[Airport Emergency Contract - Covenant Aviation Security, LLC - General Airport Security Services - Not to Exceed \$1,700,000]

Resolution retroactively approving Emergency Contract No. 50177 for General Airport Security Services between Covenant Aviation Security, LLC, and the City and County of San Francisco, acting by and through its Airport Commission, in an amount not to exceed \$1,700,000 over a six month term from April 9, 2018, through October 8, 2018.

WHEREAS, The Airport's general security services contractor defaulted, and the Airport issued a notice of termination of that contract, effective Monday, April 9, 2018, at 2300 hours; and

WHEREAS, On April 6, 2018, the Airport Commission declared an emergency; and WHEREAS, On April 24, 2018, by Resolution No. 18-0111, the Airport Commission awarded the Emergency Contract to Covenant Aviation Security, LLC for Transportation Security Administration (TSA)-Approved Airport Security Program (ASP) requirement for Airports to conduct inspections of all deliveries, merchandise, consumables, and employees accessing the Sterile Area (post security) from the Secured Areas; and

WHEREAS, As security is critical to safeguard the Airport, the traveling public, and the thousands of people who work at San Francisco International Airport, we must maintain continuous general security services with minimal interruption; the Airport contacted Covenant Aviation Security, LLC, who was the second ranked proposer in the most recent Request for Proposals for General Airport Security Services, to take over the service immediately upon the departure of the defaulting contractor; and

WHEREAS, The Airport and Covenant Aviation Security, LLC, have successfully concluded negotiations and reached agreement on the contract terms and conditions; and

WHEREAS, Copies of the Contract are on file with the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors in File No. 180494; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors hereby approves the Emergency Contract No. 50177 for General Airport Security Services between Covenant Aviation Security, LLC and the City and County of San Francisco, acting by and through its Airport Commission, in an amount not to exceed \$1,700,000 over a six month term from April 9, 2018, through October 8, 2018; and, be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, That within thirty (30) days of the Contract being fully executed by all parties, the Airport Commission shall provide the executed Contract to the Clerk of the Board for inclusion into the official file.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Legislative Objectives

• The proposed resolution would retroactively approve the emergency contract between the San Francisco International Airport and Covenant Aviation Security, LLC, to provide security services for an amount not to exceed \$1,700,000 over a six-month term from April 6, 2018 through October 5, 2018.

Key Points

- In November 2016, the San Francisco International Airport Commission approved the issuance of the request for proposals for General Airport Security Services. HSS Inc. earned the highest score and was awarded an initial contract for a period of three years from July 1, 2017 through June 30, 2020 in an amount not to exceed \$6.5 million. The contract was approved by the Airport Commission on May 2, 2017.
- Under the initial contract, HSS Inc. provided trained security staff to provide security guard and inspection services at the San Francisco International Airport at specified locations throughout the terminals and exits. However, HSS Inc. failed to provide adequate staffing. The Airport determined that HSS Inc. had defaulted on its contract and issued a notice of termination of the contract effective Monday, April 9, 2018.
- The Airport contacted Covenant Aviation Security, LLC, to take over the service immediately upon departure of the defaulting contractor. The Airport Commission approved the emergency contract on April 24th, and the final contract terms were reached on May 2, 2018.

Fiscal Impact

- The contract not to exceed amount of \$1,700,000 over a six-month term from April 6, 2018 through October 5, 2018. As of July 2018, the Airport has paid \$427,589 to Covenant Aviation Security for the emergency contract.
- The Airport has issued a new request for proposals for a contract with an initial term of approximately 20 months. Proposals for this contract were due by June 29th. The Airport is scheduled to award this new contract to the highest-ranking proposer prior to the expiration of the six-month Emergency Contract with Covenant on October 5th, 2018.

Recommendation

Approve the proposed resolution

MANDATE STATEMENT

Administrative Code Section 6.60 provides that City contracts entered into for emergency work may be executed in the most expeditious manner. However, declarations of emergencies where the repair work is anticipated to be \$250,000 or more are subject to Board of Supervisors approval. Section 6.60(d) also states that if the emergency does not permit Board of Supervisors approval of the emergency before work is commenced or the contract(s) entered into, such approvals from the Board of Supervisors shall be obtained as soon as possible, with the proposed resolution approving the emergency determination submitted to the Board of Supervisors within 60 days of the department head's emergency declaration.

BACKGROUND

The federal Transportation Security Administration (TSA) requires that all commercial service Airports have a TSA approved Airport Security Program. In November 2016, the San Francisco International Airport Commission approved the issuance of the request for proposals for General Airport Security Services. Eight proposals were submitted, but three were deemed non-responsive. A panel composed of a three security related staff and an Airport duty manager rated the proposals on (a) experience of the firm, (b) assigned project team, (c) approach, and (d) average yearly hourly rate. The top three scoring firms, HSS Inc., Allied Universal and Covenant Aviation Security, LLC, were interviewed by the selection panel. The results of the interviews and scoring process are shown in Table 1 below.

HSS Inc. earned the highest score and was awarded an initial contract for a period of three years from July 1, 2017 through June 30, 2020, with one (1) two-year extension option, in an amount not to exceed \$6.5 million. The contract was approved by the Airport Commission on May 2, 2017. To date, the Airport has paid HSS Inc. \$1,040,327 for the six month period from October 1, 2017 through March 31, 2018.

Under the initial contract, HSS Inc. provided trained security staff to provide security guard and inspection services at the San Francisco International Airport at specified locations throughout the terminals and exits. However, according to Mr. Rob Forester, Senior Manager Safety and Security Services, HSS Inc. failed to provide adequate staffing on at least 19 separate occasions.

The Airport determined that HSS Inc. had defaulted on its contract and issued a notice of termination of the contract effective Monday, April 9, 2018.

The Airport contacted Covenant Aviation Security, LLC, to take over the service immediately upon departure of the defaulting contractor. According to Mr. Forester, the Airport contacted Covenant Aviation because they were the second ranked respondent in the original request for proposals. Negotiations with Covenant began on April 5th. The Airport Commission declared an emergency on April 6, 2018, and an agreement was reached on Monday, April 9th. The Airport Commission approved the emergency contract on April 24th, and the final contract terms were reached on May 2, 2018.

The Airport Commission submitted the proposed resolution to the Board of Supervisors on May 22, 2018, within the 60 days required by Administrative Code Section 6.60(d).

DETAILS OF PROPOSED LEGISLATION

The proposed resolution would retroactively approve the emergency contract between the San Francisco International Airport and Covenant Aviation Security, LLC, to provide security services for an amount not to exceed \$1,700,000 over a six-month term from April 6, 2018 through October 5, 2018.

Covenant Aviation Security, LLC has been providing General Airport Security Services to ensure compliance with Airport Rules and Regulations, as well as TSA regulations and security directives. These services include, but are not limited to, conducting required inspections of all goods, employee ID badge verifications, and guarding of the security screening checkpoints, lanes, airfield operations access gates, and buildings.

FISCAL IMPACT

The contract not to exceed amount of \$1,700,000, including start-up costs, is shown in Table 2 below. According to Mr. Forester, the contract not-to-exceed amount of \$1,700,000 was based on the hourly rates of approximately 36 uniformed guards and 4 uniformed supervisors, the average hours billed in the previous contract, and an estimate allowance for start-up costs.

As of July 2018, the Airport has paid \$427,589 to Covenant Aviation Security for the emergency contract. The Airport is currently paying Covenant Aviation Security using direct voucher requests through the Airport Commission pending certification of the contract. After certification, the funding will be provided through Airport operating funds.

The Airport has issued a new request for proposals for a contract with an initial term of approximately 20 months, and the option for two (2) two-year extensions at the sole discretion of the Airport. Proposals for this contract were due by June 29th. The Airport is scheduled to award this new contract to the highest-ranking proposer prior to the expiration of the sixmonth Emergency Contract with Covenant on October 5th, 2018.

EMERGENCY AGREEMENT between the City and County of San Francisco and

Covenant Aviation Security, LLC Contract No. 50177

This Agreement is made effective the 6th of April, 2018, in the City and County of San Francisco, State of California, by and between: Covenant Aviation Security, 400 Quadrangle Drive, Suite A, Bolingbrook, IL 60440 (the "Contractor") and the City and County of San Francisco, a municipal corporation (the "City"), acting by and through its Airport Commission (the "Commission").

