Most recently a large group of us travelled to Sacramento to the Senate Public and safety hearing to voice our support for AB 931 the police accountability and safety act. I have met with several legislators at the state and city level along the years and have confidence that I am able to fulfill my duties as part of the reentry council.

I understand the direct struggles of men and women in the reentry community as they return home from periods of incarceration – I have experienced it directly myself.

Currently, I am a Senior Organizer & Advocate for the Ella Baker Center for Human Rights. In my capacity, I empower directly impacted men and women to advocate and organize around criminal justice reform. As the senior organizer, I am responsible for the Alameda county work.

I have previously worked as program manager for the SF Tenderloin based non-profit, Hospitality House. There, I was charged with overseeing a men's homeless shelter program. The program saw an average of 700 homeless men a year. I supervised case management services and ensured effective programming for shelter residents and staff.

I am 2015 graduate of Stanford University, Project Remade. An intensive business program aimed at empowering formerly incarcerated men and women.

During the course of the class, I had the opportunity to get to know Jose's character. He is hard working, responsible, kind, and committed to a future as a productive member of society. He takes great pride in his work, seeing the humanity in each of the clients with whom he interacts. I have had the pleasure of supervising Jose Bernal in his position as our full-time, weekday overnight program monitor at Swords to Plowshares' Safe Haven program since September 23rd, 2015. He is responsible for maintaining the safety of our building and its Veteran inhabitants, many of whom are actively using drugs and alcohol while also suffering the effects of unmedicated mental illness. These issues can be especially challenging on Jose's shift in the middle of the night, and compounded by our location in the Tenderloin. Many of our Veterans, if not most, have been through jail and prison, are on probation or parole, and some are also registered sex offenders.

Jose has proven to have expertise in crisis intervention and de-escalation techniques, and I consider myself extremely lucky to be supervising an employee of his caliber. He takes his job and his duties very seriously, and demonstrates a very high level of professionalism. He approaches his interactions with our clients with a sense of compassion and empathy, responds to emergencies with poise and calm, and communicates well with me and his co-workers. Re: Reappointment of Jose Bernal Jimenez to the Reentry Council

Dear Chair Safai, Sup. Yee, and Sup. Stefani:

As a Co-Chair of the Reentry Council of the City and County of San Francisco, I am writing to strongly recommend Jose Bernal Jimenez for reappointment to the Council. The Public Defender's Office's Reentry Unit provides legal, social, and practical support to address the complex legal and social problems confronted by our clients. The Reentry Unit strives to eliminate the lifetime barriers to employment presented by having a criminal record, and to maximize the health and self-sufficiency of clients who are in need of prisoner reentry services.

Over the past several years, my staff and I have been continuously impressed with Jose Bernal's dedication to criminal justice reform and to the reentry community, his depth of knowledge of the issues, his thorough preparation for every meeting, and his communication skills when he makes presentations to the Council and other government bodies. He is also very knowledgeable about both the criminal justice system and how government works.

In 2017, Mr. Bernal raised concerns at the Council with the practices of some for-profit corporations contracting with the City and County to provide reentry services. He thoroughly researched the issue and made presentations to the Council and to the Board of Supervisors about what he had learned. His research and advocacy resulted in a unanimous Board resolution urging City departments to prioritize non-profit contracts and grants for reentry services.

Mr. Bernal then went on to educate the Council about the problems that gang injunctions have caused for the reentry community and for San Francisco's communities of color. I partnered with him to urge the City Attorney to reexamine his gang injunction policy. The Reentry Council agreed to take up this issue and the Board of Supervisors held a hearing. As a result, the City Attorney conducted a long-overdue review of the injunctions and 86 Black and Latino men were removed from injunctions this year.

Mr. Bernal is actively involved with the reentry community and works tirelessly to organize and empower justice-impacted and at-risk people. He has dedicated his life to advocating with and on behalf of these communities and to bringing them into the political process.

In every context in which we have worked with Mr. Bernal, we have been impressed with his professionalism, and his ability to communicate with people across the spectrum of race, class, gender, age, and power. We have seen him effectively negotiate in difficult political situations and bring broad coalitions to consensus.

Jose Bernal Jimenez is an asset to the Reentry Council and to the City and County of San Francisco. He is a voice for the marginalized and disenfranchised, and is deeply committed to the goals of the Reentry Council. San Francisco needs Mr. Bernal to continue on the Council.

