10	eliminate the fee for night service, to substitute a flat fee for supplemental supplies in
11	place of fees for individual supplies used to treat each patient, to amend the language
12	regarding changes in fees in subsequent years to fix typographical errors, to eliminate
13	the provision by which the San Francisco Fire Department could add charges for
14	additional supplies, and to make environmental findings.

18	Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco:
19	Section 1. The San Francisco Health Code is hereby amended by adding Section
20	120.1, to read as follows:
21	(a) The San Francisco Fire Department shall waive its fee for Emergency Medical
22	Services if the patient and/or any other person legally obligated to pay provides the
23	Department with reliable information that:
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1	 The patient and/or any other persons who are legally obligated to pay have
2	insufficient annual income to pay the bill without undue hardship. The Fire
3	Department shall define "insufficient income" but may not define it at a rate less
4	than 300% of the Federal Poverty Level as set forth in the Federal Register;
5	and,
6	2. The patient is not covered by any insurance that would pay for the services
7	and cannot obtain MediCal or MediCare.
8	(b) The Fire Department has the sole authority to determine whether the information
9	provided supports a waiver of the fee.
10	Section 2. The San Francisco Health Code is hereby amended by amending Section
11	128.1, to read as follows:
12	Sec. 128.1 PATIENT RATES/Fire Department EMS Services
13	(a) The Board of Supervisors approves the following fee schedule for Fire Department
14	ambulance services and emergency medical service supplies for fiscal year 2005-2006:
15	1. Emergency Medical Services
16	Treatment without Transportation, a base rate fee of \$195.00 per call.
17	Basic Life Service, a base rate fee of \$473.25 \$690.00 \$700.00 per call.
18	Advanced Life Service, a base rate fee of \$691.00 \$810.00 per call.
19	Mileage, an additional fee above the base rate of $\$13.15$ $\$15.00$ per mile
20	Night service (7:00 p.m. to 7:00 a.m.), an additional fee above the base rates of \$74.57
21	2. Emergency Medical Supplies:
22	Supplemental charges for supplies will be assessed at a flat fee of \$20.00 per incident.

(b) Beginning with Fiscal Year <u>2004-2005-2005-2006</u>, <u>the</u> fees set in this section <u>may be</u> <u>amended</u> without further action by the Board of Supervisors, to reflect changes in the Medical

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1	Consumer Price Index as determined by the Controller. No later than April 15th of each year,
2	the Fire Department shall submit its current fee schedule to the Controller, who shall apply the
3	price index adjustment to produce a new fee schedule for the following year.
4	(c) The San Francisco Fire Department may from time to time change or add medications and
5	supplies used by emergency medical services according to the Advanced Life Support Scope of
6	Practice under Title 22 of the California Code of Regulations. With the approval of the Controller, the
7	Department may set the fees for those additional items based on the usual and customary industry
8	standards.
9	(d) (c) No later than May 15th of each year, the Controller shall file a report with the
10	Board of Supervisors reporting the new fee schedule and certifying that: (a) the fees produce
11	sufficient revenue to support the costs of providing the services for which each fee is
12	assessed, and (b) the fees do not produce revenue which is significantly more than the costs
13	of providing the services for which each fee is assessed.
14	Section 2. The Planning Department has determined that the actions contemplated in
15	this Ordinance are in compliance with the California Environmental Quality Act (California
16	Public Resources Code sections 21000 et seq.) . Said determination is on file with the Clerk
17	of the Board of Supervisors in File No and is incorporated herein by
18	reference.
