

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## **RESOLUTION NO.**

[Urging Plan Approval - Interdepartmental Staff Committee on Traffic and Transportation -How Weird Street Faire Admission Fee]

Resolution urging the Interdepartmental Staff Committee on Traffic and Transportation to approve a proposed plan to allow the How Weird Street Faire to charge an admission fee.

WHEREAS, How Weird Street Faire has been a much-loved showcase of electronic music, fashion, art, performance, food, unique vendors and creativity for the last 20 years; and

WHEREAS, How Weird Street Faire takes place along 2nd Street between Clementina Street and Minna Street and along Howard Street between New Montgomery Street and 1st Street in a primarily commercial area; and

WHEREAS, How Weird Street Faire provides an economic boost to businesses in the vicinity of the faire; and

WHEREAS, How Weird Street Faire is classified as a full cost-recovery event and is required to reimburse the City for all police, fire, public works, and other expenses related to the event; and

WHEREAS, Non-profit organizations and small businesses are struggling to operate in the City due to the high cost of labor, permitting, and services; and

WHEREAS, How Weird Street Faire is produced by World Peace Through Technology, a non-profit organization that re-invests all event proceeds into the production of future events and donates the remaining proceeds to other non-profit organizations; and

WHEREAS, How Weird Street Faire has in the past been a free event dependent upon
attendee donations for a large portion of its budget; and

WHEREAS, Receipts from donations have not provided sufficient revenue to make necessary improvements to the staffing and public security elements of the event; and

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WHEREAS, The site of the How Weird Street Faire is approaching full capacity attendance but expanding the site is not possible due to permitting and residential access points; and

WHEREAS, An admission-based event would help moderate attendance and provide additional revenue for event improvements, public safety, and community donations; and

WHEREAS, The San Francisco Police Department (SFPD) made an initial recommendation for an admission fee for the dual purpose of crowd control and to provide funding for increased public safety measures; and

WHEREAS, The organizers of the How Weird Street Faire have worked with SFPD and staff from the Interdepartmental Staff Committee on Traffic and Transportation ("ISCOTT") on all of their plans for the event, including the proposal to charge admission; and

WHEREAS, In the spirit of accessibility, no one will be turned away from How Weird Street Faire for lack of funds; and

WHEREAS, How Weird Street Faire organizers will submit an access plan to allow free access to affected residents, employees, and business patrons; and

WHEREAS, Approval of this access plan will be a requirement of their ISCOTT permit; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco urges ISCOTT to approve the application including the plan to allow for gated admission and a modest admission charge for the How Weird Street Faire.

Hi Supervisor Haney and Zhihan,

This is John Wood, one of the producers of the How Weird Street Fair (HWSF). Prior to our meeting on Friday, I wanted to provide you with some background information about our event and the reason for our meeting.

As our lead Producer Michael O'Rourke explained in his introductory email, HWSF is a music and art based Street Fair entering its 20th year in District 6. It is produced by a 501c3 organization, World Peace Through Technology. Like most City Street Fairs, it has primarily been a free event, with attendees asked for donations upon entering.

As you know, San Francisco has become a very expensive city to do business and this has presented funding challenges for all of the City's non-profit Street Fairs. Most of the long time City Street Fairs (Castro Street Fair, Pride, Haight Street Fair etc.) are covered under legislation that subsidizes City Costs (such as Police), but in the 1990's new events (including the How Weird Street Fair), were required to be full cost recovery events. HWSF has managed for 20 years to pay such costs, but it has left no funds for improving the event.

In addition, the City's Street Fairs have challenges because of new construction including large housing developments, office towers and traffic islands that have happened within our festival sites. In most cases, events have lost street space and in all cases, it is impossible to expand. Consequently, some events including Folsom Street Fair and HWSF, have reached capacity or over capacity attendance, presenting public safety challenges.