Recitals

- A. On April 6, 2018, the Airport Commission President approved and the Airport Director issued a declaration of an emergency concerning the provision of security guard services at the San Francisco International Airport (the "Airport" or "SFO") necessitating award of this emergency contract, all as provided under San Francisco Administrative Code § 21.15(c); and,
- B. Contractor has agreed to provide security guard services at the Airport on an emergency, temporary basis; and
- C. The Commission is authorized to enter into all contracts which relate to matters under its jurisdiction; and
- D. On April 24, 2018, by Resolution No. 18-0111, the Commission awarded this Emergency Agreement to the Contractor for a six (6) month term in an amount not to exceed \$1,700,000; and
- E. The City has approved the contracting-out of the services under this Agreement upon the certification of the Controller that the services can be performed by a contractor at a lower cost than by City employees at current salary and benefit levels, see Board of Supervisors Resolution No. 307-16, adopted July 19, 2016; and
- F. On , by Resolution No. , the Board of Supervisors approved the Agreement under San Francisco Charter Section 9.118; and
- G. There is no Local Business Entity ("LBE") subcontracting participation requirement for this Agreement; and
- H. The Contractor represents and warrants that it is qualified to perform the services required by City under this Agreement;

Now, THEREFORE, the parties agree as follows:

Article 1 Definitions

The following definitions apply to this Agreement:

- 1.1 "Agreement" means this contract document, including all attached appendices, and all applicable City Ordinances and Mandatory City Requirements which are specifically incorporated by reference into this Agreement.
- 1.2 "City" or "the City" means the City and County of San Francisco, a municipal corporation, acting by and through both its Director of the Office of Contract Administration, referred to as "Purchasing," or the Director's designated agent, Airport Commission.
 - 1.3 "CMD" means the Contract Monitoring Division of the City.
- 1.4 "Contractor" or "Consultant" means Covenant Aviation Services, LLC, 400 Quadrangle Drive, Suite A, Bolingbrook, IL 60440.
- 1.5 "Deliverables" means Contractor's work product resulting from the Services that are provided by Contractor to City during the course of Contractor's performance of the Agreement, including without limitation, the work product described in the "Scope of Services" attached as Appendix A.
- 1.6 "Effective Date" means the date which the Contractor commenced services on an emergency basis, subject to all necessary approvals as provided under Administrative Code Chapter 21 and certification as to the availability of funds by the City's Controller.
- 1.7 "Mandatory City Requirements" means those City laws set forth in the San Francisco Municipal Code, including the duly authorized rules, regulations, and guidelines implementing such laws that impose specific duties and obligations upon Contractor.
 - 1.8 "Party" and "Parties" mean the City and Contractor either collectively or individually.
- 1.9 "Services" means the work performed by Contractor under this Agreement as specifically described in the "Scope of Services" attached as Appendix A, including all services, labor, supervision, materials, equipment, actions and other requirements to be performed and furnished by Contractor under this Agreement.

Article 2 Term of the Agreement

2.1 The term of this Agreement commenced on April 6, 2018 and shall expire on October 5, 2018, unless earlier terminated as otherwise provided in this Agreement.

Article 3 Financial Matters

3.1 Certification of Funds; Budget and Fiscal Provisions; Termination in the Event of Non-Appropriation. This Agreement is subject to the budget and fiscal provisions of the City's Charter. Charges will accrue only after prior written authorization certified by the Controller, and the amount of City's obligation under this Agreement shall not at any time exceed the amount certified for the purpose and period stated in such advance authorization. This Agreement will terminate without penalty, liability or expense of any kind to City at the end of any fiscal year if funds are not appropriated for the next succeeding fiscal year. If funds are appropriated for a portion of the fiscal year, this Agreement will

terminate, without penalty, liability or expense of any kind at the end of the term for which funds are appropriated. City has no obligation to make appropriations for this Agreement in lieu of appropriations for new or other agreements. City budget decisions are subject to the discretion of the Mayor and the Board of Supervisors. Contractor's assumption of risk of possible non-appropriation is part of the consideration for this Agreement.

THIS SECTION CONTROLS AGAINST ANY AND ALL OTHER PROVISIONS OF THIS AGREEMENT.

3.2 **Guaranteed Maximum Costs.** The City's payment obligation to Contractor cannot at any time exceed the amount certified by City's Controller for the purpose and period stated in such certification. Absent an authorized Emergency per the City Charter or applicable Code, no City representative is authorized to offer or promise, nor is the City required to honor, any offered or promised payments to Contractor under this Agreement in excess of the certified maximum amount without the Controller having first certified the additional promised amount and the Parties having modified this Agreement as provided in Section 11.5, "Modification of this Agreement."

3.3 Compensation.

- 3.3.1 Payment. Contractor shall provide an invoice to the City on a monthly basis for Services completed in the immediate preceding month, unless a different schedule is set out in Appendix B, "Calculation of Charges." Compensation shall be made for Services identified in the invoice that the Airport Director, in his or her sole discretion, concludes has been satisfactorily performed. Payment shall be made within 30 calendar days of receipt of the invoice, unless the City notifies the Contractor that a dispute as to the invoice exists. In no event shall the amount of this Agreement exceed One Million Seven-Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$1,700,000). The breakdown of charges associated with this Agreement appears in Appendix B, "Calculation of Charges," attached and incorporated by reference as though fully set forth in this Agreement. A portion of payment may be withheld until conclusion of the Agreement if agreed to both parties as retainage, described in Appendix B. In no event shall City be liable for interest or late charges for any late payments.
- 3.3.2 Payment Limited to Satisfactory Services. Contractor is not entitled to any payments from City until Airport Commission approves Services, including any furnished Deliverables, as satisfying all of the requirements of this Agreement. Payments to Contractor by City shall not excuse Contractor from its obligation to replace unsatisfactory Deliverables, including equipment, components, materials, or Services even if the unsatisfactory character of such Deliverables, equipment, components, materials, or Services may not have been apparent or detected at the time such payment was made. The City may reject Deliverables, equipment, components, materials and Services that do not conform to the requirements of this Agreement and in such case must be replaced by Contractor without delay at no cost to the City.
- 3.3.3 **Withhold Payments.** If Contractor fails to provide Services consistent with Contractor's obligations under this Agreement, the City may withhold any and all payments due Contractor until such failure to perform is cured, and Contractor shall not stop work as a result of City's withholding of payments as provided in this Agreement.
- 3.3.4 **Invoice Format.** Invoices furnished by Contractor under this Agreement must be in a form acceptable to the Controller and City, and must include a unique invoice number. Payment shall be made by City as specified in 3.3.6, or in such alternate manner as the Parties have mutually agreed upon in writing.

3.3.5 LBE Payment and Utilization Tracking System – Not applicable.

3.3.6 Getting paid for goods and/or services from the City.

- (a) All City suppliers receiving new contracts, contract renewals, or contract extensions must sign up to receive electronic payments through the City's third party service that provides Automated Clearing House (ACH) payments. Electronic payments are processed every business day and are safe and secure. To sign up for electronic payments, visit www.sfgov.org/ach.
- (b) The following information is required to sign up: (i) The enroller must be their company's authorized financial representative, (ii) the company's legal name, main telephone number and all physical and remittance addresses used by the company, (iii) the company's U.S. federal employer identification number (EIN) or Social Security number (if they are a sole proprietor), and (iv) the company's bank account information, including routing and account numbers.
- Audit and Inspection of Records. Contractor agrees to maintain and make available to the City, during regular business hours, accurate books and accounting records relating to its Services. Contractor will permit City to audit, examine and make excerpts and transcripts from such books and records, and to make audits of all invoices, materials, payrolls, records or personnel and other data related to all other matters covered by this Agreement, whether funded in whole or in part under this Agreement. Contractor shall maintain such data and records in an accessible location and condition for a period of not fewer than five years after final payment under this Agreement or until after final audit has been resolved, whichever is later. The State of California or any Federal agency having an interest in the subject matter of this Agreement shall have the same rights as conferred upon City by this Section. Contractor shall include the same audit and inspection rights and record retention requirements in all subcontracts.
- 3.5 **Submitting False Claims.** The full text of San Francisco Administrative Code §21.35, including the enforcement and penalty provisions, is incorporated into this Agreement. Under San Francisco Administrative Code §21.35, any contractor, subcontractor or consultant who submits a false claim shall be liable to the City for the statutory penalties set forth in that section. A contractor, subcontractor or consultant will be deemed to have submitted a false claim to the City if the contractor, subcontractor or consultant: (a) knowingly presents or causes to be presented to an officer or employee of the City a false claim or request for payment or approval; (b) knowingly makes, uses, or causes to be made or used a false record or statement to get a false claim paid or approved by the City; (c) conspires to defraud the City by getting a false claim allowed or paid by the City; (d) knowingly makes, uses, or causes to be made or used a false record or statement to conceal, avoid, or decrease an obligation to pay or transmit money or property to the City; or (e) is a beneficiary of an inadvertent submission of a false claim to the City, subsequently discovers the falsity of the claim, and fails to disclose the false claim to the City within a reasonable time after discovery of the false claim.

3.6 Payment of Prevailing Wages – Not applicable

Article 4 Services and Resources

4.1 **Services Contractor Agrees to Perform.** Contractor agrees to perform the Services provided for in Appendix A, "Scope of Services." Officers and employees of the City are not authorized to request, and the City is not required to reimburse the Contractor for, Services beyond the Scope of Services listed in Appendix A, unless Appendix A is modified as provided in Section 11.5, "Modification of this Agreement."

Appendix A includes as-needed services. Such services shall be requested by City through the issuance of a written task order signed by City and Contractor, which task order shall be made a part of and incorporated into the Agreement as though fully set forth in this Agreement without the need for a formal amendment to the Agreement. The task order shall include a description of the as-needed services, the deliverables, schedule for performance, cost, and method and timing of payment.

4.2 **Qualified Personnel**. Contractor shall utilize only competent personnel under the supervision of, and in the employment of, Contractor (or Contractor's authorized subcontractors) to perform the Services. Contractor will comply with City's reasonable requests regarding assignment and/or removal of personnel, but all personnel, including those assigned at City's request, must be supervised by Contractor. Contractor shall commit adequate resources to allow timely completion within the project schedule specified in this Agreement.

