1	[Police Foot Patrols.]
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3	Ordinance adopting Section 10A.1 of the San Francisco Administrative Code to
4	establish a one-year pilot program requiring foot patrols in crime-impacted areas within
5	the boundaries of Northern, Park, Tenderloin, Mission, Ingleside, Taraval, Southern and
6	Bayview Police District Stations, and require reporting and review on the effectiveness
7	of the foot patrols.

11	Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco:
12	Section 1. Findings. A police foot patrol program has multiple potential benefits,
13	including increasing police visibility and presence; deterring criminal and disorderly conduct
14	and reducing the incidence of crime; increasing police knowledge of and involvement with the
15	patrolled community; increasing community familiarity and confidence in the police;
16	encouraging community cooperation with police services and operations; enhancing citizens'
17	sense of safety; and generating information relevant to preventing and solving crime. A police
18	foot patrol program may have particular benefit in commercial and high-crime areas.
19	The San Francisco Police Department currently staffs certain police foot patrols
20	throughout the City. In order to review and assess the effectiveness of a police foot patrol
21	program, the Board of Supervisors hereby implements a formal pilot foot patrol program at
22	eight designated Police District Stations, with defined patrol areas, conditions and reporting
23	requirements. This pilot program is designed to provide data to assist the City in evaluating
24	the effectiveness of a foot patrol program and in determining what additional actions to take, if
25	any, regarding a police foot patrol program in the City and County.

1	Section 2. The San Francisco Administrative Code is hereby amended by adding
2	Section 10A.1, to read as follows:
3	Sec. 10A.1. PILOT FOOT PATROL PROGRAM.
4	(a) Foot Patrols at Park and Northern, Tenderloin, Mission, Ingleside, Taraval,
5	Southern and Bayview Stations.
6	(1) The officer in charge at Park Police Station shall assign no fewer than one officer in two
7	of the three daily watches (days, swing, nights), for a total of two officers per twenty-four hour period,
8	to walk a foot beat. The officer in charge shall select from among the following foot beats, based on his
9	or her assessment of the most critical and immediate need for a physical police presence to address and
10	prevent crime: Officers shall walk in the following neighborhoods. Streets and locations are
11	provided solely for the purpose of describing the neighborhoods. Foot beat officers are not
12	required to walk on all the listed streets, and may walk on other streets within the general area
13	of the neighborhood.
14	(A) PARK STATION 1 (Western Addition) WESTERN ADDITION (Park Station 1):
15	bounded by Geary Blvd. on the North, Pierce St. on the East, Fulton Page St. on the South, and
16	Divisadero Broderick St. on the West, with particular attention to Kimbell Playground, and Alamo
17	<u>Square.</u>
18	(B) PARK STATION 2 (Haight, Upper Market, Panhandle) HAIGHT, UPPER
19	MARKET, PANHANDLE (Park Station 2): bounded by Fell St. on the North, Baker Divisadero St.
20	on the East, Haight St. on the South, and Stanyan St. on the West, with particular attention to Kezar
21	Dr., Alvord Lake, Buena Vista Park and Panhandle Park.
22	(C) PARK STATION 3 (Inner Sunset) INNER SUNSET (Park Station 3): bounded by
23	Lincoln Way on the North, 3 rd Avenue on the East, Parnassus St. on the South, and 8th 10 th Avenue on
24	the West. (The Captains of Park and Taraval Stations shall consult with each other at least
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1	once per week, or more frequently as needed, regarding foot patrol coverage for the Inner
2	Sunset commercial and residential corridor.)
3	(2) The officer in charge at Northern Police Station shall assign no fewer than one officer in
4	two of the three daily watches (days, swing, nights), for a total of two officers per twenty-four hour
5	period, to walk a foot beat. The officer in charge shall select from among the following foot beats,
6	based on his or her assessment of the most critical and immediate need for a physical police presence
7	to address and prevent crime: Officers shall walk in the following neighborhoods. Streets and
8	locations are provided solely for the purpose of describing the neighborhoods. Foot beat
9	officers are not required to walk on all the listed streets, and may walk on other streets within
10	the general area of the neighborhood.
