[Accept and Expend Grant - Department of Homeland Security - 2016 Port Security Grant Program - \$1,059,000]

Resolution retroactively authorizing the Port of San Francisco to accept and expend a grant award in the amount of \$1,059,000 from the U.S. Department of Homeland Security's 2016 Port Security Grant Program, including \$997,500 for the replacement of the San Francisco Police Department Maritime Unit's dock, and \$61,500 to upgrade the Port's DOC video system, for the period of September 1, 2016, through August 31, 2019.

WHEREAS, The FY 2016 Port Security Grant Program (PSGP) provides grant funding to port areas for the protection of critical port infrastructure from terrorism; and

WHEREAS, On April 22, 2016, the Port of San Francisco submitted an application for grant funds under the FY 2016 PSGP; and

WHEREAS, On September 1, 2016, the Port was awarded \$1,059,000 in grant funds for its SFPD Marine Unit Dock Replacement Project, and the Pier 1 DOC Video System Replacement Project; and

WHEREAS, On August 8, 2017, through Resolution No. 17-34, the Port Commission authorized the Executive Director to seek the Board of Supervisors' approval to accept and expend the grant, including any extensions, augmentations or amendments thereof; and

WHEREAS, This grant does not create any new positions and will not require an amendment to the Annual Salary Ordinance; and

WHEREAS, A combination of Port funds (\$103,000) and San Francisco Police Department Funds (\$250,000) have been identified to provide the required \$353,000 (25% of total project cost of \$1,412,000) in required non-federal match monies; and

WHEREAS, The grant terms prohibit including indirect costs in the grant budget; now, therefore, be it;

Mayor Farrell BOARD OF SUPERVISORS RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors hereby authorizes the Port of San Francisco to accept and expend \$1,059,000 in grant funding from the Federal Emergency Management Agency for security improvements at the Port of San Francisco; and be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors hereby waives inclusion of indirect costs in the grant budget and, be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Port, subject to the Board of Supervisors' approval, authorizes the Executive Director or her designee to execute for and on behalf of the City and County, any documents necessary to enter into the grant agreement with the Federal Emergency Management Agency within the Department of Homeland Security, including any extensions, augmentations or amendments, thereof.

MANDATE STATEMENT

City Administrative Code Section 10.170-1 states that accepting Federal, State, or third-party grant funds in the amount of \$100,000 or more, including any City matching funds required by the grant, is subject to Board of Supervisors approval.

BACKGROUND

The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), an agency within the Department of Homeland Security (DHS), provides grant funding through the Port Security Grant Program (PSGP) to port areas for the protection of critical port infrastructure and to increase public safety. These funds are primarily intended to assist ports in enhancing risk management capabilities, increasing maritime domain awareness¹, and improving capabilities for the prevention, detection, response and recovery from attacks involving improvised explosive devices and other nonconventional weapons, and enhancing cybersecurity capabilities.

In September 2016, FEMA notified the Port of its approval of two PSGP projects: 1) the replacement of the San Francisco Police Department (SFPD) Maritime Unit's dock located at Hyde Street Harbor, and 2) the upgrade of the Port's Department Operations Center (DOC) video system. The goal of these projects is to improve Port infrastructure and increase the Port's ability to successfully recover from natural and human-caused disasters.² In addition, the Port is implementing a comprehensive program to improve emergency preparedness and physical security through infrastructure improvements and implementation of all-hazards training programs. According to Mr. Ken Tashian, the Port's Homeland Security Program Manager, the Port is increasing maritime domain awareness through improved coordination and information sharing with local and federal partners that provide layered security³ to the Port, such as the San Francisco Police and Fire Departments, and the U.S. Coast Guard.

DETAILS OF PROPOSED LEGISLATION

The proposed resolution would authorize the Port to retroactively (i) accept and expend a grant in the amount of \$1,059,000 from FEMA's Port Security Grant Program, including \$997,500 for the replacement of the San Francisco Police Department (SFPD) Maritime Unit's dock at Hyde Street Harbor and \$61,500 to upgrade the Port's DOC video system for the period of September 1, 2016 through August 31, 2019, and (ii) commit the Port and SFPD to providing \$353,000 in matching cash funds over the 36-month duration of the grant agreement. If required, four (4) six-month extensions will be requested to enable all work to be completed by August 31, 2021. The PSGP grant requires a 25 percent cash or in-kind matching funds of \$353,000.

