1	[Armenian Genocide Commemoration Day - April 24, 2018]
2	
3	Resolution declaring April 24, 2018, as Armenian Genocide Commemoration Day in the
4	City and County of San Francisco.
5	
6	WHEREAS, The Armenian people, living in their historic homeland of 4,000 years,
7	were subjected to severe persecution by the Turkish government of the Ottoman Empire
8	before and after the turn of the twentieth century, including widespread massacres, usurpation
9	of land and property, and destruction of cultural institutions and monuments during the period
10	from 1894 to 1896 and again in 1909; and
11	WHEREAS, The unspeakable horrors experienced by the Armenian people at the
12	hands of the Ottoman Turkish government culminated in 1915 in what is known by historians
13	as the first systematic genocide of the twentieth century; and
14	WHEREAS, The Ottoman Turkish authorities planned and implemented the atrocities
15	committed against the Armenian people from 1915 through 1923, resulting in the deaths of
16	1.5 million Armenian women, men and children; and
17	WHEREAS, In response to the genocide and at the behest of President Woodrow
18	Wilson and the U.S. State Department, the Near East Relief Organization, the first
19	Congressionally-sanctioned American philanthropic effort created exclusively to aid the
20	Armenian people and other Christian minorities, was founded and provided unprecedented
21	relief, delivering more than \$117,000,000 of humanitarian assistance between 1915 and 1930,
22	and saving approximately one million refugees, including 130,000 orphans of the genocide;

24	WHEREAS, Raphael Lemkin, who coined the term "genocide" in 1944, and who was
25	the earliest proponent of the United Nations Convention on the Prevention and Punishment of

the Genocide, invoked the Armenian case as a definitive example of genocide in the twentieth
century; and

3 WHEREAS, Those citizens of Turkey who speak the truth about the Armenian 4 Genocide – such as assassinated human rights activist and journalist Hrant Dink – continue to 5 be silenced by violent means and/or imprisonment, in part due to Turkish law which 6 criminalizes any expression which is considered to be critical of Turkish identity; and 7 WHEREAS, 2018 marks the 30th anniversary of the genocidal pogroms against 8 Armenians in the cities of Sumgait and Baku, Azerbaijan, following a peaceful demand by the 9 Armenian autonomous republic of Nagorno Karabagh to reunite with the Republic of Armenia; 10 and 11 WHEREAS, By honoring the survivors and consistently remembering and condemning 12 the repeated atrocities committed against the Armenian people, as well as the persecution of 13 the Assyrian and Greek populations of the Ottoman Empire, we guard against the repetition of 14 genocide; and 15 WHEREAS, California has become home to the largest and most active population of 16 Armenians in the United States, and those citizens have enriched our state through leadership 17 in the fields of academia, medicine, business, agriculture, government and the arts and are 18 proud and patriotic practitioners of American citizenship; and 19 WHEREAS, San Francisco Armenian-Americans are predominantly descendants of the 20 few remaining survivors of the Genocide; and 21 WHEREAS, San Francisco is proud to join the Armenian-American community in its 22 commemoration of the anniversary of the Armenian Genocide in an effort to educate others 23 about the tragic loss of life, land, and human rights of the Armenian people and the crime of 24 genocide committed against them; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco
 hereby declares April 24, 2018, as Armenian Genocide Commemoration Day in the City and
 County of San Francisco.

4 FURTHER RESOLVED, That the San Francisco Board of Supervisors urges San 5 Francisco's elected representatives in the U.S. House of Representatives and Senate to 6 accord recognition of the Armenian Genocide through passage of House Resolution 220; and 7 FURTHER RESOLVED, That the San Francisco Board of Supervisors urges the San 8 Francisco Board of Education to reaffirm its commitment to teaching about the Armenian 9 Genocide in San Francisco Schools as indicated in the California State Board of Education's 10 History Social Sciences framework and standards, by communicating this intention to its high 11 school Social Studies and English Language Arts educators, and by offering appropriate 12 professional development training and instructional resources on the subject to social studies 13 and English language arts educators. 14 15 16 17