4.3 Subcontracting.

- 4.3.1 Contractor may subcontract portions of the Services only upon prior written approval of City. Contractor is responsible for its subcontractors throughout the course of the work required to perform the Services. All Subcontracts must incorporate the terms of Article 10 "Additional Requirements Incorporated by Reference" of this Agreement, unless inapplicable. Neither Party shall, on the basis of this Agreement, contract on behalf of, or in the name of, the other Party. Any agreement made in violation of this provision shall be null and void.
- 4.3.2 The Contractor does not anticipate using subcontractors for this Emergency Contract. In the event it does use the services of a subcontractor, it shall only proceed in a manner consistent with paragraph 4.3.1 of this Agreement.

4.4 Independent Contractor; Payment of Employment Taxes and Other Expenses.

Independent Contractor. For the purposes of this Article 4, "Contractor" shall be deemed to include not only Contractor, but also any agent or employee of Contractor. Contractor acknowledges and agrees that at all times, Contractor or any agent or employee of Contractor shall be deemed at all times to be an independent contractor and is wholly responsible for the manner in which it performs the services and work requested by City under this Agreement. Contractor, its agents, and employees will not represent or hold themselves out to be employees of the City at any time. Contractor or any agent or employee of Contractor shall not have employee status with City, nor be entitled to participate in any plans, arrangements, or distributions by City pertaining to or in connection with any retirement, health or other benefits that City may offer its employees. Contractor or any agent or employee of Contractor is liable for the acts and omissions of itself, its employees and its agents. Contractor shall be responsible for all obligations and payments, whether imposed by federal, state or local law, including, but not limited to, FICA, income tax withholdings, unemployment compensation, insurance, and other similar responsibilities related to Contractor's performing services and work, or any agent or employee of Contractor providing same. Nothing in this Agreement shall be construed as creating an employment or agency relationship between City and Contractor or any agent or employee of Contractor. Any terms in this Agreement referring to direction from City shall be construed as providing for direction as to policy and the result of Contractor's work only, and not as to the means by which such a result is obtained. City does not retain the right to control the means or the method by which Contractor performs work under this Agreement. Contractor agrees to maintain and make available to City, upon request and during regular business hours, accurate books and accounting records demonstrating Contractor's compliance with this section. Should City determine that Contractor, or any agent or employee of Contractor, is not performing consistent with the requirements of this Agreement, City shall provide Contractor with written notice of such failure. Within five (5) business days of Contractor's

receipt of such notice, and consistent with Contractor policy and procedure, Contractor shall remedy the deficiency. If City believes that an action of Contractor, or any agent or employee of Contractor, warrants immediate remedial action by Contractor, City shall contact Contractor and provide Contractor in writing with the reason for requesting such immediate action.

- Payment of Employment Taxes and Other Expenses. Should City, in its discretion, or a relevant taxing authority such as the Internal Revenue Service or the State Employment Development Division, or both, determine that Contractor is an employee for purposes of collection of any employment taxes, the amounts payable under this Agreement shall be reduced by amounts equal to both the employee and employer portions of the tax due (and offsetting any credits for amounts already paid by Contractor which can be applied against this liability). City shall then forward those amounts to the relevant taxing authority. Should a relevant taxing authority determine a liability for past services performed by Contractor for City, upon notification of such fact by City, Contractor shall promptly remit such amount due or arrange with City to have the amount due withheld from future payments to Contractor under this Agreement (again, offsetting any amounts already paid by Contractor which can be applied as a credit against such liability). A determination of employment status pursuant to the preceding two paragraphs shall be solely for the purposes of the particular tax in question, and for all other purposes of this Agreement, Contractor shall not be considered an employee of City. Notwithstanding the foregoing, Contractor agrees to indemnify and save harmless City and its officers, agents and employees from, and, if requested, shall defend them against any and all claims, losses, costs, damages, and expenses, including attorneys' fees, arising from this section.
- 4.5 **Assignment.** The Services to be performed by Contractor are personal in character and neither this Agreement nor any duties or obligations may be assigned or delegated by Contractor unless first approved by City by written instrument executed and approved in the same manner as this Agreement. Any purported assignment made in violation of this provision shall be null and void.
- 4.6 **Warranty**. Contractor warrants to City that the Services will be performed with the degree of skill and care that is required by current, good and sound professional procedures and practices, and in conformance with generally accepted professional standards prevailing at the time the Services are performed so as to ensure that all Services performed are correct and appropriate for the purposes contemplated in this Agreement.
 - 4.7 Liquidated Damages Not applicable.

Article 5 Insurance and Indemnity

5.1 Insurance.

- 5.1.1 **Required Coverages.** Without in any way limiting Contractor's liability pursuant to the "Indemnification" section of this Agreement, Contractor must maintain in force, during the full term of the Agreement, insurance in the following amounts and coverages:
- (a) Workers' Compensation, in statutory amounts, with Employers' Liability Limits not less than \$1,000,000 each accident, injury, or illness; and
- (b) Commercial General Liability Insurance with limits not less than \$1,000,000 each occurrence for Bodily Injury and Property Damage, including Contractual Liability, Personal Injury, Products and Completed Operations; and

- (c) Commercial Automobile Liability Insurance with limits not less than \$1,000,000 each occurrence, "Combined Single Limit" for Bodily Injury and Property Damage, including Owned, Non-Owned and Hired auto coverage, as applicable.
- 5.1.2 Commercial General Liability and Commercial Automobile Liability Insurance policies must be endorsed to provide:
- (a) Name as Additional Insured the City and County of San Francisco, its Officers, Agents, and Employees.
- (b) That such policies are primary insurance to any other insurance available to the Additional Insureds, with respect to any claims arising out of this Agreement, and that insurance applies separately to each insured against whom claim is made or suit is brought.
- 5.1.3 All policies shall be endorsed to provide thirty (30) days' advance written notice to the City of cancellation for any reason, intended non-renewal, or reduction in coverages. Notices shall be sent to the City address set forth in Section 11.1, entitled "Notices to the Parties."
- 5.1.4 Should any of the required insurance be provided under a claims-made form, Contractor shall maintain such coverage continuously throughout the term of this Agreement and, without lapse, for a period of three years beyond the expiration of this Agreement, to the effect that, should occurrences during the contract term give rise to claims made after expiration of the Agreement, such claims shall be covered by such claims-made policies.
- 5.1.5 Should any of the required insurance be provided under a form of coverage that includes a general annual aggregate limit or provides that claims investigation or legal defense costs be included in such general annual aggregate limit, such general annual aggregate limit shall be double the occurrence or claims limits specified above.
- 5.1.6 Should any required insurance lapse during the term of this Agreement, requests for payments originating after such lapse shall not be processed until the City receives satisfactory evidence of reinstated coverage as required by this Agreement, effective as of the lapse date. If insurance is not reinstated, the City may, at its sole option, terminate this Agreement effective on the date of such lapse of insurance.
- 5.1.7 Before commencing any Services, Contractor shall furnish to City certificates of insurance and additional insured policy endorsements with insurers with ratings comparable to A-, VIII or higher, that are authorized to do business in the State of California, and that are satisfactory to City, in form evidencing all coverages set forth above. Approval of the insurance by City shall not relieve or decrease Contractor's liability hereunder.
- 5.1.8 The Workers' Compensation policy (ies) shall be endorsed with a waiver of subrogation in favor of the City for all work performed by the Contractor, its employees, agents and subcontractors.
- 5.1.9 If Contractor will use any subcontractor(s) to provide Services, Contractor shall require the subcontractor(s) to provide all necessary insurance and to name the City and County of San Francisco, its officers, agents and employees and the Contractor as additional insureds.
- 5.2 **Indemnification**. Contractor shall indemnify and hold harmless City and its officers, agents and employees from, and, if requested, shall defend them from and against any and all claims,

demands, losses, damages, costs, expenses, and liability (legal, contractual, or otherwise) arising from or in any way connected with any: (i) injury to or death of a person, including employees of City or Contractor; (ii) loss of or damage to property; (iii) violation of local, state, or federal common law, statute or regulation, including but not limited to privacy or personally identifiable information, health information, disability and labor laws or regulations; (iv) strict liability imposed by any law or regulation; or (v) losses arising from Contractor's execution of subcontracts not in accordance with the requirements of this Agreement applicable to subcontractors; so long as such injury, violation, loss, or strict liability (as set forth in subsections (i) – (v) above) arises directly or indirectly from Contractor's performance of this Agreement, including, but not limited to, Contractor's use of facilities or equipment provided by City or others, regardless of the negligence of, and regardless of whether liability without fault is imposed or sought to be imposed on City, except to the extent that such indemnity is void or otherwise unenforceable under applicable law, and except where such loss, damage, injury, liability or claim is the result of the active negligence or willful misconduct of City and is not contributed to by any act of, or by any omission to perform some duty imposed by law or agreement on Contractor, its subcontractors, or either's agent or employee. The foregoing indemnity shall include, without limitation, reasonable fees of attorneys, consultants and experts and related costs and City's costs of investigating any claims against the City.

In addition to Contractor's obligation to indemnify City, Contractor specifically acknowledges and agrees that it has an immediate and independent obligation to defend City from any claim which actually or potentially falls within this indemnification provision, even if the allegations are or may be groundless, false or fraudulent, which obligation arises at the time such claim is tendered to Contractor by City and continues at all times thereafter.