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¹ Maritime domain awareness is defined by the International Maritime Organization as the effective understanding of anything associated with the maritime domain that could impact the security, safety, economy, or environment. ² The Port submitted its PSGP grant application to FEMA on April 22, 2016.

³ Layered security describes the practice of combining multiple mitigating security controls to protect resources and data.

BUDGET AND FINANCE SUB-COMMITTEE MEETING

The acceptance of the grant is retroactive because the grant period began at the time of FEMA's Notice of Award in September 2016, or approximately 19 months ago. The Port Commission approved acceptance of the grant in August 2017, and design specifications were completed in January 2018. According to Mr. Tashian, no grant funds have yet been spent.

The Port was awarded \$1,059,000 in federal funding as part of FEMA's Port Security Grant Program that when combined with the \$353,000 in required matching funds (\$103,000 from the Port and \$250,000 from the SFPD), will enable the Port and SFPD to fund a total of \$1,412,000 in security infrastructure enhancements, as detailed below:

- \$1,330,000 budgeted for the SFPD Marine Unit Dock Replacement located at Hyde Street Harbor. This funding will support the building of a separate and secure dock for SFPD Marine Unit vessels. This project includes the construction of a floating concrete dock engineered to meet the current and projected needs of the SFPD Marine Unit. In addition, this project includes the installation of required piles, a gangway and all required infrastructure including power, lighting and water.
- \$82,000 budgeted for the Pier 1 DOC Video Replacement. This funding will allow the purchase and installation of a video wall in support of the Port's DOC operation. According to Mr. Tashian, the Port's current video system is over 20 years old, failure prone, and does not support internal or external feeds, including local and national news feeds.

The grant performance period is a maximum of 36 months from September 1, 2016⁴ through August 31, 2019, with the possibility of four (4) six-month extensions until September 30, 2021. According to Mr. Tashian, at this time, 2016 PSGP-funded projects must be completed by August 31, 2019.

FISCAL IMPACT

As previously mentioned, the total budget for the replacement of the SFPD Marine Unit dock located at the Hyde Street Harbor and the Pier 1 DOC video wall is \$1,412,000. Of this amount, \$1,330,000 will fund the replacement of the dock located at the Hyde Street Harbor. The PSGP grant will fund \$997,500, or 75 percent of the cost. SFPD will contribute \$250,000 and the Port will contribute \$82,500 for a total of \$332,500, or a combined 25 percent in matching funds.

The remaining \$82,000 will fund the replacement of the Pier 1 DOC video wall. Of this amount, the PSGP grant will fund \$61,500, or 75 percent of the cost. The Port will contribute \$20,500, or 25 percent of the cost, in matching funds.

The matching funds of \$353,000 were previously appropriated by the Board of Supervisors in the FY 2017-18 Police and Port budgets, as shown in Table 1 below, which summarizes grant funding for the two projects.

According to Mr. Tashian, project funds will be used for equipment, contracts and, if required, interdepartmental work orders. The Port does not expect to work order funds to other departments at this point in time. However, the Port is utilizing the Department of Technology (DT) contract⁵ with an audio visual contractor, Diversified Systems, Inc., to complete the Pier 1 DOC Video Replacement project. The Port is currently in the process of reviewing the SFPD Marine Unit Dock Replacement project's requirements and conducting a site survey to determine an appropriate location for the new dock. When this phase of the project is completed, the Port will implement a competitive Request for Proposals (RFP) process for a contractor and/or subcontractors to perform the final dock design, construction and installation. According to Mr. Tashian, a fixed fee contract will be awarded to a contractor and/or subcontractors that provide the best solution at the lowest cost for the SFPD Marine Unit Dock Replacement project.

The source of Port matching funds is capital funding from the FY 2017-18 budget, as appropriated by the Board of Supervisors. The source of SFPD matching funds is the SFPD General Fund allocation to capital renewal projects, as appropriated by the Board of Supervisors in the FY 2017-18 budget. According to Mr. Tashian, there will likely be nominal equipment repair costs to the video wall system over its useful life. Given that the Pier 1 audiovisual systems will be new, the Port estimates that the annual maintenance cost after the warranty period will be approximately 10 percent of the purchase price of the equipment. Any future maintenance needs will be funded out of the Port's operating budget.

RECOMMENDATION

Approve the proposed resolution.

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Article I - Summary Description of Project

Project 1: DOC Video System Replacement is fully funded for \$61,500.