11	(A) NORTHERN STATION 1 (Hayes Valley) HAYES VALLEY (Northern Station 1):
12	bounded by Fulton St. on the North, Gough St. on the East, Hayes St. on the South, and Fillmore St. on
13	the West, with particular attention to Rose Page mini-park and the Hayes Valley Community Center.
14	(B) NORTHERN STATION 2 (Western Addition) WESTERN ADDITION (Northern
15	Station 2): bounded by Ellis Geary St. on the North, Laguna St. on the East, McAllister St. on the
16	South, and Pierce St. on the West, with particular attention to Rosa Parks Elementary School and
17	Senior Center, the Buchanan St. Mall, Ella Hill Hutch Community Center, the African-American Arts
18	& Cultural Center, Jefferson Park, Fillmore-Turk mini-park, Jefferson Square, Hayward
19	Playground and Buchanan YMCA.
20	(C) NORTHERN STATION 3 (Lower Haight) LOWER HAIGHT (Northern Station 3):
21	bounded by Page St. on the North, Laguna St. on the East, Laussat St. on the South, and Divisadero St.
22	on the West, with particular attention to Koshland Park.
23	(D) NORTHERN STATION 4 (Japantown) JAPANTOWN (Northern Station 4):
24	bounded by Post St. on the North, Laguna St. on the East, Geary Blvd. on the South and Scott St. on the
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1	West, with particular attention to the Japantown Cultural & Trade Center, Hamilton Recreation Center
2	& Playground, and Japanese Peace Plaza.
3	(3) The officer in charge at the Tenderloin, Mission, Ingleside, Taraval, Southern
4	and Bayview Police Stations shall assign to a foot beat no fewer than one officer in two of the
5	three daily watches (days, swing, nights), for a total of two officers per twenty-four hour
6	period, at each station. The officer in charge shall select the area to be covered by the foot
7	beat, based on his or her assessment of the most critical and immediate need for a physical
8	police presence to address and prevent crime.
9	(3-4) The Captains of Northern and, Park, Tenderloin, Mission, Ingleside, Taraval,
10	Southern and Bayview Stations shall consult with each other and with the Captains of the Richmond
11	and Taraval Stations at least once per week, or more frequently as needed, regarding crime and crime
12	trends within the areas covered by their respective stations. The Captains of Northern and, Park,
13	Tenderloin, Mission, Ingleside, Taraval, Southern and Bayview Stations shall take information
14	gained from these consultations into account, and shall coordinate with each other, in determining
15	which beats, during which watches, to staff.
16	(4-5) The officer in charge of Northern and, Park, Tenderloin, Mission, Ingleside,
17	Taraval, Southern and Bayview Stations shall assign at least one officer to walk a beat during
18	the swing and night shifts staff the foot beats described above, except where an emergency
19	prevents such staffing. Foot patrol officers shall not be called off their foot beat except in an
20	emergency. If a foot patrol that is required by this ordinance is not staffed or is shortened due to a foot
21	patrol officer being called off his or her beat, the Station Captain shall make a report, in writing, to the
22	Chief of Police. The report shall include the beat not staffed or shortened by the call-off of the
23	assigned officer, and the reasons therefore.
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1	(6) The Police Department, in its discretion, may staff a foot beat with two or more
2	officers, where additional staffing would increase officer safety or enhance the effectiveness of
3	the foot patrol.
4	(7) Notwithstanding the detailed street descriptions in Sections 10A.1(a)(1) and
5	10A.1(a)(2), above, the officers in charge at Park and Northern Stations during any shift in
6	which a foot patrol is staffed shall have discretion to determine the specific route based on
7	community needs and evolving or emerging patterns of criminal activity or suspected criminal
8	activity.
9	(b) Requirements for Officers and Supervisors. Foot patrols shall be managed to identify
10	and reduce the incidence of crime in the areas most heavily impacted by crime.
