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3	Resolution supporting the California Schools and Local Communities Funding Act and
4	reaffirming the Board of Supervisors support for a split-roll reform of Proposition 13 in
5	order to close the commercial property tax loophole and restore billions in revenue.
6	
7	WHEREAS, Since the passage of Proposition 13 in 1978, cities and counties have
8	faced significant limitations in their main source of funding, the property tax; and
9	WHEREAS, While the intent of Proposition 13 is to help homeowners, loopholes in the
10	system have permitted major commercial and industrial properties to avoid reassessment, a
11	windfall to commercial property owners at the expense of vital public services; and
12	WHEREAS, The property tax has shifted away from commercial property and toward
13	residential property throughout the state and in virtually every county; and
14	WHEREAS, City and county finances have long been stressed while the state has
15	failed in its intention to improve local finances; and
16	WHEREAS, The property tax is one of the few discretionary sources of revenue for
17	cities and counties; and
18	WHEREAS, Estimates by academic researchers at University of Southern California
19	("USC") have identified that reassessing commercial property will bring \$11.4 billion in annual
20	property tax revenue to cities, counties, special districts, and schools; and
21	WHEREAS, This estimate includes \$835,000,000 in annual revenue for the City and
22	County of San Francisco alone; and
23	WHEREAS, USC has identified that nearly 80% of the revenue will come from just 8%
24	of large properties, owned by corporations and wealthy investors, many of them out-of-state;

1	WHEREAS, USC research shows that a majority of commercial owners already pay
2	close to market value, making the current system inequitable among businesses, benefitting
3	large property owners, who have held land for a long period; and
4	WHEREAS, The current failure to close the commercial property tax loophole has led
5	to poor land use, inflated land values, and urban blight; and
6	WHEREAS, The San Francisco Board of Supervisors unanimously passed a resolution
7	on June 3, 2014, in support of closing the commercial property tax loophole by regularly
8	reassessing commercial properties at fair market value; and
9	WHEREAS, Signatures are currently being gathered for the Schools and Local
10	Communities Funding Act ("the Act"), which is expected to be on the ballot in 2020; and
11	WHEREAS, Allocation of revenues to cities, counties, and special districts will follow
12	current property tax allocation; and
13	WHEREAS, The Act will provide billions in locally-controlled property tax funding yearly
14	for cities, counties, and special districts; and
15	WHEREAS, The Act contains provisions to benefit small businesses, and levels the
16	playing field among businesses; and
17	WHEREAS, The Act will improve land use, infrastructure, public safety, housing, parks,
18	libraries, health and human services, and the environment; now, therefore, be it
19	RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors reaffirms its support for a split-roll reform of
20	Proposition 13 in order to close the commercial property tax loophole; and, be it
21	FURTHER RESOLVED, That the City and County of San Francisco go on record in
22	support of the California Schools and Local Communities Funding Act; and, be it
23	FURTHER RESOLVED, That the City and County of San Francisco urges other
24	municipalities to support the California Schools and Local Communities Funding Act.

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