My daily methamphetamine use culminated in me losing my legal job and then selling drugs to support myself, my family, and my habit. Once the Federal government indicted me on drug charges, they sent me to residential drug treatment while I was on pre-trial. Before being convicted and sentenced, I was able to complete the 6-month program and begin aftercare before having to go to prison.
My qualifications as required by each Seat that I qualify for: Seat #1 – I am a survivor of sexual abuse (incest) and domestic violence
Seat #2 I am the Director of Programs and Operations at Code Tenderloin, a nonprofit which does workforce development for people who have employment barriers. Many of the people we serve are justice involved. We provide job readiness training, wrap around services, and job placement assistance.
Seat #3 I was released from Federal Prison to the halfway house at 111 Taylor Street, San Francisco 94102 on September 6, 2016. On March 1, 2017, I left the halfway house and began Federal probation. I am currently still on Federal probation.

I graduated from the Georgia Institute of Technology with degree in Industrial Engineering. I have worked in both for profit (private) companies and nonprofit companies in various managerial positions. I have negotiated and managed outsourced service contracts, including establishing performance metrics, developing the Service Level Agreement, and managing contractual compliance and budgets. I worked for big Technology companies, such as Sybase and Siebel. I also worked for a nonprofit named the California Communications Access Foundation (CCAF), who managed the State mandated program for the CPUC called the Deaf and Disabled Telecommunications a Program.

My first job out of prison was as a host and food runner at Joe's Crab Shack. I then began working part time as the Programs Associate with Code Tenderloin. On May 1, 2017, I began working full time for Code Tenderloin as the Director of Programs and Operations.

Civic Activities:

I am a voting member of the Legislation, Policy, and Practices subcommittee of the SF Reentry Council and a working member of the Direct Services subcommittee. (I hope to be a voting member of both subcommittees moving forward.) I attend and participate in both subcommittee meetings consistently.

I am an active member of the Bay Area Blue Ribbon Commission on Fair Chance Hiring (BRC) (Root and Rebound). I am on the Addiction - Solutions/Strategies Working Group that was recently formed after the first SF Recovery Summit.

I was a proposal submissions reader/evaluator for the Employment Case Management RFQ for SF Adult Probation.

I've been with Glide 13 years and have held many staffing positions: Safety Team Monitor, Church and Meals Program, Client Advocate, Family Case Manager, Speak Out Host, Co-facilitator of the Women's Center support groups and facilitated Emotional Emancipation Circles for people of African descent. I am currently a Case Manager in Glide's Walk In Center and specifically focus on supporting the reentry population to stabilize and thrive. As Case Manager I serve a diverse population which assist with goal planning, treatment options, assessments, housing assistance, basic needs, and connecting with primary care and mental health services. The Walk In Center served 1,609 unduplicated clients with 14,678 units of service in the fiscal year 2016-2017. In addition In addition to my role in the Walk In Center, I facilitate Recovery Circles twice weekly for men and women who struggle with addiction and provide them with individual counseling as needed. I have jail clearance, and support the women in county jail #2 with reentry information every Monday. I often correspond with incarcerated individuals who send letters inquiring about reentry services and support from prison, and many connect with me upon release.

My full name is Shannon Latrice Wise. I am a 48-year African American female born 1970 in San Franciscan native born in 1970. I lived in the Fillmore district until the age of nine. My mom, brother and I then moved to Oakland. This is where brother and I attended grade school at Lakeview Elementary. Our single mother led family then moved to Albany CA to complete Albany middle & Albany high schools. I graduated in 1988.

I am a returning citizen. Like many young folks in their 20's do, I became addicted to drugs during the 1990's, which subsequently landed me in the San Francisco county jail more times than I'd like to remember. In 1998, I was convicted of a felony for marijuana sales and a misdemeanor for having a controlled substance & paraphernalia. I was then placed on felony probation and became a product of recidivism. During one of my many probation violation trips into custody, I completed the in-custody S.I.S.T.E.R.S program. However, I was still not ready to change my life. I would always get out and continue using.

