WHEREAS, On April 20, 2006, the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) issued a press release, which stated "no sound scientific studies supported medical use of marijuana for treatment in the United States, and no animal or human data supported the safety or efficacy of marijuana for general medical use"; and

WHEREAS, The press release stated that the evaluations previously performed negated the benefits of medical marijuana, yet the press release lacked any substantial documentation of this claim and did not cite any scientific facts or studies; and,

WHEREAS, In 1999, the Institute of Medicine (IOM) published a report at the request of the White House Office of national Drug Control Policy, which concluded that marijuana's active components are potentially effective in treating pain, nausea, the anorexia of AIDS wasting, and other symptoms, and that marijuana should be tested rigorously in clinical trials; and,

WHEREAS, The FDA is charged with protecting the public health, but the agency has failed to respond adequately to the IOM's findings seven years after the study was published; and,

1	WHERAS, The FDA's Investigational New Drug (IND) Compassionate Access
2	Program allows patients with certain medical conditions to apply with the FDA to receive
3	federal marijuana, in direct contradiction of the FDA's press release; and
4	WHERAS, Several members of congress, including Maurice D. Hinchey, Ron Paul,
5	Barney Frank, and Sam Farr, have written a letter to Andrew C. von Eschenbach, M.D., the
6	acting commissioner of the FDA urging him to fully explain and support with scientific facts
7	the April 20 th press release; now, therefore, be it
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9	RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco
	urges the California's and San Francisco's congressional district to sign the letter to the FDA;

11	FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San
