[Administrative Code - Extension of the Public Utilities Revenue Bond Oversight Committee.]

Ordinance amending the Administrative Code to extend the sunset date of the Public Utilities Revenue Bond Oversight Committee, suspend provisions of Board Rule 2:21, for an additional six years to January 1, 2025.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco:

Section 1. Findings. The Board of Supervisors hereby finds and declares as follows: (a) Proposition P, a 2002 initiative ordinance (now codified at San Francisco Administrative Code, Sections 5A.30 et. seq.) created the Public Utilities Revenue Bond Oversight Committee ("RBOC") to provide independent oversight of the San Francisco Public Utilities Commission's ("SFPUC") expenditure of revenue bond proceeds on the repair, replacement, and expansion of the City's water, power, and wastewater facilities.

The RBOC monitors and reports publicly about the SFPUC's expenditure of revenue bond proceeds on the repair, replacement, upgrading and expansion of the City's water collection, power generation, water distribution, and wastewater treatment facilities.

The RBOC is required to provide oversight to ensure that: (1) revenue bond proceeds are expended only in accordance with the authorizing bond resolution and applicable law; (2) revenue bond proceeds are expended solely for uses, purposes and projects authorized in the bond resolution; and (3) revenue bond proceeds are appropriately expended for authorized capital improvements so that an uninterrupted supply of water and power continues to flow to the City and the SFPUC's customers.

(d) The RBOC has conducted monthly public hearings about SFPUC activities and provides annual reports of its findings to this Board and to members of the public.

(e) In accordance with Administrative Code Section 5A.36(a), the provisions of Proposition P would have expired on January 1, 2013, unless extended by ordinance. <u>Ordinance No. 236-12 extended the sunset date of the RBOC to January 1, 2016, and</u> <u>Ordinance No. 189-15 again extended the sunset date, to January 1, 2019.</u>

(f) — This Board adopted Ordinance No. 236-12 on December 4, 2012, signed by the Mayor on December 7, 2012, to extend the sunset date of the RBOC to January 1, 2016.

(g) — This Board This Board adopted Ordinance No. 189-15 on October 27, 2015, signed by the Mayor on November 4, 2015, to extend the sunset date of the RBOC to January 1, 2019.

(hf) The SFPUC will continue to incur bonded indebtedness to finance capital improvements for the repair, replacement, and expansion of its water enterprise, and will from time to time issue its revenue bonds to finance the cost of such improvements.

(ig) The SFPUC also expects to initiate a multi-billion dollar capital improvement program for the wastewater enterprise, and bonding for this program is expected to continue through 2025.

(h) In addition, the SFPUC expects to incur bonded indebtedness to finance capital improvements for the repair, replacement, and expansion of its power enterprise, and will from time to time issue its revenue bonds to finance the cost of such improvements.

(jhi) In order to ensure that revenue bonds of the SFPUC are used for their intended purposes, and to ensure that the SFPUC continues to employ the best management practices, it is necessary and desirable that the RBOC continue to provide oversight of the

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SFPUC expenditure of revenue bond proceeds.

Section 2. <u>Article V of Chapter 5 of</u> \mp the San Francisco Administrative Code is hereby amended by revising Section 5A.36 to read as follows:

SEC. 5A.36. SUNSET AND SEVERABILITY.

(a) Unless the Board by ordinance reauthorizes the provisions of this Ordinance for a specified period of years, the provisions of this Ordinance shall expire on January 1, *2019 2025*.

Section 3. Effective Date. This ordinance shall become effective 30 days after enactment. Enactment occurs when the Mayor signs the ordinance, the Mayor returns the ordinance unsigned or does not sign the ordinance within ten days of receiving it, or the Board of Supervisors overrides the Mayor's veto of the ordinance. Notwithstanding the Effective Date of this Ordinance, it is the intent of this Board that the authority conferred on the RBOC under Proposition P (codified at San Francisco Administrative Code, Sections 5A.30 et. seq.) shall be without interruption, and that the incumbent members of the RBOC shall continue to hold their seats without reappointment until the expiration of their respective terms.

Section 4. Scope of Ordinance. In enacting this ordinance, the Board of Supervisors intends to amend only those words, phrases, paragraphs, subsections, sections, articles, numbers, punctuation marks, charts, diagrams, or any other constituent parts of the Municipal Code that are explicitly shown in this ordinance as additions, deletions, Board amendment additions, and Board amendment deletions in accordance with the "Note" that appears under the official title of the ordinance. Notwithstanding Rule 2.21 of the Board of Supervisors Rules of Order, which provides that advisory bodies created by the Board should sunset within three years, the RBOC, along with Administrative Code Sections 5A.30 et seg. this Article XXV shall

expire on January 1, 2025 unless the Board of Supervisors adopts an ordinance continuing its existence reauthorizing those provisions, as stated in Section 5A.30.6(c). In the event this Article expires, the City Attorney shall cause it to be removed from the Administrative Code.

[Ordinance Amending San Francisco Administrative Code to Extend Sunset Date of the Revenue Bond Oversight Committee.]

Ordinance amending the Administrative Code to extend the sunset date of the Public Utilities Revenue Bond Oversight Committee for an additional six years to January 1, 2025.

Existing Law

Under Section 5A.36 of the Administrative Code, the Public Utilities Commission Revenue Bond Oversight Committee sunsets on January 1, 2019.

Background Information

Proposition P, a 2002 (now codified at S.F. Admin. Code, Sections 5A.30 et. seq.) an initiative ordinance, created the Public Utilities Revenue Bond Oversight Committee (RBOC) to provide independent oversight of the Public Utilities Commission's expenditure of revenue bonds proceeds on the repair, replacement and expansion of the City's water, power and wastewater facilities.

