, where she spent 13 years as Program Director, then Deputy Director. She founded and directed City Housing, Inc. to provide non-profit property management, and leased more than 1,500 units of housing. Clty Housing later merged with Tenderloin

In 2005, Kerry began a consulting practice. She brought program-planning skills to scores of housing developers, service providers, and government agencies around the Bay Area for the next 11 years. Kerry joined the DHSH team as Deputy Director for Programs in November, 2016. She oversees the direct and contracted programs in housing, shelter, and street outreach programs for the department. Kerry has a BA in Philosophy from Point Loma College and studied Advanced Evaluation at Claremont Graduate University.

Sam Dodge, Deputy Director for Communications and External Affairs



Sam Dodge served as the Director of Mayor's Office of Housing Opportunity, Partnerships and Engagement (HOPE) before joining HSH as the Deputy Director for Communications and Policy.

Sam Dodge has more than a decade of public service, including six years as Director of Organizing and Outreach at the Tenderloin Housing Clinic here in San Francisco and five years as a member of the Street Homelessness Solutions Unit within the New York

City Department of Homeless Services. During his time as the Program Support Analyst for San Francisco's Department of Public Works, Dodge implemented the successful Pit Stop program, which provides clean and safe public toilets, sinks, used needle receptacles and dog waste stations.

Serving as the Deputy Director for Policy Sam played a primary role in opening the City's first Navigation Center.

Dodge holds a Bachelor's degree in Political Economy from Evergreen State College as well as a Master's in Public Policy and Administration from Columbia University's School of International and Public Affairs. Dodge has also served as a labor organizer for both the California Nurses Association and the Service Employees International Union.

**Gigl Whitley, Deputy Director for Administration and Finance** 



Gigl Whitley manages the HSH division responsible for Finance, Contracts, Information Technology, Human Resources, Facilities, and Data and Performance.

Ms. Whitley has worked in San Francisco government since 2006, starting in the Mayor's Budget Office as both an analyst and as Deputy Budget Director. From 2009 to 2014, she served as the Chief Financial Officer and Deputy Director of the Mayor's Office of

Housing and Community Development, implementing the City's first Housing Trust Fund and protecting more than \$100 million in local affordable housing funding after the 2012 dissolution of the San Francisco Redevelopment Agency. During her tenure, she also worked on funding strategies for the HOPE SF Initiative and the plan to transform public housing in San Francisco. Most recently, she served as the Deputy Director for Administration and Finance at the Office of the Assessor-Recorder.

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
