### PEDESTRIAN SAFETY

Budget Priority Hearing May 3, 2018 Chava Kronenberg, SFMTA In 2014, the City and County of San Francisco adopted Vision Zero as a policy.

Vision Zero is the city's commitment to creating safer, more livable streets with the goal of eliminating all traffic fatalities and reducing severe injuries.

  - Using technology to ensure a safe system

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

Pedestrians are most vulnerable: 70% of fatalities

Downward trend since 2014



No one killed while travelling in a motor vehicle, in contrast with 2016




Two people killed while biking: 10% of fatalities




Four people killed while riding a motorcycle: 20% of fatalities

#### **VULNERABLE POPULATIONS**

- In 2017, half of traffic fatalities occurred on the Vision Zero High Injury Network.
- Forty percent of fatalities occurred in a Community of Concern half of which were on the VZHIN.
- Among pedestrian fatalities 50% were people age 65 and older and 79% were people age 50 +





#### SAFE STREETS: CAPITAL PROGRAM

13 miles per year at least annually with an average of \$57 million dollars per year, with a focus of funding on the High Injury Network

- Major projects in construction include Masonic Avenue,
   2<sup>n</sup> Street and Polk Street
- Complete Streets projects in planning and design phases include 6<sup>th</sup> Street, Hairball, Valencia, and Mission Street
   Excelsion
- Quick and effective corridors, including Folsom St., Turk
   St. and Division St. quick builds
- Future projects in the SFMTA Capital Improvement Program include Ocean Ave. and Monterey Ave.
- Neighborhood planning efforts in the Excelsior and the Bayview


#### SAFE PEOPLE & SAFE VEHICLES: NON CAPITAL PROGRAM

Approximately 3-5 major campaigns each year with an average annual budget of \$2-3 million dollars

- **Broad, citywide multi-media campaigns:** Recent 'heartbreak' campaign
- Targeted outreach to vulnerable populations:
   Motorcycle Safety, Safe Routes for Schools & Safe Routes for Seniors
- Collaborations with enforcement and communications: Safe Speeds

Additional non-infrastructure efforts to support Vision Zero:

- Evaluations of all Safe Streets projects to inform future projects and share outcomes
- Data transparency on TransBASESF.org

- California Office of Traffic Safety
- Active Transportation Programs, Non-Infrastructure
- One Bay Area Grant
- Prop K County Sales Tax
- National Safety Council Road to Zero


80% of funds received go to:

- Consultants and community based organizations for outreach campaigns







Know the rules of the road – pedestrians have the right of way






#### **Expand evaluation program:**