The RBOC monitors and reports publically about the Public Utilities Commission's (PUC) expenditure of revenue bond proceeds on the repair, replacement, upgrading and expansion of the City's water collection, power generation, water distribution and wastewater treatment facilities.

Under Proposition P, the original sunset date of the RBOC was January 1, 2013, unless extended by ordinance of the Board of Supervisors. The Board has from time to time extended the sunset date of the RBOC, the latest action being the adoption of Ordinance No. 189-15, adopted by the Board on October 27, 2015, and signed by the Mayor on November 4, 2015, to extend the sunset date of the RBOC to January 1, 2019.

The proposed Ordinance amends Administrative Code Section 5A.36 to extend the sunset date of the RBOC to January 1, 2025.

Dear Messrs. George and Leshner:

This letter is written in support of extending the sunset date of the Revenue Bond Oversight Committee (RBOC). The RBOC was originally scheduled to sunset on January 1, 2013 and is currently scheduled to sunset on January 1, 2019. The SFPUC supports the proposed extension for six years to January 1, 2025 in anticipation of continuing RBOC's oversight work of the SFPUC's capital programs,

Pursuant to Proposition P, as enacted by the voters of the City and County of San Francisco in 2002, RBOC provides valuable oversight over the SFPUC's expenditure of revenue bond proceeds on the repair, replacement, upgrading and expansion of San Francisco's regional water collection and distribution system, power generation, and wastewater treatment facilities operated by the SFPUC. RBOC has diligently and effectively provided oversight of the SFPUC's various capital programs, including the spending of revenue bond proceeds for the Water System Improvement Program (WSIP), helping guide this capital program toward completion.

The SFPUC has more recently embarked on financing and implementing the Sewer System Improvement Program (SSIP), a capital program that will provide critical upgrades and improvements to San Francisco's aging sewer and stormwater collection system. As with WSIP, revenue bonds are expected to be the primary funding source for the SSIP. I fully support the proposed extension in order to continue RBOC's mission and responsibilities. A resolution in support of RBOC's proposed extension will be formally heard by the Commission at the November 13, 2018 meeting.

Board of Supervisors Rules of Order 2.21 establishes certain criteria that must be included in legislation creating and establishing, or reauthorizing, new bodies (boards/commissions/task forces/advisory bodies) and requires the Clerk of the Board to advise the Board on certain matters. Through this Ordinance, the Board will be reauthorizing the Public Utilities Revenue Bond Oversight Committee. In order to fulfill these requirements, the following is provided:

File No. 181023Administrative Code - Extension of the Public Utilities Revenue
Bond Oversight Committee

The Public Utilities Revenue Bond Oversight Committee was established with the responsibility of reporting publicly to the Mayor, Public Utilities Commission (PUC), and Board of Supervisors on PUC's expenditure of revenue bond proceeds on the repair, replacement, upgrading and expansion of the City's water collection, power generation, water distribution, and wastewater treatment facilities.

The voters passed the Initiative Ordinance (Proposition P) in November 2002 that created the Oversight Committee; therefore, amendments to the Administrative Code are limited in order to stay consistent with the ballot measure.

Does a current body address the same or similar subject matter?

No, there is no current body that addresses the same or similar subject matter.



Language requiring the body to meet at least once every four months

There is no language in the Administrative Code that requires the Committee to meet at least once every four months.

• Language indicating members serve at the pleasure of the appointing authority

There is no language in the Administrative Code that indicates members serve at the pleasure of their appointing authority.

Language establishing attendance requirements

There is no language in the Administrative Code that establishes attendance requirements for members. However, the RBOC Bylaws state that "if a Committee member has misses three (3) consecutive duly called meetings of the Committee without informing the Chair as to the reason or cause of the absence, such Committee member shall be presumed to have vacated their position on the Committee. Thereupon the Chair shall place on the next succeeding agenda for the Committee's consideration an item to permit such member to appear and explain his or her absence from Committee meetings. Prior to such meeting, the Chair shall cause to be provided no later than 5 days prior to such meeting notice to the absent Committee member requesting their attendance at such meeting. If such member shall not attend the next succeeding meeting then and in such case the presumption shall become conclusive and such member shall be deemed to have vacated their position on the Committee. Thereafter the Chair shall promptly notify the appointing authority of the presumed vacancy and request that such vacancy be filled at the earliest possible date."

Number of seats and qualifications

There are a total of seven seats: two appointed by the Board of Supervisors, two appointed by the Mayor, one appointed by the Controller, and one member appointed by the governing body of the Bay Area Water Users Association.

The members appointed by the Board of Supervisors and the Mayor must individually, or collectively, have expertise, skills and experience in economics, the environment, construction, and project management. The member appointed by the Controller must have a background and experience in auditing, and project finance.



No current officer or employee of the City shall be appointed to the Committee. No vendor, contractor, or consultant of the City that performs work funded by bonds issued by the City shall be appointed to the Committee.

Term limits (i.e., commencement date? staggered terms?)

Each member shall serve for a term of four years, and for no more than two consecutive terms.

Administering department

The Board of Supervisors provides the Committee with clerical, technical, and administrative assistance to publicize the conclusions and recommendations of the Committee.

Reporting requirements

Section 5A.22 requires the Committee to issue regular reports (at least once a year) of its activities.

Sunset date

Section 5A.36 indicates the Committee shall expire on January 1, 2019. If the Ordinance is passed, the Committee shall be extended for an additional six years (January 1, 2025).