Project 2: SFPD Marine Unit Replacement Dock is fully funded for \$997,500.

DIRECTOR'S RECOMMENDATION: Approve Attached Resolution

Executive Summary

On February 16, 2016, the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), an agency within the Department of Homeland Security (DHS), announced grant allocations for the 2016 Infrastructure Protection Program Port Security Grant Program (PSGP). This began the application process for 2016 Preparedness Grants. On April 22, 2016, the Port submitted its grant application to FEMA for consideration.

On September 1, 2016, FEMA notified the Port of its approval of two projects with a combined cost of \$1,412,000. This FEMA funding opportunity requires a twenty-five percent (25%) cash or "in kind" match of \$353,000. The two approved projects are the Hyde Street Harbor dock and the Pier 1 Bayside Conference Room video wall.

The replacement of the dock located at the Hyde Street Harbor is budgeted at \$1,330,000. The San Francisco Police Department Marine Unit uses this Port-owed dock. Of this amount, FEMA will fund 75% of the cost (\$997,500), SFPD will fund 17.7% of the cost (\$250,000), and the Port will fund 7.3% of the cost (\$82,500). The combined 25% match equals \$332,500.

This replacement of the Pier 1 Bayside Conference Room video wall is budgeted at \$82,000. Of this amount, FEMA will fund 75% of the cost (\$61,500) and the Port will fund 25% of the cost (\$20,500).

The grant performance period is a maximum of thirty-six months, plus the possibility of twenty-four additional months of extensions. At this time, 2016 PSGP-funded projects must be completed by August 31, 2019.

For the Port to accept grant funds of \$100,000 or more, the San Francisco Port Commission must authorize the Port of San Francisco to seek Board of Supervisors' approval to accept and expend the funds.

Strategic Objectives

The Hyde Street Harbor and Pier 1 Bayside Conference Room projects will improve Port infrastructure, thereby increasing the Port's ability to successfully recover from natural and human-caused disasters. This aligns with the Port Strategic Plan's Resiliency Objective #7: "(1.) Seek traditional and innovative solutions to the Port's capital plan funding gap by maximizing external investment capital; for project funding including infrastructure financing districts, general obligation bonds, historic tax credits, and grants. Improve the Port's resiliency to earthquake and the impacts of climate change, including sea level rise."

In addition, the Port is implementing a comprehensive program to improve emergency preparedness and physical security through infrastructure improvements, target hardening and implementation of all-hazards training programs. The Port is increasing maritime domain awareness through improved coordination and information sharing with local and Federal partners that provide layered security to the Port, such as the San Francisco Police and Fire Departments, and the U.S. Coast Guard. PSGP funds support enhanced threat detection and prevention, and projects consistent with Department of Homeland Security requirements.

Background and Purpose

The PSGP provides grant funding to port areas for the protection of critical port infrastructure and to increase public safety. These funds are primarily intended to assist ports in enhancing risk management capabilities, increasing maritime domain awareness, and improving capabilities for the prevention, detection, response and recovery from attacks involving improvised explosive devices and other nonconventional weapons, and enhancing cybersecurity capabilities.

Grant Approval Process

On February 16, 2016, the Federal Emergency Agency (FEMA), an agency within the Department of Homeland Security (DHS), announced grant allocations for the 2016 Infrastructure Protection Program Port Security Grant Program, effectively beginning the application process for the 2016 Preparedness Grants. This FEMA funding opportunity requires 25 percent (25%) cash or "in-kind" match for approved projects submitted by eligible entities. At this time, 2016 PSGP-funded projects must be completed by August 31, 2019.

On April 22, 2016, the Port submitted its grant application to FEMA for consideration. A committee made up of representatives from the region's major ports and from each port stakeholder community evaluated the applications and provided input to the U.S. Coast

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Guard Captain of the Port, who then made funding recommendations to FEMA. On September 1, 2016, FEMA notified the Port of their approval of two projects for the total amount of \$1,412,000, and awarded the Port \$1,059,000 in Federal grant funding (75%). A Port match of \$353,000 (25%) for the following projects is required:

- \$1,330,000 budgeted for the SFPD Marine Unit Dock Replacement (\$997,500 PSGP grant; \$250,000 SFPD; \$82,000 Port): This investment will support the building of a separate and secure dock for SFPD Marine Unit vessels. This project includes the fabrication of a floating concrete dock engineered to meet the current and projected needs of the SFPD Marine Unit. Also included is the installation of required piles, a gangway and all required infrastructure including power, lighting and water.
- \$82,000 budgeted for Pier 1 DOC Video Replacement (\$61,500 Grant; \$20,500 Port): This investment will provide funding to purchase and install a video wall in support of the Port's DOC operation. The Port's current video system is over 20 years old, failure prone, and does not support and internal or external feeds, including local and national news feeds.

