| 16 | WHEREAS, Proposition 75 would tilt the political balance even further toward |
| 17 | corporate interests; and |
| 18 | WHEREAS, Proposition 75 has a hidden agenda, which is to destroy the ability of |
| 19 | public employee unions to protect important programs such as public education, health care, |
| | and public safety that serve all the people of California; and |
| 20 | WHEREAS, Earlier this year, after Governor Schwarzenegger attempted to cut the |
| 21 | pensions of public employees, public employee unions exposed the consequences of his |
| 22 | plans to the public, causing the Governor to back down; and |
| 23 | WHEREAS, Supporters of Proposition 75 pretend to speak on behalf of union workers, |
| 24 | but have never been union members themselves, and instead are individuals who oppose |