Contractor shall indemnify and hold City harmless from all loss and liability, including attorneys' fees, court costs and all other litigation expenses for any infringement of the patent rights, copyright, trade secret or any other proprietary right or trademark, and all other intellectual property claims of any person or persons arising directly or indirectly from the receipt by City, or any of its officers or agents, of Contractor's Services.

Article 6 Liability of the Parties

- 6.1 Liability of City. CITY'S PAYMENT OBLIGATIONS UNDER THIS AGREEMENT SHALL BE LIMITED TO THE PAYMENT OF THE COMPENSATION PROVIDED FOR IN SECTION 3.3.1, "PAYMENT," OF THIS AGREEMENT. NOTWITHSTANDING ANY OTHER PROVISION OF THIS AGREEMENT, IN NO EVENT SHALL CITY BE LIABLE, REGARDLESS OF WHETHER ANY CLAIM IS BASED ON CONTRACT OR TORT, FOR ANY SPECIAL, CONSEQUENTIAL, INDIRECT OR INCIDENTAL DAMAGES, INCLUDING, BUT NOT LIMITED TO, LOST PROFITS, ARISING OUT OF OR IN CONNECTION WITH THIS AGREEMENT OR THE SERVICES PERFORMED IN CONNECTION WITH THIS AGREEMENT.
- 6.2 **Liability for Use of Equipment.** City shall not be liable for any damage to persons or property as a result of the use, misuse or failure of any equipment used by Contractor, or any of its subcontractors, or by any of their employees, even though such equipment is furnished, rented or loaned by City.
- 6.3 **Liability for Incidental and Consequential Damages**. Contractor shall be responsible for incidental and consequential damages resulting in whole or in part from Contractor's acts or omissions.

Article 7 Payment of Taxes

- 7.1 Except for any applicable California sales and use taxes charged by Contractor to City, Contractor shall pay all taxes, including possessory interest taxes levied upon or as a result of this Agreement, or the Services delivered under this Agreement. Contractor shall remit to the State of California any sales or use taxes paid by City to Contractor under this Agreement. Contractor agrees to promptly provide information requested by the City to verify Contractor's compliance with any State requirements for reporting sales and use tax paid by City under this Agreement.
- 7.2 Contractor acknowledges that this Agreement may create a "possessory interest" for property tax purposes. Generally, such a possessory interest is not created unless the Agreement entitles the Contractor to possession, occupancy, or use of City property for private gain. If such a possessory interest is created, then the following shall apply:
- 7.2.1 Contractor, on behalf of itself and any permitted successors and assigns, recognizes and understands that Contractor, and any permitted successors and assigns, may be subject to real property tax assessments on the possessory interest.
- 7.2.2 Contractor, on behalf of itself and any permitted successors and assigns, recognizes and understands that the creation, extension, renewal, or assignment of this Agreement may result in a "change in ownership" for purposes of real property taxes, and therefore may result in a revaluation of any possessory interest created by this Agreement. Contractor agrees on behalf of itself and its permitted successors and assigns to report on behalf of the City to the County Assessor the information required by Revenue and Taxation Code section 480.5, as amended from time to time, and any successor provision.
- 7.2.3 Contractor, on behalf of itself and any permitted successors and assigns, recognizes and understands that other events also may cause a change of ownership of the possessory interest and result in the revaluation of the possessory interest. (see, e.g., Rev. & Tax. Code section 64, as amended from time to time). Contractor agrees on behalf of itself and its permitted successors and assigns to report any change in ownership to the County Assessor, the State Board of Equalization or other public agency as required by law.
- 7.2.4 Contractor further agrees to provide such other information as may be requested by the City to enable the City to comply with any reporting requirements for possessory interests that are imposed by applicable law.

Article 8 Termination and Default

8.1 Termination for Convenience

- 8.1.1 City shall have the option, in its sole discretion, to terminate this Agreement, at any time during the term hereof, for convenience and without cause. City shall exercise this option by giving Contractor written notice of termination. The notice shall specify the date on which termination shall become effective.
- 8.1.2 Upon receipt of the notice of termination, Contractor shall commence and perform, with diligence, all actions necessary on the part of Contractor to effect the termination of this Agreement on the date specified by City and to minimize the liability of Contractor and City to third parties as a result of termination. All such actions shall be subject to the prior approval of City. Such actions shall include, without limitation:

- (a) Halting the performance of all Services under this Agreement on the date(s) and in the manner specified by City.
- (b) Terminating all existing orders and subcontracts, and not placing any further orders or subcontracts for materials, Services, equipment or other items.
- (c) At City's direction, assigning to City any or all of Contractor's right, title, and interest under the orders and subcontracts terminated. Upon such assignment, City shall have the right, in its sole discretion, to settle or pay any or all claims arising out of the termination of such orders and subcontracts.
- (d) Subject to City's approval, settling all outstanding liabilities and all claims arising out of the termination of orders and subcontracts.
- (e) Completing performance of any Services that City designates to be completed prior to the date of termination specified by City.
- (f) Taking such action as may be necessary, or as the City may direct, for the protection and preservation of any property related to this Agreement which is in the possession of Contractor and in which City has or may acquire an interest.
- 8.1.3 Within 30 days after the specified termination date, Contractor shall submit to City an invoice, which shall set forth each of the following as a separate line item:
- (a) The reasonable cost to Contractor, without profit, for all Services prior to the specified termination date, for which Services City has not already tendered payment. Reasonable costs may include a reasonable allowance for actual overhead, not to exceed a total of 10% of Contractor's direct costs for Services. Any overhead allowance shall be separately itemized. Contractor may also recover the reasonable cost of preparing the invoice.
- (b) A reasonable allowance for profit on the cost of the Services described in the immediately preceding subsection (a), provided that Contractor can establish, to the satisfaction of City, that Contractor would have made a profit had all Services under this Agreement been completed, and provided further, that the profit allowed shall in no event exceed 5% of such cost.
- (c) The reasonable cost to Contractor of handling material or equipment returned to the supplier, delivered to the City or otherwise disposed of as directed by the City.
- (d) A deduction for the cost of materials to be retained by Contractor, amounts realized from the sale of materials and not otherwise recovered by or credited to City, and any other appropriate credits to City against the cost of the Services or other work.
- 8.1.4 In no event shall City be liable for costs incurred by Contractor or any of its subcontractors after the termination date specified by City, except for those costs specifically enumerated and described in Section 8.1.3. Such non-recoverable costs include, but are not limited to, anticipated profits on the Services under this Agreement, post-termination employee salaries, post-termination administrative expenses, post-termination overhead or unabsorbed overhead, attorneys' fees or other costs relating to the prosecution of a claim or lawsuit, prejudgment interest, or any other expense which is not reasonable or authorized under Section 8.1.3.

- 8.1.5 In arriving at the amount due to Contractor under this Section, City may deduct: (i) all payments previously made by City for Services covered by Contractor's final invoice; (ii) any claim which City may have against Contractor in connection with this Agreement; (iii) any invoiced costs or expenses excluded pursuant to the immediately preceding subsection 8.1.4; and (iv) in instances in which, in the opinion of the City, the cost of any Service performed under this Agreement is excessively high due to costs incurred to remedy or replace defective or rejected Services, the difference between the invoiced amount and City's estimate of the reasonable cost of performing the invoiced Services in compliance with the requirements of this Agreement.
- 8.1.6 City's payment obligation under this Section shall survive termination of this Agreement.

8.2 Termination for Default; Remedies.

- 8.2.1 Each of the following shall constitute an immediate event of default ("Event of Default") under this Agreement:
- (a) Contractor fails or refuses to perform or observe any term, covenant or condition contained in any of the following Sections of this Agreement:

- (b) Contractor fails or refuses to perform or observe any other term, covenant or condition contained in this Agreement, including any obligation imposed by ordinance or statute and incorporated into this Agreement by reference, and such default continues for a period of ten days after written notice thereof from City to Contractor.
- (c) Contractor (i) is generally not paying its debts as they become due; (ii) files, or consents by answer or otherwise to the filing against it of a petition for relief or reorganization or arrangement or any other petition in bankruptcy or for liquidation or to take advantage of any bankruptcy, insolvency or other debtors' relief law of any jurisdiction; (iii) makes an assignment for the benefit of its creditors; (iv) consents to the appointment of a custodian, receiver, trustee or other officer with similar powers of Contractor or of any substantial part of Contractor's property; or (v) takes action for the purpose of any of the foregoing.
- (d) A court or government authority enters an order (i) appointing a custodian, receiver, trustee or other officer with similar powers with respect to Contractor or with respect to any substantial part of Contractor's property, (ii) constituting an order for relief or approving a petition for relief or reorganization or arrangement or any other petition in bankruptcy or for liquidation or to take advantage of any bankruptcy, insolvency or other debtors' relief law of any jurisdiction or (iii) ordering the dissolution, winding-up or liquidation of Contractor.
- 8.2.2 On and after any Event of Default, City shall have the right to exercise its legal and equitable remedies, including, without limitation, the right to terminate this Agreement or to seek specific performance of all or any part of this Agreement. In addition, where applicable, City shall have

the right (but no obligation) to cure (or cause to be cured) on behalf of Contractor any Event of Default; Contractor shall pay to City on demand all costs and expenses incurred by City in effecting such cure, with interest thereon from the date of incurrence at the maximum rate then permitted by law. City shall have the right to offset from any amounts due to Contractor under this Agreement or any other agreement between City and Contractor: (i) all damages, losses, costs or expenses incurred by City as a result of an Event of Default; and (ii) any liquidated damages levied upon Contractor pursuant to the terms of this Agreement; and (iii), any damages imposed by any ordinance or statute that is incorporated into this Agreement by reference, or into any other agreement with the City.