11	(1) Officers assigned to foot patrols shall:
12	(A) Make every effort to be known in the community through constant interactions with
13	residents. In particular, officers on foot patrol should establish a periodic physical police presence at
14	schools, community centers, senior centers, homeless shelters, churches and other places of worship,
15	housing authority developments, after school program locations, and other locations where seniors,
16	children and youth gather.
17	(B) Identify and address crime and nuisance problems that impact the quality of life and the
18	level of fear of neighborhood residents. Foot patrol officers should work with neighborhood residents
19	and City agencies to identify and eliminate any structural, physical, or other features that may hide or
20	encourage crime or criminal activity.
21	(C) Foster collaboration and open communication between police officers and community
22	members, including neighborhood groups, merchants, faith-based groups, schools, and neighborhood
23	<u>leaders.</u>
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1	(D) Encourage residents' involvement in activities that contribute to crime prevention,
2	including neighborhood watch activities, neighborhood clean-up and beautification, and crime
3	prevention educational programs.
4	(2) The Captains of Park and, Northern, Tenderloin, Mission, Ingleside, Taraval,
5	Southern and Bayview Stations, and other commissioned officers as appropriate, shall:
6	(A) Work with foot patrol officers and the community to develop policing priorities and
7	strategies – including prevention, intervention and enforcement – that are specific to the neighborhood
8	and the needs of its residents.
9	(B) Assist in the recruitment, orientation, training and evaluation of officers assigned to foo
10	patrols.
11	(C) Establish and oversee the reporting and tracking systems required by this Section.
12	(c) <u>Citywide study, Reporting and Review.</u>
13	(1) The Police Department shall compile data regarding all reported crime within the foot
14	beats described in Section 10A.1(Aa), by type, during the one year period of this pilot program. The
15	Captains of Park and, Northern, Tenderloin, Mission, Ingleside, Taraval, Southern and Bayview
16	Stations shall also keep detailed records of the foot beats actually staffed, including time, date and
17	officer or officers assigned.
18	The Captains of Park and, Northern, Tenderloin, Mission, Ingleside, Taraval, Southern
19	and Bayview Stations shall report the data on the incidence of crime and the staffing of foot beats at
20	each monthly community meeting held in the District Station.
21	(2) Six months and one year from the effective date of this ordinance, the Police
22	Department shall submit to the Board of Supervisors, the Police Commission and the Mayor's Office of
23	Criminal Justice a comprehensive report analyzing the effectiveness of this pilot program in reducing
24	crime within the areas described by the foot beats in Section 10A.1(Aa). The report shall include all
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1	reported incidents of crime within those foot beats, by type, during the reporting period, compared with
2	a relevant period prior to establishment of this pilot program, and an analysis of the actual staffing of
3	the beats during the reporting period.
4	(3) The Police Department, in consultation with the Controller's Office and the
5	Mayor's Office of Criminal Justice, shall engage in a comprehensive study of the need for and
6	the efficacy of foot patrols throughout all areas of the City. With an emphasis on areas
7	experiencing high incidents of crime, and in particular violent crime, the Police Department
8	shall identify those foot patrols that will best serve the goal of deterring crime and enhancing
9	police-community relations. There shall be at least one foot beat in the area covered by each
10	and every District Station. The Police Department shall report its findings to the Board of
11	Supervisors and the Police Commission as part of the six-month report required by Section
12	10A.1(c)(2). The Board of Supervisors shall hold a hearing on the feasibility of adopting a
13	Citywide foot patrol program.
14	(d) General Welfare Clause. In undertaking the enforcement of this ordinance, the City is
15	assuming an undertaking only to promote the general welfare. It is not assuming, nor is it imposing on
16	its officers and employees, an obligation for breach of which it is liable in money damages to any
17	person who claims that such breach proximately caused injury.
18	(e) One-Year Sunset. This ordinance shall expire by operation of law one year from the
19	effective date of the ordinance. Upon the expiration of this ordinance, the City Attorney shall cause it
20	to be removed from the published code.