Regulatory Approvals

Any construction and/or implementation of the planned improvements will require developing construction plans and performing an environmental review pursuant to approvals under the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA), and securing permits from the San Francisco Bay Conservation and Development Commission (BCDC), and Regional Water Quality Control Board. Port Commission approval is contingent upon CEQA determination and acceptance. Additional approvals through FEMA to comply with applicable Federal environmental review requirements are currently in progress. The Port will seek BCDC approval as applicable.

<u>Climate Action</u>

The potential for sea level rise is a concern for all port projects along the waterfront. However, the design life of these projects is limited to less than 30 years. The SFPD replacement dock will be a floating structure that will accommodate rising sea level during this period.

The planned video wall will be located on Pier 1 above deck level, so it is not necessary for this project to withstand sea level rise.

Funding

As detailed in table 1, the Port will use capital funding from Fiscal Years (FY) 2017-18 and 2018-19 budgets, and \$250,000 from the SFPD to meet the PSGP 25% match requirement for SFPD dock project.

The Port will use capital funding from the Fiscal Year (FY) 2017-18 budget to meet the PSGP 25% match requirement for Pier 1 video wall project.

WHEREAS,	the U.S. Department of Homeland Security Infrastructure Protection Program's Port Security Grant Program (PSGP) provides grant funding to port areas for the protection of critical port infrastructure from terrorism; and the PSGP funds are primarily intended to assist ports in enhancing risk management capabilities, increasing domain awareness and improving capabilities for prevention, detection, response and recovery from attacks involving improvised explosive devises and other nonconventional weapons; and
WHEREAS,	on April 22, 2016, the Port of San Francisco submitted an application for grant funds under the PSGP; and
WHEREAS,	on September 1, 2016, the Port of San Francisco was awarded \$1,059,000 in PSGP funds for security improvements on Port of San Francisco property (the "grant") which will fund replacement of the SFPD Marine Unit dock at the Hyde Street Harbor, and to assist with the replacement of the Port's Department Operations Center (DOC) video system; and
WHEREAS,	under the City Administrative Code Section 10.107-1, the Port of San Francisco must obtain Board of Supervisors' approval to accept and expend grant funds of \$100,000 or more; and
WHEREAS,	annually the Port of San Francisco budgets \$250,000 to ensure matching funds are available to provide a source for required matching funds; and
WHEREAS,	the \$1,330,000 budgeted for the SFPD Marine Unit Dock Replacement (\$997,500 PSGP grant; \$250,000 SFPD; \$82,000 Port funds) will support the building of a separate and secure dock for SFPD Marine Unit vessels. This project includes the fabrication of a floating concrete dock engineered to meet the current and projected needs of the SFPD Marine Unit. Also included is the installation of required piles, a gangway and all required infrastructure including power, lighting and water; and
WHEREAS,	the \$82,000 budgeted for Pier 1 DOC Video Replacement (\$61,500 Grant; \$20,500 Port) will provide funding to purchase and install a video wall in support of the Port's DOC operation. The Port's current video system is over 20 years old, failure prone and does not support and internal or external feeds, including local and national news feeds.

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WHEREAS, the security enhancement projects will require the completion of environmental review pursuant to the California Environmental Quality Act, and securing permits from regulatory agencies prior to implementation; now, therefore be it

RESOLVED, that the Port Commission hereby authorizes the Executive Director to seek the Board of Supervisors' approval to accept and expend PSGP FY16 funds in the amount of \$1,059,000, 75% of the \$1,412,000 approved for Port security projects; and be it further

RESOLVED, that the port Commission hereby urges the Board of Supervisors to approve the request for approval to accept and expend the grant; and be it further

RESOLVED, that the Port Commission, subject to the Board of Supervisors' approval, hereby authorizes the Executive Director or her designee to accept and expend the grant, provided that all required CEQA environmental review and regulatory permits have been secured, and to execute for and on behalf of the City and County of San Francisco, any documents necessary to enter into the grant agreement with the Federal Emergency Management Agency or the Department of Homeland Security, including any extensions, augmentations or amendments thereof.