To cope with both of these issues, HWSF in 2018 developed and implemented with Southern Station of the SFPD, an admission based plan, with the intent of lowering capacity and to raise extra funds for increased security and event staffing. We presented this to ISCOTT and our permit was granted with the provision that we would submit an access plan, to allow free admittance to neighbors, business owners and staff or anyone who wanted to access the site but who were not attending our event.

We submitted and implemented that plan in 2018 and it was successful in lowering attendance and raising extra funds to cover additional staffing, grants for art at the event and we made approximately \$40,000 in donations to other NFP groups. Most attendees bought pre-sale tickets online before the event, with tickets ranging from \$15-25. A smaller number paid cash at the door. We had a separate lane for "local access" and anyone who told us that they were not attending our event but needed to access the site were allowed in free. We did not ask for any proof, just allowed people in free who requested it.

We were informed in the days prior to our event, that in order to charge admission on the city streets, we also should have had a resolution from the Board of Supervisors granting that

permission. At that point, we had already been selling pre-sale tickets for 2 months, so it was impossible to change the plan. SFPD was in support of the admission plan to not only reduce over crowded conditions but to provide greater security, so we went ahead with that plan day of event.

So for 2020 we would like to do the same plan, so we are asking your support for the required resolution to again allow an admittance charge. Here is the language requiring the resolution from the ISCOTT permit:

#### SIDEWALK ACCESS

The temporary use or occupancy of a public street shall not unnecessarily obstruct or bar public access onto said street. Sidewalks shall remain open at all times for pedestrian use unless closure of the sidewalk is provided for by resolution of the Board of Supervisors explaining the reasons for such closure

I am providing a previous BOS resolution from the San Francisco Lovevolution event that was written by Supervisor Mirkarimi to allow admission for that event. We used that resolution as a template and wrote a draft resolution that could be used for HWSF this year. This resolution, edited as you see fit, would allow HWSF to enact our admission policy again this year.

Resolution approving the plan to allow a gated \$10 admission charge to the Lovevolution festival in Civic Center Plaza, which is scheduled to take place on Saturday, October 3rd 2009, pending the approval of the Interdepartmental Staff Committee on Traffic and Transportation (ISCOTT).

WHEREAS, San Francisco Lovevolution, formerly known as Lovefest, is an annual electronic music event that consists of a parade down Market Street and a festival in Civic Center Plaza; and

WHEREAS, San Francisco Lovevolution is now the largest electronic music event in America and attracts attendees from all over the world; and,

WHEREAS, The 2009 San Francisco Lovevolution parade and festival is scheduled to take place on Saturday, October 3rd 2009; and,

WHEREAS, Lovevolution is a major destination event that generates business for the local economy and tax revenue for the City, as well as contributing to the City's reputation as a global creative center; and

WHEREAS, Lovevolution is classified as full cost-recovery event, which means the event is required to reimburse the City for all police, fire, public works, and other expenses related to the event; and,

WHEREAS, In recent years San Francisco has raised a number of fees related to outdoor events including the cost of permits for the use of City parks and Fire Department fees for street fairs; and,

Supervisor Mirkarimi BOARD OF SUPERVISORS WHEREAS, In addition to these increases in city fees, San Francisco's outdoor events are also suffering from declining revenues caused by the economic downturn that threaten the viability of many of the City's cherished outdoor events; and,

WHEREAS, In order to keep Lovevolution a financially viable event, Lovevolution proposes charging a \$10 admission fee for the festival portion of the event at Civic Center Plaza, while maintaining the parade as a free event; and,

WHEREAS, Lovevolution is a non-profit organization that invests any profits into future events and regularly donates to other non-profit organizations; and

WHEREAS, The organizers of Lovevolution have worked with the staff of the Interdepartmental Staff Committee on Traffic and Transportation (ISCOTT) on all of their plans for the event, including the proposal to charge admission to the festival; and

WHEREAS, Civic Center Plaza is an appropriate place to charge admission because there are no residences located within the gated area of Lovevolution that would be impacted; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco approves of the plan to allow a gated \$10 admission charge for the 2009 Lovevolution festival, pending approval of the application by ISCOTT.