- 8.2.3 All remedies provided for in this Agreement may be exercised individually or in combination with any other remedy available hereunder or under applicable laws, rules and regulations. The exercise of any remedy shall not preclude or in any way be deemed to waive any other remedy. Nothing in this Agreement shall constitute a waiver or limitation of any rights that City may have under applicable law.
- 8.2.4 Any notice of default must be sent by registered mail to the address set forth in Article 11.
- 8.3 **Non-Waiver of Rights**. The omission by either party at any time to enforce any default or right reserved to it, or to require performance of any of the terms, covenants, or provisions hereof by the other party at the time designated, shall not be a waiver of any such default or right to which the party is entitled, nor shall it in any way affect the right of the party to enforce such provisions.

8.4 Rights and Duties upon Termination or Expiration.

8.4.1 This Section and the following Sections of this Agreement listed below, shall survive termination or expiration of this Agreement:

8.4.2 Subject to the survival of the Sections identified in Section 8.4.1, above, if this Agreement is terminated prior to expiration of the term specified in Article 2, this Agreement shall be of no further force or effect. Contractor shall transfer title to City, and deliver in the manner, at the times, and to the extent, if any, directed by City, any work in progress, completed work, supplies, equipment, and other materials produced as a part of, or acquired in connection with the performance of this Agreement, and any completed or partially completed work which, if this Agreement had been completed, would have been required to be furnished to City.

Article 9 Rights In Deliverables

- 9.1 Ownership of Results. Any interest of Contractor or its subcontractors, in the Deliverables, including any drawings, plans, specifications, blueprints, studies, reports, memoranda, computation sheets, computer files and media or other documents prepared by Contractor or its subcontractors for the purposes of this agreement, shall become the property of and will be transmitted to City. However, unless expressly prohibited elsewhere in this Agreement, Contractor may retain and use copies for reference and as documentation of its experience and capabilities.
- Works for Hire. If, in connection with Services, Contractor or its subcontractors creates Deliverables including, without limitation, artwork, copy, posters, billboards, photographs, videotapes, audiotapes, systems designs, software, reports, diagrams, surveys, blueprints, source codes, or any other original works of authorship, whether in digital or any other format, such works of authorship shall be works for hire as defined under Title 17 of the United States Code, and all copyrights in such works shall be the property of the City. If any Deliverables created by Contractor or its subcontractor(s) under this Agreement are ever determined not to be works for hire under U.S. law, Contractor assigns all Contractor's copyrights to such Deliverables to the City, agrees to provide any material and execute any documents necessary to effectuate such assignment, and agrees to include a clause in every subcontract imposing the same duties upon subcontractor(s). With City's prior written approval, Contractor and its subcontractor(s) may retain and use copies of such works for reference and as documentation of their respective experience and capabilities.

Article 10 Additional Requirements Incorporated by Reference

- 10.1 **Laws Incorporated by Reference**. The full text of the laws listed in this Article 10, including enforcement and penalty provisions, are incorporated by reference into this Agreement. The full text of the San Francisco Municipal Code provisions incorporated by reference in this Article and elsewhere in the Agreement ("Mandatory City Requirements") are available at http://www.amlegal.com/codes/client/san-francisco ca/.
- 10.2 **Conflict of Interest**. By executing this Agreement, Contractor certifies that it does not know of any fact which constitutes a violation of Section 15.103 of the City's Charter; Article III, Chapter 2 of City's Campaign and Governmental Conduct Code; Title 9, Chapter 7 of the California Government Code (Section 87100 *et seq.*), or Title 1, Division 4, Chapter 1, Article 4 of the California Government Code (Section 1090 *et seq.*), and further agrees promptly to notify the City if it becomes aware of any such fact during the term of this Agreement.
- 10.3 **Prohibition on Use of Public Funds for Political Activity.** In performing the Services, Contractor shall comply with San Francisco Administrative Code Chapter 12G, which prohibits funds appropriated by the City for this Agreement from being expended to participate in, support, or attempt to influence any political campaign for a candidate or for a ballot measure. Contractor is subject to the enforcement and penalty provisions in Chapter 12G.
 - 10.4 Reserved.
 - 10.5 Nondiscrimination Requirements
- 10.5.1 **Nondiscrimination in Contracts**. Contractor shall comply with the provisions of Chapters 12B and 12C of the San Francisco Administrative Code. Contractor shall incorporate by reference in all subcontracts the provisions of Sections12B.2(a), 12B.2(c)-(k), and 12C.3 of the San

Francisco Administrative Code and shall require all subcontractors to comply with such provisions. Contractor is subject to the enforcement and penalty provisions in Chapters 12B and 12C.

- 10.5.2 Nondiscrimination in the Provision of Employee Benefits. San Francisco Administrative Code 12B.2. Contractor does not as of the date of this Agreement, and will not during the term of this Agreement, in any of its operations in San Francisco, on real property owned by San Francisco, or where work is being performed for the City elsewhere in the United States, discriminate in the provision of employee benefits between employees with domestic partners and employees with spouses and/or between the domestic partners and spouses of such employees, subject to the conditions set forth in San Francisco Administrative Code Section12B.2.
- 10.6 Local Business Enterprise and Non-Discrimination in Contracting Ordinance. Contractor shall comply with all applicable provisions of Chapter 14B ("LBE Ordinance"). Contractor is subject to the enforcement and penalty provisions in Chapter 14B.
- 10.7 **Minimum Compensation Ordinance**. Contractor shall pay covered employees no less than the minimum compensation required by San Francisco Administrative Code Chapter 12P. Contractor is subject to the enforcement and penalty provisions in Chapter 12P. By signing and executing this Agreement, Contractor certifies that it is in compliance with Chapter 12P.
- 10.8 **Health Care Accountability Ordinance.** Contractor shall comply with San Francisco Administrative Code Chapter 12Q. Contractor shall choose and perform one of the Health Care Accountability options set forth in San Francisco Administrative Code Chapter 12Q.3. Contractor is subject to the enforcement and penalty provisions in Chapter 12Q.
- 10.9 **First Source Hiring Program.** Contractor must comply with all of the provisions of the First Source Hiring Program, Chapter 83 of the San Francisco Administrative Code, that apply to this Agreement, and Contractor is subject to the enforcement and penalty provisions in Chapter 83.
- 10.10 Alcohol and Drug-Free Workplace. City reserves the right to deny access to, or require Contractor to remove from, City facilities personnel of any Contractor or subcontractor who City has reasonable grounds to believe has engaged in alcohol abuse or illegal drug activity which in any way impairs City's ability to maintain safe work facilities or to protect the health and well-being of City employees and the general public. City shall have the right of final approval for the entry or re-entry of any such person previously denied access to, or removed from, City facilities. Illegal drug activity means possessing, furnishing, selling, offering, purchasing, using or being under the influence of illegal drugs or other controlled substances for which the individual lacks a valid prescription. Alcohol abuse means possessing, furnishing, selling, offering, or using alcoholic beverages, or being under the influence of alcohol.
- 10.11 **Limitations on Contributions.** By executing this Agreement, Contractor acknowledges that it is familiar with section 1.126 of the City's Campaign and Governmental Conduct Code, which prohibits any person who contracts with the City for the rendition of personal services, for the furnishing of any material, supplies or equipment, for the sale or lease of any land or building, or for a grant, loan or loan guarantee, from making any campaign contribution to (1) an individual holding a City elective office if the contract must be approved by the individual, a board on which that individual serves, or the board of a state agency on which an appointee of that individual serves, (2) a candidate for the office held by such individual, or (3) a committee controlled by such individual, at any time from the commencement of negotiations for the contract until the later of either the termination of negotiations for such contract or six months after the date the contract is approved. The prohibition on contributions applies to each prospective party to the contract; each member of Contractor's board of directors; Contractor's

chairperson, chief executive officer, chief financial officer and chief operating officer; any person with an ownership interest of more than 20 percent in Contractor; any subcontractor listed in the bid or contract; and any committee that is sponsored or controlled by Contractor. Contractor must inform each such person of the limitation on contributions imposed by Section 1.126 and provide the names of the persons required to be informed to City.

- 10.12 Slavery Era Disclosure Not applicable.
- 10.13 Working with Minors Not applicable.
- 10.14 Consideration of Criminal History in Hiring and Employment Decisions

10.14.1 Contractor agrees to comply fully with and be bound by all of the provisions of Chapter 12T, "City Contractor/Subcontractor Consideration of Criminal History in Hiring and Employment Decisions," of the San Francisco Administrative Code ("Chapter 12T"), including the remedies provided, and implementing regulations, as may be amended from time to time. The provisions of Chapter 12T are incorporated by reference and made a part of this Agreement. The text of the Chapter 12T is available on the web at http://sfgov.org/olse/fco. A partial listing of some of Contractor's obligations under Chapter 12T is set forth in this Section. Contractor is required to comply with all of the applicable provisions of 12T, irrespective of the listing of obligations in this Section. Capitalized terms used in this Section and not defined in this Agreement shall have the meanings assigned to such terms in Chapter 12T.