After one to many probation violations, in 1998 I decided to try a residential program and went into Walden House, now HealthRight360, in San Francisco. After completing 15 months of residential treatment I soon relapsed. However, thanks to the San Francisco Police Department, I got arrested one last time in February 2000. The judge gave me two options, prison or recomplete the program, I chose the latter. I was re-sentenced to HealthRight360 in 2000. I successfully completed the program. With further assistance and support from the San Francisco public defender's office, in 2003 I expunged my San Francisco convictions.

Having served & worked for nonprofit agencies that serve individuals exiting the criminal justice system, low to moderate income earners, people of color, formerly homeless families, coupled with a background in recovery and deliverance, my focus has been to assist returning citizens, particularly women, and teach them the life skills necessary to transition to a positive and self₇ fulfilling life. And because it took other strong, positive women to advocate and show me how to change my life for the better, I'm here to show our newer returning citizen women that same way.

Board Qualifications:

The Reentry Council was created to coordinate local efforts to support adults exiting San Francisco county jail, San Francisco juvenile justice system out-of-home placements, the California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation facilities, and the United States Federal Bureau of Prison facilities.

The Council shall provide the Mayor, Board of Supervisors, the public, and any other appropriate agency with accurate and comprehensive information about programs that serve this population, barriers faced by this population, best practices to meet the needs of this population, and funding sources for programs and practices that address the needs of this population. The Council shall coordinate information sharing, planning, and engagement among all interested private and public stakeholders to the extent permissible under federal and state law.

The Council shall consist of 24 members, seven (7) of whom shall be former inmates in the San Francisco County Jail, a California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation facility, and/or a United States Bureau of Prison facility.

The Mayor, or his designee, shall serve as one (1) member, and shall also appoint three (3) of the members. One (1) of the three (3) members shall be between the ages of 18 and 24 at the time of appointment, and one (1) shall have expertise in providing services to individuals exiting the criminal justice system.

The Board of Supervisors shall designate one (1) of its members to serve as a member of the Council, and shall appoint four (4) of the seven (7) members who are former inmates (added and revised by Ordinance No. 44-11). Of these four (4) members:

> One (1) shall have expertise in providing services to individuals exiting the criminal justice system;

> One (1) must have been released from custody within three years of his/her appointment;

> One (1) must have served multiple terms of incarceration; and

> One (1) must self-identify as a survivor of violence or crime.

All members of the Council shall be exempt from the Charter requirement that they be electors of the City and County of San Francisco (added by Ordinance No. 26-09).

The following City departments or agencies shall appoint one (1) member each to the Council: Public Defender's Office; District Attorney's Office; Sheriff's Department; Police Department; Adult Probation Department; Juvenile Probation Department; Department of Economic and Workforce Development; Human Services Agency; Department of Children, Youth and Families; Department of Public Health; and Department of Homelessness and Supportive Housing (11 total).

In addition, co-chairs shall invite the San Francisco Superior Court, Department of Child Support Services, California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation Division of Adult Parole Operations, and United States Probation and Pretrial Services System to appoint one (1) member each to the Council. If any of these agencies do not appoint a representative, the cochairs shall appoint an additional member (4 total).

Members shall serve two-year terms and shall serve at the pleasure of the appointing authority. Members may serve multiple terms. If any member misses two regularly scheduled meetings in a twelve-month period without prior notice, the Council shall certify that fact in writing to appointing authority and the member shall be deemed to have resigned.

Twelve members of the Council shall constitute a quorum and the Council shall have the authority to act on the vote of the majority of the quorum.

The four members appointed by the Adult Probation Department, District Attorney's Office, Public Defender's Office and Sheriff's Department, respectively, as well as the Mayor or the Mayor's representative, shall co-chair the Council. The Council may establish subcommittees. The Council shall meet in full at least three times per year.

Reports: At least once a year, the Council shall prepare and submit a report that shall include,

but not be limited to, information identifying funding streams; programs serving individuals exiting the criminal justice system; needs of reentry population; and barriers to safe and successful reentry. City departments shall respond within 30 days, if mentioned in report. Reports shall be provided to the Mayor, Board of Supervisors, City departments identified in the report, and the public.

The Council shall be staffed, subject to fiscal and budgetary provisions of the Charter, by the Public Defender's Office, District Attorney's Office, Adult Probation Department, and Mayor's Office who shall designate one staff member each.

Sunset: June 1, 2019, unless the Board of Supervisors adopts an ordinance continuing its existence.
