2	Resolution declaring October 11 to 18, 2004 as Binational Health Week and urges the
3	people of San Francisco County to join the people of Mexico and all Californians of
4	Mexican origin in observing and participating Binational Health Week
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6	WHEREAS, The Secretariat of Health and the Secretariat of Foreign Relations of the
7	United Mexican States, the California State Department of Health Services, the Health
8	Commission of the Institute for Mexicans Abroad (IME), the United States-Mexico Border
9	Health Commission, and the University of California, California-Mexico Health Initiative
10	(CMHI), have recognized the necessity of improving access to health services to migrant and
	immigrant workers and their families in the State of California; and
11	WHEREAS, Migrants laborers and immigrants of Mexican origin and their families
12	have limited access to health care; and
13	WHEREAS, According to the 2000 United States Census, of the 8.45 million people
14	of Mexican origin living in California, 3.7 million were born in Mexico; and
15	WHEREAS, Seventy-seven percent (77%) of Latinos in California are of Mexican
16	origin and of the total population of Mexican immigrants living in the United States, forty-four
17	percent (45%) of the in are in California; and
	WHEREAS, Ninety-one percent (91%) of California's hired agricultural workers were
18	born in Mexico and improving the health of mobile populations requires multiple approaches in
19	service design, delivery, funding priorities, and most fundamentally, requires strong binational
20	commitment; and
21	WHEREAS, In October 2001, 2002, and 2003, the California-Mexico Health Initiative
22	(CMHI), a program of the California Policy Research Center, the University of California Office
23	of the President and partnering organizations convened the first three Binational Health
24	Weeks, an unprecedented effort overseen by multi-agency task forces, which conducted
	health promotion activities involving over 500 of community-based organizations from 22
25	California counties and 8 Mexican states; and

1	WHEREAS, Over 1,000 people participated in planning and implementing activities,
	and over 70,000 people received direct health care services during the 2003 Binational Health
2	Week; and
3	WHEREAS, Binational Health Week reflects coordinated efforts between California
4	and Mexico to improve the quality of life of immigrant families by expanding their access to
5	health care, increasing their health insurance coverage, and reducing their unmet health
6	needs; and
7	WHEREAS, the California-Mexico Health Initiative (CMHI) operates in California, and
8	in the states of origin of workers in Mexico; and
	WHEREAS, Binational Health Week is a bilateral collaborative effort between CMHI
9	and the Mexican Secretary of Health (SSA) and Foreign Affairs (SRE), with the active
10	participation of state and local organizations. In California, the Department of Health Services
11	(DHS), border-health organizations, Mexican consulates, the Latino Legislative Caucus,
12	community clinics and community-based organizations endorse this effort; and
13	WHEREAS, The objective of Binational Health Week is to generate a dynamic
14	dialogue between California and Mexico representatives, and the CMHI vision is that "the
	health of California is the health of its immigrants"; and
15	WHEREAS, California and Mexico share a population, and they need to share
16	common strategies to address this population's health needs; now, therefore, be it
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18	RESOLVED, That the San Francisco County Board of Supervisors declare October
19	11 to 18, 2004 as Binational Health Week and urges the people of San Francisco County to
20	join the people of Mexico and all Californians of Mexican origin in observing and participating
	Binational Health Week.
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