10.14.2 The requirements of Chapter 12T shall only apply to a Contractor's or Subcontractor's operations to the extent those operations are in furtherance of the performance of this Agreement, shall apply only to applicants and employees who would be or are performing work in furtherance of this Agreement, and shall apply when the physical location of the employment or prospective employment of an individual is wholly or substantially within the City of San Francisco which excludes Airport property. Chapter 12T shall not apply when the application in a particular context would conflict with federal or state law or with a requirement of a government agency implementing federal or state law.

- 10.15 Public Access to Nonprofit Records and Meetings Not applicable.
- 10.16 **Food Service Waste Reduction Requirements.** Contractor shall comply with the Food Service Waste Reduction Ordinance, as set forth in San Francisco Environment Code Chapter 16, including but not limited to the provided remedies for noncompliance.
- 10.17 **Sugar-Sweetened Beverage Prohibition**. Contractor agrees that it will not sell, provide, or otherwise distribute Sugar-Sweetened Beverages, as defined by San Francisco Administrative Code Chapter 101, as part of its performance of this Agreement.
- 10.18 **Tropical Hardwood and Virgin Redwood Ban.** Under San Francisco Environment Code Section 804(b), the City urges Contractor not to import, purchase, obtain, or use for any purpose, any tropical hardwood, tropical hardwood wood product, virgin redwood or virgin redwood wood product.
 - 10.19 Preservative Treated Wood Products Not applicable.

Article 11 General Provisions

Notices to the Parties. Unless otherwise indicated in this Agreement, all written communications sent by the Parties may be by U.S. mail or e-mail, and shall be addressed as follows:

Any notice of default must be sent by registered mail. Either Party may change the address to which notice is to be sent by giving written notice thereof to the other Party. If email notification is used, the sender must specify a receipt notice.

11.2 **Compliance with Americans with Disabilities Act**. Contractor shall provide the Services in a manner that complies with the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA), including but not limited to Title II's program access requirements, and all other applicable federal, state and local disability rights legislation.

11.3 Reserved.

- 11.4 **Sunshine Ordinance.** Contractor acknowledges that this Agreement and all records related to its formation, Contractor's performance of Services, and City's payment are subject to the California Public Records Act, (California Government Code §6250 et. seq.), and the San Francisco Sunshine Ordinance, (San Francisco Administrative Code Chapter 67). Such records are subject to public inspection and copying unless exempt from disclosure under federal, state or local law.
- 11.5 **Modification of this Agreement.** This Agreement may not be modified, nor may compliance with any of its terms be waived, except as noted in Section 11.1, "Notices to Parties," regarding change in personnel or place, and except by written instrument executed and approved in the same manner as this Agreement. Contractor shall cooperate with Department to submit to the Director of CMD any amendment, modification, supplement or change order that would result in a cumulative increase of the original amount of this Agreement by more than 20% (CMD Contract Modification Form).

11.6 Dispute Resolution Procedure.

- 11.6.1 **Negotiation; Alternative Dispute Resolution.** The Parties will attempt in good faith to resolve any dispute or controversy arising out of or relating to the performance of services under this Agreement. If the Parties are unable to resolve the dispute, then, under San Francisco Administrative Code Section 21.36, Contractor may submit to the Contracting Officer a written request for administrative review and documentation of the Contractor's claim(s). Upon such request, the Contracting Officer shall promptly issue an administrative decision in writing, stating the reasons for the action taken and informing the Contractor of its right to judicial review. If agreed by both Parties in writing, the Parties may resolve disputes by a mutually agreed-upon alternative dispute resolution process. If the parties do not mutually agree to an alternative dispute resolution process or such efforts do not resolve the dispute, then either Party may pursue any remedy available under California law. The status of any dispute or controversy notwithstanding, Contractor shall proceed diligently with the performance of its obligations consistent with the Agreement and the written directions of the City. Neither Party will be entitled to legal fees or costs for matters resolved under this section.
- 11.6.2 **Government Code Claim Requirement.** No suit for money or damages may be brought against the City until a written claim has first been presented to and rejected by the City in

conformity with the provisions of San Francisco Administrative Code Chapter 10 and California Government Code Section 900, et seq. Nothing set forth in this Agreement shall operate to toll, waive or excuse Contractor's compliance with the California Government Code Claim requirements set forth in San Francisco Administrative Code Chapter 10 and California Government Code Section 900, et seq.

- 11.7 **Agreement Made in California; Venue.** The formation, interpretation and performance of this Agreement shall be governed by the laws of the State of California. Venue for all litigation relative to the formation, interpretation and performance of this Agreement shall be in San Francisco.
- 11.8 **Construction.** All paragraph captions are for reference only and shall not be considered in construing this Agreement.
- 11.9 **Entire Agreement**. This contract sets forth the entire Agreement between the parties, and supersedes all other oral or written provisions. This Agreement may be modified only as provided in Section 11.5, "Modification of this Agreement."
- 11.10 **Compliance with Laws**. Contractor shall keep itself fully informed of the City's Charter, codes, ordinances and duly adopted rules and regulations of the City and of all state, and federal laws in any manner affecting the performance of this Agreement, and must at all times comply with such local codes, ordinances, and regulations and all applicable laws as they may be amended from time to time.
- 11.11 Severability. Should the application of any provision of this Agreement to any particular facts or circumstances be found by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid or unenforceable, then (a) the validity of other provisions of this Agreement shall not be affected or impaired thereby, and (b) such provision shall be enforced to the maximum extent possible so as to effect the intent of the parties and shall be reformed without further action by the parties to the extent necessary to make such provision valid and enforceable.
- 11.12 **Cooperative Drafting.** This Agreement has been drafted through a cooperative effort of City and Contractor, and both Parties have had an opportunity to have the Agreement reviewed and revised by legal counsel. No Party shall be considered the drafter of this Agreement, and no presumption or rule that an ambiguity shall be construed against the Party drafting the clause shall apply to the interpretation or enforcement of this Agreement.

11.13 Order of Precedence – Not applicable.

Article 12 Requirements For Airport Contracts

- 12.1 **Airport Commission Rules and Regulations.** Contractor agrees to comply with the Airport Commission's Rules and Regulations for the San Francisco International Airport as amended from time to time. A copy of the current Rules and Regulations can be found at: http://www.flysfo.com/about-sfo/the-organization/rules-and-regulations.
- 12.2 **Airport Intellectual Property.** Pursuant to Resolution No. 01-0118, adopted by the Airport Commission on April 18, 2001, the Airport Commission affirmed that it will not tolerate the unauthorized use of its intellectual property, including the SFO logo, CADD designs, and copyrighted publications. All proposers, bidders, contractors, tenants, permittees, and others doing business with or at the Airport (including subcontractors and subtenants) may not use the Airport intellectual property, or any intellectual property confusingly similar to the Airport intellectual property, without the Airport Director's prior consent.

- Labor Peace / Card Check Rule. Without limiting the generality of other provisions in 12.3 this Agreement requiring Contractor to comply with all Airport Rules, Contractor shall comply with the Airport's Labor Peace / Card Check Rule, adopted on February 1, 2000, pursuant to Airport Commission Resolution No. 00-0049 (the "Labor Peace / Card Check Rule"). Capitalized terms not defined in this provision are defined in the Labor Peace/Card Check Rule. To comply with the Labor Peace/Card Check Rule, Contractor shall, among other actions: (a) Enter into a Labor Peace/Card Check Rule Agreement with any Labor Organization which requests such an agreement and which has registered with the Airport Director or his / her designee, within thirty (30) days after Labor Peace/Card Check Rule Agreement has been requested; (b) Not less than thirty (30) days prior to the modification of this Agreement, Contractor shall provide notice by mail to any Labor Organization or federation of labor organizations which have registered with the Airport Director or his / her designee (registered labor organization"), that Contractor is seeking to modify or extend this Agreement; (c) Upon issuing any request for proposals, invitations to bid, or similar notice, or in any event not less than thirty (30) days prior to entering into any Subcontract. Contractor shall provide notice to all registered Labor Organizations that Contractor is seeking to enter into such Subcontract; and (d) Contractor shall include in any subcontract with a Subcontractor performing services pursuant to any covered Contract, a provision requiring the Subcontractor performing services pursuant to any covered Contract, a provision requiring the Subcontractor to comply with the requirements of the Labor Peace/Card Check Rule. If Airport Director determines that Contractor violated the Labor Peace/Card Check Rule, Airport Director shall have the option to terminate this Agreement, in addition to exercising all other remedies available to him / her.
- 12.4 **Federal Fair Labor Standards Act.** This Agreement incorporates by reference the provisions of 29 USC §201, the Federal Fair Labor Standards Act (FLSA), with the same force and effect as if given in full text. The FLSA sets minimum wage, overtime pay, recordkeeping, and child labor standards for full and part time workers. Contractor has full responsibility to monitor compliance to the referenced statute or regulation. Contractor must address any claims or disputes that arise from this requirement directly with the U.S. Department of Labor Wage and Hour Division.
- 12.5 Occupational Safety and Health Act of 1970. This Agreement incorporates by reference the requirements of 29 CFR §1910 with the same force and effect as if given in full text. Contractor must provide a work environment that is free from recognized hazards that may cause death or serious physical harm to the employee. Contractor retains full responsibility to monitor its compliance and their subcontractor's compliance with the applicable requirements of the Occupational Safety and Health Act of 1970 (29 CFR §1910). Contractor must address any claims or disputes that pertain to a referenced requirement directly with the U.S. Department of Labor Occupational Safety and Health Administration.
- 12.6 **Federal Nondiscrimination Requirements.** During the performance of this Agreement, Contractor, for itself, its assignees, and successors in interest (hereinafter referred to as "Contractor") agrees as follows:
- 12.6.1 **Compliance with Regulations.** Contractor (hereinafter includes consultants) will comply with the Title VI List of Pertinent Nondiscrimination Acts And Authorities, as they may be amended from time to time, which are herein incorporated by reference and made a part of this Agreement.
- 12.6.2 **Nondiscrimination.** Contractor, with regard to the work performed by it during the Agreement, will not discriminate on the grounds of race, color, or national origin in the selection and retention of subcontractors, including procurements of materials and leases of equipment. Contractor will not participate directly or indirectly in the discrimination prohibited by the Nondiscrimination Acts and

Authorities, including employment practices when the Agreement covers any activity, project, or program set forth in Appendix B of 49 CFR §21.

- 12.6.3 **Solicitations for Subcontracts.** Including Procurements of Materials and Equipment: In all solicitations, either by competitive bidding, or negotiation made by Contractor for work to be performed under a subcontract, including procurements of materials, or leases of equipment, each potential subcontractor or supplier will be notified by Contractor of Contractor's obligations under this Agreement and the Nondiscrimination Acts And Authorities on the grounds of race, color, or national origin.
- 12.6.4 Information and Reports. Contractor will provide all information and reports required by the Acts, the Regulations, and directives issued pursuant thereto and will permit access to its books, records, accounts, other sources of information, and its facilities as may be determined by the Airport or the Federal Aviation Administration to be pertinent to ascertain compliance with such Nondiscrimination Acts and Authorities and instructions. Where any information required of a contractor is in the exclusive possession of another who fails or refuses to furnish the information, the contractor will so certify to the Airport or the Federal Aviation Administration, as appropriate, and will set forth what efforts it has made to obtain the information.
- 12.6.5 **Sanctions for Noncompliance.** In the event of a contractor's noncompliance with the Non-discrimination provisions of this Agreement, the Airport will impose such contract sanctions as it or the Federal Aviation Administration may determine to be appropriate, including, but not limited to:
- (a) Withholding payments to the contractor under the contract until the contractor complies; and/or
 - (b) Cancelling, terminating, or suspending a contract, in whole or in part.
- 12.6.6 **Incorporation of Provisions.** Contractor will include the provisions of paragraphs 12.6.1 through 12.6.6 in every subcontract, including procurements of materials and leases of equipment, unless exempt by the Acts, the Regulations and directives issued pursuant thereto. Contractor will take action with respect to any subcontract or procurement as the Airport or the Federal Aviation Administration may direct as a means of enforcing such provisions including sanctions for noncompliance. Provided, that if Contractor becomes involved in, or is threatened with litigation by a subcontractor, or supplier because of such direction, Contractor may request the Airport to enter into any litigation to protect the interests of the Airport. In addition, Contractor may request the United States to enter into the litigation to protect the interests of the United States.
- 12.6.7 **Title VI List of Pertinent Nondiscrimination Acts and Authorities.** During the performance of this Agreement, Contractor, for itself, its assignees, and successors in interest (hereinafter referred to as the "Contractor") agrees to comply with the following non-discrimination statutes and authorities; including but not limited to:
- Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 (42 USC §2000d *et seq.*, 78 stat. 252), (prohibits discrimination on the basis of race, color, national origin);
- 49 CFR part 21 (Non-discrimination In Federally-Assisted Programs of The Department of Transportation—Effectuation of Title VI of The Civil Rights Act of 1964);
- The Uniform Relocation Assistance and Real Property Acquisition Policies Act of 1970, (42 USC §4601), (prohibits unfair treatment of persons displaced or whose property has been acquired because of Federal or Federal-aid programs and projects);

- Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, (29 USC. §794 et seq.), as amended, (prohibits discrimination on the basis of disability); and 49 CFR §27;
- The Age Discrimination Act of 1975, as amended, (42 USC §6101 et seq.), (prohibits discrimination on the basis of age);
- Airport and Airway Improvement Act of 1982, (49 USC §471, Section 47123), as amended, (prohibits discrimination based on race, creed, color, national origin, or sex);
- The Civil Rights Restoration Act of 1987, (PL 100-209), (Broadened the scope, coverage and applicability of Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, The Age Discrimination Act of 1975 and Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, by expanding the definition of the terms "programs or activities" to include all of the programs or activities of the Federal-aid recipients, subrecipients and contractors, whether such programs or activities are Federally funded or not);
- Titles II and III of the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990, which prohibit discrimination on the basis of disability in the operation of public entities, public and private transportation systems, places of public accommodation, and certain testing entities (42 USC §12131 – 12189) as implemented by Department of Transportation regulations at 49 CFR §37 and 38 and the Department of Justice regulations at 28 CFR, parts 35 and 36;
- The Federal Aviation Administration's Non-discrimination statute (49 USC §47123) (prohibits discrimination on the basis of race, color, national origin, and sex);
- Executive Order 12898, Federal Actions to Address Environmental Justice in Minority Populations and Low-Income Populations, which ensures non-discrimination against minority populations by discouraging programs, policies, and activities with disproportionately high and adverse human health or environmental effects on minority and low-income populations;
- Executive Order 13166, Improving Access to Services for Persons with Limited English Proficiency, and resulting agency guidance, national origin discrimination includes discrimination because of limited English proficiency (LEP). To ensure compliance with Title VI, you must take reasonable steps to ensure that LEP persons have meaningful access to your programs (70 CFR at 74087 to 74100);
- Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972, as amended, which prohibits you from discriminating because of sex in education programs or activities (20 USC §1681 et seq.).
- **Ouality Standards Program.** This Agreement is subject to the Airport's Quality Standards Program. The Airport's Employment and Quality Standards (EQS) office oversees the Airport's Quality Standards Program (QSP) which is applicable to Service Providers at the Airport whose employees are involved in performing services that have an impact on Airport security and safety. Data and Security Article 13

13.1 Nondisclosure of Private, Proprietary or Confidential Information.

- 13.1.1 If this Agreement requires City to disclose "Private Information" to Contractor within the meaning of San Francisco Administrative Code Chapter 12M, Contractor and subcontractor shall use such information only in accordance with the restrictions stated in Chapter 12M and in this Agreement and only as necessary in performing the Services. Contractor is subject to the enforcement and penalty provisions in Chapter 12M.
- 13.1.2 In the performance of Services, Contractor may have access to City's proprietary or confidential information, the disclosure of which to third parties may damage City. If City discloses proprietary or confidential information to Contractor, such information must be held by Contractor in

confidence and used only in performing the Agreement. Contractor shall exercise the same standard of care to protect such information as a reasonably prudent contractor would use to protect its own proprietary or confidential information.

- 13.2 Payment Card Industry ("PCI") Requirements Not applicable.
- 13.3 Business Associate Agreement Not applicable.

Article 14 MacBride And Signature

14.1 **MacBride Principles -Northern Ireland**. The provisions of San Francisco Administrative Code §12F are incorporated by this reference and made part of this Agreement. By signing this Agreement, Contractor confirms that Contractor has read and understood that the City urges companies doing business in Northern Ireland to resolve employment inequities and to abide by the MacBride Principles, and urges San Francisco companies to do business with corporations that abide by the MacBride Principles.

Appendix A Scope of Services

1. Description of Services

- 1.1 In general, Contractor shall maintain a trained security staff of agreed upon size and capability to provide security guard and inspection services at San Francisco International Airport at the locations specified below. The days, locations and times of each post may vary. The guard service duties will include the following, depending on the location:
 - a. Airport media identification inspection and validation
 - b. Pre/Post security inspection of employees and their belongings
 - c. Pre/Post security inspection of concession/tenant deliveries and merchandise
 - d. General security services in response to TSA security directives or emergencies
 - e. Security services at passenger security checkpoints and exit lanes during non-TSA screening hours
 - f. Air Operations Area (AOA) access gate vehicle inspections and security services
 - g. Maintaining a written log of daily post activities
- 1.2 All post positions operate in a highly regulated security environment, and inspectors/guards will be responsible for duties related to securing the Airport against all threats. Additionally, the nature of these posts requires that:
 - a. Inspectors/guards be familiar with current TSA regulations regarding prohibited items; and
 - b. Inspectors/guards have a State of California Guard Card.
- 1.3 Current post positions and the hours of operation are listed below. The posts below are to be used as a general guide and are subject to change at the Airport's discretion, and may include additional locations and/or modified hours and number of days.

- a. The Airport may designate alternative and/or additional locations if needed either on a permanent or on-call/temporary basis.
- b. The Parties recognize that under the Emergency Agreement not all Posts can be initially staffed until the Contractor is able to hire additional guards. The Parties agree to work together to implement mutually agreed-to alternatives until full staffing is achieved.
- c. Contractor shall provide at least one (1) relief person when guards are on duty to ensure adequate relief. Uniformed Supervisors can augment the relief function and will provide relief on the back shift when it is efficient to do so.
- d. Contractor shall provide at least one (1) on-site supervisory personnel at the Airport when guards are on duty to ensure efficient provision of services. This position will be direct billed.
- e. Contractor shall ensure proper training and performance of all staff. Training occurring off post will be direct billable, as will On-the-Job-Training for new hires prior to them assuming Post responsibilities. Direct billable training is estimated at 12 hours per incumbent guard hired by the Contractor and 40 hours per new guard. Contractor shall provide the Airport with an advance copy of its training guide and curriculum and proposed schedule of training, and shall take into consideration and incorporate any changes and comments from the Airport. Contractor shall provide any necessary retraining as needed and when new TSA security directives are issued which affects these guard services. The Airport has the right to request that the Contractor reassign or remove any employee at any time for improper or unsatisfactory performance, including but not limited to theft, poor customer service, or violating any section of the Airport's Rules and Regulations, or TSA security directives.
- f. Services shall be performed by unarmed uniformed guard licensed by the State of California, possessing a State of California Guard Card, and familiar with current TSA regulations regarding prohibited items.
- g. Guards shall be uniformed, badged and neat in appearance and shall comply at all times with the Airport Rules and Regulations. Uniforms shall be provided and maintained at Contractor's expense. Uniforms shall be consistent in appearance style and color. Contractor's employees must also wear Airport-issued/approved valid identification badges, issued to the employee by the Airport's Security Access Office, at all times while on duty. These identification badges must be worn in a manner that makes them clearly visible at all times so as to present themselves in a professional manner.
- h. Contractor shall conduct visual inspections of all deliveries, merchandise, employees and their belongings accessing the Sterile Area. These inspection activities will occur at designated access points as noted in the charts above. (Airline Flight Crew and their

- belongings accessing the sterile area post-security from the ramp area are exempt from inspections).
- i. Inspection of deliveries/merchandise shall consist of inspecting for items prohibited by TSA in accordance with current regulatory requirements, and verifying that commercially packaged in boxes, cartons, containers, racks or packages have not been altered or tampered with.
- j. Inspections of employees and their belongings shall consist of ensuring that employees are not bringing any items prohibited by TSA, in accordance with TSA regulatory requirements and specifically, Security Directive (SD) 1542-01-07M, and the current TSA Permitted and Prohibited Items list. Relevant Airport Operations Bulletins or other Airport instructional/directive documents may apply.
- k. Contractor shall perform general security services as needed and respond to new Airport requests for compliance to new or revised TSA Security Directives and emergency situations. The Airport shall outline the conditions under which the additional work would apply.
- Contractor may be required to provide a cell phone for each guard staffing a post to use as a back-up form of communication. Contractor shall provide equipment, such as a small table and chair at each post.
- m. Airport may conduct audits of activities of service provider.
- n. The Contractor may use Screeners who are under contract with the TSA for the Screening Partnership Program (SPP) to staff the exit lane posts by extending their normally scheduled SPP hours to cover those non-screening operational hours for which the airport is responsible. Screeners provided by the Contractor to perform these extended exit lane hours must be certified to the TSA's Transportation Screening Officer (TSO) standards. The TSA certification shall preempt any other qualification requirements. The use of SPP screeners to extend exit lane hours cannot impact SPP operations. Contractor must receive approval from the Airport contract liaison prior to billing the Airport the Hourly Overtime Rate for Screeners (as shown on Appendix B). Overtime may be appropriate to cover extension of post hours and/or to cover emergencies or urgent service needs.
- o. Contractor must receive approval from the Airport contract liaison prior to billing startup expenses. Startup expenses may be appropriated to cover actual expenses incurred to commence guard services.
- 2. Services Provided by Attorneys. The City Attorney must review in advance and approve in writing any request for services to be provided by a law firm or attorney. The City will not pay any invoices for services provided by law firms or attorneys, including as subcontractors of Contractor, unless the provider receives advance written approval from the City Attorney.
- 3. Reports. Contractor shall submit written reports as requested by the Airport Commission. Format for the content of such reports shall be determined by the Airport Commission. The timely submission of all reports is a necessary and material term and condition of this Agreement. The reports, including any copies, shall be submitted on recycled paper and printed on double-sided pages to the maximum extent possible.

4. **Department Liaison.** In performing the services provided for in this Agreement, Contractor's liaison with the Airport will be the person identified in Agreement at Section 11.1, Notices to the Parties. Such individual shall be the Contractor's primary point of contact for all purposes under this Agreement.

Appendix B Calculation of Charges

1. General

For the complete and satisfactory performance of the services detailed in Appendix A of this Agreement, the City will pay fees and expenses upon proper invoicing and in accordance with the rates set forth in this Appendix B. Documentation of the Airport's approval for all invoiced amounts requiring advance Airport approval must be included with the Contractor's monthly invoices in order for payment to be made.

2. Start-Up Costs

Contractor shall be reimbursed for *all* costs incurred from 1:00 PM on April 5, 2018 through 10:59 p.m. on Monday, April 9, 2018 to initiate an accelerated transition of the services covered by this Emergency Agreement, including staff time, travel, training, applicant interviews, uniforms, profit and overhead.

3. Standard Billable Labor Rate

Contractor will bill Guard and Supervisor hours at a rate not to exceed \$40.19.

This rate includes transportation or parking allowances, fringe benefits, taxes, all direct (including but not limited to uniforms, pre-employment licenses, etc.), overhead expenses, general and administrative expenses, and profit. The following rates are based on a staff of approximately 36 uniformed guards and 4 uniformed supervisors. All guards are represented by the Service Employees International Union ("SEIU"). Contractor will abide by negotiated CBA wages and/or QSP, whichever is higher.

Guard and Supervisor hourly base rates are as follows:

4. Transportation Security Officer (TSO) Overtime Rate

Contractor will bill TSO Security Overtime Guard hours at a rate not to exceed \$44.13.

This hourly bill rate for TSO's who are providing graveyard shift exit lane support includes wages, fringe benefits, general and administrative expenses and profit.

5. Method of Payment

Contract shall submit monthly invoices in for the work performed in conformance with the procedures approved by the Commission. Each invoice shall clearly distinguish 1) Contract's Start-Up Costs, 2) Standard Billable Labor Hours, and 3) TSO Overtime Hours. Contractor will provide supporting documentation including, but is not limited to payroll, and receipts. Compensation shall be made in monthly payments within thirty (30) days of approval by Airport management of invoices and receipts submitted by Contractor.

DIRECTOR'S RECOMMENDATION: AWARD EMERGENCY CONTRACT NO. 50177, GENERAL AIRPORT SECURITY SERVICES, TO COVENANT AVIATION SECURITY, LLC FOR A PERIOD OF SIX MONTHS, IN AN AMOUNT NOT TO EXCEED \$1.7 MILLION.

Executive Summary

Commission approval is requested to award Emergency Contract No. 50177 for General Airport Security Services to Covenant Aviation Security, LLC. The current general security services contractor defaulted, and the Airport has issued a notice of termination of that contract, effective Monday, April 9, 2018, at 2300 hours. The scope of work of the emergency contract includes the performance of guard and inspection services at various posts throughout the Airport in compliance with Airport Rules and Regulations, Transportation Security Administration (TSA) Regulations and Security Directives, and the operational needs of the Airport. In addition, the contract provides for on-call guard services in the event of unforeseen emergencies or compliance requirements.

Background

The current general security services contractor defaulted, and the Airport has issued a notice of termination of that contract, effective Monday, April 9, 2018, at 2300 hours. As security is critical to safeguard the Airport, the traveling public, and the thousands of people who work at SFO, we must maintain continuous general security services with minimal interruption. The Airport contacted Covenant Aviation Security, LLC to take over the service immediately upon the departure of the defaulting contractor. Covenant was the second ranked proposer in the most recent Request for Proposals process for General Airport Security Services.

IVAR C. SATERO AIRPORT DIRECTOR The Airport and Covenant Aviation Security, LLC have successfully concluded negotiations and reached an agreement on the contract terms and conditions. These negotiations included an agreement that all qualified employees of the current general security services contractor would be offered employment with Covenant Aviation Security, LLC. Employees accepting employment with Covenant Aviation Security, LLC will receive no less than their current wages as well as benefits. Additionally, Covenant Aviation Security, LLC is immediately recognizing Service Employees International Union (SEIU) as the exclusive union representative for these employees.

Covenant Aviation Security, LLC will provide general security services to ensure compliance with Airport Rules and Regulations, TSA Regulations and Security Directives, and the operational needs of the Airport. These services include, but are not limited to: conducting required inspections of all deliveries; merchandise; consumables; and employees accessing the Sterile Area (post security) from the Secured Areas; Employee ID Badge verifications and inspections of their belongings as they access the Sterile and Secured Areas; guarding of security screening checkpoints and exit lanes during non-TSA screening hours; guarding of SFO Airport Commission buildings to ensure employee safety and security; guarding of airfield operations area access gates in support of remote aircraft bussing operations; and providing on-call services should an emergency or unforeseen circumstance arise.

Recommendation

I recommend that this Commission award Emergency Contract No. 50177, General Airport Security Services, to Covenant Aviation Security, LLC, in an amount not to exceed \$1.7 million, for a period of six months.

I further recommend that the Commission hereby direct the Commission Secretary to forward Emergency Contract No. 50177 to the Board of Supervisors for approval pursuant to Section 21.15 Emergency Procurement Procedures of the Administrative Code of the City and County of San Francisco.
